Harpist Will Give Concert at Winside, Hoskins, Wakefield

A harp concert by Otto Baganz of Plymouth, Wis., will be presented in three local churches July 15-20.

The churches are the Trinity Lutheran Church, Winside; St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church, Wakefield; and the Trinity Lutheran Church, Hoskins. The concert will be presented in Hoskins on Sunday, Wakefield on Wednesday and Winside on Friday, July 20.

Featured at the concert will be one of the top concert harpists in America today. Baganz has studied under such men as Enrico Trecchi, recognized as the world's greatest harpist, Edvard Schreier and Joseph Vito.

He was also a member of a mid-west symphony orchestra and founder of the Baganz Trio. The harp which Baganz will play is claimed to be the last work of the harp maker's art and is valued at \$10,000. Its construction required two years.

The public is invited to attend the concerts, which will begin at 8 p.m. Free will offerings will be taken.

Music, Art Camp Has Registrations From 41 Schools

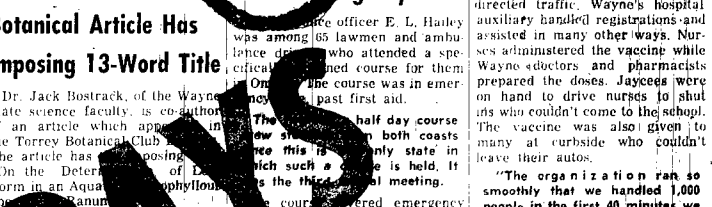

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Socialized Medicine Opposed

Advocates of the proposal to provide medical services to everyone drawing Social Security benefits, whether they need them or not or want them or not, often say that the opposition comes from a relative few who are motivated by selfish economic or political reasons.

What is the case? Senator Goldwater (R-Ariz.) offers an answer. His mail, he writes, has been running three-to-one against the bill. And he is not alone. He cites the mail received by two other senators, including a Nebraskan, following the President's Madison Square Garden speech urging passage of the bill in dramatic and impassioned words. One senator's mail ran 298 to 27 against. The other's racked up a 274 to 28 opposing

vote. Similar trends were demonstrated in letters from other states.

From this Sen. Goldwater concludes that "the American people know perfectly well the dangers of socialized medicine and want no part of it." The American people have every reason to take that view. The experience with socialized medicine in Britain has hardly been reassuring — it has been characterized by soaring costs and a grave decline in the standards of care.

And the enormous growth of voluntary health insurance is another potent element in cementing opposition. Finally the Kerr-Mills bill, passed by the last Congress, answers the question of how to help the truly indigent by setting up a joint federal-state plan that has been widely accepted in the brief span of time since its enactment.

Capitol News . . . Lower Railroad Evaluation In Nebraska for Fifth Year

Lincoln — The plight of Nebraska railroads became increasingly evident this past week when the State Board of Equalization lowered the valuation of all railroads for tax purposes for the fifth straight year.

In a statement released after the valuations were set, Gov. Frank Morrison, a board member, said the reductions are a result of "loss of business, deterioration of equipment and difficulties and cost of obtaining adequate financing."

The reduction came with little surprise. Railroads each year are becoming less important property tax contributors to state and local governments due to economic problems and the growth in other types of property.

Railroad valuations have generally reversed the pattern of other utilities such as pipelines, gas, light and telephone companies. Last year these utilities increased 15 percent in valuation. At the same time the board reduced the values of smallest railroads 31.2 percent.

Decreased valuations set for railroads this year: Illinois Central, \$56,623; Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, \$1,662,259; Union Pacific, \$45,469,206; Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, \$35,159,890; Chicago and North Western, \$4,339,599; Missouri Pacific, \$1,857,865; Wabash, \$20,515; Atchafalaya, Topoka, and Santa Fe, \$9,010; Chicago & Great Western, \$177,080; South Omaha Terminal, \$443,245; Omaha, Lincoln, & Beatrice, \$19,800.

Valuation of the Pullman company was set by the board at \$132,920, or 35 percent of actual value.

Composite of a Killer

The Nebraska Safety Council has hit on a way to warn motorists of the particular driver who becomes a killer on the highways. The idea began over the Fourth of July holiday period, was to compile a composite of the driver who becomes involved in accidents during a specific period.

