The Wayne high vocal music department will also be represented by four choir members: Jean Eymon, Jack Schriber, John Barr and Jim Kern. The choir will total about 500 students.

Rehearsal of the groups will take place under the direction of nationally known directors Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The final concert featuring all three clinic groups will be given in the Norfolk city auditorium Saturday evening. Admission is 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

Student Teachers Start New Seven Week Practice

A major phase in the art of becoming a teacher began this week for 50 Wayne State seniors.

They went to 46 high schools in Nebraska and Iowa to spend seven weeks in directed teaching under the supervision of selected, skilled teachers.

The seven-week period is an innovation at Wayne this year. In the past, students preparing to be high school teachers spent only two weeks in the field during their directed teaching course. The rest of the time they performed at Hahn or Wayne High.

During their seven-week assignments, the students devote full time to teaching or observing, plus participation in all the extracurricular duties of a teacher. The students also arrange for their own housing and meals.

In short, the future teachers live the full life of a professional teacher—and perhaps decide, as a result, whether they do or don't want to make teaching their profession.

the college faculty visitors. In preparing for the directed teaching assignment, all the students spent the first half of the fall term in a concentrated block of three courses—psychology of learning, secondary schools, and major field materials.

Also in preparation, the supervising teachers and officials were briefed on what the college expects of its students and what the supervisors should require of them.

Schools cooperating with the college in this program will get several benefits. For each five student teachers that a school serves, Wayne State will award a \$400 scholarship to a graduating senior of the school. In addition, the supervising teachers may take any Wayne college course for credit without payment of tuition.

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National Science Grants To Two WSTC Professors

Two Wayne State professors have received National Science Foundation grants through the Nebraska Cooperative College Teachers Development Program.

Frank Prather, assistant professor of mathematics, has been awarded a grant equaling his salary, enabling him to do additional graduate work at the University of Nebraska.

He is the second Wayne faculty member to gain this prize. Irvin Brandt is pursuing doctoral studies this year at Nebraska.

Dr. W. G. Ingram has been awarded \$470 from the Teacher Development Program's small grant fund (the limit is \$500), to be used for purchase of science research equipment. Ingram intends to buy an interferometer, an instrument that measures and analyzes light.

The interferometer likely will be used by graduate students for specialized research.

Dr. Richard Stevens previously received a similar grant for equipment to study microclimatology.

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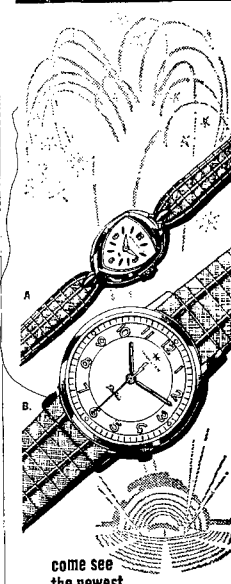

Postcard Check

The Nebraska and Kansas agricultural extension services have completed arrangements for a postcard survey involving three southwestern Nebraska counties.

The survey will involve approximately 30 percent of the rural and urban families in Dundy, Hitchcock and Red Willow counties. It will supplement data already collected in eight northwest Kansas counties. The cards will go into the mail Nov. 5.

Citizens in the three counties will be requested to identify the towns where they go for food, clothing, machinery, livestock, feed, fuel, school, medical attention and recreation.

The survey was initiated by Kansas State University as a part of its area development program. It was expanded to include the three Nebraska counties and three in eastern Colorado because citizens often cross state lines to make retail purchases.

Thinking OUT LOUD

Dr. O. B. Proett, pastor United Presbyterian Church Shall We Enact Blue Laws?

Now and then you run into a person who has some decided opinions about Sunday closing. He knew that once many cities had laws which obligated merchants to close one day in seven, but this was before the time of the forty-four week. He knew also that if he closed on Saturday or Sunday, the day depending upon a man's faith, he had some time for his family and for his church he does not now have.

There is now no law that we are aware of that requires a man to close his store whether he likes it or not. I am not sure any would be proposed or suggested. A man has a right to stay away from the church if he chooses, just as he may refuse to vote or read a newspaper, but we think he makes himself poorer for it.

