

City Schools Open Tuesday, Expect 270 in Grades 1-6

A total of 270 students are expected in grades 1-6 at the opening of Wayne city schools Tuesday, according to Superintendent Stan Westergard.

Forty-three of these new elementary students have enrolled during the summer, the superintendent said. Registrations to kindergarten total 44.

The new students come from the two districts to the east that have merged with Wayne. Wayne Hahn and children of parents who moved to Wayne, he added. Sixty students are expected at Carroll elementary school.

A half-day session will be held Tuesday, Westergard pointed out. The first full-day session will be Wednesday.

The cafeteria will serve the first meal Wednesday. Meal tickets will cost \$1.50 a week or 35 cents a meal.

Several high school students are needed to sell meal tickets, lunch tickets and distribute milk at the cafeteria, Westergard said.

"This will require about one hour either before classes or during the noon hour. Students that desire to work will be given a meal ticket," he went on. "Those that are interested should inquire either at the superintendent's or principal's office," he added.

Marge Summers will be the new head cook. Her assistants will be Mrs. Anna Nissen, Mrs. Rollie Longe, Mrs. Bob Stanley, Mrs. John Dall, Mrs. Martin Willers, Mrs. Clair Stokes and Mrs. August Lorenzen.

Room and teacher assignments have been made for the coming school year, Westergard said. "If any name is not listed the parents are requested to phone the school (number 26) so that assignment can be made."

In an effort to keep grades 4-6 on the west end of the building, several of the teachers have received new room assignments this year, he added. If it is recommended, see CITY SCHOOLS — page 4

Concord Field Day Set for Sept. 18

Crops, conservation, insect control, fertility practices, and fattening cattle will be on display at the Northeast Nebraska Experiment Station field day, Sept. 18, according to County Agent Harold Ingalls.

The experiment station at Concord is currently finding that their fattening cattle are eating more grain when hay is fed generously than when it is fed in limited amounts, Ingalls said.

Six lots of experimental cattle were started on six pounds of hay daily and gradually reduced to two pounds daily per head. The other six lots have been reduced from six and one-half pounds to three and one-half pounds. This is about all the hay they want with a full feed of corn, Ingalls explained.

"Grain consumption has not been increasing by limiting the hay," Ingalls continued. "In fact the low hay cattle have actually eaten less grain than those getting more hay, since their hay has been cut to two pounds daily."

The hay hungry cattle have been harder to keep on feed than the others getting more roughage, experimental cattle feeder Walter Tolman told Ingalls.

WSTC Campus to Come Alive Monday as Freshmen Arrive

Wayne State's campus will come alive again Monday after a brief August respite as freshmen arrive to begin their college careers.

Advance applications indicate another record enrollment for the eleventh straight year. President W. A. Brandenburg estimates about 1,500 students, perhaps more, compared with 1,437 a year ago.

Reservations for dormitory rooms are approaching a capacity of nearly 1,200.

The calendar for opening week lists a convention for freshmen at 2 p.m. Monday in Rice Auditorium; sophomore registration Tuesday morning and juniors that afternoon; freshman registration Wednesday, seniors Thursday. Freshmen will keep busy through Thursday with placement testing and orientation. Then all students will begin classes Friday.

The campus will exhibit one new landmark, the Student Center, now complete except for final installation of kitchen equipment. The \$900,000 structure, built entirely with revenue bonds, will feed 750 at a time in its cafeteria. In addition, it will house the college grill, recreation facilities and the book store.

Also notable on campus is considerable new concrete paving of roads around the Student Center, also of new sidewalks. Athletic fields, including a baseball diamond, are ready for use adjacent to Memorial Stadium.

Other campus changes include remodeling of rooms in the top floor of Hahn school. The old Student Union is to be remodeled for classroom and office use, now that the cafeteria is vacated. It will retain its former name, Council Hall.

New on campus are 16 faculty members, among them two filling new positions. Dr. M. A. Waggoner will have the duties of director. See WSTC CAMPUS — Page 4

County NFO Group To Back National Holding Action

Wayne county's nearly 100 NFO members will actively participate in the organization's all-out holding action on livestock, corn and soybeans, it was announced Wednesday by County Chairman Lawrence Hansen.

Fifteen Wayne county farmers attended the NFO convention at Des Moines, Ia. Tuesday where President Oren Lee Staley, Rea, Mo., disclosed details of the marketing curtailment.

The holding action, slated to start at midnight Friday, will continue until NFO contracts have been signed with all packers and meat processors, the organization's leaders said.

"All our county members will participate in the action," Hansen said Wednesday. "We are urging non-members to join us in the action to make the results more effective."

NFO members were advised at the Des Moines conclave to feed their livestock only a maintenance ration to keep animals from gaining any more weight than necessary.

