

City Budget Shows .90 Mill Increase As Total Lowers

The city council approved a lower budget for 1963, although there will be an increase in the mill levy. This situation was brought about as the major decrease came in departments for which there is no tax levy and the increases came in levied areas.

A .90 mill increase will be needed in the coming year, based on an evaluation of \$5,353,540. This was an increase in evaluation of \$100,760.

The additional .90 increase brings the total to 23 mills, compared to 22 1/2 last year.

The increases occurred in the Auditorium fund, one mill to two mills; the Park fund, up 1/10 mill to two mills; the Social Security fund, up 5/10 to 1.50.

Mill decreases were in the Airport fund, down .20 to .20 and the Library Bonds fund down .20 to nothing.

The decreases occurred in the Light fund, down \$20,000 and the Sewage Treatment fund, down \$50,000.

The total budget is \$1,150,500.

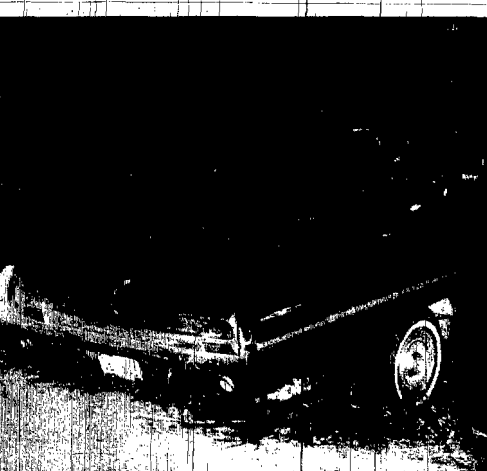
Ruth Jensen Graduated From School of Nursing

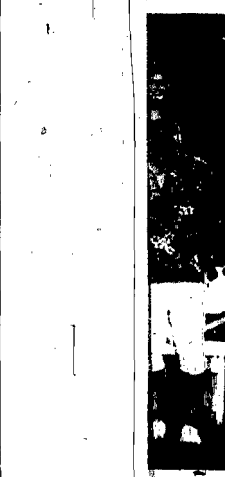

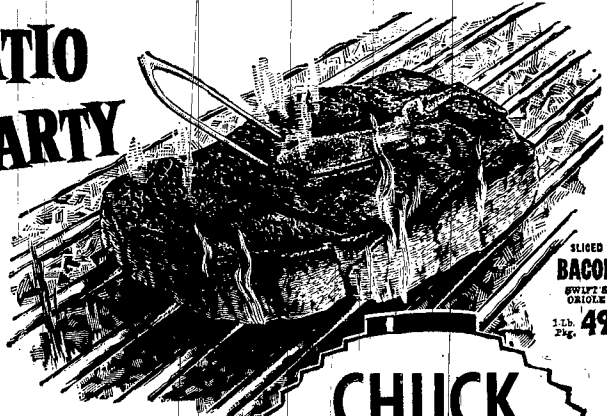

Wayne won the district north half championship last Wednesday with an eight-run outburst in the fifth inning enroute to an 8-3 victory over Hartington.

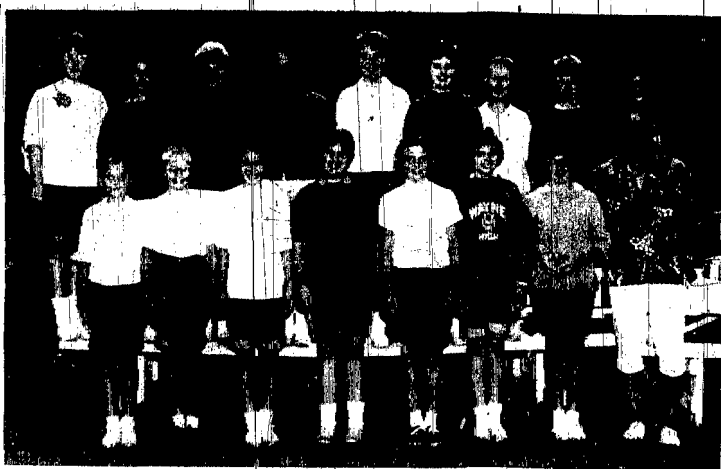



EDITORIAL COMMENT

It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You Might Miss Her

If you give your wife a million dollars and tell her that she can go away and spend it at the rate of \$1,000 per day, she would be back in three years, broke and asking for more money. But if you give her a billion dollars and tell her to spend it at the same rate of \$1,000 per day, you would not see her again for 3,000 years.

Public Deserves Facts

The increasingly bitter debate over the proper method of providing health services to the aged has led, inevitably and unfortunately, to some widely-held misconceptions.

Many believe, for instance, that most elderly people now lack any economic

protection if illness strikes. But the truth is that 53 percent of all persons over 65 have health insurance of some kind, that this age group is buying health insurance faster than any other group and by 1965 more than 75 percent of the aged who want coverage will have it.