On the other hand, if a man wants to go to church he ought to have that freedom. Everyone needs a day off now and then for rest and recreation. To keep one's feet on the grindstone seven days in the week gets sand into his eyes and puts his vision out of focus.

Let me cite a simple illustration: Here is a community of more than one grocery store. One owner decides to stay open thereby stealing a march on his competitors. He thinks he can pick up a few strays who usually go to another store. He figures he can take in more money in seven than in six days. He is deluded: the number of customers in a given com-

munity remains the same and the total dollars they spend is the same. Most of us spend all the money we have and cannot spend more if we like. Thus, a second grocer stays open, merely to protect his interests, and ere long the whole city is at work every day and for many hours. He runs his store by the David Harum Golden Rule—"Do unto others as he would do unto you, only do him first and do him fast."

But the sad part is what a storekeeper does to his family and those of his employees. He keeps them on the job and cannot permit them to enjoy themselves in church, even if they want to. Blue laws do not "drive people to church," but do permit those to go who would enjoy the pleasure and the opportunity afforded by a Sabbath closing to meet with God's people, in the Lord's house and on the Lord's day. Maybe we ought to have some.



This is being written on October twenty-third. Last night the President talked to us about the gravity of the Cuban situation. Not a one of us who listened can hope to go unscathed if this crisis cannot be resolved and this has to be resolved sooner or later—no time now to look back and say that this should have been done or that this should have been our policy.

This is the time for looking ahead, straight into the heart of the dilemma and to face up to whatever will come. That's the way America does things when the chips are down.

Maybe there were some of us, who did look back a bit while the President was talking—not too many of us though, for there just aren't too many of us who can look back to 1898 and remember with clarity the happenings of those days. The situation, in Cuba, had at that time become well nigh intolerable. The Cuban people were to all intents and purposes slaves of the Spanish Monarchy. Finally America, after a series of incidents, stepped in to lift this yoke of slavery from these oppressed people. We mustered our resources of men and material to go to their relief.

I can well remember seeing trainloads of recruits going through my home town on their way to the various camps and I also can remember that thousands of those fellows died in the hell holes of those camps, of malaria, dysentery, typhoid fever and what have you. More men were lost in the camps than in the battles that were fought.

Now let us remember this— not a one of these soldiers was drafted. They were all volunteers. Not only that, but probably not one in a thousand of these fellows had ever seen a Cuban, let alone knowing one.

Here though was a people oppressed, a people who needed help and we gave it to them. Not only gave them help, but gave them the previous boon of freedom and protected it for them during their formative years as a nation.

Yes, we went even further than that—we paid for their freedom. It didn't come just as the fruits of our victory in battle. We supplemented that with hard cash and now to what avail? Here's that same nation with a dagger pointed straight at our heart today. Must we fight today to protect that heart against its kindness of yesterday?

Farm Records Help You 3 Ways

Records can mean dollars for you—if you use them instead of just keeping them.

Records are the foundation of good farm management. Trying to farm profitably without keeping and using adequate records is like trying to navigate a ship without a compass.

A farm management expert says farm records have three main purposes:

- 1) They tell you whether you're making money or not.
2) They're necessary for filling out income tax and social security tax forms.
3) They are a "diagnostic" tool for locating the weak points in a farm business.

The last point, says this management specialist, is by far the most important. Records help you "feel the pulse" of your business, locate the strong and weak points. By analyzing your records, you can find out why your farm is a paying or losing business, and how you can make changes or improvements which will bring in more net dollars.

Here are some of the important things you can determine if you keep good records:

- Do you have an adequate volume of business? That is, are you productively employed 12 months of the year and are you handling sufficient volume to permit a satisfactory profit?
Do your crops fit your farm? Perhaps you're not growing the most profitable crops for your land.
Are you producing crops efficiently? How do your yields check out against similar farms in your area? Are you using adequate fertilizer?
Does your livestock add the business volume you need?
Are your livestock production levels in line with other farms in your area? How do your feed costs stack up? Are you producing high-quality products?
Are your machinery and equipment investments per acre too high? Perhaps you don't have enough to produce the volume you need for an adequate profit.
Are you making the best possible use of your buildings? Your records can reveal excessive use of manual labor around the farmstead.

