Shows .92 Increase

The 11862 county budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30, 1963, shows a .92 mill increase in taxes to be levited. The mill levy is based on a valuation which has increased from \$27.860,100 to \$28,258.795. The overall mill levy for the coming fiscal year is 5.84 as compared with 4.92 a year ago.

The largest increase is in the bridge fund, where the mill levy rose 6.4 from .58 to 1.22. The second largest rise comes under the general fund with an increase of .31 mills.

Others showing an increase are county relief, .08, and soldiers and sailors' relief, .08, and soldiers and the same.

USDA'S Feed Grain Rules

Some farmers who've signed up for this year's feed grain program are now asking if they must comply in full. Or may they change their minds?

The answer, says USDA's legal office, is that contracts are not binding. But before you decide to scrap your agreement, here are rules you should know about: Before you harvest a crop from for plant a crop to) acros specifically designated for diversion, you must obtain a release from ASCS. Otherwise you could be in trouble.

If you divert less that 20% of your base acreage, you get no payment and no price support, the same as the man who diverted no acres. If you divert at least 20% of your base, USDA will make payment for acres actually diverted, even if it is, less than the amount signed up.

A new rule this year adds 6% interest charge to any advance payment that you must refund to the government. A refund is due if no payment is earned.



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
