

Students, Faculty Skip Classes! For a Reason

Usually there's something wrong when all the students and faculty of a college skip classes. But nothing was wrong at WSTC when this happened Nov. 28.

On the administration's suggestion, the faculty made a mass exodus to visit senior students who are doing their directed teaching in Nebraska and Iowa high schools.

It was the first time that all the professors had been freed from classes for such a mission. In the past members of the education faculty had done most of the observation of student teachers.

President W. A. Brandenburg, pleased with the results, had this to say: "We plan to do this periodically, if not annually. It is of vital importance for college faculty members who are preparing teachers to acquaint themselves with current conditions in the public schools and to observe the performance of those they have prepared to enter the profession."

"Too often, faculty members in the academic disciplines disclaim all responsibility in this regard, but in my opinion it is a responsibility which should be shared with those engaged in professional education."

While the faculty went visiting, the students took on campus did not let the day pass in carefree abandon. They responded to the Student Council's Fund for Fund Day, designed to raise money for the Wayne State Foundation.

Actually, the students were helping themselves, for the Foundation turns over most of its income to the college's student defense loan fund, which aids needy students.

At day's end, Student Council members bubbled with joy when all the dimes and quarters—paid for the privilege of watching or playing a variety of activities—added up to \$155.40. When matched by federal grants, this sum will make the loan fund nearly \$1,400 richer.

The professors, singly or in groups, visited schools in 18 towns; 21 went to Omaha and Council Bluffs.

They watched the student teachers in action and chatted with them in their brief moments between classes. Most of the neophyte teachers have at least four classes in several subjects, besides doing all the extracurricular duties that fall to teachers.

The visiting professors found agreement among school officials, supervisors and student teachers that Wayne's new seven-week directed teaching period is good. In the past, the students in secondary education have spent only two weeks in field teaching, the rest of the practice teaching in Wayne's laboratory school.

The longer period gives the students fuller opportunity to experience all that goes into teaching, both in class and out, says Dr. B. E. Ross, chairman of Wayne's Division of Education.

Postmaster Don Wightman again urges you to plan to mail early and often. Bring your Christmas card and gift lists up to date. Be sure you have complete address, street and number, city and state. Check your address before you drop them in the Post Office.

Your return address and a four cent postage stamp will help insure forwarding delivery or return to you.

Separate your mail into "Local" and "Out of Town" bundles, using the labels which can be had at the window. This method speeds your mail.

Pack your parcels in strong cartons. Address with wax crayon directly on the wrapper, if possible. A label sticker can come off.

Remember that the weekend of December 22-23-24 can cause a tightening situation for mail deliveries. Early mailing will help ease the strain at this late period.

All Wayne customers will receive new telephone numbers effective with the changeover. The new numbers, referred to as ANC (all number calling), will be the seven numeral type. Every number will have the same first three digits, 375, which is a special code for the Wayne telephone exchange and is unique in this dialing area. An example of the new ANC number is 375-3028.

An interesting "How-to-Dial" Lecture/Demonstration is being offered by the phone company to service clubs, schools and civic organizations during the coming months.

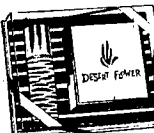

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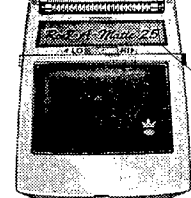

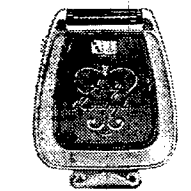

"We learned something." Such was Coach Al Svenningson's judgment of Wayne State's two-game invasion of Chicago last weekend.

The Wildcats cagers not only learned something, they taught a bit too, as they surprised Chicago Teachers College with a come-from-behind win, 89-87. The next night, Saturday, Wayne learned considerable from DePaul cagers, whose defense Svenningson labeled "fantastic, the best we have ever seen." DePaul dumped Wayne, 73-45.

Chances are the Wildcats will learn some more basketball this weekend too, especially Friday from Lincoln University of Jefferson City, Mo. Last year Lincoln gave Wayne an 80-50 lesson. Saturday night the foe will be Midland, which divided two games with Wayne last year. Monday the Cats will entertain Southern State of South Dakota.

All three games will start at 7:30 in Rice gym following 111 games with Wayne last year. Midland and Southern have provided Wayne well-matched competition—the wins and losses nearly equal.

