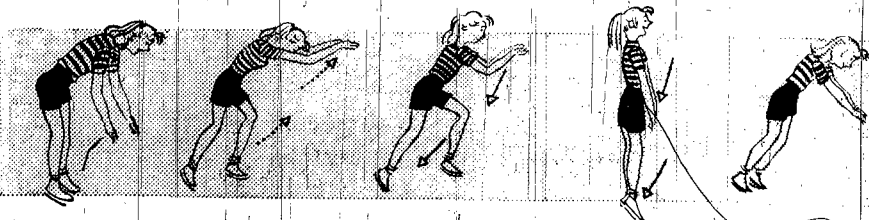

Family Can Be Made Safer By Drownproofing Steps

You can make your family drownproof this summer. Knowing the five simple steps of drownproofing could save your life and it will definitely increase your enjoyment of water sports, says Rollin Schneider, University of Nebraska Extension specialist.

The steps in drownproofing are:

Figure 1 — Inhale and relax. Allow your body to slide beneath the surface; Figure 2 — Bring your arms forward slowly and easily to this position; Figure 3 — Give a slow, easy, downward push with the arms and legs and raise your head high enough to get the nose and mouth out of the water; Figure 4 — Breathe out through your nose on the way up and inhale through the mouth as your head comes above the water surface; Figure 5 — As your body slides down, let the water raise your arms into position for the next push. Within a second or two the body will stop sinking and begin to rise. You may want to rest in this position for a moment.

Drownproofing is a simple technique which utilizes the natural buoyancy of the human body, says Schneider. When a drowning person sinks, it is because they have let the air out of their body and replaced it with water. The trouble is that the body floats naturally in a face down position. If you take a breath and relax you will sink and come back up again.

In drownproofing the water bears the weight of the body and the only thing you have to do is raise your mouth or nose above the water long enough to get air. Schneider advises swimmers as well as children to learn the technique because many an excellent swimmer has drowned simply because he exhausted himself.
