Redistricting There has been no let up in the heated, sometimes hitter, words which have been traded in the legislative redistricting contro-versy.

The Nebraska AFL-ClO has filed a petition in federal district court asking permission to inter-vene on the side of the League of Nebraska Municipalities in the suit filed by the League.

The aim of the suit is to force reapportionment of the Legislaure solely on the basis of population and to have declared invalid a proposed constitutional amendment which would give 20 to 30 percent weight to area in any redistricting.

According to the petition, the AFL-ClO asks/the court to decree that all futule elections to the Legislature be held on an atlarge basis until such time as the districts are reapportioned according to population. The league originally planned to request at-large elections this fall, but dropped the idea, apparently after it had sittred a storm of protest.

Safe Picnic Foods

Safe Picnic Foods

"Is it safe to eat this food?" is a question a humber of homemakers ask each summer.

Biarmful bacteria do prey upon cdoked pridein foods, espetially if they are chopped or ground, and soft or moist. Meat, poultry, cystards, yustard type puddings, some salads and sandwich fillmess need careful storage.

It is important to keep hot foods at 140 degrees or hotter. Cold foods need to be kept at 40 degrees or hotter. Cold foods need to be kept at 40 degrees or hotter. Three hours is the maximum safe time to hold foods between these temperatures.

For a successful picnic, pack hot food very hot in insulated containers, Chill or freeze cold food. Wrab, it so it will still be cool when it is-time to eat. Plan to cat soon, after you arrive at the picnic spot.

For a long trip, invest in an ide chest or carry the type of food that doesn't require refrigeration.

When returning from your vacation, you need not be greeted by unwelcome guests such as water bugs and roaches who could take over while you were gone.

A precautionary measure to take would be sprinkling drains and hiding places with bug repellants containing I in d a ne, chlordane, flourbdane and diazanon. However, you need to follow driections, carefully as they are highly toxic.

An extra precaution William Rapp, ir., Entomologist in the State Department of Health, suggests is that a five percent chlordane solution be sprayed around the foundation of the basement wills.

Dual Grading of Beef CHOICE



WHAT IT

Beginning July 1, 1962, a new beef grading system will be offered to the industry on a trial basis for one year. It is called "The Dual Grading System." The Agriculture Marketing Service (AMS) of the USDA has developed an accurate method of determining the yield of boneless, closely-trimmed retail cuts from the chuck, rib loin, and round of beef carcuss. Thus a yield grade in addition to a quality grade will be used for each carcuss.

Definition of Dual Grading
Dual grading use two criteria, (1) the quality grade such as we have now — Prime, Choice, Good, etc., and (2) the yield grade, known as "cutability" to some people. (The yield grade is not dressing %) The final grade is a combination of quality and yield. For example, Choice yield No. 1 is of choice quality which has a very high percent of ledible meat in the carcass.

Why the Dual Grading System is Being Initiated

Why the Dual Grading System is Being Initiated
The dual grading system was developed to meet
the consumer desire for tender, being with the least amount of waste fat. The system
attempts to identify the quality
amount of fat in a carcass.
This means of identifying the carcasses will help
the retailer and packer buy or sell a product which
will have a relatively assured amount of meat, with
the designated quality. It can also help the producer,
breeder, and feeder identify and
expand the producer,
one of meatier animals with
consumers benefit by being able to buy meat of specifiel quality and fat content.
One of the shortcomings of
grades is that little consideration is given to the amount of excess fat that must be trimmed before retailing. The new system of yield grading will identify
this problem and the market
ferences in yield through price yariations for carcasses of various grades.

Administration.

The program will be handled by the Federal Graders of the Livestock Division of the Agricultural Marketing Service. They will give both the quality grade (Prime, Choice, etc.) and the yield grade (cutability.)

The Grades and Their Implications

(1) Quality grade — USDA Prime, Choice, Good, etc. is the same as the old sysem and will not be changed. It designates quality off meat such as marbling color, texture, and firmness in relation to mathrity.

(2) Yield grade — USDA 1 to 6 — The No. 1 grade indicating the highest yield and the No. 6 grade the lowest. To determine yield grade, the following factors are evaluated. (1) thickness of outside fat at the 12th rib. (2) area of rib eye, (3) kidney and pelvic fat in percent, and (4) carcass weight!


By using these factors, the grader can estimate the saleable portion of meat from the koneless, closely-trimmed chuck, loin, tib, and round. The grades are:


The dual grading service is available to members of the trade (packers, etc.) who wish to use it and pay for it on a fee basis. The firm using the quality grade is not required to use the yield grade. The program will be given a one-year trial. It may or may not be accepted.

It is noteworthy that regardless of the outcome of this particular program, the method of obtaining the retail yield grade probably will be useful to the livestock and meat industry in attempting to meet the changing trends of the future.

Implications



Beef grading helps to determine its market value. The question of whether or not to grade might be compared to the question of whether or not we should weigh slaughter cattle. Slaughter cattle are usually sold on a hundradweight basis rather than by the head because the fold value of animal is related to its weight. This is thecause consumers buy meat by the pound. Consumers also prefer bone ess, closely-trimmed rounds, lions ribs and chucks.

Cutability Risk and Buying Cost

Cutability Risk and Buying Cost

Here is where dual grading comes in. The added yield grade gives the proportion of high value retail cuts. A Good grade carcass with 52% of high valued retail cuts is worth far more than a Good grade carcass with only 44% of high valued retail cuts. The retailer, especially the small retailer, has less value or outability risk in buying carcasses that are graded for yield. The retail yield grade system of dual grading was proposed and will be tried for the same reason that we sell our slaughter cattle or a hundredweight basis rather than by the head; it is a more accurate method of determining value.

The meat buyer for a retail store at present can buy over the phone, on buy on inspection by picking out those carcasses that he feels will yield him the greatest return; or if the quantity purchased is large enough, he can buy meat according to his specifications. For the retailers buying on inspection the buyers with the best judgement, usually those buying large quantities, have the advantage. The buyers purchasing without inspection or specification, their average would be near the market average. But with a larger proportion of the meat sold on inspection or specification, their average would be near the market average yields would be lower for those buying without inspection or specification for specification respection or specification. In other words, the average yield of this meat would be lower than the market average if inspection or specifications mean anything.
