St. Paul's Plan Living Nativity Scene at Church

For the second year, the young people of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Wayne, will present their Living Nativity Scene on the church lawn during the week preceding Christmas, Dec. 17-24.

This unique feature of St. Paul's Christmas Services consists of actors who portray the Holy Family, Mary and Joseph, and the shepherds, in motionless pantomime for the entire hour.

The animals are used as part of the scene, and brilliant lighting outlines the modern design of the creche.

A different cast of five young people will be used each evening, with nearly 35 youths participating during the week. Behind the scenes many members of the congregation are busy with costumes, procuring and care of the animals, and serving hot chocolate to the actors afterward.

Last year, when the Living Nativity Scene was presented for the first time, it received wide acclaim throughout the state of Nebraska, with hundreds of cars moving past the scene nightly.

The final scene will be given on Christmas Eve, Dec. 24, in order that families may include a visit to the creche as part of their family worship and festivities.

Wayne State's concert, performed tonight with a varied and entertaining program.

Among its selections: "Royal Fireworks Music" by Handel, (composer of "The Messiah"), excerpts from the musical, "West Side Story," and the modern symphonic tone poem, "Tulsa."

The concert is scheduled for 8 p.m. in the Administration Building auditorium.

Joining the band in the program are the Madrigal Singers directed by Antony Garlick, and a brass quintet directed by Dr. Raymond Kelton.

The "Royal Fireworks Music" has a story behind it. Handel wrote the number to celebrate the Peace of Aix la Chapelle, with a spectacle including fireworks. The music met huge success but before the celebration ended, the fireworks—which King George II had planned to increase the patriotism of his subjects—got out of hand and burned down the concert hall.

The "Tulsa" number portrays the settlement of Oklahoma, the discovery of oil, the violence of a gascher, and finally an exuberant celebration of Tulsa's oil-rich population.

Ballet Classes to Present 'Nutcracker Suite' Here Sunday

Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker Suite" with its luring music and timeless Christmas story will come to life on the Wayne State stage Sunday night as ballet classes share the college's annual Christmas concert.

The symphony orchestra and choir also will perform in the concert at 8 p.m. in Rice Auditorium. There will be no admission charge.

Ballet will, in this production, reach maturity in its third year as a Wayne State fine arts course. Creative dance classes began in 1960 under the direction of Nina Youskevitch, who before her retirement was a world-renowned ballerina.

Her classes have presented several public recitals of brief dances, but "The Nutcracker Suite" is their first major production.

For Miss Youskevitch, this classic of ballet is a labor of pleasant memories, for she danced it herself with some of the world's leading ballet troupes.

The choreography for Wayne's performance is her own invention. The cast includes 27 dancers, among them Jeanne Hecker, former director of the Sioux City Civic Ballet. Nine are college dance students; the others elementary school dance pupils.

Wayne State College will offer 34 courses at night during its second term, most of the classes beginning in the week of Jan. 7.

The courses provide resident credit and are designed primarily for people in the Wayne area who are unable to attend day classes.

Registration will be done in the hour before the first meeting of each class. All the courses will meet one night a week, except the major field materials classes meeting twice weekly from Jan. 8 to Feb. 21.

Two courses will not begin until later—American school systems on Jan. 30; music in general culture Jan. 31.

The major field materials course will be offered in art, business, English, home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, physical education, science, social science and speech.

Other undergraduate courses in the offering: Symphony orchestra and world civilizations II, Monday; world literature II, Tuesday; history and literature of music II, Thursday; physical sciences, Wednesday.

Courses open to seniors and graduates: Seminar on theatre, radio and TV, Monday; advanced invertebrate zoology II, teaching social science in elementary schools, the exceptional child, and number theory, all Tuesday; marketing management, modern Germany, and organization and administration of safety education, all Thursday; applied radioscope technique, time to be arranged.

Courses open only to graduates: Education and society, Monday; mechanical analysis of motor skills, Tuesday; curriculum and supervision of secondary schools, and theory and practice of communism, Wednesday; problems in elementary school teaching, nineteenth century English prose, psychological foundations of music education, Thursday; applied music, time to be arranged.

