Total Electric Living Opens New Ideas In Home Design

The architectural importance of the flameless, total electric home has, until the present, often been understated. Only recently have architects begun to realize that a new concept in today's living is also the first major change to affect the structural design of the home.

Total electric living, by lifting restrictions on space and easing installation requirements, opens up new avenues of design that portend a "new look" in our homes and buildings of the future.

What once was described as "custom" built was often merely a carefully constructed plan to hide the home's bulky heating system or perhaps create a new effect in lighting. Now heating, cooling, cleaning and cooking are matters of wiring, without the additional problems encountered with chimneys, flues, vents and pipes.

The design potential of the flameless electric concept is not new. Several years ago a well-known architect encountered its potential when he was asked to create a house for tract developments that would not make the development monotonous. After careful study it was found that only a structure with the total electric concept could achieve such versatility. With only electric service, rooms could be re-arranged at random, placed on different levels, new effects created and even rooms interchanged for variety. In addition to varying the appearance of the development's streets, hilly sites could be utilized to create even greater distinctions with land differential.

According to the Live Better Electrically Program of the Edison Electric Institute the most important development in new home starts in the coming years will be the architectural improvements achieved in homes that use electricity exclusively. Valuable floor space need no longer be designated for heating purposes but can be utilized for "offices-at-home,"

hobby workshops, family rooms, or special recreation centers.

New housing and pre-fab plans already point to the modern total electric concept as the house that can be sold in stages. Instead of turning in older homes basic design can be added to as desired. The total electric home is also the ideal vacation home since electricity does not have to be stored for heating purposes.

Because of its electric power, the total electric home, according to Live Better Electrically is designed to be the most important architectural influence in the 60's.

Care-Free Care With Hardboard

Cleaning and caring for the hardboard paneling in your new home make for easier living.

Walls and ceilings with factory applied finishes are resistant to scuffs and stains of virtually all kinds. Most smudges and dirt can be removed simply with a damp cloth or sponge.

For washing down the panels, if this should eventually become necessary, use any mild detergent and a damp cloth. It is not necessary to soak the panel.

Perfectly Safe
For removing household paints, inks, bluing, grease, hair oil, crayon marks and lipstick, it is perfectly safe to use naphtha, turpentine, lighter fluid, carbon tetrachloride or the like. Just apply with a dampened cloth and exercise normal caution if the liquids are flammable.

Stubborn smudges, such as grease or pencil marks which cannot be removed with solvents can still be removed without marring prefinished hardboard, by use of liquid waxes containing cleansing ingredients. Painted or enameled hardboard can be cleaned in the same way as any other wood product with the same applied finish.

When WPA offered \$500
When the county seat was moved to Wayne, the LaPorte courthouse was sold to W. P. Agler after he offered \$500 for the structure.

Good Fences Make Good Neighbors Add Beauty

With today's growing accent on outdoor living, fences have become an integral part of new home planning and designs for better living all over your property.

Then, too, adequate fencing can do much to alleviate the awkward

Painting the paneling is recommended; not only for the beauty it will give the fenced-in area, but because it will increase the longevity of the paneling.

Because hardboard will flex without cracking or splintering while preserving its tough surface and strength, fences of tempered hardboard can be woven readily into popular but out-of-the-ordinary basket-weave fencing. Either horizontal or vertical applications are practical and striking.

Any fence using large, solid panels — such as those used to separate a service yard from outdoor living areas — are economical in terms of labor and material, when made with hardboard.

One smart design, for example, alternates big squares of hardboard on either side of the post structure. Because the squares are placed in a diamond pattern, there are just enough open spaces to add interest without loss of privacy. And one very different fence uses perforated hardboard panels to create a hanging garden for potted plants.

Whatever the purpose of your fence, the wide range of choice in hardboard panel types, designs and textures will allow you to create a fence tailored to your particular new home needs.
