## Survey Shows Only Wayne Lacks Radio

In a recent survey of 26 towns in Nebraska, ranging in size from 2,500 to 8,301 population, Wayne was the only one without a police radio system.

In all other respects, such as salaries, vacations, uniform allowances and vehicles, Wayne compared favorably. Except that Wayne and Kimball were the only towns with populations over 4,000 that had only 4 police officers.

The survey pointed up a definite need of summoning the police in Wayne since the present light method will have to be discontinued with the advent of the dial telephone system.

The present method of calling an officer, which has proven to be highly ineffective, is to light a light above the street on the corner of Second and Main and hope an officer is in the area to see it.

The light is turned on by the telephone operator taking the call for police.

A short time ago it took this reporter 30 minutes to contact a police officer who was on duty at the other end of town.

With the coming of the dial system, a new method will have to be found since there will be no telephone operators to turn on the light.

### Teacher Appointed By Normal Board To Ask Area Residents To Use Opportunity

The State Normal Board Monday appointed a new member to the Wayne State faculty, accepted five resignations, and awarded contracts for furnishing the new Student Center.

Appointed to the faculty was Nancy Dale Nieman as instructor in Spanish. She has a bachelor's degree from Beloit college and is completing studies for a master's this summer in Madrid under the Middlebury college program abroad.

The resignations: Gerald Gullickson and his wife, Dr. Christine Gullickson, both in the language faculty; Mrs. Elizabeth Woodridge, mathematics; Dr. Mary Fitzpatrick, women's physical education, and Thoburn Taggart, assistant librarian.

The board awarded contracts for Student Center furnishings to the Larson Kuhn Company of Wayne and to Orchard and Wilhelm of Omaha. Completion of the building is expected in July, and the food service will transfer to its new cafeteria quarters in August.

Paving of service roads and sidewalks around the center was authorized, but the extent of paving awaits further study.

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## Four Injured In Head-on Accident North of Wayne

A Walthill man was fined on three counts and had his driver's license revoked for six months in Wayne county court Tuesday, on charges growing out of a head-on collision two miles north of Wayne on Highway 15 Sunday night.

Robert E. Redding, 21, Walthill, was fined \$75 for willful reckless driving, \$10 for failure to yield right of way and \$10 for failure to dim headlights, plus \$4 costs and lost his license.

The charges were filed by Sheriff Don Weible after four people were injured in the accident.

## Summer Enrollment Tops Previous Record by 85

Summer school enrollment, completed Friday, has made Wayne State College the busiest ever in its summer history.

There are 1,081 students in resident college courses, and more will register in July for the second summer session or for workshops or field trips.

The previous summer record was 996 students two years ago. Of the present figure, 894 enrolled for the first summer session, and 287 were already here, attending third-term classes since April 23.

Thus Wayne's three-term trimester schedule, inaugurated last September, has accomplished one of its goals — to make fuller use of college facilities. In past years a few students under the two-semester system attended summer school too, but not as many as have stayed on for the new third term.

Traditionally summer school has attracted mainly teachers in service, and this year's summer session has about the usual number.

Enrollment shows gains in all classes, especially the freshman and senior, up 54 and 60 percent respectively. The number of graduate students went up from 122 last year to 147.

The institute is pioneering a new approach to teaching English. Nebraska is one of three universities in the United States conducting such institutes.

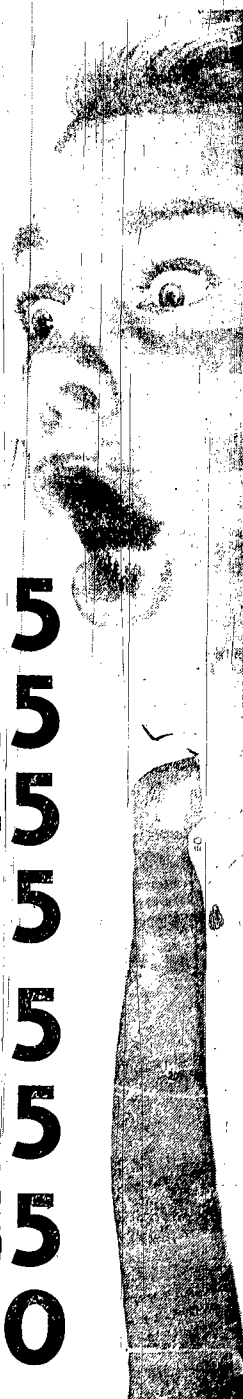
