The average yields of single cross hybrids in University of Nobraska outstate tests we're semewhat higher than those of standard double cross hybrids in the two years prior to 162. Growers reported very little difference in 1961.

The plant he e de'r for one company estimates that single cross es will outly ield double crosses five to eight percent under favorable prowing conditions.

The risk is greater because of the high degree of uniformity in plant development in single cross fields. Because of this uniformity adverse weather or other handleaps may affect a single cross field which is more variable in its development, says J. C. Swinhank, University extension agronomist.

In addition to their high degree for uniformity in repening, car height, ear appearance and plant height, single cross hybrids have a shorter, period of pollination than the double cross types. They have strong stalks and retain the ears well. How-
