# Wayne Wins Own Tourney Title from South Sioux City

Wayne High Blue Devils used excellent rebounding by Jim Mau and improved defensive work in carrying away top-honors in their own holiday basketball tournament Thursday.

South Sioux City defeated Norfolk in the first round, 61 to 48, but lost to Wayne in the finals, 57-52, giving the Cardinals second place. Schuyler, dumped by Wayne 65-41, lost to the Norfolk quintet 51-42, for last place and Norfolk, third.

Tournament action began Wednesday, when a short Norfolk club fangled with the South Sioux City Cardinals.

Both teams got off to a shaky start as there seemed to be a lid on each basket. The close of the first quarter found South Sioux carrying a slight margin,

taltest man being 6'1". The Devils entered the tournament with the best record of 4 wins and no losses.

Wayne got the opening tip and got the ball through the net first after more than a minute of play had elapsed. 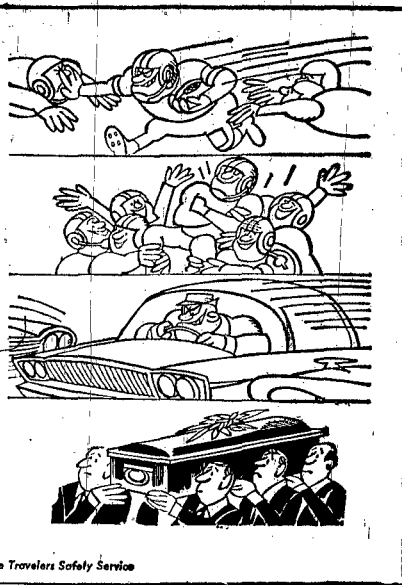

Frontier Airlines an extension of time to prove a need for its southern Nebraska route. A CAB ruling on whether cities in southern Nebraska on the Frontier route were complying with CAB's "use it or lose it" policy was expected this year. Sandstedt said he believes CAB "has unofficially given Frontier more time because of the change in the airlines management."

**Oratorical Contest**  
The Nebraska American Legion in cooperation with state high schools will sponsor the 25th annual high school oratorical contest.

District contests will be held during early March with the state contest slated for Lincoln March 30. The national contest will follow in Eau Claire, Wis., May 2.

William Galbraith, state Legion commander, said the contest is an Americanism activity and has the approval of the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

According to Galbraith, the program serves a two-fold purpose. He explained that the sides giving students a lesson in speaking ability, it also improves their knowledge of the constitution as all orations must be on the subject, "The Constitution of the United States."

A total of 15 district champions will be named. The three highest scoring contestants of the 15 will compete for the three top places.

**Juvenile Court**  
The Nebraska Supreme Court has ruled that if a minor is tried as a delinquent child instead of as a criminal, the minor is not entitled to a jury trial.

But the court avoided a bigger question in which it was alleged that the act creating the separate juvenile court in Nebraska in counties with a population of 50,000 or more was unconstitutional.

The father of a youth involved in a Douglas County juvenile court action alleged the 1958 legislative act establishing the separate court was unconstitutional and his son was treated unfairly by the court because he was not given a jury trial.

The Supreme Court said it could not rule on the constitutionality of the act in a case of this nature.

**Extension Notes**  
by Myrtle Anderson  
January White Sales are tempting the homemaker this month. Color as never before is the news in household linen this season. This is especially true of sheets. Colored sheets and pillow cases can now be laundered either in the same manner as or along with white bed linens without fear of colors fading or whites being grayed. However, this is only true of those linens labeled "color fast or vat dyed" so do check the labels.

"White" is still found in 75 per cent of the bed linens in use today.

Two standard types of sheets most popular with consumers are muslin and percale. There have been and still are some synthetic yarn sheets but, like top-fitted style sheets, they have not been accepted well by the homemaker so are becoming obsolete.

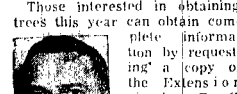
Whether the homemaker chooses percale or muslin sheets is entirely dependent upon her personal preference and pocket book. Neither light nor heavy-weight muslin is recommended for home use. Medium-weight muslin recommended for home use should be of combed cotton and have a thread count of 128. Thread count is number of threads in one square inch of the sheet.