Wayne showed potential for future power as the Cats trounced Chicago Teachers for the first time after 18 straight home victories.

Down 44-33 at the half, Wayne rallied with a 56-point second half, one of the biggest half scores (maybe the biggest) Wayne has tallied in years. Dennis Johnson hit 24 of his 34 points during the second half and Chuck Peterson 14 of his 26 to whittle a deficit which was still 16 points with 10 minutes left.

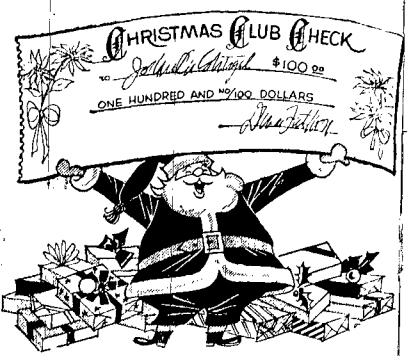

Nebraska Cities Protesting Highway Discrimination

LINCOLN—Twenty-four Nebraska cities with populations of more than 5,000 have informed the State Advisory Highway Commission that the State Highway Department is discriminating against them.

The municipalities want a revision of policy so that increased state aid will be made available for urban state highway projects. Present policy, representatives of the cities said, is grossly inequitable and in urgent need of change.

Former state engineer L. N. Hess told the commission that cities of more than 5,000 must match federal urban funds. This, he said, is putting a heavy burden and has resulted in insufficient attention being paid to other city streets and roads. Hess said the 24 cities are paying for 137 miles of the "most heavily" traveled state owned roads, which happen to be inside city limits.

The commission was told that all the Nebraskans share the use of the state road system and should share in its financial support equally. The commission also was told that these 24 cities contribute 35.5 percent of motor vehicle registration fees and only 24 percent of this money is returned to them.

Centennial Commission

The Nebraska Centennial Commission has agreed to seek introduction of a bill in the upcoming Legislature which would impose a special .14 mill levy for four years for financing of the state Centennial in 1967.

It was the feeling of the commission members that no one group should have to pay the expenses of the celebration and that it would be preferable to have all citizens making a contribution. Former Gov. Robert Crosby, attorney for the commission, said it is time for the group to move from the planning to the "action" stage.

A. James Ebel of Lincoln was named chairman of the commission, replacing former Gov. Val Peterson, who was recently discharged by Governor Morrison. Also removed were Mrs. Darlene Brooks, widow of the late Gov. Ralph C. Brooks, and Floyd Wisner, editor-publisher of the Scottsbluff Star-Herald.

Sen. Fern Hubbard Orme, Lincoln, plans to draft a bill which would ask voters to decide whether they want to elect state senators at large in counties which have more than one senator. Mrs. Orme has been informed by the attorney general that any at large elections would require a change in the Constitution.

Presently, Mrs. Orme's proposal would affect only Douglas and Lancaster counties. Her bill would be patterned after the procedure used to elect county

Declarer, holding nothing but trump and the ace of diamonds, claimed the remainder of the tricks.

Peace Corps Center

An official of the Peace Corps has expressed interest in the University of Nebraska Center for Continuing Education and the Nebraska College of Agriculture as a possible training center for Peace Corps recruits. Ross Pritchard, assistant to the Secretary of the Peace Corps, said the university setup is ideal, and is "one of the nation's finest agriculture education centers."

Pritchard expressed his ideas while in Nebraska to confer with farm, state and industry officials about the possibility of erecting windmills in the African Republic of Somalia.

Gubernatorial Speculation

Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney says he has not had time in recent months to devote any thought to the possibility of running for governor in 1964. A constitutional amendment approved Nov. 6 knocked out a ban which had prohibited the lieutenant governor from seeking the gubernatorial post.

If Burney, 70, should decide to go after the nomination for governor, it is believed a number of state senators would be very much interested in seeking the lieutenant governor's job. It has been reported that Jack Schütz, Nebraska representative for Congressmen Ralph Beermann, would also be interested in the position. Schütz was also reported thinking about running for state treasurer or state railway commissioner.