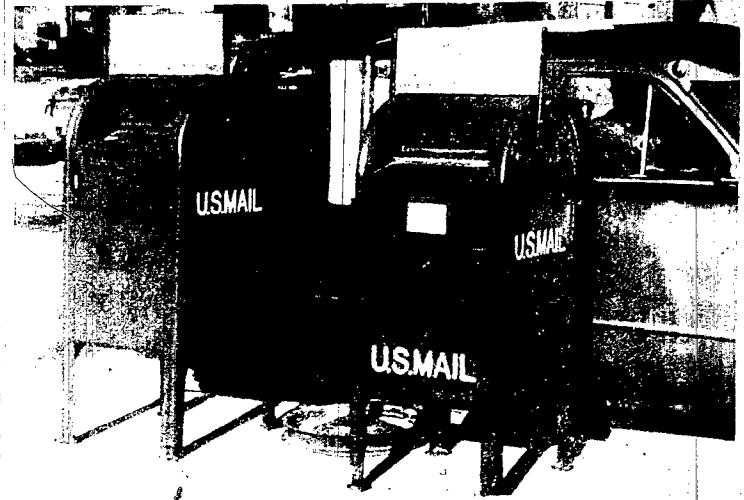
All the classes begin at 6:30 p.m. except symphony orchestra at 7.

Two More Drive-in Mail Boxes Added at Post Office

Two new curb-side drive-in mail boxes were put into operation this week by the Wayne post office.

They have been installed on the north side of the post office on Second street and are available to traffic going east.

Postmaster Don Wightman urged patrons to make sure they use the right box, since one is for local mail and one for out of town mail.

The "Local" box is for all mail for rural and city delivery for Wayne. The box labeled "Out of Town" is for mail going to other cities.

With the inauguration of the dual drive-in collection mail box drop, Wayne will now have a 9:30 p.m. collection by a Star Route driver going to Sioux City.

Out of town mail deposited in the correct box after 6 p.m. will be collected and carried to Sioux City where it will be postmarked, processed and dispatched for destination.

Sunday nights will be the only night during the week when a collection will not be made at 9:30 p.m.

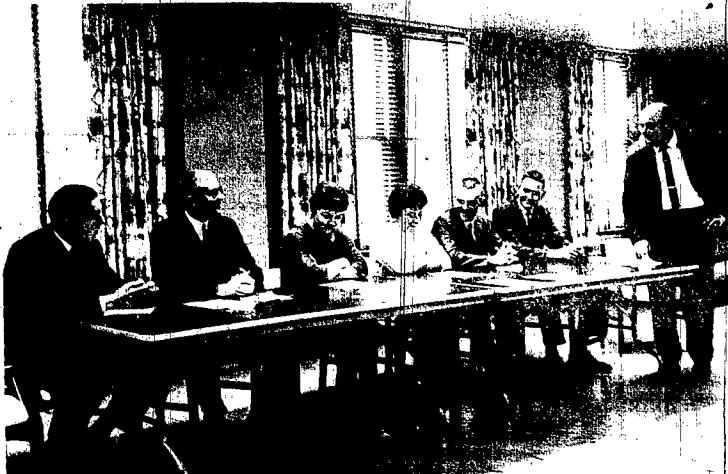
Wayne City School to Give Christmas Program

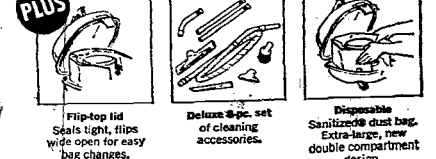

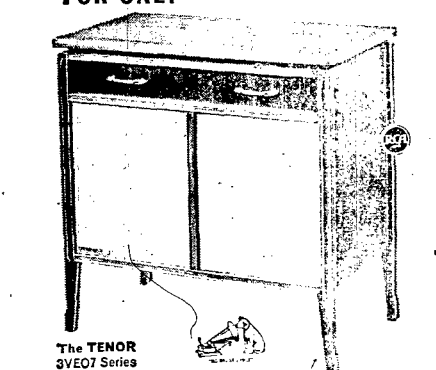

'Cats End Home Play Until Tourney With a 4-2 Mark

Wayne State eagles will head north Friday for a two-game jaunt into South Dakota, at Horn the first night, at Northern State of Aberdeen Saturday.