Price goals for the action are: \$32.40 per hundredweight on choice cattle weighing 800 to 1,000 pounds; \$22.75 per hundredweight on No. 1 and No. 2 hogs scaling 150-210 pounds; \$29.45 per hundredweight on choice wooled lambs; \$1.49 a bushel on No. 2 or better corn; \$2.56 a bushel on No. 1 soybeans.

(Continued from page 1) rector of graduate studies, which Dean of Instruction, Karl Meyer has performed, Dr. Waggoner also will be professor of sociology, chairman of the new division of business which previously was part of the division of applied arts. The curriculum has a number of minor changes and one major change. Students preparing for secondary teaching now will spend seven weeks in directed teaching at schools in other towns. Formerly they spent only two weeks this way. During the seven weeks they will spend full time in the classroom, perform extra duties that teachers do, and arrange for their housing. Elementary teaching candidates will do their directed teaching at Mann for a full 15-week term in stead of half terms as in the past, spending half a day five days a week. As the 1962-63 year begins, Wayne moves into its second year of operating on the accelerated trimester schedule. Though still in the three-year experimental stage as authorized by the State Normal Board, the trimester achieved several of its goals in the first year. It enabled many students to graduate many months before they could have under the old semester plan. It reduced board and room costs because of shorter terms, 15 weeks instead of 18. It combined third term with summer enrollment to attain the biggest student body in history during June and July. And by its accelerated pace it required more concentrated study habits of students.

# EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and vice versa thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

## How Not to Compete

One of the problems facing this country is how to compete in world markets with nations whose wage and other costs are, for the most part, far lower than ours. The expanding European Common Market is one example of the tough competition we are up against.

Yet, in mid-August, the AFL-CIO executive council announced a drive to make the 35-hour week general throughout organized industry with no reduction in take-home pay and with double-time pay for all additional hours

worked. The reason given for this is unemployment. The labor leaders say that employers would take on more workers in order to avoid heavy overtime penalties.

But what they fail to discuss is the increase in costs that would certainly result and would find their way into the swelling prices of U.S. goods in world markets as well as the home market. Thus, our competitive ability would be further weakened. Then there would be reduced demand for our products — and more, not less, unemployment. This would be a classic and tragic example of cutting off one's nose to spite one's face.

# New Approach Is Suggested To State Public School Aid

LINCOLN — The Nebraska School Boards Association Executive Committee has announced it is planning a new approach in an attempt to get some state aid for public schools. The aid, according to a recent announcement, would come from a doubling of the present state property tax levy.

In the past, most educators interested in state aid said the money for the program could be raised by broadening of the base — meaning a state sales and/or income tax.

The latest move has been interpreted as a sign that the association has given up hope of getting the tax base broadened — at least in the immediate future.

The executive committee said it would support the new approach after a pool of school boards belonging to the organization. The pool, an association spokesman said, showed "we're for state aid, but apparently not so strong for earmarked state sales or income taxes."

Two resolutions will be presented to the association convention in Lincoln Oct. 21-22. One will call for \$100 state aid for each public school student, and the second will urge that the money be raised by a uniform state levy on all tangible property in the state.

Last year Nebraska had about 250,000 students in average daily attendance in the public schools. That means if the Legislature authorized \$100 for each, \$25 million would be required annually.

Using the present state valuation, this would require a 7.44 mill increase in the current levy of 8.43 mills.

South opened with a bid of one diamond. When North bid his five card spade suit, South jumped the bidding to three spades. It will be noted that South held 17 points in support of spades. North, holding eight high card points, plus a doubleton, had ample to carry on to game in spades.

East led the king of clubs. South's dummy hand won with the ace. Declarer next played the spade queen failed to pick up the diamond queen was led to dummy's jack. The king of diamonds came next, declarer discarding the seven of clubs as West trumped with the queen. West's club return was taken by East with the jack. East could

do no better than to return a club, trumped by declarer with the eight spot. The six of spades was led to dummy's seven spot. On the ace of diamonds declarer tossed a small heart.

Declarer's only chance to bring in the hand now depended upon the location of the ace of hearts. A small heart was led from dummy. West played low, but declarer's only hope for success in the contract was to play the heart king. When the king held the trick the bid was fulfilled. The defense won, in all, one spade, one club, and one heart.

Today's hand is an example of a hand in which the defense's last trump must be left outstanding. Had North made the mistake of forcing out the queen of spades the defense could have immediately cashed two club tricks and a heart trick. These four tricks would defeat the contract.

With a normal distribution of opponents' diamonds, it will be noted, declarer will make an overtrick. If West has as many as three diamonds, two clubs can be discarded from North as the third and fourth rounds of diamonds are played. From South, West can trump the fourth round, but with the ace of hearts in West's hand, declarer would lose only a heart trick and a spade trick.

