## Chamber of Commerce Members to Receive Special Invitations To Visit the School

Something new in the way of acquainting the members of the Wayne Chamber of Commerce with the teachers and the school is being inaugurated at the Wayne City Schools this year.

Stanley Westergard, superintendent of the Wayne City Schools, said that because Nov. 12-16 is National Education Week, each of the 39 teachers, who make up the faculty at the Wayne Public Schools, will invite four members of the Chamber of Commerce in Wayne to visit the classroom for about an hour. The visitors will also be invited by the respective faculty members to be their luncheon guests at the cafeteria during the noon hour.

There are 161 business establishments in the city of Wayne that are members of the Chamber of Commerce. There are nearly 200 individual memberships each teacher will contact four businesses to invite one of their personnel to the school. Mr. Westergard feels that we will have a successful project if we can get one representative from each business to visit us.

When a teacher calls a chamber member, the two will arrange the day and the hour of the visitation. The chamber member need not visit the classroom of the teacher who calls. If his children are in a different room or if he is more interested in another department, he should feel free to inform the teacher of this and the teacher will make these arrangements for him.

"Many of the chamber members have not been in the high school since they were graduated," Mr. Westergard explained. "We have set up this Chamber of Commerce visitation to re-introduce these men to their school and acquaint them with the teachers they do not know."

"It is hoped that this visitation may be kept for the years to come, and new ideas developed each year it is applied."

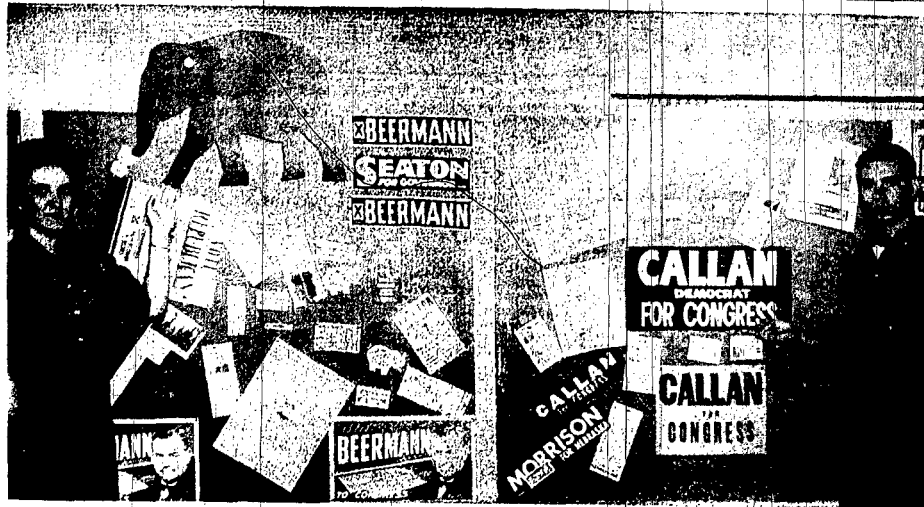
Our rating last year was excellent. Mr. Schumacher said, "Competition is very keen—we have to put on a good exhibition to get a good rating."

# Extension Notes

**Knit Fabric Tips**  
Knitwear is again the favorite for the fall and winter costume. Knit goods are featured both in ready-mades and yard goods. To get satisfaction both in appearance and wear, one needs to look for good quality.

The looped construction of the knit goods allows for considerable give or motion of yarns. As a result the fabric will change its shape. This makes a garment comfortable to wear but also poses a problem of shrinkage.

One can expect about one-half inch shrinkage in one yard length, experts tell us, but most knit goods are restored to shape when the garment is worn.

When buying knit goods, look for knitted stitches that are circular in shape. If stitches are elongated it means the fabric might be stretched and a high percentage of shrinkage could occur.

Knit shrinkage is aggravated by tumble dryers. Avoid over drying and prolonged tumbling. Study labels on garments or bolt and follow the manufacturer's instructions for cleaning or laundering.

**Count Your Amps and Watts**  
In 1939, the average home had 19 appliances. Today, it has over 60. When we start using too many of these appliances, at one time, trouble begins. Most homes haven't kept pace. As a result, four out of five homes are said to be underwired.

## Frost Nip — Frostbite

**FROST NIP**  
O. Members of our club hike in the mountains during winter months. Can you give us some advice about frostbite?

A. Let's first talk about "frost nip" — the mild form of frostbite. Frost nip is usually a result of the effects of extreme cold on the nose, cheeks, chin, ears, fingers or toes. High wind alone can cause it or can increase the danger. It's hard to believe, but the chilling effect of a temperature of +20° F. combined with a 45-mile wind is identical to that of a -40° F. temperature accompanied by a 2-mile breeze! Watch for sudden blanching of the skin. Should this occur, warm the area by using steady pressure (no rubbing) of the hand until normal color is restored. Warm frost-nipped fingers by holding them motionless in the armpit. One fairly reliable sign of approaching frost nip is sudden numbness in the affected part, often followed by a feeling of warmth. If this danger sign is instantly heeded, frost nip will never progress to the much more serious frostbite. Next week — Frostbite.
