### 1963 Wool Incentive Price Set at 62 Cents

A shorn wool incentive price of 62 cents per pound was announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the period beginning April 1 and ending December 31, 1963.

The USDA also announced that the marketing year under the wool payment program is being changed from an April-March period to a calendar year basis in line with recommendations from producers. In making this transition, the 1963 marketing year will be a 9-month one from April 1 through December 31. After 1963, the marketing year will be on a 12-month calendar year basis.

The incentive price for shorn wool for the 1963 marketing year is the same as for the first eight years of the program running from 1955 through the 1962 marketing years.

Payments to producers for the 1963 marketing year will follow the current 1962 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

The National Wool Act requires that pulled wool be supported at such levels in relation to the support price for shorn wool as the Secretary determines will maintain normal marketing practices, i.e., primarily to avoid unusual shearing prior to marketing. Support for pulled wool is provided by means of payments on lambs that have never been shorn. Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis

comparable to the national average incentive payment per pound of shorn wool.

Payments for the 1963 marketing year will be made in the spring of 1964 on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the April 1, 1963-December 31, 1963 period. With the marketing year ending December 31.

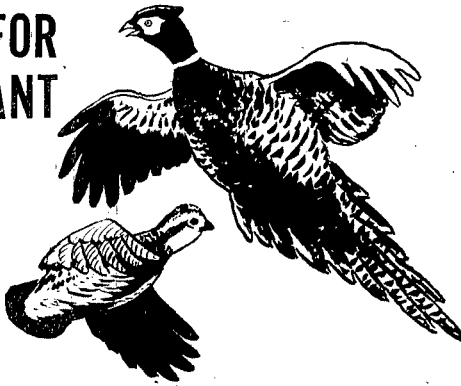
Seyler Motors, Inc. Ends Ford Dealership

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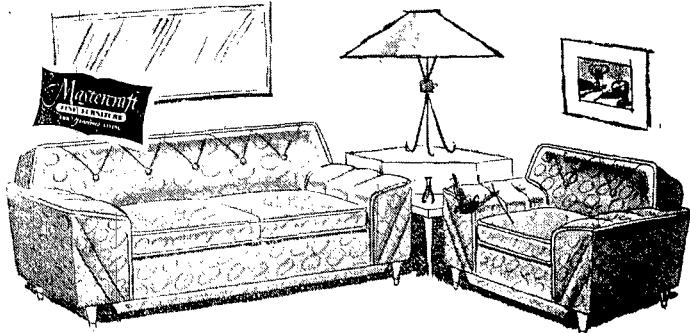

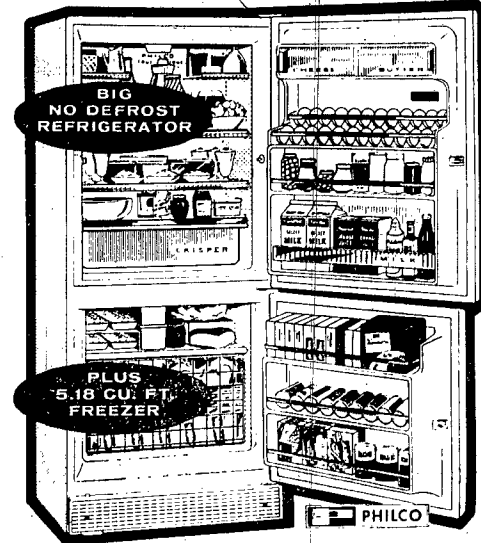
The first grade planted bean seeds and have fun watching each day, whose bean will be the tallest. Anemometers were made by the second grade to study the wind.
