Education Representative Discusses College Growth

With enrollments growing rapidly, what are colleges doing to meet the growth?

A United States Office of Education representative told some of the current trends in a talk to the Wayne State College faculty Saturday.

Chief among the major trends he noted are calendar changes, more independent study by students, larger classes, fewer courses, greater use of equipment (some call it hardware), and more junior colleges.

Dr. Donald Warner, a professor for about two decades and a summer school specialist for the Office of Education in the past year, said independent study can be a major solution to the large enrollment gains expected.

More and more colleges are finding that students can do remarkable work when turned loose to study on their own with occasional guidance. Even freshmen and sophomores are getting the chance in some colleges, Dr. Warner said.

Wayne State offers independent study to juniors and seniors. It also has adopted another major method to cope with growing enrollment — calendar change, specifically the trimester schedule.

Dr. Warner said many Office of Education people consider the three term trimester plan only will be the major way to handle more students. The three terms, covering 11 months, enable students to earn degrees in less than three years, instead of the usual four.

Office of Education estimates three college enrollments jumping from a probable 4.2 million this fall to more than 6 million by 1970. But this is conservative, Dr. Warner said. Some prophets see an increase of perhaps 75 percent. The percentage of high school graduates going to college has risen steadily — from one-tenth three decades ago to more than one-third now.

Summer sessions may help relieve the increase problem. Dr. Warner has just written a report on a general survey of college summer schools — the first major study ever done. It reveals that about two-thirds of the colleges and universities in America offer summer school. Summer enrollment is about one-third of that in regular terms.

Some colleges, he said, are using the summer session as a try-out for new freshmen to find those who are capable of college work.

Woman's Club Will Hold Opening Meet Sept. 14

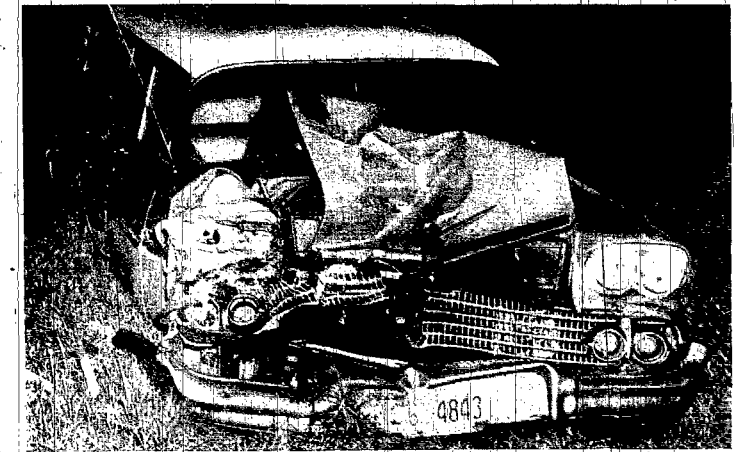
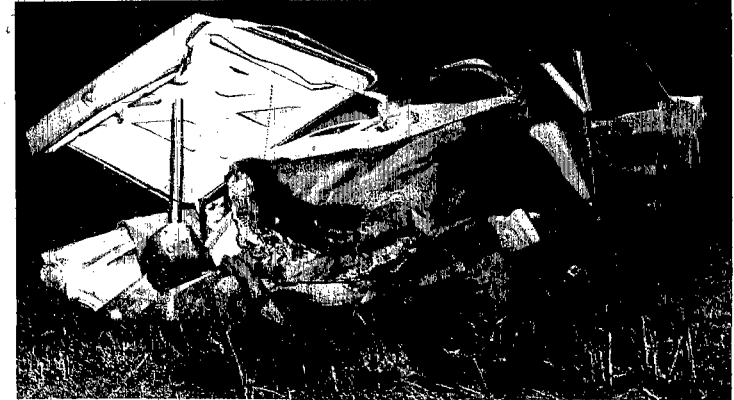
Speakers, tours and panels will be featured at the meetings of the Wayne Woman's Club this year.

Capitol News

Recreation Areas, Access Roads to Face Lawmakers

LINCOLN—One problem which is sure to get stepped-up attention during the next legislative session is the building of access roads to state recreational areas.

Now that the state has embarked on a campaign to boost tourism, the argument is sure to come that roads leading to places of historic and scenic interest should be a logical part of the over-all plans to lure tourists into the state.