Beware of Ammonium Nitrate and Sulfate Deicers. Certain chemicals are being sold for quick removal of snow and ice from concrete sidewalks, driveways, patios, pavements, etc. Some of these particular products contain ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate salts. They are extremely corrosive. They will severely attack any concrete as well as other materials. They should not be used as concrete de-icing agents under any circumstances.

To prevent damage to concrete pavements and other slabs on the ground:

- 1. Don't use any de-icer until you know its chemical composition.
2. Keep de-icers containing ammonium nitrate or ammon-

ium sulfate away from all concrete, regardless of the age or quality or the concrete.

Time Topics: It's wise to carry a fire extinguisher when picking corn. When corn is dry, fires can start on it especially in using a mounted picker.

They're still time to take soil samples before freeze up. Put no more than 1/2 acre into one sample and be sure that areas of different characteristics are sampled separately.

Extension Notes

Why Recipes Fail: Recipe failures may not be due to faulty recipes, but to faulty adaptation. Incomplete measurement of flour, using extra flour to roll out dough, overcooking and use of stale spices or seasonings are examples of where no labor can be made Oven temperature are another cause of failure if thermometers are incorrect. Quality of raw foods, proper equipment and the home-maker's standards are other factors affecting the outcome.

Tips on Handling Knits: 1. Knits are made both tubular and flat, and when tubular, cut to an economical advantage. It is necessary to either refold or cut the fabric on a lengthwise rib straighten the ends with a square and cut. Press out fold mark before placing pattern.

2. Many knits have a slight nap or texture and require all pattern pieces to be cut in one direction.

3. Use average length stitch, 12-15 per inch; as you stitch, stretch (stretch-seams slightly).

4. Stay-stitch all bias or curved, and also stay stitch cross-grain with pre-shrunk seam tape while seaming.

5. Soft knits should be lined with a soft fabric such as China silk or cheap lining.

6. Seams need little finishing; zigzag, pink or overcast.

Dark Cottons: Dark cottons, sometimes referred to as "winter" of the year as "winter" cottons, are now being featured in stores for the cool season ahead and for year-around wear. The effect of home laundering and commercial dry cleaning was tested at the New York State Experiment Station (Cornell).

Eight fabrics sold as winter cottons were purchased in a large New York city store. The fabrics varied in color, texture, weight and thread count, ranging from a fairly smooth striped twill to a rather rough red-brown check and a grey tweed with black flecks on the surface. Each was given 20 launderings or dry cleanings. Enough yardage was purchased so each could be tested by hand laundering, machine laundering and dry cleaning.

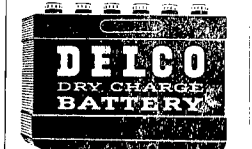

Medical Mirror

Diseased Tonsils
Q. I have trouble with my back but my doctor has never taken an x-ray. Could my diseased tonsils cause this trouble?
A. Your doctor apparently considers x-ray pictures unnecessary but if it will cause your mind to ask him about it. Yes, diseased tonsils can contribute to aching muscles and joints.

B.C.G. Vaccine
Q. What is your opinion of B.C.G. vaccine to prevent tuberculosis?
A. We submitted this question to one of our editors who has spent many years in foreign lands where B.C.G. vaccine has been extensively used. Here is his answer: "I have observed the use of B.C.G. vaccine in other countries during the last twenty years. It is of definite value. One group of investigators found that the vaccine gives better than 70 percent protection. However, we have been slow to adopt its use in the U.S.A."

Fried Foods
Q. I have a stomach (peptic) ulcer. My doctor advises that I avoid fried foods but he didn't explain why. Can you?
A. The heating of fats, as in frying, causes chemical changes in the fats that increase in degree the higher the temperature. Frying may raise the temperature to a point where the fat is "polymerized," with consequent loss of digestibility. Unsaturated fatty acids may also be destroyed and irritant substances formed. Hard-to-digest foods should, of course, be avoided by persons with stomach ulcers.