The composite for the Fourth was a driver 17 to 24 years old, who drives a car two to six years old, and who has two speeding and two failure to stop or yield violations on his record.

Manpower Training

A final decision on Nebraska's participation in the Federal Manpower Act program should be made by the State Board of Education in the next few days. The board has been awaiting a new contract proposal by the federal government.

Nebraska and several other states earlier rejected a clause in a proposed federal contract which would have given the federal government authority to approve all projects instituted under the act. The states said they should have this control.

The act — which went into effect July 1 — provides for a three-year program for training persons put out of work by automation. The federal government is offering to foot the bill for the first two years, with the state joining on a matching funds basis the third year.

The state board has indicated it will sanction Nebraska's participation if the "prior federal approval" clause is removed from the contract.

Juvenile Delinquency

In a report to the annual governor's conference held in Hershey, Pa., Governor Frank Morrison has given strong praise to three projects to help combat juvenile delinquency in Nebraska.

Morrison gave particular praise to a special employment program in Lincoln schools, a recreational program for the educable mentally handicapped teenager and young adult in Lincoln and on the overall progress of the city of Holdrege. Terming the programs "unique" to Nebraska, the governor said other states could benefit by adopting similar techniques.

The report, Morrison submitted had been prepared for him by the Nebraska Committee for Children and Youth, Steering Committee on Juvenile Delinquency and Crime.

Morrison described the special employment program in Lincoln as intending to serve as a "motivating factor to the under-achiever, the prospective school dropout and the emotionally disturbed."

Although the chief purpose of the program is the development of the individual, vocational training plays a major role, the governor said. Last year 85 boys and girls were placed in 99 jobs under the program.

Conservation NEWS NOTES

The Soil Conservation Service Technicians have assisted several farmers in installing tile drainage the past two weeks. Some of the larger jobs have been completed on the farms of Alfred Utech, Fender, Fredrick Janke and Marvin Dunklau, Wayne, and Earl Anderson, Randolph.

The areas that have been drained are fields which have a very high water table. With a high water table, the soil remains cold in the spring and seeds are slow to germinate. Root growth is obstructed after germination because roots of cereal crops cannot survive in a water logged soil. The water table needs to be lowered so air may enter the soil. These soils are very productive when drained and fertilized properly.

If your broom pastures are beginning to produce less grass because of the dry hot weather you may be interested in seeding some season grasses.

Some farmers and SCS technicians from Northeast Nebraska took a tour of Polk county to observe some grass seedings. Many farmers in that area are seeding these warm season grasses to make a better mid-summer pasture. Big Bluestem, Indiangrass, and Switchgrass are the most important species of grass for our area.

These grasses can be planted in the late fall or spring. They must be planted in a firm seed bed. The best seed bed would be in the stubble of sedan grass or grain sorghums. You will drill the grass seeds directly into the soil without disturbing the stubble.

We have a couple of these seedings started in Wayne county. If you are interested in observing these pastures please contact the SCS office.

Extension Notes

Spots Out
Spots on linens and those crisp pastel-colored towels and fringed are often the aftermath of picnics these summer days. However, they need not spoil a pleasant memory if taken care of immediately.

If left even a week before laundering, spots will be more difficult to remove. If neglected a month, they may be impossible to remove. All spots should be removed before laundering as hot water sets some stains.

Three basic groups of stains require different methods of removal. Try to remove non-greasy stains, such as sweetened fruits, cola drinks and grass with water alone. If the stain remains, rub detergent into the stain then rinse. A syringe with a little diluted alcohol may be used for stubborn stains. Before applying it, however, test the solution on an inside seam to see if it affects the dye.

For greasy spots like butter or meat greases, use carbon tetrachloride. If the garment is washable, rub with detergent.

Treat combination stains, such as ice cream and cocoa, with cool water and detergent. When dry, if the stain is still visible, treat with carbon tetrachloride.

Pre-Treat Waffle Iron
The bride who receives a waffle iron for her new home should pre-treat the grill before using. Coat the cold surface with unheated fat — such as lard or salad oil. Heat the appliance to its smoking point and cool. Wipe the grill clean but don't wash. Then grease very lightly before pouring another.

If waffles continue to stick after much use, place a paper napkin which has been saturated with household ammonia in between grids. Leave overnight. In the morning, rub with fine steel wool and wash thoroughly. Re-season with unsalted fat before using.