Coach Al Svenningsson hesitated to predict Wayne's prospects with Huron, a school normally tough in most sports. Of Northern he could say at the least that Wayne will be hard pressed.

Wayne fans have watched Northern in two Christmas Holiday tournaments and there never was doubt that the Wolves fought every inch of the way. They also gave Wayne one of its scrappiest tussles in a regular game last year before bowing, 63-62.

Wayne will take a commendable 4-2 record into the weekend wars. The Wildcats lost Friday to a rangy Lincoln university crew, but only by a 72-69 margin—compared with the 80-50 shelling the Missourians handed Wayne a year ago in Jefferson City.

A victory would have been a bonus, Svenningsson declared. Weary from the Lincoln campaign, the Wildcats found Midland difficult the next night, trailing 16-10 of the way until they sharpened both offense and defense in the waning minutes.

Second string players turned the course midway through the second half and forged a 52-all tie with seven minutes left. It was Ron Sadler's long shot that brought the tie and another of his distant efforts that allowed Wayne its first lead, 59-57, since early in the game.

Denny Johnson gave Wayne a 62-59 pad with 2:40 left when he snatched a Midland pass and raced alone for the goal.

The Warriors managed two more free shots, and Wayne added one eight seconds before the end.

Another Wayne victory went into the record Monday with a relatively easy conquest of Southern (S.D.) State, 80-75. Except for a brief scare just as the first half ended, 36-35, the Cats had the game mostly their own way. They owned leads of 18-7 early in the first half, 61-48 midway in the second.

Svenningsson used most of his team and got notable performance from several who had seen little or no action before.

Study of German Language New at School this Year

The German instructor is Mrs. Ella Wittmeier. This is her first year in Wayne. She was graduated from Southern State Teachers College in Springfield, S. D. Last year she taught in Dell Rapids, S.D.

Since she grew up in a German community, she has been familiar with the German language all her life. The confirmation class she attended was conducted in German.

The German department was added to the high school curriculum this year for several reasons. Perhaps the most practical reason is that it gives college-bound students a head start toward getting their degrees. High school language study means advanced standing in college.

But there's more to the study of languages than the purely practical side. Language study introduces students to a different type of civilization. Students begin to understand that there are people who live differently and accomplish different things. They begin to appreciate the contributions of other peoples to the world. German, for instance, is the language of science. Many of the world's greatest scientific advances have been made via the German language.

The study of a second language also contributes to better international relations. People around the world need to be able to talk with

Capitol News . . . Morrison to Ask for State Department for Promotions

Governor Morrison says he will ask the 1963 Legislature to approve the establishment of a new state development department which would be in charge of promotional ventures now handled by several different agencies.

He said he envisions the new department in taking over responsibilities now under the direction of the State Resources Division and tourism activities handled by the State Game Commission.

Morrison praised the work of Dave Osterhout, head of the Resources Division, but added that he was not immediately prepared to say if Osterhout should head up the proposed new department.

The governor also said he can see merit in raising tourism revenue through the State Highway Department, South Dakota uses such a system.

Back to Court

The Fremont power case has been submitted to the State Supreme Court for the second time in three months.

Fremont, the Omaha Power District, and the League of Nebraska Municipalities have asked for a rehearing on the recent Supreme Court decision which held that a customer has a right to select its electricity supplier.

Involved in the ruling was the Dawson County Feed Products, Inc., which has a plant located just north of the Fremont city limits. The city and Omaha Public Power had agreed informally that Fremont should supply Dawson with power. But Dodge County District Court said Dawson could choose its supplier.

Dawson said it wanted power from OPD because of less expensive rates. After the district court said Dawson could make the choice, the Supreme

The bulk of the increase is being asked from the state general fund. The department asked for \$5.7 million from this source, up 38.4 per cent from the appropriation for the current two-year period.

Statistical Evidence

There is ample statistical evidence for the record pace of the highway death rate in Nebraska, according to the Nebraska Safety Council.

The council has reported these 1962 increases compared with 1961:

- Number of teenage drivers involved in fatal accidents—up 40 per cent.
- Teen-age driver involvement in fatal accidents (18 and 19 years of age)—up 50 per cent.
- Pedestrian deaths—up 35 per cent.
- Railroad crossing deaths—up 50 per cent.
- Bicycle deaths—up 40 per cent.
- Driver drinking accidents—up 18 per cent.
- Urban fatalities—up 50 per cent.

