This, he said, is proving a heavy burden and has resulted in insufficient attention being paid to other city streets and roads. Ress said the 24 cities are paying for 137 miles of the "most heavily" traveled state owned roads, which happen to be inside city limits.

The commission was itold that that all Nebraskans share the use of the state road system and should share in its financial support equally.

These 24 cities contribute 35.5 percent of motor vehicle registration fees and only 24 per cent of this moneylis returned to them.

These cities get no gas tax allocation from unincorporated rural areas and receive less than 17 per cent of the gas tax their residents pay in their incorporated areas.

These cities receive none of the one-cent Schrooder mail route gas tax allocation even though rural mail routes pass through cities as well as rural areas.

Add Christmas Cheer
Smoke curling from the family

in many colors, adding to the
festive spirit of the holiday season. But certain precautions
should be taken in handling the
color-producing chemicals for
safety's sake.

The following chemicals will produce the colors indicated: Copper sulphate, green: Calcium chloride, orange; Copper chloride, blue; Lithium chloride, carmine; Polassium chloride, purple.

"Rubber gloves should be worn when mixing the chemical solutions, taking care not to spill the materials Chemicals should be dissolved in a wooden pail or earthen crock, as the chemicals will ultimately destroy metal containers," Loerch warned.

A discarded five-gallon paint

arned. A discarded five-gallon paint

troy metal containers," Loerch warned.

A discarded five gallon paint bucket will serve the purpose, as a treating vat. However, no more than two gallons of solution should be mixed in it at a time, the University specialist stressed. A ratio of one pound of chemical to one gallon of water is recommended, using one chemical per batch, it is not pecessary to cleanse the container thoroughly after a change of chemicals, Loerch stated.

"The materials to be treated may be placed in a mesh or porous bag, and submerged in the solution. After a day or two of soaking, lift out the material to dry."

If the materials adown in the solution. After a day or two of soaking, lift out the material, drain over the container and spread the treated materials out, to dry."

If the materials are allowed to dry in newspapers, the newspapers themselves, when dry, may be rolled and wrapped tightly to burn in the fireplace. Loerch pointed out.

"Do not use chlorates or nitrates, or potassium permanganate," Loerch emphasized. "Chemicals should be kept away from children and pets, To avoid storage, obtain only sufficient amounts for treatment. And, do the job out-of-doors." Correctly-treated cones and wooden blocks make good novel-ty Christmas gifts, and bags to contain them can be made out of dyed mosquito netting, Loerch concluded.

Dr Peter Peffer, supt. of the Glemwond's and Woodland State Schools in lowa, believes all employes of institutions for the mentally retarded are potential therapists. "and that includes custodians as well as the professional staff." Dr. Peffer, a psychatrist, made the observation while addressing the informational conference on dynamic health recently at the University of Nohraska. This help is available without charge and is the only source of help available in Nebraska to make certain farmers are getting all the turber is worth.

Apples for Everybody
This year apples are so plentiful they should not be limited just for the teacher or the lunch box.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture now says this year's commercial apple crop will be around 121 million bushels, about 10 percent above average. That means it's only a short walk to the nearest grocery for the makings of these delicious apple recipes:

Apple Selad Dressing: Fold 1 cup grated apples and ½ cup finely chopped walnuts into ½ cup mayonnaise. Combine with shredded lettuce, or serve as the topping for fruit salads.

Apple Sherbet: A light dessert to top off heavy dinners, Chill 2 cups applesauce, sweetened to taste. Add 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Whip 3/4 cup heavy cream. Gradually add apple sauce. Continue beating this stiff, Pour into refrigerator trays and chill until firm, but not hard. Fluff-up with fork, Serve in sherbet glasses with a bright red cherry perched on top.

Furniture Beauty Treatment

Now that your furnace is on, your wood furniture may need beauty treatments to withstand the dry atmosphere of heated rooms during late fall and winter.

rooms during late fall and winter.

Gena Thames, Rutger extension home furnishing specialist, recommends a simple treatment for furniture to slow checking of the finish and restore the beauty of the wood. It disquises scratches, too.

