Wisner Crushes Wayne 39-0 As Both Teams Open Season

The Wayne Blue Devils found it quite a little heavy Friday night as Wisner rolled to a 39-0 victory in the opening game for both clubs.

Wayne received the kickoff, ran four plays and the Bulldogs took over from there, scoring five times in the first half.

Wayne got away a very short punt after running their first series of downs and Wisner brought the ball back to the Wayne 20. Four plays later Wisner's Clem McGill punched over from the six for the score. They missed the extra point and led 6-0 with just minutes gone in the game.

The Devils took the kickoff on their 27. Unable to move they kicked from the 26, only to have the punt blocked and recovered by Wisner on the Devil's 10. McGill scored on the first play, Gayle Giese added the point and the Bulldogs led 13-0.

Wayne took the kickoff on the 20 and was unable to gain. Wisner took the punt on their 42, rambled to the 30 and five plays later Dave Ott scored, making it 19-0 in favor of the Bulldogs.

The Devils returned the kickoff to the 30 but again were unable to move and were forced to punt.

The hard charging Wisner line again swarmed the kicker and blocked the punt. This time the Bulldogs recovered on the Wayne 15 and scored in the next two plays. Ott again scored and McGill added the point to lead 26-0.

With time left in the first half, Wayne was again forced to punt, this time to their own 40 where Wisner fielded the ball and returned it to the 25. Wisner this time used five plays as Bob Hurst punched over for the TD and Giese added the PAT to make it 33-0.

The Blue Devils contained the Wisner offense in the third and fourth quarters, although they were unable to put together any kind of a scoring threat in that time.

The final six points for Wisner came with 16 seconds left in the game when McGill hit Alan Moeller in the end zone with a pass for the TD. The PAT failed and Wisner led by the final score of 39-0 with seconds left on the clock.

The Devils meet Plainview Friday at WSTC Memorial Stadium for a conference game. Plainview owns one conference win with their victory over Stanton last week.

Maj. Paul Bowman Dies Sept. 6 In San Francisco

Maj. Paul B. Bowman, 55, Palo Alto, Calif., died Sept. 6 in a San Francisco hospital. He was the son of O. R. Bowman and the late Mrs. Bowman, Wayne. He was born Oct. 25, 1906, in Pikes.

He was graduated from Wayne high school and WSTC. He received a law degree cum laude from the University of Nebraska College of Law in 1928. Following his graduation he began the practice of law in Billings, Mont. He was married in 1931 to Opal Hughes at Billings. In the same year he became an attorney for The Federal Land Bank, Spokane.

At the beginning of World War II he entered the Army as a captain in the Judge Advocate General department and while on duty in Washington, D.C. he was promoted to major. In 1943 he was ordered to Australia but was unable to go because of major surgery. Illness caused him to retire from active duty. However, he retained his military rank as a reserve officer.

Survivors include his widow; a son, Paul W., a daughter, Mrs. Joyce Poore; his father, O. R. Bowman, Wayne; a sister, Mrs. J. Knox Jones, Lincoln, and two granddaughters.

Short Sessions in Ag, Business Set for Fall

Practical self-improvement courses in business and agriculture have been condensed into an eight-week session for high school graduates at the University of Nebraska Hall of Youth.

The short sessions, entitled the Midwest Institute for Young Adults (MIYA) are open to anyone interested in continuing his education. The sessions will be held this fall and winter starting Oct. 23, 1962 and Jan. 21, 1963, according to Dr. Hoiberg.

The Woods Charitable Fund Inc., Lincoln, will offer 75 scholarships valued at \$50 each to students in need of financial assistance on a first-come first-serve basis. The scholarships are contingent on a \$50 matching amount to be provided by local organizations and groups in each county.