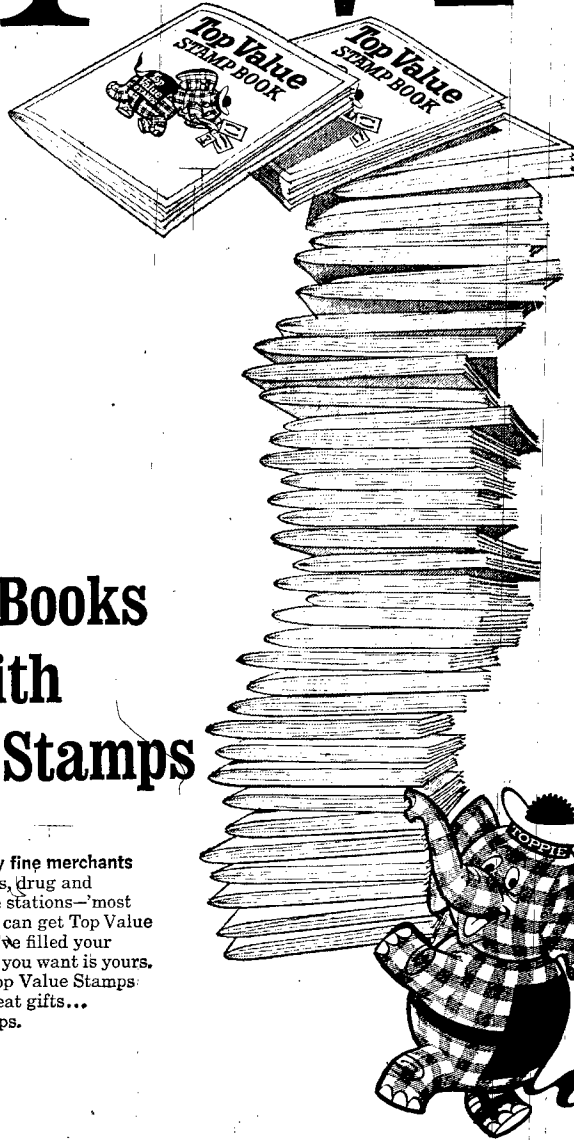
Wayne Boys' Choir Hosts Mexicans

Proposed Amendment No. 1 Constitutional amendment to permit the Legislature to authorize lottery or gift enterprises.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, for approval, the following amendment to Article III, section 24, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 24. The Legislature shall not authorize any game of chance, nor any lottery, or gift enterprise, where the consideration for a chance to participate involves the payment of money for the purchase of property, services, chance or admission ticket, or requires an expenditure of substantial effort or time; but nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the enactment of laws providing for the licensing and regulation of wagering on the results of horse races by the parimutuel or certificate method, when conducted by licensees within the race track enclosure at licensed horse race meetings, or to prohibit the enactment of laws providing for the licensing and regulation of bingo games conducted by nonprofit associations which have been in existence for a period of five years immediately preceding the application for such license. Provided, bingo games cannot be conducted by agents or lessees of such associations on a percentage basis."

Proposed Amendment No. 2

Constitutional amendment to provide that the State Railway Commission shall consist of not less than three nor more than seven members, as the Legislature shall prescribe, and that such members shall be elected from districts of substantially equal population as the Legislature shall provide.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article IV, section 20, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 20. There shall be a State Railway Commission, consisting of not less than three nor more than seven members, as the Legislature shall prescribe, whose term of office shall be six years, and whose compensation shall be fixed by the Legislature. Beginning with the general election in 1964, commissioners shall be elected by districts of substantially equal population as the Legislature shall provide, but this amendment shall not affect the term of any commissioner elected prior to its effective date. The powers and duties of such commission shall include the regulation of rates of service and general control of common carriers as the Legislature may provide by law. But, in the absence of specific legislation, the commission shall regulate rates and perform the duties enumerated in this provision."

Proposed Amendment No. 3

Constitutional amendment to permit the Lieutenant Governor to be a candidate for the office of Governor.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article IV, section 2, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have attained the age of thirty years, and who shall not have been for five years next preceding his election a resident and citizen of this state and a citizen of the United States. None of the officers mentioned in this article shall be eligible to any other state office during the period for which they have been elected or appointed, except that a Lieutenant Governor shall

be eligible to be a candidate for Governor.

