

State Agencies to Request **Budget Increases in 1963-65**

LINCOLN—All of the state a-gencies have submitted their bud-get requests for the 1963-65 bien-nium—and if all of them were ap-proved, it would take an increase of some \$42 million over 1961-63 appropriations.

appropriations.

The various departments have asked for nearly \$373 million from all funds for the next two-year period. Of this total some-\$103 million would come from the

\$103 million would come from the state's general fund, which receives much of its support from the property lax.

The askings from the general fund are up about \$22.5 million from the amount appropriated from that source for the 1961-53 period.

period.

Late this year, the agencies will review their requests with the governor to help him make recommendations to the Legislature. Each agency also must appear before the Unicameral's budget committee, which in turn makes its own recommendations on how much each should receive

Ceive.

The largest single request came

Control Department of from the State Department of Roads, which asked for \$149.465, 531—more than half of which would come from federal match-ing money.

ing money.

No general fund money is appropriated for road building.

The largest request for general fund dollars came from the University of Nebraska which is seeking \$36.9 million, up nearly 32 per cent from the appropriation for this biennium.

West's opening spade lead was taken in South. Had declarer been able to reach dummy he would have had no problem on the hand. Faced with the probable loss of three club tricks should East hold the club ace, declarer sought a safer way to make the bid. In an attempt to place the lead with East, the acc of diamonds was led at trick number two. When West did not follow to the trump lead, East, unaware of South's difficulty, played the four spot. The king of diamonds was led next; then the ace and king of hearts. The seven of diamonds was now played, as East was forced to win with the ten. East was helpless to do anything about defeating the contract.

A spade return would give declarer all the remaining tricks, allowing him to score an over trick on the bid. A heart return would let South discard three of his clubs on dummy's hearts. The return of a club, other than the ace, would also result in the loss of all remaining tricks. East reluctantly played the club ace, after which he conceded the remainder of tricks to declarer. South, by throwing East in with a trump lead, cannot be defeated. Had a low club been led by declarer, the defense would take three club tricks to defeat the contract.

It is noted that West's preemtive spade bid almost certainly places the club ace in East's hand, It is unlikely that West would open with a bid of three spades if he holds seven spades headed by the king and queen, plus the ace of clubs. Declarer took advantage of the implications of West's opening bid to find a logical solution to his problem.

Redistricting Opinion

State Sen. Fern Hubbard Orme of Lincoln will ask the attorney general for an opinion on whether Douglas and Lancaster county senators could run at large with-out a change in the state con-

out a change in the state constitution.

Mrs. Orme is in favor of countywide election of legislators in the state's two most populous counties. There are some, however, who believe such a procedure would require a constitutional amendment.

There are others who believe the constitution might not prohibit senators from being nominated by district at a primary election but elected at large in a general election.

Mrs. Orme said she is not sure

Mrs. Orme said she is not sure she favors this procedure. But she said this is one of the legal questions on which guidance is needed before the Legislature

needed before the Legislature convenes.

The Lincoln lawmaker, the only female in the Unicameral, also said she is not certain she would favor a plan whereby the membership of the Legislature would be increased from 43 to 50 with 40 members representing population and 10 representing area.

There is every indication that the redistricting issue will provoke some of the most heated debate in the next session.

New Appointments

The State Labor Department has announced five appointments to the Nebraska Advisory Committee on Manpower Development and Training.

The five include representatives of labor, management, education, agriculture and government.

The appointees are: Fred Gordon, Omaha, labor; Van Dunham, Omaha, management; Dr. Glen Lundstrom, Grand Island, superintendent of schools, education: Rob Rauen, Minden farmer, agriculture; and Sen. Fern Orme, Lincoln, government.

This special committee was set up to assist the Department of Labor and the Department of Education in carrying out their contracted responsibilities with the federal government in connection with the Manpower Development and Training. Act recently adopted by Nebraska.

The act provides for the training of workers who have been thrown out of work by automation.

State Aid to Education

Fleven Nebraska education groups met in Lincoln recently and concluded that state aid to schools should be adopted. Hamilton Mitten of Fremont, chairman of the State Board of Education, said the groups agreed state aid must be given, "whether it comes from a broadened tax base or other revenue sources, if quality education is to continue in Nebraska."

Another conclusion was that state aid must be made available to junior colleges if they are to continue operating.

The groups also agreed school district reorganization should have a more comprehensive study; a statewide educational television network should be established; and there should be a compulsory audit for all school districts.

Thawing Turkey

Thawing Turkey

For many Americans Thanksgiving without turkey is like
bread without butter. Turkey is
much more readily available
today and preparation time for
the homemaker is cut considerably with the modern marketing processes.

Frozen turkey is available in
considerable quantities and in
different weights suitable to the
in di vidual homemaker's demands. For those planning to
use frozen turkey a word of
caution is needed for proper
thawing to preserve the temperature and taste of the bird.

—Do not thaw a turkey at
room temperature or in warm
water. Allow the bird to thaw in
its original wrapper in the refrigerator. And keep in mind
that it takes an 18,27 pound turkey two to three days to, thaw
in the refrigerator.

—If you must thaw the bird
in a hurry, place it, in its original wrapper, under cold running water.

—Don't run water over an

—Don't run water over an unwrapped bird to thaw,
—Once thawed, uncooked turkey meat should not be refrozen.
—If the packer has furnished directions on the package be

sure to follow them.

—If a commercial preparation
was used to stuff your bird,
make sure the stuffing is completely cooked before it is
served.

Lefy Vegetables on the Menu
All leafy vegetables can be held under moist conditions at or near 32 degrees F. This is a good safeguard against loss of nutrients. Keeping them in covered containers or film bags helps to prevent evaporation and withering.

Trimming lettuce or cabbage heads is necessary to remove damaged leaves and spoiled parts but all trimming should be conservative. The outer leaves, if good, should be used be ca u se they generally are darker green and contain more nutrients than inner leaves. Stems and ribs in the leaves are less palatable and have fewer nutrients than the leaf blade so can be discarded if desired. The leafy part of collard greens, for instance, has 30 times as much vitamin A as the midrib, In cooking vegetables to prevent the loss of important vitamins and minerals follow the three R's:

1. Reduce the length of cook-

ed. Reduce the length of cook-

Reduce the amount of sur-area exposed.

3. Reduce the amount of surface area exposed.

The more're-heating of leftovers, the greater the loss of food value.

How Can You Reduce Food Costs Without Lowering Nutritional Value?

Simply revise the ingredients. Begin by comparing the costs of single servings of various dishes. Students in food buying classes at the University of Nebraska have determined that as much as \$.06 may be saved on each serving of certain dishes. In one instance they substituted dry milk solids and oleomargarine for whole milk and butter in a creamed pea recipe.

According to Ruth Ganshorn, University of Nebraska foods and nutrition division, the less expensive dish was considered to be as acceptable as the more expensive one.

DEAR MISTER EDITOR:

I see by the papers where the Defense Department has final give out some figgers, on them Chinese feathers we been stockpiling. 