The shopper will usually find two qualities of percale sheets available in combed cotton. The difference lies in thread count. The finest quality percale has a thread count of 200 while the next finest will have a count of 180.

Measure your mattress before going shopping for sheets. The important measurements of course, are length, width and depth. Allow 6 inches extra for shrinking in length. Then 10 inches for each side and end allows for adequate tucking and turning over blanket at top.

For a bottom fitted sheet, mattress measurements are also most important but it helps to know the kind of bed it's for (example: twin, single, double, King size).

**Co. Agent's Column**

Farmers and ranchers planning to obtain trees under the Clarke-McNary Tree distribution program may obtain order blanks at County Extension Offices throughout Nebraska.



Since the program was initiated in 1926, more than 40 million trees have been purchased by Nebraska farmers and ranchers for developing various tree plantings says Karl Loersch, University of Nebraska Extension forester.

Those interested in obtaining trees this year can obtain complete information by requesting a copy of the Extension circular E. C. 1726 entitled "A P l i c a t i o n B l a n k and I n f o r m a t i o n o n C l a r k e - M c N a r y T r e e s ." Copies can be obtained at County Extension Offices. The circular includes a list of species, prices, tips on ground preparation, planting directions, and cultivation and care of tree plantings.

Prices of the trees are as follows: \$3 per hundred for broad-leaf species, \$5 per hundred for evergreens, \$150 per hundred for shrub species and \$8 per hundred for Christmas tree stock. Prices include handling, packing and shipping charges. Evergreens called for at the Nebraska National Forest at Halsey will be \$4.50 excepting Christmas tree stock. Loersch said. Trees will be shipped in late March or early April 1963.

**Young Adults Can Boost Income**  
High school graduates can boost their incomes in 1963 and the years ahead by enrolling in the winter term of the Midwest Institute for Young Adults (MIYA) at the University of Nebraska. The winter term starts January 15, 1963.

Dr. Otto Hoiberg who is in charge of the MIYA short course says the \$8 week program is especially designed for young adults who do not go to college. Classes are designed to help young farm men and women sharpen their skills in business and agriculture. Other classes include music, handicrafts, recreation leadership and understanding art.

The classes are at a post-high school level and are taught by members of the University of Nebraska faculty. Dr. Hoiberg said. No academic credit is given, but a certificate is awarded upon completion of an eight-week term.

Business classes which will be offered during the winter term January 21-March 15, 1963 include: business management, human relations in business, salesmanship, business records and reports, business correspondence, public speaking, and rapid reading and comprehension.

Agricultural classes will include feeding and marketing of livestock, agricultural marketing, farm writing, and soil conservation.

In addition to class work, MIYA participants may take advantage of a counseling service, the Student Union, University libraries, and medical care on the same basis as regular University students.

The cost for the 8-week term is \$300 which includes room and board. Students in the Lincoln area who choose to live at home pay a fee of \$150. Students interested in the Midwest Institute for Young Adults may contact the local County Extension Agent or write: Dr. Otto Hoiberg, Head, Hall of Youth, University of Nebraska, Lincoln 3, Nebraska.

**Capitol News**  
**Key Officers Selected at Opening of Unicameral**

Operating under the shadow of the explosive reapportionment question, the 1963 Legislature opened proceedings on a variety of problems expected to keep the lawmakers busy for at least six months.

One of the major jobs of the early legislative days is to get the Unicameral in operational position. This includes selection of some of the key officers.

Sen. William Moulton of Omaha won the coveted speakership on the fourth ballot after a suspenseful race with Sen. Fern Hubbard Orme of Lincoln, the only woman member of the law-making body.

Sen. George Gerdes of Alliance went the job of chairman of the Committee on Committees, and Sen. Harold Stryker of Hising City was elected chairman of the important Legislative Council.

Moulton had waged a long campaign for the speakership and said the election by his fellow lawmakers marked the high point in his legislative career.

Gerdes' Committee on Committees ran into almost immediate criticism when announcement was made of the assignments to the standing committees.

The outspoken criticism came from some members of the Omaha delegation who charged Omaha legislators were "discriminated against" when the committees were formed. Another complaint from the Omaha senators was that the chairmanships given to Omaha senators were on committees of lesser importance.

Gerdes denied the allegations and said a serious attempt was made to be fair to every segment of the state.