Proposed Amendment No. 4

Constitutional amendment to increase the term of office of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor to four years.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article IV, section 1, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 1. The executive officers of the state shall be the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Attorney General, and the heads of such other executive departments as set forth herein or as may be established by law. The Legislature may provide for the placing of the above named officers as heads over such departments of government as it may by law establish. The Attorney General, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Treasurer shall be chosen at the general election held in November, 1958, and in each even-numbered year thereafter, and their term of office shall be two years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The Governor and Lieutenant Governor shall be chosen at the general election held in November, 1964, for a two year term and at the general election held in November, 1966, and in each alternate even-numbered year thereafter, for a term of four years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The records, books, and papers of all executive officers shall be kept at the seat of government, and such officers, excepting the Lieutenant Governor and members of boards and commissions when the board or commission is the head of an executive department, shall reside there during their respective terms of office. Officers in the executive department of the state shall perform such duties as may be provided by law. The heads of all executive departments established by law other than those to be elected as provided herein, shall be appointed by the Governor, with the consent of a majority of all members elected to the Legislature, but officers so appointed

may be removed by the Governor. Subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the heads of the various executive or civil departments shall have power to appoint and remove their respective employees in their respective departments."

Proposed Amendment No. 5

Constitutional amendment to provide a four year term of office for members of the Legislature, with one half being elected each two years, and to provide for the transition.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III, section 7, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 7. At the general election to be held in November, 1964, one half the members of the Legislature, or as nearly thereto as may be practicable, shall be elected for a term of four years, and the remainder for a term of two years, and thereafter all members shall be elected for a term of four years, with the manner of such election to be determined by the Legislature. Each member shall be nominated and elected in a nonpartisan manner and without any indication on the ballot that he is affiliated with or sponsored by any political party or organization. Each member of the Legislature shall receive a salary of not to exceed two hundred dollars per month during the term of his office, in addition to his salary, each member shall receive an amount equal to his actual expenses in traveling by the most usual route once to and returning from each session of the Legislature. Members of the Legislature shall receive no pay nor perquisites other than said salary and expenses, and employees of the Legislature shall receive no compensation other than their salary or per diem."

Proposed Amendment No. 6

Constitutional amendment to provide a merit plan for the selection and term of office of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, judges of the district courts and judges of other courts as the Legislature may prescribe.

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the amendments of the Constitution of Nebraska which are set forth in section 2 of this act and which are hereby proposed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The amendments proposed are as follows:

(1) To amend Article IV, section 11 to read as follows:

"Sec. 11. In the case of a vacancy during the recess of the Legislature, in any office which is not elective, except officers provided for in Article V of this Constitution, the Governor shall make a temporary appointment until the next meeting of the Legislature, when he shall nominate some person to fill such office; and any person so nominated, who is confirmed by the Legislature, a majority of all the legislators elected concurring by voting yeas and nays, shall hold his office during the recess of the Legislature, and until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person after being rejected by the Legislature shall be again nominated for the same office at the same session unless he is reappointed by the Legislature, or be appointed to the same office during the recess of the Legislature."

(2) To amend Article V, sections 4, 5, 7, 10, 15, 20 and 21 to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. The Chief Justice and the Judges of the Supreme Court shall be selected as provided in this Article. They shall reside at the place where the court is located, but Justice or Judge of the Supreme Court shall be deemed thereby to have lost his residence at the place from which he was selected.

"Sec. 5. The Legislature shall divide the state along county lines into six compact districts of approximately equal population, which shall be numbered from one to six, consecutive numbers to be given adjacent districts and shall be the Supreme Court judicial districts. Such districts shall not be changed except upon the concurrence of two-thirds of the members of the Legislature, nor shall any such change vacate the office of any judge."Sec. 7. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Judge of the Supreme Court unless he shall be at least thirty years of age, and a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State for at least three years next preceding his selection; nor, in the case of a Judge of the Supreme Court selected from a Si-

preme Court judicial district, unless he shall be a resident and elector of the district from which selected.

Sec. 10. The state shall be divided into district court judicial districts. Unless otherwise provided by law, the boundaries of the judicial districts and the number of judges of the district courts shall remain as now fixed. The judges of the district courts shall be selected from the respective districts as provided in this Article V.

