## WSTC Students Prepare "Blithe Spirit" Play

Violinist Benjamin Bernstein and Pianist James Day will present their annual recital next Thursday, Dec. 6, in the Birch Room of Wayne State's Student Center.

To devotees of chamber music, the program will offer three sonatas that rank among the finest by three masters: Brahms's Sonata in A major, Beethoven's Spring Sonata, and Grieg's Sonata in F major.

The Beethoven work is one of ten that the composer wrote for violin and piano. The Grieg sonata one of three for these instruments and the most tuneful of the series.

Both the recitalists have studied under teachers of renown. Dr. Bernstein's principal teacher was Michael Press, a White Russian who taught at the Imperial Conservatory of Moscow before World War I. A colorful figure and strong anti-Bolshevik, he twice escaped Communist firing squads and fled the country.

Day has studied with several eminent teachers, the most notable being Ros-sinne Lhevinne, who also taught Van Cliburn and is considered the foremost piano teacher in America.

The public is invited to attend both the recital and reception afterwards.

### Wheat Program Signup Deadline Set Dec. 14

December 14 is the last day for signing up under the 1963 wheat stabilization program for farms in the winter wheat area, John H. Mohr, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, announced.

"Farmers who participate in the 1963 program will be eligible for voluntarily diverting a part of their allotment or base acreage from the production of wheat and devoting that acreage to a conservation use, and they will also qualify for extra price-support payments and for the regular price-support loan or purchase agreements," Mohr stated.

Growers are cautioned to sign up for only the amount of acreage they intend to divert from 1963 production. Failure to divert the full amount of acreage signed up would result in loss of diversion and price support payments, as well as loss of eligibility for the regular wheat price-support loan or purchase agreement.

1 can (1 lb. 12 oz.) tomatoes  
1 cup soft bread crumbs  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 tsp. pepper, 1/2 cup flour  
3 tbsps. lard or drippings  
1/2 tsp. sugar  
1/2 tsp. curry powder
