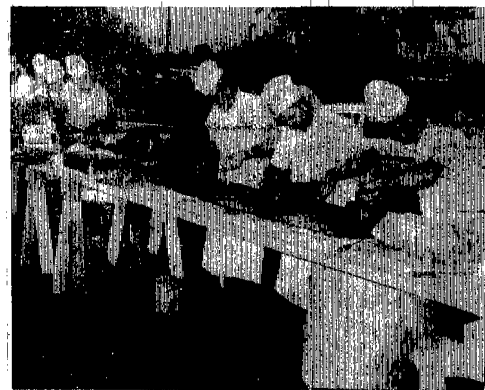

Growers To Vote August 30 On Wheat Marketing Quota

Wheat growers will vote Thursday, Aug. 30 on marketing quotas for the 1963 crop of wheat, it was announced this week by the Wayne County ASC Committee.

The issues to be voted on will be the same ones voted on for the 1961 wheat crop, as provided by permanent legislation in effect before the 1962 emergency program.

Minimum price support would be at a national average of \$1.82 per bushel (75 percent of parity) if farmers approve marketing quotas by at least a two-thirds vote in the August 30 referendum, Francke continued.

Growers with more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain (but not those taking part in the feed-wheat program) who exceeded their 1963 wheat farm allot-

ments would be subject to marketing quota penalties on their excess wheat under a quota program, he added.

If farmers disapprove marketing quotas, support for the 1963 wheat crop would be based on a national average of not less than \$1.21 per bushel for cooperators (who stay within their acreage allotments.) with no support for noncooperators, Francke went on.

Lightning Strikes D. Nolte's Wagon In Severe Storm Over 3,500 People Served At County Fair Barbecue

About 110 bales of straw and a wagon were destroyed by fire when lightning struck the wagon at the Delbert Nolte farm three and one-half miles north of Wayne early Thursday morning.

Electricity was also shut off in Wayne for a short time when a tree fell across some wires in the eastern part of town.

At the fair grounds some 60 feet of the grandstand roof was blown off by the high winds. Members from a fire which had been started for the Thursday evening barbecue were also blown around, but did not start any fires.

Wayne firemen kept the fire from spreading. Wayne suffered heavy tree damage that resulted in property damage in many cases.