Unwelcome Visitors
A common complaint heard in the past few weeks is the visiting of ants in the house. Whether conditions have encouraged this problem. However, the housewife need not put up with the unwelcome visitors long.

There are several reliable sprays, powders and bait cans on the market which are effective in getting rid of ants. The bait can with small holes is perhaps the better choice where there are small children in the home. Powders and sprays need to be used with caution so they do not come in contact with food.

City of Nebraska agricultural engineer. According to the survey, 36,000 acres of irrigated corn and 35,000 acres of dry-land corn are being produced under the Nebraska till-plant system. In 1961 the till plant acreage totaled 10,000 acres.

The till-plant method is a system of minimum tillage which consists of cutting stalks, planting, (tillage, applying insecticide, herbicide, and starter fertilizer when needed) and cultivation.

Nebraska farmers can save \$15 million annually by adopting the system for corn and soybean production, according to University agricultural engineers Drs. H. D. Wittmuss and E. W. Hurlburt.

Advantages and principles of the system are:

1. Reducing tillage operations to a minimum without affecting stand, weed control or crop yield.
2. Packing soil at seed level and covering with loose soil and rapid germination and uniform stand.
3. Leaving residue on the surface to reduce wind and water erosion.
4. Eliminating tillage prior to planting and reducing tillage to a minimum at planting in order to keep soil moisture and evaporation losses to a minimum.
5. Planting in ridges to place seed in warmer, better drained soil.
6. Reducing soil compaction.

District Dairy Shows
The 16th annual Nebraska-Iowa district dairy shows will be held this fall in 10 Nebraska and Iowa cities, according to C. W. Niblett, University of Nebraska dairyman.

A series of 10 shows will be held this fall at the following locations: Blair, July 31; Norfolk, Aug. 1; South Sioux City, Aug. 2; Seward, Aug. 6; Grand Island,

Aug. 7; McCook, Aug. 8; Hemingford, Aug. 9; Denison, Ia., Aug. 10; Council Bluffs, Ia., Aug. 11, and Beatrice, Aug. 18.

The two-state program is sponsored by the Cooper foundation. The Nebraska Dairyman's association, Omaha Chamber of Commerce, and 20 dairies and dairy organizations of Nebraska and Iowa. Locally the shows are sponsored by the chamber of commerce of the host city.

About 1,300 entries are expected this year. In the past 15 years 35,371 head of dairy cattle were shown. Niblett reports.

Gas Tax Refund
Farmers and ranchers may claim a 4-cent refund for federal excise tax paid on gasoline and used for agricultural purposes after June 30, 1961 and before July 1, 1962.

The owner, tenant or operator of a farm or ranch who bought the gasoline may file for the claim. Claims for refunds of federal gasoline tax paid between July 1, 1961 and June 30, 1962 are due in the office of the Director of Internal Revenue before Oct. 1.

Federal Internal Revenue Service Form 2240, required for filing a claim, is available at the county agent's office. The revenue service has mailed forms to all farmers and ranchers who filed last year.

Federal rules define "agricultural purposes" as cultivating of soil or raising or harvesting any agricultural or horticultural commodity. Included are shearing, feeding, caring for, training and management of livestock, bees, poultry, fur-bearing animals and wildlife.

A farm operator may sometimes claim a refund on gasoline used by a custom operator for cultivation. Contract farm work, such as land leveling, will not qualify for a refund.

This federal gasoline tax refund is entirely separate and different from the state gasoline tax refund. Differences include the reporting period, amount of refunds, forms for filing and filing dates.