Health Facilities

Governor Morrison will confer with Robert Newell, Capital building superintendent, on the problem of finding adequate laboratory facilities for the state health department. Dr. F. A. Rogers, state health director, said Newell had suggested construction of a state-owned residence near the statehouse. But Rogers said it was concluded that expensive installation of needed equipment for a short term occupancy was prohibitive. The health director said a solution might be to locate a laboratory outside the Capitol which would be used by all laboratories within the statehouse.

Retirement Announced

Maj. Gen. Warren C. Wood, commanding general of the 34th Infantry Division, Iowa-Nebraska Army National Guard, announced his retirement, ending 38 years of military service. An Iowa native, Wood was a division commander. The post relates to Iowa under terms of an agreement between the two states after World War II. He has commanded the division since 1954.

Potential Therapists

Dr. Peter Peffer, supt. of the Glenwood and Woodland State Schools in Iowa, believes all employees of institutions for the mentally retarded are potential therapists, and that includes custodians as well as the professional staff. Dr. Peffer, a psychiatrist, made the observation while addressing the informational conference on dynamic health recently at the University of Nebraska. He said "the staff and all employees must really believe in the efficacy of treatment or training and must be enthusiastic. It is well known in this business that most employees' problems fall within the category of social incompetence rather than work incompetence."

Add Christmas Cheer

Smoke curling from the family fireplace can be made to appear in many colors, adding to the festive spirit of the holiday season. But certain precautions should be taken in handling the color-producing chemicals for safety's sake. This advice comes from Karl Loerch, Extension forester at the University of Nebraska. Evergreen cones, small blocks of wood or kindling, wood chips, sawdust or even tightly wrapped and tied magazines or newspapers will give off flames of various colors when used as a fuel in the fireplace. Loerch chemical solutions, dried and says. The following chemicals will produce the colors indicated: Copper sulphate, green; Calcium chloride, orange; Copper chloride, blue; Lithium chloride, carmine; Potassium chloride, purple. "Rubber gloves should be worn when mixing the chemical solutions, taking care not to spill the materials. Chemicals should be dissolved in a wooden pail or earthen crock, as the chemicals will ultimately destroy metal containers," Loerch warned. A discarded five-gallon paint bucket will serve the purpose, as a treating vat. However, no more than two gallons of solution should be mixed in it at a time. The University specialist stressed. A ratio of one pound of chemical to one gallon of water is recommended, using one chemical per batch. It is not necessary to clean the container thoroughly after a change of chemicals. Loerch stated. "The materials to be treated may be placed in a mesh or porous bag, and submerged in the solution. A stone can be used to weigh the materials down in the solution. After a day or two of soaking, lift out the material, drain over the container and spread the treated materials out to dry." "If the materials are allowed to dry in newspapers, the newspapers themselves, when dry, may be rolled and wrapped tightly to burn in the fireplace. Loerch pointed out. "Do not use chlorates or nitrates, or potassium permanganate," Loerch emphasized. "Chemicals should be kept away from children and pets. To avoid storage, obtain only sufficient amounts for treatment. And do the job out-of-doors." Correctly-treated cones and wooden blocks make good novelty Christmas gifts, and bags to contain them can be made out of dyed mosquito netting. Loerch concluded. 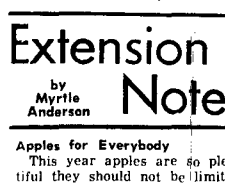
Extension Notes

Apple Salad Dressing: Fold 1 cup chopped apples and 1/2 cup finely cracked walnuts into 1/2 cup mayonnaise. Combine with shredded lettuce, or serve as the topping for fruit salads. Apple Sherbet: A light dessert to top off heavy dinners. Chill 2 cups applesauce, sweetened to taste. Add 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Whip 3/4 cup heavy cream. Gradually add apple sauce. Continue beating until stiff. Pour into refrigerator trays and chill until firm, but not hard. Fluff up with fork. Serve in sherbet glasses with a bright red cherry perched on top. Furniture Beauty Treatment: Now that your furnace is on, your wood furniture may need beauty treatments to withstand the dry atmosphere of heated rooms during late fall and winter. Gena Thames, Rutger extension home furnishing specialist, recommends a simple treatment for furniture to slow checking of the finish and restore the beauty of the wood. It disguises scratches, too. Use a mixture of one-fourth gum turpentine and three-fourths boiled linseed oil. Be sure to use gum turpentine, not distilled. And buy only linseed oil labeled "boiled." Next, pour some hot water in to a cup or small can and set it on a saucer. Shake oil-turpentine mixture and pour enough into cup to cover surface of the hot water. Do not stir. Dip a soft cloth into the oily layer of liquid and rub onto furniture, a small section at a time. For shellac finishes, wring cloth very dry. If wood is grimy, dip 3/8 steel wool in mixture and rub surface gently following the grain of the wood. Then wipe wood with another cloth rung from hot water. Finally, wipe wood with a dry cloth. When mixture cools, discard it. Do not try to reheat, because it is flammable. Unused mixture may be stored indefinitely in a capped bottle. You may use this treatment on varnish, lacquer, oil and shellac finishes. Use this solution sparingly on shellac, however, because it is damaged easily by water. If you think a finish might be shellac, you can tell by sponging a spot on underside of piece with denatured alcohol solvent or rubbing alcohol. A shellac finish will soften and become gummy.