The Legislature's interim committee studying tourism has already made its pitch to the State Advisory Highway commission for some consideration in its future deliberations.

The tourism committee has requested prompt action in allocating state highway funds for construction of access roads to some of the "more popular" recreational areas. The commissioners, after some discussion, said they wanted some assurance that local property owners who would benefit from such roads would help in their maintenance. The commissioners agreed such access roads are necessary but said they should not be financed entirely by the state.

Commissioner Thane Davis, Hyannis, suggested that areas with strong recreational potential should devise a system of helping pay for the access roads. He also proposed that public use recreational areas set themselves up into districts which would levy property taxes to defray road construction costs. This proposal, presented in the form of a resolution, was unanimously adopted by the commission.

Joe Votava, Omaha commission member, said he favored the state constructing roads only to Lewis and Clark lake and to Lake McConaughy, which he described as "the only two real areas that have the potential and

the natural resources to attract tourists."

Members of the interim committee said they would give the matter more study and would report back Sept. 24. The 1961 Legislature set aside \$120,000 annually for access roads, but this obviously is not sufficient to do the job that many think should be done.

Russian Visitors

The University of Nebraska at the request of the federal government, will host a two-day visit of high ranking Soviet government officials late this month.

The party, scheduled to arrive Sept. 20, will include the Soviet Union's minister of agriculture and the former minister. The latter is now president of the Union of Agriculture Sciences in Russia. According to Dr. E. F. Frolik, dean of the Nebraska College of Agriculture, the Soviet officials asked specifically to see Nebraska and its college of agriculture.

The Russians will make brief visits also which will be aimed at familiarizing them with programs of research in plant breeding and extension programs in wheat, cattle and poultry. The delegation will include eight Russians and four Americans. The Americans will include Dr. E. T. York, administrator of the Federal Extension Service, and Eugene T. Olson, an expert on Soviet agricultural affairs.

Frolik says he is interested in showing the Russians what "free economic enterprise and supported scientific research can produce."

Poor Salesman

The manager of the Nebraska Hybrid Seed Growers association has described farmers as the world's best producers but the "poorest" merchandisers.

Dr. Wittson announced plans for the program after being awarded a Federal grant of \$99,999—the first of a series which could total \$400,000 by 1957.

Dire Warning

The Nebraska Safety council has come up with the sobering prediction that the state is on the way to a new annual traffic death record. The council said the last six months of the year "have consistently produced a much higher percentage of traffic deaths than the first six months."

Records show that during the past 25 years, the average increase in the last half of the year was 42 percent and for the past five years, 40 percent. If the pattern continues this year, Nebraska will have the dubious distinction of setting a new record.

The present traffic death high was reached in 1958 when 848 were killed in road mishaps.

New Appointments

Governor Morrison has appointed Gregory K. Stuve, Norfolk, to fill the unexpired term of the late Otto Hansen, Bloomfield, of the State Water Pollution Control council. He will serve until Mar. 1, 1955.

Reappointed to a four-year term on the Nebraska Brand committee was W. Woodrow Metzger, Gordon.

Close To Home

Six more cases of hog cholera in six more counties affecting 1,083 hogs have been reported in Nebraska. The new cases were reported in Dawes, Pierce, Dawson, Greeley, Boone and Lancaster counties.

We don't know how many hogs have been exposed to cholera during the past few days. Many herds of hogs may have been exposed and farmers should vaccinate their animals to help prevent infection. Protect against hog cholera by immunizing serum and rabbit origin virus vaccine. Hog cholera can mean a loss of 50 to 100 percent of your hogs.

A total of 20 cases of hog cholera involving 2,235 hogs has been reported since July 1. Other cases were reported in the following counties: Wayne, Richardson, Cedar, Garden, Merrick, Fillmore, York, Butler and Johnson.

New Wafering Machine

An inexpensive wafing machine that can process hay at almost any moisture content has been developed in Michigan, according to P. H. Cole, University of Nebraska dairyman.

The machine was built mostly from parts of a baler by a Michigan State university agricultural engineer. It is expected to be on the market in two years.

The machine is supposed to be capable of making wafers from hay with a moisture content of 65 percent without the use of an artificial binding agent. The wafers are artificially dried by conventional driers.

