Largest Summer Class Will Receive Diplomas Saturday

The largest summer graduating class, totaling 150, in Wayne State College history will receive diplomas at commencement Saturday morning.

The ceremony will begin at 9 a. m. in the Willow Bowl (room) in the Auditorium. If weather is inclement, the public is invited.

Wayne's accelerated trimester schedule, started last September, has allowed many students to graduate this summer because they were able to finish three full terms of study instead of the traditional two during the year.

Both the graduate and undergraduate classes exceed any previous summer classes in number, and the master's degree class of 21 tops any in the past, spring or summer. The senior class numbers 129 candidates for degrees.

Commencement speaker is a 1939 graduate of Wayne State, Dr. Dwight David Darland, Washington, D. C., associate secretary of the National Education Association's Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards (CEPS).

A native of Northeast Nebraska and graduate of Colorado High School, Dr. Darland has taught or held administrative positions in six universities. In addition to his CEPS duties, he lectures at George Washington University and is editor of the Journal of Teacher Education.

The Wayne State Alumni Association will gather for its annual reunion on commencement day. Dr. Darland is scheduled to speak informally at a 12:30 lunch, at which Alumni President Lyle Seymour will preside. A 4 p. m. coffee is planned in Conn. Library.

Music for commencement will be provided by the band of Wayne's Summer Music and Art Camp. It also will play a concert for 45 minutes before the ceremony begins.

School Is Still Without Teacher

Only one Wayne county school district is still without a teacher for the fall term, according to Mrs. Gladys Porter, county superintendent.

The school is district 80. This district is one of the 46 rural school districts in the county.

Of this total, four are contracted next year. The 42 schools, which have not contracted have a total of 47 teachers. In addition, there are two parochial schools with three teachers. This brings the Wayne county total to 50 teachers in class 1 schools, the superintendent added.

In a bulletin mailed Tuesday to all rural school board members and teachers, Mrs. Porter recommended Sept. 3 as the opening date for the schools.

The bulletin also told the rural teachers of the time they will meet with the county superintendent before school opens. These meetings are set for the week of Aug. 27th, Mrs. Porter said.

Another activity scheduled for this month, Mrs. Porter commented, is mailing admission cards for free high school tuition. They will be sent out Aug. 15.

Free Barbecue and Kids Days To Highlight Fair Activities

The 1962 Wayne county fair is only a week away. This year's fair will feature a kiddie parade, free barbecue and top grandstand shows.

The fair, which begins with entry day Wednesday, will also feature champion 4-H livestock and band concerts by the Wayne city band.

The free barbecue will be Thursday, Aug. 9, from 6 to 7:30 p. m. Members of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce will serve the beef and all the trimmings. The food and other items necessary for a barbecue have been donated by Wayne business firms and individuals.

People and their donations made this week include: beds from Mint Bar; napkins, State National Bank; gas and burners, Propane Natural Gas company; meat preparation, Johnson Locker and Hill Locker, a pit, Large-Pfeil Excavating, and milk from Nebraska-Iowa Milk producers.

Other Thursday fair features are a livestock parade and placing of 4-H beef champions at 8 p. m. Prize-winning hogs and dairy cattle will also be paraded at 8 p. m. Horses will be judged Wednesday at 1 p. m.

All beef will be judged Friday. Walter Tolman, Wayne, will judge baby beef while Archie White, Fremont, will judge hogs.

The grandstand show featuring an hour and a half of acts that have appeared on the Ed Sullivan show will begin at 8 p. m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Jerry Hickson will be master of ceremonies. Friday and Saturday the stage troupe will also present matinees. At this time all rides will be 10c on the midway.

In case of rain the stage shows will be held at Wayne city auditorium.

Each evening at 5:30 p. m. the Wayne city band will be featured at a concert. Also, each evening after the grandstand show the Hungry Five will be featured.

Saturday features will include a kiddie parade at 2:30 p. m. and a 4-H dress revue in the evening. The kiddie parade is open to all children 15 years old or younger. Cash prizes are being offered in three separate classes — costumes, pets, bikes and tricks.

A Kids' contest in front of the grandstand will be held two days at 2 p. m. Cash prizes will be given winners.