Many also believe that most elderly people are sorely lacking in financial resources. But the truth is that the economic status of those past 65 is, in many respects, better than that of any other age group. For example, compared with any other group, more of the elderly own homes mortgage free, have lower tax liabilities, higher liquid assets and fewer family responsibilities.

This is not an argument against providing aid to those who need it — and the Kerr-Mills law passed by the last Congress is designed to do that under a sound federal-state cooperative system. But it is an argument against providing aid in a shotgun fashion to all the people of one age category whether or not they need it and whether or not they want to pay for it in higher taxes. And this is precisely what the Social Security approach would do at a potentially astronomical cost.

Capitol News

Board Claims 8.43 Mill Levy Needed For State Functions

The State Board of Equalization has determined that it will take a levy of 8.43 mills to raise sufficient state property tax money to carry out state government functions during the coming year.

That means Nebraskans will have to shell out \$8.43 for every \$1,000 of assessed valuation. That's two cents per \$1,000 more than in the past year.

But the governor and other members of the board seemed pleased they were able to practically hold the line on the levy. They noted that starting this year the special park mill levy was raised from .17 to .30 mill. The new rate, it was estimated, will raise slightly more than one million dollars annually.

The governor noted that the board was able to keep the state's general fund levy down to 6.18 mills, compared with 6.33 a year ago and 6.35 in 1960. This, the board said, was made possible by increases in total valuations returned by the counties and by increased cash receipts in some cases.

The 8.43 mill-rate will raise about \$20.8 million. The state had to raise about \$38.5 million and the balance will come from sources other than the property tax.

Redistricting

There has been no let up in the heated, sometimes bitter, words which have been traded in the legislative redistricting controversy.

The Nebraska AFL-CIO has filed a petition in federal district court asking permission to intervene on the side of the League of Nebraska Municipalities in the suit filed by the League.

The aim of the suit is to force reapportionment of the Legislature solely on the basis of population and to have declared invalid a proposed constitutional amendment which would give 20 to 30 percent weight to area in any redistricting.

According to the petition, the AFL-CIO asks the court to decree that all future elections to the Legislature be held on an at-large basis until such time as the districts are reapportioned according to population. The league originally planned to request at-large elections this fall, but dropped the idea, apparently after it had stirred a storm of protest.

Governor Morrison has rejected a request by Sen. Marvin Stromer, Lincoln, for a special session to permit the

lawmakers to redistrict. The governor said that after careful study of "both sides of the picture" such a session would not be justified.

If the Legislature voted to redistrict itself on a population basis, and if the people later approved the 20 to 30 percent amendment, "confusion and undoubtedly litigation would follow to determine which would take precedence," Morrison said.

Another factor that influenced his decision, he said, was that the session would be long and would amount to an "unjustified expense" because of the probability "that this appointment consideration could not be resolved."

Tourists

Nebraska's beautiful Capitol has often been described as the state's No. 1 tourist attraction.

Robert Newell, superintendent of the statehouse buildings and grounds, predicts a record 60,000 tourists will visit the building this year.

The number of persons who have visited the Capitol this year is approaching the record of 60,523 set last year.

Gas Taxes

During the first half of this year the state collected \$23,549,533 in gasoline taxes, about a half million dollars more than during the corresponding period in 1961.

During July the state received \$4,116,583, up slightly from the \$4,001,824 collected in June and down a bit from the \$4,143,293 collected in July last year.

New Troopers

The governor named the 31 new members of the Nebraska Highway Patrol in a short pep talk before they went out on the job for the first time.

He told the troopers they could become effective ambassadors of goodwill for the state.

The governor said patrolmen "be firm and decisive" without being arrogant and obnoxious and cautioned that every act of a trooper, in public and private, reflects credit or discredit on the state.

New Director

Marion E. Clark has been appointed state director of services for the visually impaired. He was appointed by Director of Institutions George Morris to replace Harry Hines who resigned July 31.

Clark, a school superintendent for 19 years, took a pay cut from \$8,200 to \$6,900 in moving into the job. But he said he wanted to return to Nebraska and believes he can be of service to the visually handicapped.

His first assignment will be to study services for the visually impaired in Kansas and Missouri.

Clark, 45, is married and has three children. He spent 11 years in the teaching field at Marquette, Ashton, Amherst and Alda.

He holds a bachelor's degree from Kearney State Teachers College, a master's degree from the University of Nebraska, and he has done additional work at the University of Iowa.

Co. Agent's Column

Hog Cholera Reported
Fourteen separate outbreaks of hog cholera involving 1,112 pigs were reported in Nebraska since May 15 according to Dr. C. C. Howland, University of Nebraska Extension animal hygienist.

Only one outbreak of hog cholera involving 130 hogs in Wayne county required quarantine of animals. However, three outbreaks not requiring quarantine were reported in Cedar county.

Hog cholera is usually fatal to hogs, Dr. Howland said. The Nebraska Hog Cholera Committee has asked farmers to report all known or suspected cases of the disease to the State Veterinarian.

Symptoms of hog cholera are continuous elevated temperature followed by loss of appetite, piling up, tired acting pigs, constipation, all outsets of disease, diarrhea, vomiting, weakness, staggering, observed the sixth day after infection, central nervous system disorders including convulsions, shivering and chills, inflammation of skin, and general "sick all over" symptoms.

