

(Continued from page 1) After four years of teaching here, he began working full-time for the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co. "I wanted to get into business to see about making money instead of just spending other people's," he explained.

"Besides, we liked it in Wayne and wanted to raise our fair daughters here," he added. Baseball is one of Hook's past hobbies. While in college, he played for the University of Iowa team. Later, he played some semi-pro baseball.

With 14 grandchildren, 11 of whom are boys, Hook said, "Now I've got my baseball team."

In addition to his work with the Republican party, Hook has served as a member of the Hospital Advisory Council since its beginning in 1947. This group is in charge of distributing funds for building and improving Nebraska hospitals.

"There are very few places in Nebraska that aren't within 15 or 20 miles of a hospital," he pointed out.

Another honor bestowed on Hook was his election in 1928 to the position of moderator of the Nebraska Synod of the Presbyterian Church. He was the first layman to be chosen as moderator.

Currently, Hook is chairman of the board of trustees of the Nebraska Synod.

In the position of district agent for Northwest Mutual which Hook held until 1957 he has been a member of the Marathon Club several times. Membership is earned by selling 100 new life insurance policies in one year.

Selling life insurance, Hook commented, has changed greatly since he began. Then, "an insurance man was like a lightning rod salesman, he was to be run off the place if you had a good dog."

One of Hook's political philosophies he summed up this way — "Let's grow our governors." He cited Dwight Burney's experience as a state senator and lieutenant governor as helping contribute to his success as governor.

"Someone who desires to be governor should first be a state senator and lead a good life," Hook said. Then when a candidate runs for governor, the people can be certain that the candidate will know what to do if he is elected.

In addition to being county Republican chairman, Hook has served as party chairman of the third district for the past 12 years.

Actually, this chairmanship didn't amount to much until Lawrence Brock, a Democrat, was elected to Congress, Hook commented. When he won, everyone knew something had to be done.

The result was better party organization, he said.

"These are jobs you have to get work at if you are going to get anything done," Hook concluded.

Perhaps it is this philosophy which has led Roman Itruska to say, "With deepest appreciation to Ted Hook for his full time citizenship."

Conservation NEWS NOTES

The SC's technicians have been checking the survival of trees planted this spring. The survival appears to be very good even though it was very dry for three weeks after planting. The cedar trees that appear very dry are beginning to show new growth of green.

Cultivation is very important to these new plantings. Care should be taken to prevent covering the lower branches of the cedar and pine trees while cultivating. This causes the trees to grow slower than normally. We would like to emphasize again that good care given to trees the first two years will pay big dividends for many years.

The tile laying machine is in Wayne county now. If you have a wet area that you think would benefit from tile drainage, stop in at the Soil Conservation office. The first job we are doing is on the Fredrick Janke farm. This is located seven and a half miles south and one mile west of Wayne.