The Royal United Shows will be featured on the midway every day of the fair. Commercial exhibits of farm machinery and household goods will also be featured.

Admission to the fair will be 50c per person with a \$1.50 maximum charge per family. Grandstand shows are 75c for those 12 and over and 50c for those under 12. Season tickets are \$1.25.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with this editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

Dollars Into Dollarettes

Columnist Henry J. Taylor recently devoted an article to the cost of the Peace Corps. This runs to about \$9,000 a year for each of the corpsmen. By way of contrast, many of the church-supported missionary groups operated for as little as \$2,000 a year for each man and woman they send abroad. The comparison, Mr. Taylor learned, is not absolute. But even if the private cost figure were doubled, it would still be less than half of the Peace Corps figure.

Mr. Taylor is not critical of the work of the objective of the Corps. Nor does he blame it for the relatively high cost of fielding its people. But he does say this: "Regardless of the merit in any service, the government machine itself contains an invisible tax that automati-

cally chops the taxpayers' dollars into dollarettes. The government's currency rotating process passes the people's tax money through a sieve of government overhead that drains off more of its value all the time — This is why, in terms of human welfare, it's important to debunk political propaganda claiming 'the government can do better' when ever men and women can do what needs to be done by their own associations. When politicians so often (and profitably) insist 'the government' should do something — like medicine — where is the money coming from? We pay every penny."

And this is why, Mr. Taylor could have added, the welfare state is at best a snare and delusion and at worst a plain fraud. It represents a system of gradual impoverishment of the people to the ultimate weakening of the welfare of all.

Lincoln — Steamed up charges and counter charges have been flying since the League of Nebraska Municipalities filed its suit in federal district court in an attempt to force legislative redistricting on the basis of population alone.

As expected, some of the senators from the less heavily populated areas were quick to accuse Omaha lawmakers of backing a proposal which would give the metropolitan areas more representation — at the expense of the smaller communities.

Complicating the matter is Nebraska's unique unicameral. Senators from thinly populated districts claim that some consideration must be given to area because the state does not have a two-house body. In states with two houses, they argue, consideration is given to area in the senate and to population in the house of representatives. They also cite the U.S. Congress, which has two senators from each state even though some have only a fraction of the population of others.

As could also be expected, some of the cities which are members of the League were quick to state that they did not agree with the suit. For example, Sen. Theodore McCosh, Gering, has charged that it is "become apparent that the league speaks only for a few cities in the eastern part of the state." He added the league will find it difficult to get support elsewhere in the future. McCosh is also strongly backing a proposed constitutional amendment that 20 to 30 percent weight be given to area in any legislative

redistricting. In its suit, the league has requested that this proposal be declared invalid and that it be kept off the general election ballot.

Sen. Arnold Runke, Plymouth, who spearheaded the fight in the 1951 Legislature to get the amendment on the ballot, has called a meeting of 31 lawmakers in Lincoln Aug. 6 to discuss ways and means of battling the suit. Runke has charged the league with discriminating against its minority membership in western Nebraska. The Plymouth lawmaker is also trying to find out which senators would be willing to explain the proposed constitutional change in their districts.

Health Care
Governor Morrison is persisting in his efforts to get the Nebraska State Medical association to furnish figures on the number of needy aged in the state who are not receiving medical aid. In an exchange of letters and telephone calls with Dr. O. A. Kostal, Hastings, president of the association, Morrison has insisted that the organization furnish him with these figures.

He said he cannot go to bat for the Kerr-Mills approach to medical care for the aged until he knows just how many persons would receive its benefits and how much it would cost the state to implement the program.

During the 1951 legislative session, the unicameral turned down a bill calling for a Kerr-Mills agreement between the state and federal government. It was estimated that enactment of the bill would have cost Nebraska

19 million in tax funds during a two-year period.

The medical association is backing this approach, arguing that it provides for state control of the program and would be much less expensive than the "federal aid King-Anderson bill. But Morrison said he needed more facts and figures and added that plenty of time remains before the 1953 legislative convenes for the compilation of this information.

Highway Commission
The State Advisory Highway commission has mapped out a busy schedule of hearings throughout the state during August. Similar meetings were held during the past several years.