These figures, compiled by the Nebraska Accidents Records Bureau, were for the first nine months of this year. The council said the rate of fatal accidents per 100,000,000 vehicle miles increased from 3.7 per cent in 1961 to an even four per cent during the first nine months of 1962. This represented an 11 per cent increase.

Psychiatric Visits

Regular visits from faculty members and resident psychiatrists from the Nebraska Psychiatric Institute in Omaha to evaluate inmates has been inaugurated at the state penitentiary.

The initial aim of the program will be to work with men observed as suspect mental illness cases. According to Warden Maurice Sigler, 30 inmates might currently fit this classification.

It is hoped eventually to provide the Nebraska Psychiatric Service by resident doctors to all inmates as they are processed through the reception center.

Up to now, inmates found to be mentally ill have been committed to the Lincoln State Hospital's security building by a three-man board.

Whenever we hear of a person living to be a hundred years old, our first reaction is one of awe and wonderment that one could live so long. Measured in the span of the years of a human life, a hundred years is a long time, but measured in the light of a nation's history or progress, it seems relatively short.

Army Reserve Reorganizes

The Secretary of the Army has proposed a plan for reorganization of the Nebraska Army Reserve National Guard which will add 97 men to the state's present guard force of 3,362.

The secretary has asked Governor Morrison to indicate by sometime this week whether he would accept the reorganization plan as it affects Nebraska.

Morrison immediately directed Maj Gen Lyle Welch, Nebraska's adjutant general, to conduct a staff study to determine the consequences of the new troop basis on the present organization of the state Guard.

The study, Morrison said, will indicate how the plan proposes to utilize all of the armories that are constructed and will compare equipment of a new organization against the equipment of the present structure. "With the thought in mind of usefulness for the state in state disaster and in support of the state law enforcement agencies."

The study will also help determine how much re-training would be necessary to accomplish the reorganization and whether it would be necessary to eliminate units from any Nebraska towns.

Nebraska Army Reserve strength will remain about the same but there will be a shuffling of units in the Defense Department's reorganization plan.

A spokesman for XVI Corps Headquarters in Omaha said 10 Nebraska reserve units will be inactivated, 10 will be reorganized and three new ones will be activated.

The Defense Department said Nebraska Reserve strength would be upped from 2,427 to 2,488.

The spokesman said Reserve units slated for inactivation include those at Fremont, Norfolk, West Point, Grand Island, Lexington, Lincoln, McCook, North Platte and Omaha. Units at Columbus, Grand Island, York and Omaha will be reorganized. Two units at Omaha and one at Lexington are scheduled for activation.

Q. What is histoplasmosis? Can it be arrested?
A. Histoplasmosis is a disease caused by a parasitic fungus. Primary pulmonary (lung) histoplasmosis results in the development of "lung spots" and enlargement of breathing passage lymph glands. As healing occurs the lung spots harden ("calcify"). The prospects of recovery in this type of histoplasmosis are excellent. In rare cases the disease becomes progressive, and the infectious agent invades many other body tissues. Such generalized infections are very serious. Early use of a special antibiotic may be life saving. However, commonly employed antibiotics and sulfa drugs are ineffective in this disorder.

Q. What causes a cervical ulcer after childbirth? What is meant by cauterization?
A. The cervix or neck of the womb is stretched and thinned during delivery. There may be some tearing. A stitch or two may be required but small tears usually heal without help. If the damaged tissue doesn't heal, an ulcer can form and, if infection sets in, the condition becomes chronic. Childbirth isn't the only cause of cervical ulcer (or "erosion"). Single women may experience it, just as anyone can develop a sore area in the throat or small ulcer in the nose. Usually, medicine applied to the ulcer is not successful, in which case the doctor cauterizes ("burns") or surgically removes the ulcer to allow regrowth of new, healthy tissue.

Q. My husband often drinks six large bottles of "pop" in a day. Could he get diabetes from consuming so much sugar?
A. Consumption of sugar in more-than-needed amounts will not in itself cause diabetes. However, if one has a tendency toward diabetes it might cause the symptoms of the disease to become more readily apparent.

*To measure flour, dip nested dry measuring cups into flour, level off with straight-edged spatula.

