The trend in recent sessions has been to put considerable weight on the proposals stemning from committee work and many laws now on the books were based on conclusions reached by senators during interim studies.

ing interim studies.

During the recent meeting of the Legislative Council, perhaps the most talked about report was the one from the committee on tax problems. Dr. Harold McClelland of Claremont College of the committee on tax problems are considered to the committee on tax problems.

McClelland of Chremont College in California typed the law-makers to adopt a low, flat rate state income tax. The committee, peaded by Sea, Kenneth L. Bowen of Red Cloud, still has to report the recommendations.

Bowen said because of the mass of information compiled by McClelland, members of the committee were unable to come to any conclusions immediately. But the Red Cloud senator said he will work for adoption of the income tax concept.

It is known, however, that not all the members of the tax committee will go along with McClelland's ideas:

Later a few drops of vinegar or oxalic acid are applied and allowed to remain for a few minutes water is followed by a thorough water ringe.

Most fruit stains with the resoftened with glycerine or vase-line, then washed in warm, soapy water. If the fabric is non-washable, soften stain with lard or vaseline, and then sponge spot with carbon tetrachloride. rinse.

Most fruit stains, with the exception of peach, pear, plum, and cherry, may be removed when boiling water is poured through the stain from a height of three or four feet. To make the removal easier, the stained part of the fabric is stretched over the top of a bowl. This method is not used on silk or wool fabrics. Stubborn fruit stains and those which appear on silk or wool fabrics are bleached with hydrogen peroxide. spot with carbon tetrachloride.