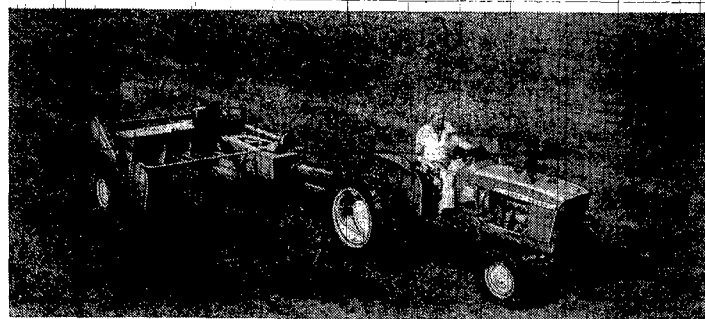

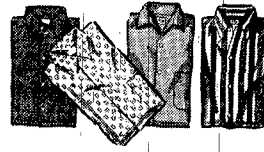

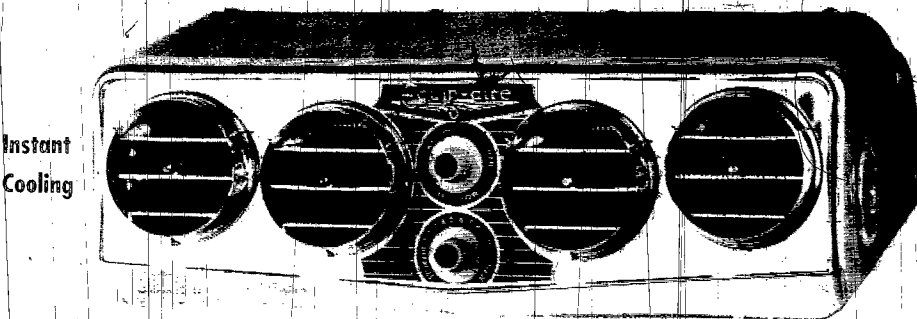

Which of these senior citizens needs help to pay for his Medical Care?

Citizen A is a well-to-do retired executive. Citizen B is no longer employable . . . is not wealthy and is not protected by a private medical care plan. Both are over 65.

And both deserve the top medical care that the nation's physicians feel every American should receive. But obviously citizen A, in his comfortable financial position, should not receive federal medical aid at taxpayers' expense. Citizen B, on the other hand, needs this help and should receive it. The point is, these men are not "peas in a pod". Their needs are as different as their personalities and their financial capabilities. Yet the King-Anderson Bill — now before Congress — would treat them as equally in need of help and would supply them both with federally controlled, production-line medical care.

Any reasonable person will object to the waste of federal tax funds for free medical care for the well-to-do senior citizen. Yet that's what the King-Anderson Bill would succeed in doing—wasting millions of your tax dollars.

We, physicians believe in treating pa-

tients according to individual needs. We favor financial help for those who need it, which is why we supported — and continue to support — the Kerr-Mills Law now on the books. We urge you to support the Kerr-Mills Law too, and to oppose the King-Anderson Bill by writing your congressman and senators.

The King-Anderson Bill — now before Congress—is a compulsory national health plan for one segment of the population . . . those of the elderly covered by Social Security. It is a peculiar bill that offers medical care equally to all over 65 — rich or poor — who are on Social Security. Several million elderly who are not eligible for Social Security, however, would be denied the benefits of this program — no matter how urgent their needs.

Backers of compulsory, standardized medical care for the aged claim that blanket coverage is necessary because most, if not all of the aged, are in poor health.

Fact: Some of those over 65 are in poor health. Most are not. Only 14 per cent of those over 65 experience any significant limitation of physical activi-

ty; only 5 per cent have major limitations of activity.

It is also claimed that a government-run medical program is needed for all those over 65 because most, if not all of the aged, are verging on bankruptcy.

The truth is: Some of our elderly are poor, others are wealthy. Most (like the rest of the population) are not destitute, nor are they rich. The King-Anderson Bill would create a compulsory government program which would provide limited medical care, at the taxpayer's expense, for millions of the elderly who are financially able to take care of themselves. The cost of such a program would be staggering. Its administration would require the creation of an enormous and complex bureaucratic machine.

Voluntary health insurance and prepayment plans now cover 132 million Americans — including more than 53 per cent of those persons over 65 — and coverage is increasing at a phenomenal rate.

The newly enacted Kerr-Mills Law is being implemented rapidly. It provides for federal grants-in-aid to the individual states, enabling them to provide health care for those among the elderly who need help. The Kerr-Mills Law does not burden taxpayers with the medical bills of those who are able to pay their own way. Further, Kerr-Mills does not discourage voluntary efforts at the community level . . . it is already on the books and should not be discarded without a fair trial.

We believe that voluntary health insurance, private efforts of individual citizens and the Kerr-Mills Law — together — assure our citizens over 65 the first-class medical care every American should receive.

Again, we urge you to write your congressman and senators in Washington. Ask them to vote against the proposed King-Anderson Bill and support the already enacted Kerr-Mills Law.
