A new building has been erected at the Thurston county fair grounds in Walhill to house all exhibits of the Pender chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

The building was constructed by A. M. Clark county fair grounds, keeping with the use of voluntary help from the Pender buy, under the direction of their instructor, Joe Aude.

The new exhibit hall, which is 96 feet long and 18 feet deep with an open east front, will be used Aug. 29 through Sept. 1 at the Thurston county fair.

One of the featured exhibits will be the "Children's Barnyard," which will include baby animals of all types.

Another feature of this year's fair will be a watermelon feed for 4-H clubbers at the close of the baby beef sale on the last day of the fair. The feed will be sponsored by the Thurston county farm bureau.

## Wheat Referendum Voter Eligibility Explained by Mohr

Eligible wheat producers in Wayne county should be sure to cast their ballots in the national wheat marketing quota referendum to be held Aug. 30. John Mohr, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee reminded growers today.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who produce more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1963 in any of the 39 commercial wheat states.

However, any producers who signed applications under the feed wheat provisions permitting them to grow wheat for use as feed on the farm for 1962 will not be eligible to vote in the referendum on quotas for the 1963 crop, Mohr pointed out.

At least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum Aug. 30 must approve marketing quotas if they are to become effective.

The 1963 plan calls for minimum price support of \$1.82 per bushel (75 percent of parity) under a quota program. Marketing quota penalties would apply to the "excess" wheat of growers with more than 15 acres of wheat who did not comply with their acreage allotments, Mohr said.

If farmers disapprove marketing quotas, there would be no restrictions on wheat marketing in 1963. However, acreage allotments would remain in effect and would be used to determine eligibility for price support at the 50-percent-of-parity rate.

Under this rate, the national average price support for wheat would be about \$1.21 per bushel, Mohr concluded.

That is also the last day to file an amended declaration of estimated individual income tax for taxpayers with fiscal years ending Aug. 31.

Individuals (other than farmers) may file final return (1040) by Sept. 30 in lieu of amended estimate.

Other installments due are third quarterly for calendar year ending Dec. 31; second quarterly for fiscal year ending Mar. 31, 1963, and first quarterly for fiscal year ending May 31, 1963.



# "Functional Budget Ideas Becoming Clear to Agencies

LINCOLN — State government agencies are beginning to get an idea of what the 1961 Legislature's budget committee meant by a "functional" approach in the preparation of budget requests.

The committee, headed by Sen. Richard Marvel, Hastings, made it abundantly clear it wanted much more detailed information on the various agencies' requests for the next biennium.

The legislators decided administrators should present a thorough analysis of their spending needs so that the lawmakers would have solid information on which to base their appropriations.

As requested by the last Unicameral, the Nebraska Public Power committee has submitted its first report to the Legislature. The report is an analysis of efforts by the committee to come up with solutions to the state's public power problems.

The manual states: "An adequate and properly prepared budget request must be thoroughly justified in terms of program objectives, activity information and fund source."

Ralph Foreman, committee secretary, said the report was "real good from a factual standpoint." But he added the committee had not been able to reach agreement on their basic deficiencies.

Among the questions are those: What major services was the agency established by law to provide? How is the agency organized to do the job?

Sen. Don Thompson, McCook, chairman of the interim committee studying public power matters, has reminded the power officials more than once that if they cannot agree on solutions the Legislature will have to step into the picture.

The budget presentation, the manual said, should give the governor, the Legislature and the public a clear and concise rundown on activities and services to be rendered by the state.

Nebraska may be in the baby-sitting business soon. Under a program which is directed at cutting the number of mothers on relief and also of curbing juvenile delinquency, public day care facilities would be set up for small children of working mothers.

# Co. Agent's Way Back When

A just-completed survey of 127 beef cattle herds in Shenandoah and Atlantic, Ia., showed that backrubbers are a good thing if your cattle can get to them.

Harold Gundersen, Iowa State entomologist, found the 11 herds that had access to backrubbers in pastures had an average of only 10 horn flies and 10 face flies per animal.

But here's the trouble. The vast majority of the pastured cattle, 104 herds, were standing, covered with flies, while many backrubbers stood in empty feedlots.

Backrubbers can be treated with fuel oil mixtures of DDT, Dithoexol, Tixaphene, Malathion or Cyfluthrin. Be sure to mix and apply according to manufacturer's recommendations on the label.

Ornamental evergreens such as cedars, junipers and pines may be transplanted successfully in the fall, according to E. H. Benson, University of Nebraska forestry expert.

The soil is warm and easily worked in the fall. Some root growth takes place after early planting so that the newly planted tree will be well established and ready to grow in the spring.

All fall-planted evergreens should be watered two or three times to a depth of one foot below the roots. Without this ample moisture winter injury is sure to occur, Benson said.

And why all this sudden interest in beef carcass shows? It seems that the livestock industry is becoming more and more aware of the value of such shows as an important means of improving the quality of beef cattle.

Until recent years, the emphasis placed on the amount of finish in live cattle has presented producers with a slightly distorted picture of the characteristics most desirable in an animal.

Carcass contests can and have proven quite helpful in correcting these fallacies. Carcasses with superior meat quality and a high proportion of lean cuts are being recognized in such contests.

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
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
