Freezing Swest Corn

Best for freezing are fresh, tender ears of sweet corn right from the hatch. The fresher the corn when frozen the more satisfactory it will be:

Select cars with plump, tender kernels and thin, sweet milk. If the milk is thick and starchy it is better to freeze corn as cream style.

After husking dars and removing silks, wash the corn in cold water. [UIS.D.A. and University of Nebraska food specialists recommend the heating of ears in boiling water, then cooling promptly in cold water and draining.

Time varies on method of

freezing:
For whole seriel and cream style—four minutes in boiling water.
Whole small cars—seven minutes.
Whole large cars—eleven minutes.

whole large bars—eleven minutes.

Blanching of vegetables stops the enzyme action which causes natural ripening and if not terminated creates over ripening thus destroying the quality of the frozen product.

Pack ears in containers or wrap in moisture-vapor resistant material. Seal and freeze.

Save Rugs From Mildew

If you detect a musty odor in your ho me, chances are that mildew is present. Magddalene Phister, home furnishings specialist at the University of Nebraska, warns that mildew can damage rigs or carpeting during warm humid days.

Mildew is a fungus which grows on cellulose and protein materials under conditions of hottlemperature, high humidity, poor ventilation and protoing darkness.

The growth infests all parts of a rug—the wool fibers on the face to the jute in the backing. The roots of the fungus grow down inside the fiber, splitting and weakening it. Continued growth can cause complete deterioration of the carpet.

Prevent mildew by keeping the humidity low and airing out closed rooms and basement frequently. However, if milde wis detected, act quickly. Move the rugs loutdoors into the sunlight; brish the area gently to remove any loose fungus; vaculum; sponge with a detergent so Jution of one teappen seutral detergent to % print luke warm

If the mildew oder persists, the specialist suggests calling a professional rug cleaner.

Federal Gas Tax Refund

Don't forget to like a claim for federal tax refunds on gasoline used for agricultural purposes, reminds Fried Olson, University of Nebraska Extension Jarmi ec-

reminds Fried Olsoii, University of Nebraska Extension farm economist.

Copies of the tax refund form and instructions can be obtained from county Extension lagents. The tax rate is still four cents a gallon and may be claimed on all gastoline used for agricultural purposes either by the farmer or a custom operator. Fuel used in any refulcle on reads or highways cannot be counted, Olson advises.

Claims can be filed anytime between July 1 and september 30, this year. The refund period covers July 1, 1981 through June 30, 1982.

All farmers who filed claims last year will receive claim forms in the mail this year. Internal Revenue Service publication No. 388 gives details of the farmers gas tax refund law.