At the core of all the charges and allegations was the constitutional amendment approved in November by the voters which permits 20 to 30 percent weight to be given to area in legislative redistricting.

Most of the Omaha senators and laid down the ace of diamonds. With book in, West returned another diamond, hoping declarer would win in dummy, then try the spade finesse. East passed, without an intervening bid from North. East, then, could not hold as many as seven high card points. Had he held as many as seven high card points he would have kept the bidding alive for his partner. Therefore, West is known to hold the king of spades after East wins the first trick with the heart ace.

It is true that declarer had no way to know that West's king was a singleton. But he had nothing to lose by laying down the trump ace. Any other play would be an admission of defeat.

West led the heart queen, dummy's king going to East's ace. West won the heart return

January White Sales are tempting the homemaker this month. Color as never before is the news in household linen this season. This is especially true of sheets. Colored sheets and pillow cases can now be laundered either in the same manner as or along with white bed linens without fear of colors fading or whites being grayed. However, this is only true of those linens labeled "color fast or vat dyed" so do check the labels.

"White" is still found in 75 per cent of the bed linens in use today.

Two standard types of sheets most popular with consumers are muslin and percale. There have been and still are some synthetic yarn sheets but, like top-fitted style sheets, they have not been accepted well by the homemaker so are becoming obsolete.

Whether the homemaker chooses percale or muslin sheets is entirely dependent upon her personal preference and pocket book. Neither light nor heavy-weight muslin is recommended for home use. Medium-weight muslin recommended for home use should be of combed cotton and have a thread count of 128. Thread count is number of threads in one square inch of the sheet.

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Measure your mattress before going shopping for sheets. The important measurements of course, are length, width and depth. Allow 6 inches extra for shrinking in length. Then 10 inches for each side and end allows for adequate tucking and turning over blanket at top.

## Patty Lansing Announced Winner of Regents Award

Patty Lansing has been announced Wayne High's Regents' Scholarship winner for 1963. Patty has won a one-year scholarship worth \$204, to the University of Nebraska.

Eight other Wayne High students were designated as alternate winners. They are Joann Bauermeister, Leslie Conyers, Ann Marie Hasebrook, Barbara Jones, Marilyn Nuernberger, Kenneth Olds, Carla Rethwisch and Jane Shram.

The 100 top scorers, out of the 5,097 seniors in Nebraska who took the test, were given 4-year scholarships to the University.

The one-year scholarships, like Patty's, were granted to the 207 seniors whose scores ranked highest among their own classmates.

The alternate scholarships were awarded to all whose scores ranked higher than the lowest-scoring scholarship winner. In case the scholarship winner in any particular school chooses not to take advantage of his scholarship, one of the alternates may have it.

One-third of Wayne's top 27 seniors who took the test earned scores above the lowest scholarship score. Statewide, only 24 per cent of the contestants placed this high.

## Fire Alarm Rang For "Real" Monday

Thirty seconds before the bell announcing the beginning of chorus sounded Monday noon, a minor mishap was experienced in the choir room. Students were still filing in when a fire broke out, the apparent result of faulty wiring. Mr. Jenkins was in the room preparing to begin choir.

The students and Mr. Jenkins noticed the smell of burning rubber and soot the flames broke out over a filing cabinet and a closet where the robes are kept. The command was given to sound the fire alarm and Mr. Jenkins happened to be the closets to it. The

high school students hurried out of the building, chattering noisily as they went. Since this was a new experience for them, they didn't know exactly what to do in spite of all the fire drilling. It took them approximately two minutes to evacuate the building, Mr. Jenkins said.

Mr. Jenkins had immediately begun to beat out the fire which was spreading to sheet music stored on the cabinets. Miss Fredrickson came from the library and helped him. Soon Mr. Schwanke and Mr. Cheney arrived with fire extinguishers and smothered the last embers.

When the fire was completely out, the all-clear bell was sounded and the students went back into the building. The top floor of the school smelled of burned rubber and was foggy with smoke. The room was too dirty and smoky to continue class, so the choir was dismissed for lunch.

Mr. Jenkins said that some music and a few records were burned. But there were German books, both new and rented, that were sitting on the top of the filing cabinet and they were completely demolished.