Use a mixture of one-fourth gum turpentine and three-fourths boiled linseed oil. Be sure to use gum turpentine, not distilled, and buy only linseed oil labeled "boiled."

Next, pour some hot water into a cup or small can and set it on a saucer Shake oil-turpentine mixture and pour enough into cup to cover surface of the hot water. Do not stir.

Dip a soft cloth into the oily layer of liquid and rub onto furniture, a small section at a time. For shellac finishes, wring cloth, very dry.

time. For shellac timishes, wring cloth, very dry.

If wood is grimy, dip 3/0 steel wool in mixture and rub surface gently, following the grain of the wood.

Then wipe wood with another cloth rung from hot water. Finally, wipe wood with a dry cloth.

ally, wipe wood with a dry loth. When mixture cools, discard it. Do not try to reheat, because it is flammable. Unused mixture may be stored indefinitely in a capped bottle. You may use this treatment on varnish, lacquer, oil and shellac finishes. Use this solution sparingly on shellac, however, because it is damaged easily by water.

because it is damaged easily by water.

If you think a finish might be shellac, you can tell by sponging a spot on underside of piece with denatured alcohol solvent or rubbing alcohol. A shellac finish will soften and gummy.

Some of us students may take the clean floors and blackboards for granted. These matters just don't happen because we are all so clean and neat that no one ever has to clean up after us. Come around school some night about 3:30 or so and be on your guard so you won't be sideswiped by a broom pusher.

There are three high school boys who help the head custodian with his cleaning chores. They are Garlin Carmichael, Ronnie Hochstein and Vernan Osweld.

The boys work from 3:10 to about 345 every night after school. Saturday they take the time to come ack to school from 8:00 to 10:30. They start with four rooms on the main floor and work up to the top floor. They sweep all the rooms, the halls, and the stairs. Lighted by the cool, shadowless light from a bank of north windows, the business department of Wayne High School resembles the working offices of a large, very important business.

The shorthand bookkeeping room has tables arranged in a shape for conferences. Student conferences to untangle knotty bookkeeping problems could very well be the forerunners of conferences to untangle important business: problems in the future.

The typing and office practice, Toom is filled with rows of typing to the girls who are concentrating on getting those shorthand symbols into their notebooks. At the same time, you can't miss the chatter next door that sounds like a nest of machine guns as 30 typing students start all at once on a timed test and race away until the timing bell rings.

In charge of the business department at Wayne High are Richard Pound and John Monson. Mr. Pound, a graduate of Wayne State Teachers College, is teaching his second year here.

Mr. Monson, also a graduate of Wayne State, is teaching his first year at Wayne High. However he was an instructor of military subjects in the Marine Corps between his graduation from college and his return there to earh his master's degree. Both men are members of Pi Omega Pi, the honorary business fraternity. Mr. Monson belongs to Pi Gamma Mu, too, the honorary social science fraternity.

Mr. Pound, who teaches typing and office practice, says the best part about teaching is seeing the pupils make progress. Perhaps the worst part is the mountain of paper work each day. He says the biggest problem in learning to type is to keep the eyes on the copy and off the typewriter keys. Somedimes he employs the blindfold test. The students, blindfolded, type the words he dictates.

Mr. Monson, who teaches shorthand and bookkeeping, says that even the most modern machine cannot completely replace a trained secretary. You don't carry machines to meetings. Neither can you take them to a cornerstone laying without a hundred feet of wire. He explained.

Mr. Monson says the biggest problem in learning shorthand isto learn to associate the phonetic sound with the shorthand symbol. After that is mastered, speed chimes with practice.

Students who plan to work in the business field are expected to learn'st least three business skills. Vocational opportunities in business are wide open to students who are well trained and responsible. There is always a local demand for office help. Many of the larger businesses provide on-the-job training in their own specialties if the employee has the basic skills.

Both instructors emphasized the value of business education to all students, even if they don't plan business careers. College students copen and sepenit from taking class notes in shorthand. Many careers demand typing skill. Any, one who writes even a letter can do it better on a typewriter. Book keeping can save many a future budget from chaos.

As busy as the department is, it may get even busiers. Mr. Pound is adding a business law course to his second semester session of office practices. Other courses which would help to round out the department would be business English, economics and seneral business.