The boys work from 3:10 to about 4:45 every night after school. Saturday they take the time to come back to school from 8:00 to 10:30. They start with four rooms on the main floor and work up to the top floor. They sweep all the rooms, the halls, and the stairs. On Saturday they clean the shop and give the blackboards the once-over.

Business Department Trains Secretaries, Bookkeepers

Lighted by the cool, shadowless light from a bank of north windows, the business department of Wayne High School resembles the working offices of a large, very important business.

The shorthand - bookkeeping room has tables arranged in a shape for conferences. Student conferences to untangle knotty bookkeeping problems could very well be the forerunners of conferences to untangle important business problems in the future.

The typing and office practice room is filled with rows of typing

desks holding a wide variety of typewriters. Both manual and electric typewriters, 30 in all, are put to use in the department. The office practice class also studies the adding machine and the mimeograph.

Both departments are busy all through the day. There are 68 students enrolled in bookkeeping, 30 in shorthand, 98 in typing and 24 in office practice.

Stop beside the shorthand room and you'll hear a voice, either recorded or live, dictating to the girls who are concentrating on getting those shorthand symbols into their notebooks. At the same time, you can't miss the chatter next door that sounds like a nest of machine guns as 30 typing students start all at once on a timed test and race away until the timing bell rings.

In charge of the business department at Wayne High are Richard Pound and John Monson. Mr. Pound, a graduate of Wayne State Teachers College, is teaching his second year here.

Mr. Monson, also a graduate of Wayne State, is teaching his first year at Wayne High. However he was an instructor of military subjects in the Marine Corps between his graduation from college and his return there to earn his master's degree. Both men are members of Pi Omega Pi, the honorary business fraternity. Mr. Monson belongs to Pi Gamma Mu, too, the honorary social science fraternity.

Mr. Pound, who teaches typing and office practice, says the best part about teaching is seeing the pupils make progress. Perhaps the worst part is the mountain of paper work each day. He says the biggest problem in learning to type is to keep the eyes on the copy and off the typewriter keys. Sometimes he employs the blindfold test. The students, blindfolded, type the words he dictates.

Mr. Monson, who teaches shorthand and bookkeeping, says that even the most modern machine cannot completely replace a trained secretary. "You don't carry machines to meetings. Neither can you take them to a construction laying without a hundred feet of wire," he explained.

Mr. Monson says the biggest problem in learning shorthand is to learn to associate the phonetic sound with the shorthand symbol. After that is mastered, speed comes with practice.

Students who plan to work in the business field are expected to learn at least three business skills. Vocational opportunities in business are wide open to students who are well trained and responsible. There is always a local demand for office help. Many of the larger businesses provide on-the-job training in their own specialties if the employee has the basic skills.

Both instructors emphasized the value of business education to all students, even if they don't plan business careers. College students, especially, benefit from taking class notes in shorthand. Many careers demand typing skill. Any one who writes even a letter can do it better on a typewriter. Bookkeeping can save many a future budget from chaos.

As busy as the department is, it may get even busier. Mr. Pound is adding a business law course to his second semester session of office practices.

Other courses which would help to round out the department would be business English, economics and general business. These last two are important because a student should have a picture of how all businesses, large and small, operate in this country. "The cold war is being fought on the economic front as well as the scientific," said Mr. Monson.