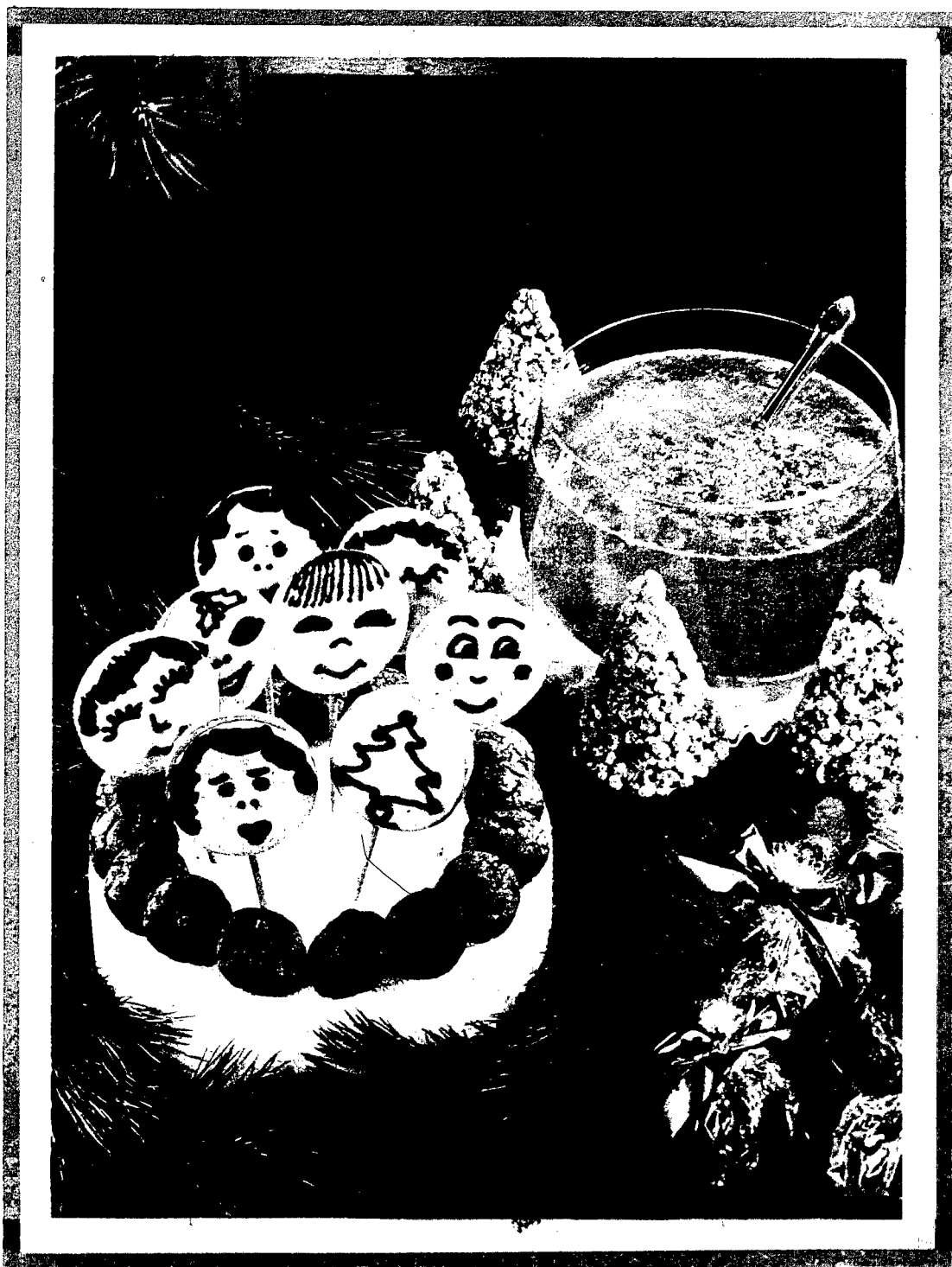
Mix sugar and butter. Add egg and flavorings and mix until thoroughly blended. Stir dry ingredients together and thoroughly blend in. Divide dough in half. Add chocolate to one half; blend thoroughly. Refrigerate dough 2 to 3 hrs. Heat oven to 375° (quick mod.). Roll dough on lightly floured pastry cloth to 3/16-in. thick. Cut into 2½ or 3-in. circles. Sprinkle with sugar, place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake 7 to 8 min. Makes 5 to 6 doz. cookies.

