

## Eight New Appointments Announced by Brandenburg

Appointment of eight new members of the Wayne State College faculty was announced Wednesday by President W. A. Brandenburg.

Three of the new appointments were announced at the faculty in September, and another two began teaching at Wayne this summer.

Six of the newcomers earned doctor's degrees or are candidates for doctorates in the near future. Thus the college's ratio of faculty members with a doctor's degree remain at 45 percent.

New appointments: Dr. M. A. Waggoner, director of graduate studies and professor of sociology, and his wife, Charlotte, assistant professor of foreign languages (German).

Dr. Billy E. Ross, chairman of the division of education and professor of education.

Dr. Cleo P. Casady, chairman of the division of business and professor of business.

Arthur W. Schulz, instructor in physical science.

Mrs. Mary Mildred Gormish, instructor in health and physical education.

William Gardner, instructor in art.

Maurice D. Anderson, instructor in mathematics.

Also joining the faculty in September and previously announced are Dr. Harrison Isa, assistant professor of mathematics; Robert D. Stabler, assistant professor of foreign languages (French) and Nancy Dale Armin, instructor in foreign languages (Spanish).

Dr. Waggoner comes to Wayne from Norwich University, Northfield, Vt., where he has been head of the department of economics and business administration. Previously he had been associate dean of the Munich Branch of the University of Maryland in West Germany. He also did graduate research at the University of Kiel, West Germany.

Mrs. Waggoner, a native of Germany, has taught German in St. Louis schools and at Tulsa University. While in Munich with her husband, she was a lecturer on the cultural history of Germany at the University of Maryland's Munich Branch.

Dr. Casady, an associate professor of business administration at the University of Iowa, will head a new division at Wayne, "Business," which has been part of the applied arts division, now will be separate.

Five of the new faculty have either studied abroad or are natives of other nations. Besides the Waggoners, they are Dr. Hsia, who has his bachelor's degree from the University of

## Second Session of Swim Lessons to Start Monday

Meierdierks, who was driving alone, is also hospitalized in Sioux City.

Mr. Peters was born Dec. 10, 1925, at Hubbard. He was married Oct. 16, 1949, to Dorothy Birkby. The couple farmed northwest of Allen.

## 4-Hers Busy With Fair Opening Aug. 8

Whether they are baking a chocolate cake, sewing a wool suit or clipping a calf, Wayne county's 4-Hers want to know "What will the judge say?"

Their question won't be answered, however, until Aug. 8, 9, 10 and 11 when entries are judged at the annual Wayne county fair.

In preparation for the fair the county's 256 4-Hers, 161 girls and 95 boys, are busy completing their projects, according to Myrtle Anderson, county home agent. These projects range from auto care to riding horse.

The most popular projects for the boys, Miss Anderson said, are market beef, market swine, dairy heifers and breeding lambs. Of course, some girls are also enrolled in these projects.

To ready their fair entries 4-Hers in these projects are finishing clipping and in general polishing up their animals according to Harold Ingalls, county agent.

The girls, meanwhile, are trying to put in that last buttonhole or sew that last seam in their clothing projects. Because of camps and other activities, some of the girls are even preparing their baked goods, Miss Anderson explained. These will be placed in their home freezers until entry day.

Since three fourths of the girls in 4-H are 12 years old or younger, food projects are the most popular this year, the home agent said. Clothing projects are second in popularity with home living projects third.

The 4-Hers are enrolled in a total of 582 projects. Several hundred are in photography and animal care projects.

In addition to individual efforts to get ready for the fair, the 4-H clubs are engaged in such pre-fair activities as practice judging contests and song rehearsals. Clubs are also working on ideas for their fair booths, Miss Anderson said. From eight

## Cyclists to Receive Safety Instruction From Wayne Police

A bicycle safety program is being initiated by the Wayne police department, according to E. L. Hatley, Wayne police officer.

The program, which will provide step by step training and testing in riding skill and in observing safety rules and traffic regulations, will begin Friday, Hatley stated.

Anyone between the ages of six and 16 may take part in the program, which is designed to make Wayne youths safe and expert bicycle operators.

The first session is scheduled for boys between the ages of six and eight. It will be held Friday. Monday's session is for those between nine and 12 years of age while those between 13 and 16 will meet on Aug. 3. The sessions will begin at 9 a.m. in the Fire Hall.

"The steady rise in motor traffic on our streets and highways is making the use of bicycles increasingly hazardous for young and unskilled riders," Hatley said.

"In addition, lack of skill and disregard of safety precautions are responsible for numerous injuries to riders," he added.

All young cyclists are urged to participate in the program.

## Frontier Cooperation

The about-face that has marked the attitude of Frontier Airlines toward Nebraska since it has come under new management was exemplified again several days ago.

The airline has joined with mid-west communities in pleading with the Civil Aeronautics Board for one more chance to prove they will use air service.

The airline's new management agreed with Nebraska that Frontier's former owners didn't give Alliance, Chadron, Hastings, McCook, Kearney and Sidney sufficient opportunity to use the service.

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## National Guard

The Army proposal to cut the strength of the Nebraska National Guard triggered a strong letter of protest from Governor Morrison.

He said he has written Defense Secretary Robert McNamara of his displeasure with the proposal.

The plan, Morrison said, "emasculates almost one-half of my state of Army National Guard troops and leaves a great void in ready support for state and national emergencies."

The governor told McNamara that the reorganization would "reduce strength to an impossible level" and would force the removal of Army National Guard troops from no less than seven towns, some of having National Guard companies in existence since 1920.

Morrison said the plan would depopulate the western half of Nebraska of tactical troops, replacing existing full units with small detachments or teams of types which cannot support national or state requirements in local emergencies or disasters.

## Ataturk University

A university in Turkey patterned after this country's land-grant schools has graduated its first class.

The Turkish institution — Ataturk University — was started just seven years ago, after the University of Nebraska agreed to help the Turkish government in building a sister institution from the ground up.

The first graduating class had 102 members, 95 of whom received degrees from the faculty of agriculture.

## Power Committee

The Nebraska Public Power Committee has hit more snags in its efforts to solve the state's public power distribution problems.

The committee voted 5-4 against a report of its subcommittee on retail duplication of facilities, but agreed immediately to go into secret sessions prior to August 6 in a final effort to come up with some solution.

Under the power committee's rules, a unanimous decision is required before a measure can be approved.

Meanwhile, Sen. Don Thompson of McCook, chairman of the Legislative Council Study Committee on public power, said he has decided to call the committee together to work on its own recommendations.

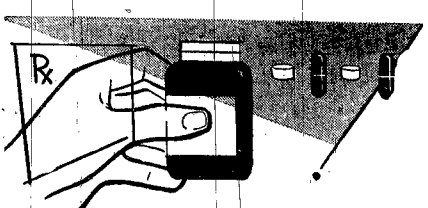