Three hundred dollars worth of new robes had just arrived over the weekend and Mr. Jenkins considered it a stroke of luck that he happened to put them in the closet that was not touched by the fire. Also, he had just received a new shipment of music for the choir which he usually lays on top of the filing cabinet directly under the scene of the fire; this time he happened to set it on a box beside his desk.

The room wasn't damaged except for a few black streaks on the wall where the flames had shot up. An odor of burned rubber and a sitting of black ashes remained in the room through the afternoon.

The result of this fire may be an incentive to have the wiring checked at Wayne High. The choir room was serviced by only one outlet.

## Drivers' License Exams Each Thursday

An examiner will be at the county court house every Thursday from 8:30 until 4:30 for the purpose of giving examinations for drivers' licenses. Students will be excused for the purpose of taking these examinations any time during the day when they have a free period.

The examiner has asked that students check out through school officials so that he does not have a waiting line. He will be able to give better service to the examinees this way. This is an improved schedule over that time spent here in Wayne prior to this time. The examiner spent one half day every other week.

## "The Diary of Anne Frank" Will Be Senior Class Play

Productions Set for Tuesday, Thursday

When the Wayne High seniors present their production of THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK next Tuesday and Thursday, they will be attempting to re-create on the city auditorium stage one of the most remarkable and inspiring true life stories to come out of World War II.

For the story of Anne Frank is a true story. It is the story of a young Jewish girl who, together with her family, another Jewish family, and an elderly dentist in trouble with the Gestapo, spent two years and two months hiding from Hitler's green police in a tiny attic apartment above an Amsterdam warehouse.

During this two year period (from the time she was thirteen until she was fifteen), Anne Frank kept a diary—a diary which records the events, passions, and hardships of eight fugitive Jews with such tenderness and understanding that it has become a document more revealing of the horror that was Nazi Germany than all the textbook accounts, the shocking Nazi films, the grim statistics, and the highly publicized war-crime trials put together.

Still, the story of Anne Frank is far more than a story of terror and death. It is rather a story of life—full of laughter and courage and love. It is a story of a noisy, awkward, irrepresible girl's progress into womanhood. It is a verification of the worth of the human individual. It is a manifestation of and a testimonial to one of the human race's most invaluable assets—hope. All this is the story of Anne Frank.

When the stage play, adapted from the actual diary of Anne Frank, first appeared on Broadway, it won virtually every award for dramatic literature existing—the Antoinette Perry award, the coveted Critics' Award, and finally the Pulitzer Prize. The motion picture version was equally successful, being nominated for an Academy Award and gaining for Sherry Winters the Academy Award for best supporting actress.

Hopes are keen at the high school for a presentation worthy of the play's reputation. Despite numerous technical set-backs, a pressing shortage of time and equipment, and the customary rash of interruptions, interferences, and irritations common to undertakings of this nature, the play is gradually approaching production point. The permanent scenery and light crews established this year are using every available moment to apply the theater knowledge gained from previous shows to the problems posed in the staging of so difficult a show. The cast for the show comprises one of the most experienced and competent groups of actors to be assembled for any Wayne High production in recent years. Without exception the actors and actresses have, at least two or three appearances in major productions to their credit and almost all of them in years past have proven themselves capable of playing lead parts.

Perhaps more important than the overall strength and experience of the cast, staff, and crews, however, is the fact that everyone connected with the show is approaching his job with an acute sense of responsibility. It is a sense of responsibility founded on respect—respect not only for the play as a great piece of literature, but also respect for the memory of the little Jewish girl who died at the hands of the Nazis in 1945 but who left behind her such a rich and poignant reaffirmation of the essential goodness of the human spirit.

## Skin Tests for TB To Be Given Freshmen

Monday, Jan. 14, all freshmen of the high school will be given the tuberculin or Mantoux test. This test will be given free to the students. This clinic is part of the Wayne County Tuberculosis Organization Skin Test program for the

Wayne County high schools. This clinic is financed solely by the sale of Christmas Seals.

Physicians will administer the skin test and will be assisted by volunteer local nurses and the local high school Future Nurses' Organization. Form letters will be sent home for parents to sign and return, thereby giving permission for their child to have this test.

This is the first year for this clinic in Wayne County and it is hoped that next year the junior class can be tested along with the incoming freshmen.