The total cost for a session is \$80 and includes room and board at the Nebraska Center, campus fees and tuition. Participants have use of all University facilities.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The editorial department of a weekly newspaper is an important department. Normally it is one person's opinion of topics that concern most of the readers. It is the duty of an editorial writer to search all available facts before he sits down to write. From this basis the writer should be able to give a clear picture of important topics.

You may not agree with an editorial — but if you read the editorial and give serious thought to the subject discussed you have gained. You, as a reader, have given careful thought to an important problem and the writer is proud to have called your attention to an important subject that you may have overlooked.

The People Are Learning

The political writers, whose names are legion these days, have devoted innumerable words to President Kennedy's difficulties with Congress. In the view of some, the legislative record to date on White House "must" bills verges on the catastrophic and may have a profound influence on elections to come. Time will tell as to that. Meanwhile, there is one element in this record that deserves more emphasis than it has been given. Mr. Kennedy has been almost totally successful in obtaining approval of measures that are clearly necessary to the national welfare and security. The \$59 billion defense budget is proof of that. The amendments and changes made were minor. He is virtually certain to be equally successful in obtaining approval of moves and policies that, whether we like them or not, stem from the pressure of irresistible world forces. The trade ex-

panion plan, which is to give the President great and unprecedented powers in adjusting tariffs and in making and gaining other trade concessions, is the prime example here. Sentiment, based on the hard rock of logic and necessity, is powerfully in favor of it. The President's legislative failures, on the other hand, have been in areas of welfare state expansion. Three examples are paramount — the medical bill, the farm bill and the bill to establish an urban affairs body at the cabinet level. All would have advanced, one way or another, the welfare state "Big Brother" philosophy. It would be absurd to argue that this Congress is anti-Kennedy. His party holds heavy majorities in both branches. But the country has had heavy doses of welfare-statism and is learning what the costs are in lost liberty and independence, no less than in billions of dollars. There are signs that the people have had more than enough of it — and that the acts of Congress simply reflect the popular will.

Capitol News . . .

First Community to Use Industrial Development Act

LINCOLN — The southeastern Nebraska community of Auburn has become the first in the state to put into actual use the 1961-enacted industrial development act. Same time ago the people of Auburn approved a \$240,000 bond issue to attract an industry to that community. Final negotiations on the bond issue took place recently in a Lincoln bank. The new industry — the third for Auburn — is the first branch of the Magnolia Alcol company, Uniontown, N. J. The Auburn venture marks the first try at sales and operations for the eastern firm west of the Mississippi. Auburn Mayor Floyd Pughman indicated attraction of the industry involved much work on the part of some of the city's residents. The mayor believes Nebraska municipalities which have depended upon agriculture alone for economic security and progress "will blow away in dust" if industry is not cultivated.

Fine Remitted

Cherry County District Court Judge Albert Crites, Chadron, has lifted a \$12,000 fine imposed upon Frontier Airlines in 1961 for contempt of court. The airlines had been released from payment. The fine was levied by Judge Crites after Frontier refused to go along with a court order to resume flights on its northern Nebraska route. In remitting the fine, the judge said the present management

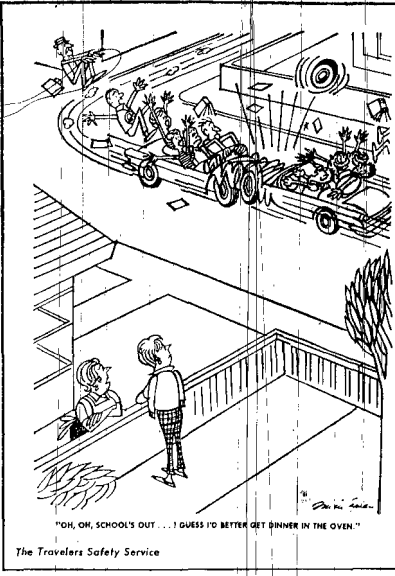

Extension Notes

Nebraskits Use Set

Two Latin American armies may be their substance while on maneuvers this fall from Ne-braskits. Officials of Colombia and Guatemala have contacted the State Department of Agriculture and have expressed inter-est in field testing the Ne-braska wheat wafers this fall when troops are on maneuvers in the jungle. Two Latin American countries have already pur-chased Nebraskits for food for underprivileged children. Uncle Sam has also bought Nebraskits for use as survival rations.