Sec. 15. In the year 1964 and every four years thereafter, there shall be selected, in such manner as the Legislature shall provide, in and for each county, one or more judges as the Legislature may provide, who shall be Judge of the county court of such county whose term of office shall be four years and whose salary shall be fixed by the Legislature; Provided, that two or more counties may form a county court judicial district when approved by a majority of the electors of each county in the district; and provided further, when two or more counties form a county court judicial district, one county judge shall be selected for a term of four years from the district at the same time other county judges are selected, whose salary shall be fixed by the Legislature.

Sec. 20. All officers provided for in this Article shall hold their offices until their successors shall be qualified and they shall respectively reside in the district, county or precinct, from which they shall be selected. All officers, when not otherwise provided for in this Article, shall perform such duties and receive such compensation as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 21 (1) In the case of any vacancy in the Supreme Court or in any district court or in such other court or courts made subject to this provision by law, such vacancy shall be filled by the Governor from a list of at least two nominees presented to him by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. If the Governor shall fail to make an appointment from the list within sixty days from the date it is presented to him, the appointment shall be made by the Chief Justice or the acting Chief Justice of the Supreme Court from the same list.

(2) In all other cases, any vacancy shall be filled as provided by law.

(3) At the next general election following the expiration of three years from the date of appointment of any judge, commission of any such commission cannot include a member of such commission or any

every six years thereafter as long as such judge retains office, each Justice or Judge of the Supreme Court or district court or such other court or courts as the Legislature shall provide shall have the right to remain in office subject to approval or rejection by the electorate in such manner as the Legislature shall provide; Provided, that every judge, holding or elected, in an office described in subsection (1) of this section on the effective date of this amendment whether by election or appointment, upon qualification shall be deemed to have been selected and to have once received the approval of the electorate as herein provided, and shall be required to submit his resignation to continue in office to the approval or rejection of the electorate at the general election next preceding the expiration of the term of office for which such judge was elected or appointed, and every six years thereafter in the case of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the elector of the entire state shall be the question of approval or rejection. In the case of any Judge of the Supreme Court, other than the Chief Justice, and any Justice of the Supreme Court or any other court made subject to subsection (1) of this section, the electorate of the district from which such judge was selected shall vote on the question of such approval or rejection.

(4) There shall be a judicial nominating commission for the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court and one for each judicial district of the Supreme Court and of the district court and of each such area or district served by any other court made subject to subsection (1) of this section by law. Each judicial nominating commission shall consist of seven members, one of whom shall be a Judge of the Supreme Court who shall be designated by the Governor and shall act as chairman of the commission. The members of the bar of the state residing in the area from which the nominees are to be selected shall designate three of their number to serve as members of said commission, and the Governor shall appoint three citizens not admitted to practice law before the courts of the state, from among the residents of the geographical area to be served by the said commission. The terms of office for members of each judicial nominating commission shall be staggered and shall be fixed by the Legislature. The nominees of any such commission cannot include a member of such commission or any

person who has served as a member of such commission within a period of two years immediately preceding his nomination or for such additional period as the Legislature shall provide."

Proposed Amendment No. 7

Constitutional amendment to provide that in redistricting of the state for legislative purposes established lines other than county lines may be followed and primary emphasis shall be given to population with great weight being given to area.

For Against

TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. That at the general election in November, 1962, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska for approval the following amendment to Article III, section 5, of the Constitution of Nebraska, which is hereby proposed by the Legislature:

"Sec. 5. At the regular session of the Legislature held in the year nineteen hundred and thirty-five the Legislature shall by law determine the number of members to be elected and the number of legislative districts. In the creation of such districts, any county that contains population sufficient to entitle it to two or more members of the Legislature shall be divided into separate and distinct legislative districts, as nearly equal in population as may be and composed of contiguous and compact territory. After the creation of such districts, beginning in nineteen hundred and thirty-six and every two years thereafter, one member of the Legislature shall be elected from each such district. The basis of apportionment shall be the population excluding aliens, as shown by next preceding federal census. The Legislature may redistrict the state from time to time, not more often than once in ten years. In any such redistricting, county lines shall be followed whenever practicable, but other established lines may be followed at the discretion of the Legislature. In such redistricting, primary emphasis shall be placed on population and not less than twenty per cent more than thirty per cent weight shall be given to area."
