

Trinity Lutheran School Dedicated in Hoskins Sunday

Hoskins Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church Sunday observed a special dedication of the new addition to its school building. The history of a Christmas Day School in the Hoskins congregation goes back to the time of its founding some 75 years ago. Shortly after the first church was built a small school house was erected which served the congregation until 1924. At that time the old building was sold and a new school was built. In the fall of 1956 a basement addition was added. In the fall of 1959 a second teacher was called to the faculty. In August of this year a 20 x 30 superstructure was begun. Since all of the work was done by the members, the cost of the addition was held below \$5,000. New school desks were purchased for the entire school. The present teachers are Marvin Meilback and Mrs. Oscar Zander. Both teachers hold lifetime Nebraska Teaching certificates. The enrollment this year has reached 45 pupils from kindergarten through the eighth grade. A no-host dinner was served by the ladies of the congregation.

Former Communist Official To Lecture Here Wednesday

A former official of the Communist Party, USA, will give a guest lecture Wednesday on Communist infiltration into education at the Wayne city auditorium. Starting at 8 p.m., Dr. Bella Dodd, former party organizer for the Communists, will give her views and past experiences with Communism and education. Dr. Dodd, now a practicing New York attorney, taught political science at Hunter College from 1925 to 1938, serving a legislative representative for the American Federation of Teachers and New York State Federation of Teachers. She joined the Communist party in 1932 and was an active member until 1948. She served as legislative representative for the Communist party of New York from 1944 to 1948. Following her break with the party, she testified before the Senate Internal Security Committee of the House Un-American Activities Committee State Rules Committee-Department of Justice. She returned to her church in 1952 and is the author of School of Darkness. She then taught at St. John's Law School from 1955 to 1961, re-

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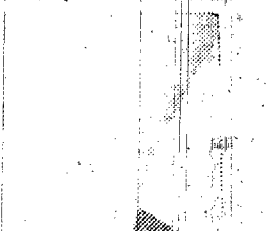