After trump failed to pick up in two rounds in the above hand declarer had two opportunities to bring in the hand. But he had to take advantage of the opportunities in the proper order. The diamond suit offered the best chance to eliminate losers from North's hand. When the diamonds did not break favorably there was still the chance that West was dealt the ace of hearts. When the king of hearts turned out to be a winner the bid was made.

## Answers Critics

Melvin O. Steen has never been known to back down, if he believes he is right. There has been some criticism in recent days about the speed at which the tourist development program has progressed.

## Extension Notes

Ripe tomatoes will keep best in the refrigerator where the cold stops the ripening process. If the tomatoes are not quite ripe when you get them, they'll turn red if you spread them out in a cool room 10 to 15 degrees Fahrenheit (about 60 to 70 degrees). Light isn't needed to turn them a good red color. In fact, ripening on a sunny window in summer is a poor practice. Too much sunlight prevents the development of a normal and even color.

Make a practice of peeling and cutting tomatoes just before serving. If you must prepare them early, keep them covered in the refrigerator until time to cook or serve.

But you may say it takes so long to peel tomatoes and they just don't look nice with knife gouges in their smooth sides. An easy way to peel tomatoes that leaves them smoothly round is to dip them in hot water for one minute and then cool at once by dipping in cold water. The skin separates easily from the flesh, leaving every ounce of the tomato intact.

**Baked Tomatoes**  
Wash medium-sized tomatoes, ripen or green, and cut off the stems. Place tomatoes in a baking dish. Sprinkle tops with salt and pepper and crumbs mixed with butter or margarine.



Ridiculous, To Put It Mildly.

Add just enough water to cover the bottom of the dish. Cover and bake 375 until tomatoes are soft—about 30 minutes for ripe tomatoes, 45 minutes for green. When tomatoes are about half done, uncover the dish to brown the crumbs.

**Honey-Spiced Fruit Dressing**  
Combine 1/4 cup and 2 tablespoons vegetable oil, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1 tablespoon honey and season to taste with paprika and salt. Beat well, chill and mix again for serving. Makes about 1 cup.

## HOW GOOD ARE OUR SCHOOLS?

Once again school bells will usher in the annual mighty "educational movements" of several million pupils and students going back to school.

Never in history has any nation invested as much in education and depended as much on it as the United States of America. By mid-September, one in four Americans will be in school either as a learner, a teacher, an administrator or as a maintenance employee. Our investment in school properties is somewhere in the neighborhood of 25 billion dollars. If this writers' source of information is correct,

This is a vast sum. Yet when our federal government alone allows almost twice that amount for military contracts and so-called defense expenditures, much of which, aside from the waste, becomes obsolete almost before it can be translated into materials, the expenditure is small.

There have been some harsh and strident things said about education in recent years. Teachers are criticized, school administrators are abused, curricula are lampooned, methods are castigated, the end product is often vilified.

Generally, however, the pendulum has a way of returning again. Take, for example, the case of "Burgess Hill," Britain's pioneer do-as-you-like school at Shenley, Hertfordshire. This school was the ultimate in free expression. Founded upon the premise that complete freedom develops character and avoids complexes, its faculty was dedicated to the philosophy that there is no fixed morality of right and wrong.

Consequently any kind of discipline and restraint were avoided. Boys and girls were free to smoke or drink or eat in class. One had in fact did not attend a class session in two years because of "outside interests."

President A. Whitney Griswold of Yale went out or a limb to declare: "The national traffic in scholarships constitutes one of the greatest swindles ever perpetrated on American youth. They undermine American education because the aim is not the education of youth but the entertainment of elders." More and more educators who are not prodded by the "play boys" among the alumni are giving these words a long, hard look.

There are textbooks. There are those who advocate a return to the old McGuffey reader. Now there is something formidable in a record of one hundred twenty-two million copies of any textbook used in a day when the population of our country was only a fraction of what it is today, when opportunities to attend school were greatly limited and when lobbyists and high pressure sales methods were hardly known in selling textbooks.

Without a doubt, next to the Bible, the McGuffey readers were the most widely used books in America during a large part of the nineteenth century, and possibly the greatest single in-

fluence in the whole American educational process. The success of the McGuffey readers must be attributed to the fact that they filled a need. In addition to teaching correct grammatical form, spelling, sentence structure and punctuation, they also set a distinct moral tone. They inculcated such homely virtues as hard work, honesty, high character and Christian morality.

All this raised the question how far education devoid of morality and religion can proceed and still be purposeful and achieve happy goals.

"But religion must not be taught in our public schools," you say. True. And the recent Supreme Court ruling on the New York regents' prayer case reaffirmed that. If this decision had any implications at all it served notice that religious education must be provided outside the public school.

And it is well that way. For this is a responsibility God imposes squarely upon parents and upon that community known as the Church, comprising many groups of parents.