The loss of feed value in hay is reduced by the machine because it reduces leaf shattering. The leaves are saved because the hay is at a high moisture content when wafered.

Wafers are excellent for handling, shipping and storage. When fed to animals, the wafers caused no significant increase or decrease in production. The shape of these little "hay packages" seems to make the biggest difference in animal acceptability. Agricultural engineers are looking for a wafer shaped in such a way that animals can easily learn to chew it, Cole said.

More Carcass Info

The increasing need for information on carcass value, growth and conformation of beef cattle has prompted Nebraska producers to suggest the formation of a Beef Cattle Improvement association.

Beef breeders feel there is a need to coordinate existing activities and develop new programs for measuring carcass value, according to information our office received from Dr. Leo Lucas, University of Nebraska animal husbandman.

Initial steps towards forming such an association were taken last spring at a meeting in Brock-

"Carcass evaluation is relatively new in most production-testing programs," Lucas said. "There is a need for carcass testing if we are to develop a complete production-testing program."

Carcass evaluation usually includes some of the following measurements: rib eye area, fat thickness over rib, USDA grade to nearest one third of grade, percentage of trimmed round, percentage kidney and pelvic fat, predicted cutability, marbling score and carcass weight.

An ultrasonic electronic device is now available to determine carcass characteristics on the hoof, without sacrificing the animals for slaughter. The cost of the machine includes its use by most individual producers but an organization like the association could obtain the device as part of a production testing program, according to Lucas.

conditions are improved, reports Magdalene Pfister, home furnishing specialist at the University of Nebraska.

Studying is one of the hardest jobs eyes have to do, therefore lighting is important. Book reading is usually easier on the eyes than seeing tasks such as writing, figuring and drawing, where there is little contrast between the pencil marks and paper. However, they all require proper light.

Good lighting means comfortable light — free from glare, annoying contrasts and disturbing shadows. It doesn't require costly lamps and fixtures.

Study lamps should provide a high level of well-diffused light, upward. Bullet lights and goose-neck lamps should NOT be used for studying. Lamps with open-topped shades are much better. The lower edge of the shade should be about eye-level (15 inches above desk top depending on your height) and wide enough across the bottom (16 inches or more) to give a wide spread of light.

Sharp contrasts may cause eye fatigue. Reduce contrasts with a light-colored desk top or desk blotter and a light-colored wall behind the study area. Turn on other lights in the room since general room lighting is necessary and aids in making "task" lighting more comfortable.

Weekly Bridge Tip — Wrong Decision

- you play properly, of course, you do not trump at all. Instead, you discard the deuce of hearts. East cannot now prevent you from making the bid. You win the trick, draw trump, play the king and queen of clubs, and lead a heart to dummy's ace. On the ace of clubs you discard your last heart. Your only losses, then, are three diamond tricks.
- When a declarer played today's hand at duplicate bridge, he failed to note the play of the six, and then the five of diamonds, by West. When the third round of diamonds was led he trumped in with a small spade. West overtrumped and played a heart. When the heart finesse failed, declarer suffered a one trick set.
- One other declarer became panicky at the thought of losing the first three kings, so when the third round of diamonds was led he trumped with his king. When trump failed to pick up in one round he also went down to defeat.
- Today's hand points up the importance of having an over-all plan for the play of a hand, and also shows the importance of watching the play of low cards from opponents' hands. The first declarer, above, went set because he failed to observe that West had high-lowed in diamonds. The second declarer failed to make the bid because he had not developed a definite plan for the play of the hand.
- An experienced player would be planning his line of play as the first two rounds of diamonds are played. When the ten of diamonds is led it is not difficult to see that the success of the contract can be assured by discarding a heart from South.

East-West vulnerable; South deals. Bidding:

South West North East

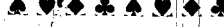

Assume that you are, sitting South as declarer in today's hand. You open with a bid of one spade. North promises at least 13 points, counting distribution, with his bid of three spades. Fortunately, you merely return to four spades and that becomes the final contract.

West leads the six of diamonds. East wins with the king. The ace of diamonds comes next, and when your queen and jack drop on the first two rounds, East continues with the ten of diamonds. You note that West played the six, and then the five of diamonds, so it is probable that he is out of diamonds. Do you trump with your king, hoping to pick up the queen and jack of spades by playing to the ace; or do you play a small spade, hoping to successfully finesse hearts later for your tenth trick? If