To make Cookie Lollipops: Spread Easy Creamy Icing (below) on baked cookie. Place a colored plastic straw or flat wooden stick across the middle, letting one end extend several inches beyond edge of cookie. Place second cookie of same size on top, pressing down slightly. 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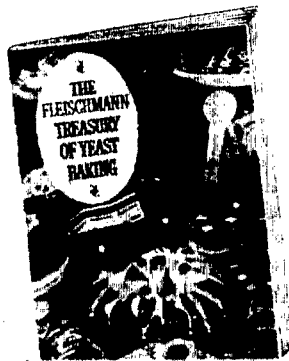
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ENGLISH CHRISTMAS BREAD

- 1½ cups boiling water
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- ½ cup butter
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon allspice
- 1 teaspoon caraway seed
- ¼ cup warm water (110-115°)
- 2 pkgs. active dry yeast
- 1 egg, room temperature
- 5¼ to 5¾ cups sifted all purpose flour
- ½ cup washed, dried currants
- ½ cup white or dark raisins
- ½ cup finely cut-up citron

Measure boiling water into a large bowl with sugar, salt, butter and spices. Add yeast to warm water. Let stand 3-5 min. Stir to dissolve. Add egg. When water-sugar mixture cools to lukewarm, add half the flour, then the yeast mixture. Beat until smooth. Add half the remaining flour, mixing well. Blend in the cut-up fruits with more flour until sides of bowl are cleaned. (Dough will be soft).

Turn dough onto lightly floured board. Gently knead about 50 strokes, until smooth. Place dough in greased bowl, turning once. Cover with foil and a dry cloth. Let rise in warm place until doubled, 1 to 1½ hours.

Grease a large baking sheet. Punch down dough. Turn out. Divide in two. Shape each half into round ball; place on baking sheet so balls don't touch. Let rise until almost doubled, about 1 hour. Bake in preheated 375° oven, 30-40 min., until well browned. Remove to rack; frost lightly if desired. Makes 3 round loaves. If desired use part of dough to fill 9 x 9 x 2-inch pan to make a square loaf, use remaining dough for rolls.

