The wave of opposition which greeted the proposal to levy a 20 percent federal withholding tax against income from dividends and interest was, it would seem, far greater in Intensity and volume than the Administration expected. There is good reason why that should be so. The objections are unusually varied. For one thing, this is not a new tax, but a complicated and costly method of collecting taxes which in multitudes of cases are not owed in the first place. The principal burden would fall on people in the lower income brackets, where the effective income tax rate is far below 20, percent.

Eincoln + Nebraska apparently is tloing a good job of attracting job huntens from other states.

This fact was pointed oil by a recent survey conducted by the State Chamber of Commence and the Associated Industries of Nebraska.

State Champer of Commerge and the Associated Industries for Ne-braska.

The organizations surveyed 500 businesses and found that 45 percent of the firms respondink had 16,868 employees who were not native Nebraskans.

The survey showed that during the past five years 2,218 persons came directly to Nebraska, to accept jobs offered by Nebraska employers.

The two agencies said this reflected the fact that Nebraska firms have had to recruit talented and ambitious people from other p arts of the country, "while native sons and daughters were scarching for greener pastures outside the state."

A total of 155 firms reported they regularly received inquiries from out of state people about job opportunities in Nebraska.

The survey also showed that Nebraska trained executives and managers were common in the state. Of the total answers received, 154 said they were native sons and daughters were had advanced positions of authority in their respective firms. Ninety-two of the executives said they came from other states.

Take Soil Sample Now

Now is the hest time for taking soil samples. Samples are easy to get. The results will be back in time to plan next year fertility program.

A soil test is the most economical way to learn how much and what kinds of fertilizer a particular crop on a jeertain field will need for most profitable yields.

The basic points to remember in taking soil samples are:

1. Each sample should be made up of the same type of soil. In most cases it is neces-sary to take more than one sample per field.

2. Take a regresentative sam-ple. It should be a composite of soil taken within this uniform soil area usually consisting of soil from 10-20 places in the area. 3. Samples should be taken

approximately the same depth that the field will be plowed.

4. Unosual areas, such as all kali spots, should be sample separately.

separately.

Mailing cartons and information sheets for samples can be
obtained from county Extension
agents. A circular on how to take
soil samples. EC 56-116, is also
available from county Extension
agents and the College of Agitculture.