Chairman J. R. McBride of Minden says the meetings have given the commission valuable insights into the road needs of various areas. At the same time, he said, the commission has been afforded an excellent opportunity to get its point of view across to those at the hearings.

People often seem to be more reasonable, McBride said, when the commissioners can analyze road problems locally. Not all of the commissioners will attend all the meetings, but all were urged to make serious efforts to attend those in their respective districts.

Tourist Promotion
Two plans have been proposed for removal of tourist promotion from the State Game commission to the Department of Agriculture.

The Nebraska State Chamber of Commerce suggested establishment of a new agency subordinate to the division of resources, which is a division of the agriculture department. The Nebraska land foundation would like to have a sister agency set up which would have equal status with that of the division of resources.

The proposals have been greeted with some opposition. There are some who believe that tourist promotion properly belongs in the State Game division and that the agency is in the best position to do a good job of attracting out-of-staters to Nebraska.

Neil Steen, director of the commission, described the proposals as "well intentioned but impractical." In the short time that the promotion of tourist trade has been the commission's responsibility, progress "has been one of the outstanding accomplishments of state government," he said. "There is nothing wrong with the present arrangement that time and realistic financing will not cure."

Selleck Retires
John K. Selleck, upon his request, has cut his ties with the University of Nebraska with which he has been associated for 41 years. The Board of Regents placed him on emeritus status and named Comptroller Joseph Sosnick as its corporation secretary, a position Selleck has held since 1944.

During his long university career, Selleck has been at various times assistant purchasing agent, business manager of athletics, comptroller, university business manager and chancellor. He remains a trustee and member of the executive committee of the University of the Nebraska foundation.

Property Tax
Sen. Kenneth L. Bowen, Red Cloud, says the property tax undoubtedly will remain a bulwark of the state's tax system. He says this is so "because the state and localities both derive a major portion of total revenue from property."

has concerned itself mostly with the property tax. Bowen says lack of time and finances will prevent an examination of all counties, but a representative group embracing all areas is being visited.

Co. Agent's Column

Goals for Dairyman

Extension dairymen in the mid-western states have the following ten goals to suggest for the guidance of our dairymen, according to Don J. Kubik, University of Nebraska area dairy man:

A dairy cow should produce at least ten times her weight in 305 days or ten months. This means a 1,200-pound cow should produce in 10 months 12,000 pounds milk. A 1,400-pound cow should give 14,000 pounds of milk. A cow should be dry from 45 to 60 days.

A heifer should calve for the first time at the age of 24 to 28 months.

A cow should be bred 60 to 90 days after calving.

The days in milk for the entire herd for the year should be 84 to 88 percent.

The average daily milk production for the entire herd, which includes the dry cows, should be at least 30 pounds of four percent fat corrected milk or 1.2 pounds of butterfat.

The feed cost per pounds of milk should be less than half the value of 100 pounds of milk. For example, if the value of milk on the farm is \$3.50 per cwt., then the feed cost per hundred of milk should be less than \$1.75.

The income over feed cost should be at least 10 percent greater than the food cost.

The yearly milk production per worker, based on a 10-hour day, should be 300,000 pounds or more.

The pounds of grain or concentrates to feed individual cows should be based on their production, age, stage of gestation, quality of roughage and price of milk.

Something New in Poultry
An arm of the University of Nebraska's poultry department will be reaching out across the state to advance the poultry industry soon.

It is the new, unique, Poultrymobile, a custom built 3 x 8 foot representation of a modern poultry house. Conventional poultry house construction materials were used to give the unit a functional and realistic appearance.

The basic structure was made possible by a grant from Ak-Sar-Ben, according to John L. Skinner, poultry specialist at the University, who is in charge of the Poultrymobile.

It will demonstrate the latest poultry equipment and methods and may be used for small meetings and judging contests. It will be available throughout the state for use at fairs, field trips, civic and community events. It may be obtained by contacting Skinner at the University of Nebraska.

Non-Bloating Legume
Farmers are advised to plant Birdsfoot Trefoil in pasture mixtures where a legume is desired. No known causes of bloat have ever been reported to have been caused by the legume when used in a mixture.

Birdsfoot Trefoil is a perennial legume that came into prominence in New York and Oregon. It is best adapted primarily