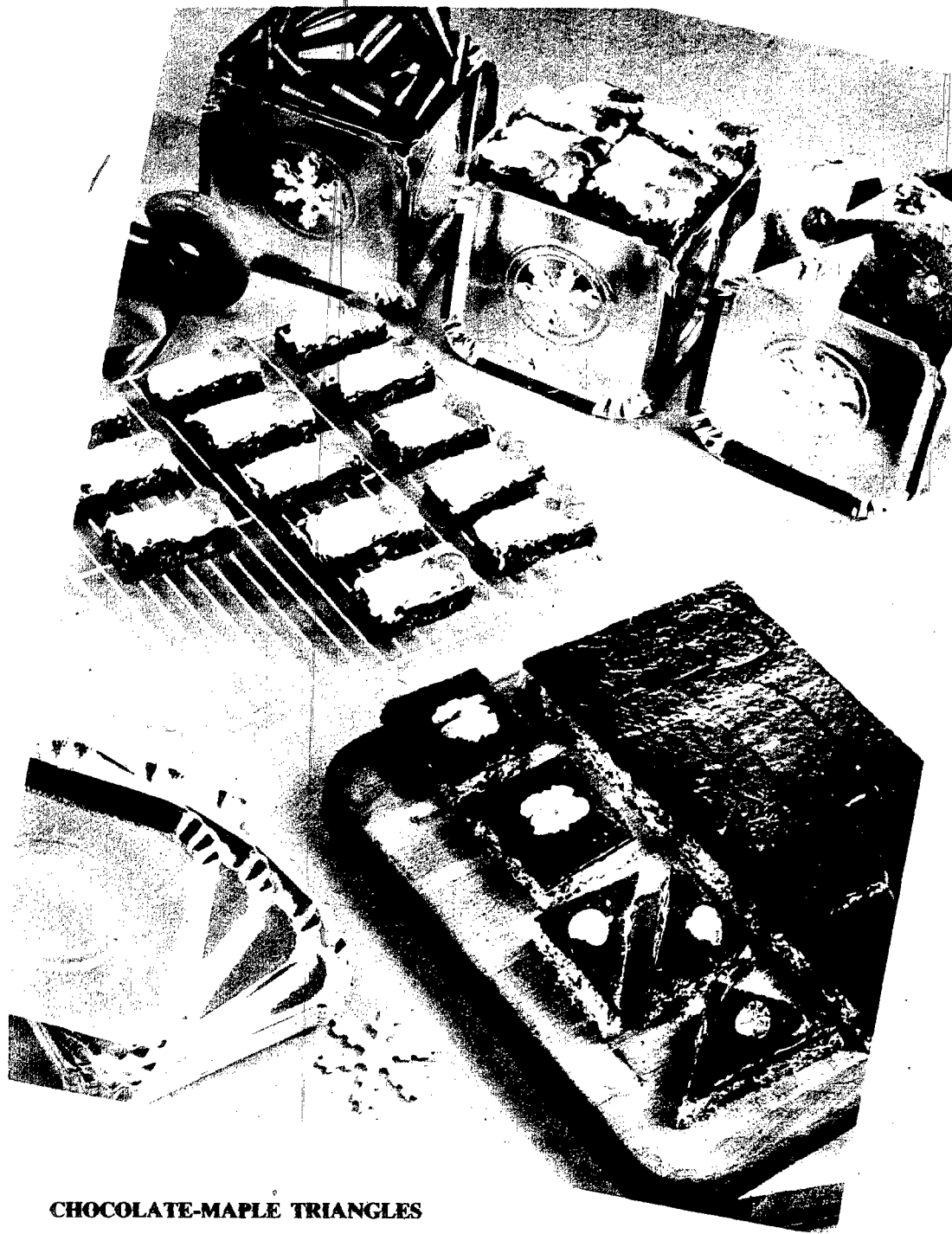

 1 6-oz. package semi-sweet chocolate morsels
 $2\frac{3}{4}$ cups all-purpose flour
 $2\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons baking powder

Melt shortening in large saucepan. Stir in brown sugar; blend. Remove from heat; cool 10 minutes. Beat in eggs one at a time. Mix together thoroughly flour, baking powder and salt; stir into sugar mixture. Stir in nuts and semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Turn into greased and floured 15 x 10 x 1-inch pan. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Cool 10 minutes; invert on bread board. Cool. Frost half with a *Maple Frosting and half with **Chocolate Frosting.  $\frac{1}{16}$ teaspoon salt
 $\frac{1}{2}$ 6-oz. package
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon vanilla

Combine evaporated milk and salt in saucepan, stirring constantly. Bring just to a boil. Remove from heat. Add semi-sweet chocolate morsels; stir until blended. Add vanilla.

HOLIDAY LEBKUCHEN

$\frac{3}{4}$ cup honey
 $1\frac{1}{4}$ cups sugar
 2 tablespoons water
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup orange juice
 2 eggs, well beaten
 1 cup chopped nuts
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mixed candied fruit
 1 12-oz. jumbo package (2 cups) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
 $2\frac{3}{4}$ cups all-purpose flour
 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 1 teaspoon cloves
 1 teaspoon cardamon
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1 teaspoon baking powder

Combine honey, sugar and water in saucepan. Place over medium heat; bring to boil. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in orange juice, eggs, nuts, candied fruit and semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Mix together thoroughly flour, spices, baking soda and baking powder. Stir into honey mixture. Store dough in a tightly covered dish for 3 days at room temperature to ripen. Turn into greased and floured 15 x 10 x 1-inch pan. Bake in slow oven (325°F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Glaze with *Orange Glaze while warm. Cut into 3 x 1-inch bars. Decorate with candied fruit. Stir in $\frac{2}{3}$ c. sweetened condensed milk, 1 tbs. water, 1 tsp. vanilla—DO NOT BEAT. Stir in 1 c. finely chopped Diamond Walnuts. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls, 2" apart, on ungreased cookie sheet. BAKE at: 375° F. TIME: 10 min. Remove from oven. Press 1 after-dinner mint into top of each. Top with Diamond Walnut half. Cool thoroughly. Remove from cookie sheet. Yield: 2 doz.
