Warning Given Farmers

Concerning Parathion

Any Wayne area farmers who have: sprayed their coun fields with parathion or methyl parathion should post signs warning of the danger to anyone entering the field, adcording to Harold Ingalls, county extension agent.

The danger to anyone entering al field soon after spraying which was pointed out by Bob Roselle, University of Nebraska extension entomologist, is a real one, Ingalls said.

The warning sign should be red, ist the spray used, when applied and when it would be safe to enter fields. It should be posted conspicuously. For parathion five days should elapse between application and entering fields, for methyl parathion three days should elapse.

The feed cost per pounds of milk should be less than half the value of 100 pounds of milk. For example, if the value of milk on the farm is \$3.50 per cwt., then the keed cost per hundred of milk should be less than \$1.75.

The income over feed cost should be at least 10 percent greater than the food cost.

The yearly milk production per worker, based on a 10-hour day, should be 300,000 pounds or more.

The pounds of grain or concentrates to feed individual cows should be based on their production, age, stage of gestation, quality of roughage and price of milk.

Conservation farm planning is one of the many free services provided to conservation Districts by the SCS. A Conservation Plan is a plen to conserve soil and water on your own individual farm.

on your own individual farm.

A Conservation plan includes a soils map of your farm. This map gives you a description of the soils found on your farm. It indicates the predominate slope of the hills and the percent of erosion that has laken place. This map shows the areas where erosion is the most serious.

Also included in the Con-

where erosion is the most serious.

Also included in the servation Plan, is an aerial photo of your farm. This map shows the location of existing features on the land, such as field boundaries, terrace lines, and farmstead areas. It is a convenient map to keep field production records on.

The Conservation Plan is developed with the farmer. The farmer decides what measures are necessary to control the soil and water losses on his farm. These decisions are a part of the Conservation Plan. A plan is the product of the knowledge, experience and desires of the farmer and the Conservation skill and knowledge of the SCS Technician. Approximately 700 W aly ne County farmers have a Conservation Plan on their farm. Some of these plans have been applied to the farm while others are being applied as conditions permit. Parmers agree that it is much easier to control erosion if you have a definite plan to follow.