The school can do much to espouse the cause of religion without actively teaching or performing practices of any particular brand or creed thereof. It can show reverence and deference for religion. It can also point out that religion belongs to one of our great heritages, is of the essence of freedom and can contribute much to the happiness of the individual and the well being of the commonwealth.

This we have a right to expect of a good school. But we must not expect of our schools to accomplish what they are powerless to achieve.

## Co. Agent's Column

Farm production costs today are nearly four times as high as they were in 1940.

Studies by USDA's Economic Research Service show about 70 percent of a farmer's gross income is paid for production. In 1951, compared to 1940, 50 percent of gross income has been held steady for the past few years, production costs have continued to climb.

In 1940, U. S. farmers spent \$175 on machinery for every dollar spent for hired help. By 1960 the ratio had risen to 2.77 to 1.

Expenditures for fertilizer and lime in the U.S. by 1960 had climbed to 4.8 times the 1940 outlay. This shows a very sizeable increase in quantity used because prices per ton increased only 50 percent.

In 1960, property taxes were about 3.4 times higher than in 1940. Between 1955 and 1960, the farmers property tax increased from 1.1 million dollars to 1.5 million dollars, about 7 percent a year.

**Slatted Floors Are Self Cleaning**  
Self-cleaning slatted floors in buildings used for growing and finishing market pigs show many promising possibilities.

According to an Iowa State study the slatted floors require less labor for cleaning and improving sanitation, reports University of Nebraska Extension Agent, E. A. Olson. Pigs are almost immediately separated from their waste and they stay clean and dry. If the slats are just wide enough to let the waste through, there is no harm to the pigs' feet or legs. Slatted floors require less space. During freezing weather, slatted floors should be used only in draft free, insulated buildings with mechanical ventilation. It may be necessary to control temperature and humidity to assure self cleaning.

## New Developments in Paints

After World War II, water-thinner paints, based on high polymers related distantly to synthetic rubber, became available. Their high resistance to alkali and the fact that they can be painted on a surface that is not completely dry made them very popular for plaster, masonry, and similar surfaces. Nearly all these products, however, did not have the flexibility to adjust to the large dimensional changes which wood undergoes when its moisture content varies over a wide range. Only recently have latex paints been available which retain their flexibility well enough to be adapted for the painting of wood.

These latex paints for wood have a number of marked advantages. They are easy to apply, then dry rapidly, usually in about half an hour, allowing the application of two coats without moving the scaffold, and they may be applied to damp surfaces or during damp weather. Being porous, they allow moisture trapped in the wood to diffuse the air without blistering the paint film. On the other hand, they are not perfect. Experience is not yet available on how they will perform when used to repaint old oil paint surfaces.

Much interest has been expressed in recent years in fire-retardant paints. Paints are now available which will do much to delay the ignition of wood surfaces, and to slow down the spread of fire when the wood is exposed to fire without blistering the paint film. Unfortunately, as a general thing the better fire-retardant paints are usually very sensitive to water, limiting their use to interiors. They are usually difficult to apply and do not give a very decorative surface. They also must be applied as a relatively thick film, to give the expected results, increasing the cost per square yard substantially.

Recently certain resinous coatings have become available which do not dry by solvent evaporation, like lacquers, or by oxidation, like oils, but rather by chemical reaction. Just before application the resin and a "catalyst" are mixed. These coatings usually have very little solvent in them, so extremely thick coatings in one application are possible. The resin used may be an epoxy, a urethane, or a polyester.

By choice of suitable materials, remarkable resistance to abrasion, chemicals, and water may be obtained. Some of these are somewhat deficient in exterior durability, and all are rather difficult to apply. Because of the close control needed in the application, they are generally better adapted to factory rather than field application. However, they are all new, and further developments may be expected in the next few years.

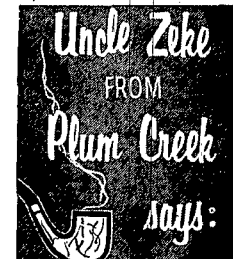
## Conservation NEWS NOTES



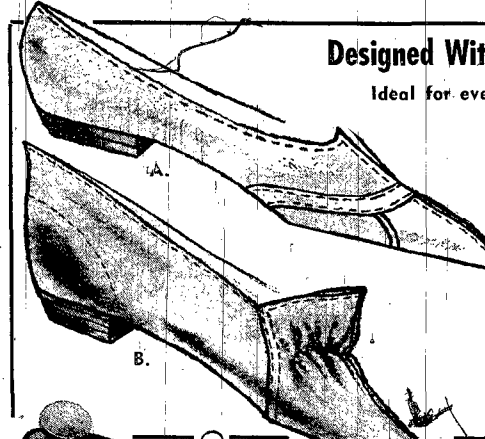