Beef Producers Organize
Nebraska will soon have its Beef Cattle Improvement Association.

Beef producers from across the state are invited to attend the organizational meeting of the Association, Sept. 17 at the 4th Camp at Halsey State Park.

Participants in the meeting will discuss the findings of a committee which has developed bylaws for the new organization.

The committee pointed out the following goals of the organization:

—To advance the use of practical and scientifically proved information for beef cattle improvement by encouraging research and education related to the total advancement of beef cattle production;

—To encourage and coordinate herd improvement programs on the farm or ranch;

—To encourage and provide opportunities for recognition of superior beef type and conformation;

—To provide guidance and supervision of market and breeding animal evaluation programs in cooperation with breed associations;

—To assist in processing and explaining records obtained in a herd improvement program;

—To promote and advertise superior stock based on accurate records.

Safe Picnic Foods

"Is it safe to eat this food?" is a question a number of homemakers ask each summer.

Harmful bacteria do prey upon cooked protein foods, especially if they are chopped or ground, and soft or moist. Meat, poultry, custards, custard type puddings, some salads and sandwich fillings need careful storage.

It is important to keep hot foods at 140 degrees or hotter. Cold foods need to be kept at 40 degrees or below. Three hours if the maximum safe time to hold foods between these temperatures.

For a successful picnic, pack hot food very hot in insulated containers. Chill or freeze cold food. Wrap it so it will still be cool when it's time to eat. Plan to eat soon after you arrive at the picnic spot.

For a long trip, invest in an ice chest or carry the type of food that doesn't require refrigeration.

Don't Let Bugs Move In
When returning from your vacation, you need not be greeted by unwelcome guests such as water bugs and roaches who could take over while you were gone.

A precautionary measure to take would be sprinkling drains and hiding places with bug repellents containing Lindane, chlordane, flourodane and diazalon. However, you need to follow directions carefully as they are highly toxic.

An extra precaution William Rapp, Jr., Entomologist in the State Department of Health, suggests is that a five percent chlordane solution be sprayed around the foundation of the house and on the inside of the basement walls.

Travel Tips
Look twice in a mirror before wearing shorts or slacks in public. There's only one "Peter Pan" and slacks and shorts are more becoming on youthful figures. Strict sportswear is meant for just that — sports. Don't wear it for shopping, visiting museums and art galleries. Gerda

Peterson, extension clothing specialist at the University of Nebraska, reminds us that such apparel in cafes and restaurants may be embarrassing.

Pack light so you don't wear yourself out lugging extra suitcases. Make use of self-service laundries or coin-operated dry cleaners after a day or two of travel. This will eliminate the need to take many extra changes of clothing. The quality of clothes you select is more important than the quantity. Take easy care, wrinkle resistant garments.

Conservation NEWS NOTES

Each year, an outstanding conservation farmer is awarded a large aerial colored picture of his farm. This picture is made available to the farmer by the Wayne county banks.

Three farmers who have a good conservation program on their farms will represent Wayne county at this event. The Wayne county farms will be in competition with four surrounding counties for merchandise valued at \$100.

The three farm families will also be honored at a banquet and program at the Sioux City auditorium this fall.

For no matter how you shout it, he won't really care about it; He won't know how many tears drop down his cheeked.

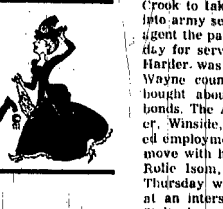
If you think some praise is due him, now's the time to slip it to him.

However, West realized that a spade lead would probably set up a spade trick for the opponents. Therefore, he led the deuce of clubs. Declarer won in dummy with the jack, and hoping the opponents would ruff some diamonds or hearts, ran all the club tricks. East showed out on the second round of clubs, but discarded his three spades as the club suit was cleared. Declarer could count only ten sure tricks, but the total would be increased

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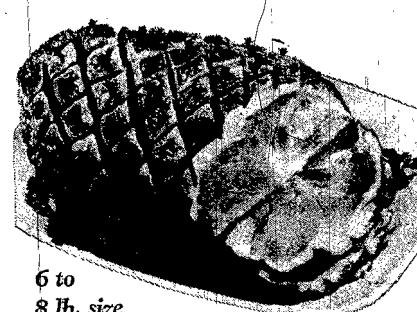

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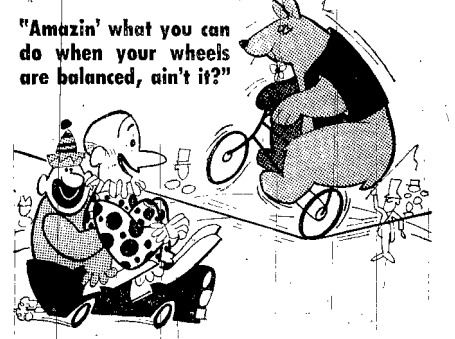
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Final Rites Held Monday At Pender For G. Breitbarth