Village Suggested

The possible establishment of an Indian or pioneer village near the Interstate highway has been under discussion by the Nebraska Centennial Commission. Former Gov. Val Peterson is head of the commission, which is gathering ideas for possible attractions to be developed for the state's centennial in 1967. Peterson re-cently named a committee to ne-gotiate with various public re-lations firms and to retain one to help the commission in its plan-ning.

Flood Aid

The U. S. Government has no-tified the governor that Nebraska will receive \$260,000 in emer-gency funds for restoration of public facilities which were dam-aged by floods in six Nebraska counties earlier this year. The six counties which will receive aid are Dixon, Cedar, Knox, Keya Paha, Rock and Brown.

Bingo Controversy

An official of the State Depart-ment of Agriculture said informa-tion has been received of viola-tions of the bingo law in Knox county's G. B. Flagg, who is in charge of administering and en-forcing the bingo law. At Knox county authorities will be asked to file charges against the Bloom-field Lions club for alleged viola-tions. Flagg said the Bloomfield Lions club has received a license to operate a bingo stand at the county fair for several years. He said that Robert Ulrich, depart-ment inspector, said the stand was open and some games were played for money. Sunday, Aug. 26, Under Nebraska's bingo law, games on Sundays are not per-mitted.

Insecticides

William Rapp, State Health department entomologist, said recently a large percentage of the money spent by Nebraskans for insect control programs is wasted. According to Rapp, "un-scrupulous, glib-tongued insecti-cide salesmen have a field day in Nebraska."

Co. Agent's Column

Improvement Group Needed
Nebraska will become the twenty-first state to have a Beef Cattle Improvement association when organization of such a group is completed Monday at Hays.

Since the late 1940's, consider-able emphasis has been placed upon the use of performance re-cords in beef herd improvement programs, according to Leo Lucas, animal husbandry at the University of Nebraska. Pro-duction test in-g programs, which utilize records of performance on individual beef animals, have generally been conducted through state-wide beef improvement associa-tions.

In the North Central region which includes Nebraska, 1,208 beef cattle herds involving 62,327 cows have been enrolled in production testing, according to the latest figures. The Nebraska program began in 1955 with seven cooperators. The number now stands at about 200. Lucas stated, with over 8,000 calves expected to be weighed and graded this fall.

"Although there has been a definite increase in the programs in Nebraska since its conception, its scope should be enlarged, es-ppecially in relation to purebred producers, to be of maximum benefit to the state's cattle in-dustry," Lucas declared. It is felt by many producers familiar with production testing that a Nebraska association would help the present and future needs of the program, the University specialist added. The important cattle states of Colorado, South Dakota and Wyoming, which border on Nebraska, have al-ready organized Beef Cattle Improvement associations.

One of the major functions of an association might be that of a clearing house for the machine analysis of records. Al-though the home evaluation of records is important, it is difficult for extension agents or producers to spend the amount of time required to adjust re-cords, Lucas concluded.

All active producers of beef cattle residing in or maintain-ing their principal breeding herds in Nebraska are eligible for membership in the association and are urged to attend the or-ganizational meeting at the Ne-braska National Forest near Halsey Monday, Lucas concluded.

Timely Tips
Between now and freeze up is a good time to treat thistles with 2:4-D. These fall annuals are more susceptible at this time of year as the new plants emerge.

This is also a good time to fertilize lawns. Treatment for crab-grass control works well in the fall or it can be done in early spring. Several new products have shown good control when used properly.

Biggest power saver for for-age harvesters are sharp knives. When chopping forage it is pos-
