But State Banking Director Ralph Misko says there are 24 of Nebraska's state-charterd banks which are not members of the Federal Deposit Insur-lance Corporation. Under the FDIC program, each depositor has his losses insured up to 510,000.

The looped construction of the knił goods allows for con-aiderable give or motion of yerns. As a result the fabric will change its shape. This make, a garment comfortable to wear but also pośce a prob-lem of shrinkage.

Knit shrinkage is aggravated by tumble dryers. Avoid over drying and prolonged tumbling. Study labels on garments or bolt and follow the manufacturers instructions for cleaning or laun
