



In the North Central region which includes Nebraska, 1,208 beef cattle herds involving 62,327 cows have been enroiled in production testing, according to the latest figures. The Nebraska program began in 1955 with seven cooperators. The number now stands at about 200, Lucas stated, with over 8,000 calves expected to be weighed and graded this fall.



One of the major functions of an association might be that of a clearing house for the machine analysis of records. Although the home evalution of records is important, it is difficult for extension agents or producers to spend the amount of time required to adjust records, Lucas concluded.

All active producers of beef cattle residing in or maintaining their principal breeding herds in Nebraska are eligible for membership in the association and are urged to attend the organizational meeting at the Nebraska National Forest near Halsey Monday, Lucas concluded.
