## WSTC Still Holds Priority For Fine Arts Building

Wayne State received welcome news from the State Normal Board last week. The college still has the No. 1 priority for the next building to be erected on a state college campus. It will house Wayne's fine arts division.

However, the priority remains only that—not a go-ahead for construction, and the college cannot even hire an architect to make preliminary plans until the future of construction funds is cleared by the Legislature.

The board authorized President W. A. Brandenburg to proceed with planning the fine arts building if he can find an architect who will do it without obligation.

In other action, the board approved refinancing of Wayne State's \$3,075,000 revenue bond debt into one package. The consolidation of bonds issued in 1956, 1959 and 1961 will lower costs an estimated \$295,113 during the 25-year life of the bonds.

In addition, the consolidated bond issue will be open-end—that is, the college can float another \$1.4 of revenue bonds for future building without going through the complete procedure.

Kearney State recently refinanced a \$1.6 million bond package and the Normal Board Coordinator Freeman Decker suggested that the board consider similar action at Chadron and Peru.

The board authorized Decker to draw several bills for presentation to the Legislature. One would remove the word "teachers" from the name of the four state colleges and rename them with town designations, such as Wayne State College.

Another bill would ask for twice the present allotment to the colleges from the institutional building levy from one-fourth to one-half mill.

A third bill would establish a retirement plan for the state college staff.

Proceeds will go to the Lions Club's sight conservation program along with other projects in Wayne.

## Tree Planting Looms In Centennial Plans

Tree planting has apparently become an integral part of the Nebraska State Centennial Commission's plan for the 1967 celebration.

It has been suggested that memorial forests of five acres or more be encouraged and has approved the use of plaques to mark centennial tree plantings.

At the local level, the Izaak Walton League of America has become interested in "living snow fences" to be planted as part of the centennial celebration.

Such planting can not only beautify the state, but prevent wind and water erosion and build up wildlife habitat.

Effective July 1, 1963 the Laurel and Concord school districts will be merged. The merger came about when petitions of Concord District 63 and the Laurel School Board were approved by the joint Cedar Dixon County Redistricting Committee and by the Nebraska State Redistricting Committee.

It is planned that an attendance center will be maintained at Concord.

## Religious Emphasis Week Begins at WS With Top Speaker

Wayne State students will ponder serious questions of religion next week in the college's annual Religious Emphasis Week.

The week's theme poses quite a question to begin with: "Christianity—Idealism or Realism?"

It is the theme chosen by the student religious coordinating committee, headed by Co-chairmen Larry Brandstetter, Wayne and Laraine Diekmann, Bloomfield.

Schedule speaker for the week is the Rev. W. J. Fields, pastor of Memorial Lutheran Church, Ames, Ia., and campus pastor to Lutheran students at Iowa State University.

Author of books and articles dealing with the problems of college students, Pastor Fields has also talked frequently at youth camps, rallies and campus convocations.

He is editor of a six-volume series on sex education scheduled for publication next year.

Opening event of the week is a convocation at 10:10 a.m., Monday in the Administration Building auditorium, with Pastor Fields talking on the general theme.

He also will serve as the resource leader of buzz sessions Monday and Tuesday nights in the dormitories—informal discussion sessions when students can ask and answer questions on religion.

A vesper service at 11:30 p.m. in the Inter-faith Chapel will follow the buzz sessions both nights.

The visiting pastor also will be available for private conferences at the request of any student.

A coffee session from 3 to 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons in the faculty conference room will give Pastor Fields another chance to visit with students and faculty.

The concluding event comes Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. with a banquet at the Student Center, the speaker summarizing his ideas on the week's theme.

## 'English' to Highlight WSTC Regional Teacher Workshop

A new approach to an old problem—teaching English—will be explained to teachers of Northeast Nebraska Saturday, February 16.

The occasion is a regional workshop at Wayne State Teachers College, starting at 10 a.m. in the Conn Library. Elementary and secondary teachers, principals and superintendents are invited to attend.

Subject of the conference will be the new Nebraska English curriculum developed last summer by 44 English teachers meeting in Lincoln under the leadership of Dr. Paul Olson of the University of Nebraska.

It is a curriculum that suggests major changes in the method of teaching English from the early elementary grades through high school.

Speaker for the morning session will be G. Thomas Fairclough, a specialist in descriptive English literature on the faculty of the University of Nebraska.

After lunch at the Student Center, teachers will group themselves in their teaching fields for study of the curriculum materials. Lincoln teachers who are piloting these materials will moderate these groups.

The curriculum is being tested this year in five pilot schools.

## Set Audio-Visual Study for Teachers

Audio-visual techniques for teachers will be explained tonight (Thursday) at a conference sponsored by Wayne State and the State Department of Education.

The program from 8 to 10 p.m. in Conn Library is intended for teachers of science, mathematics both elementary and secondary—but is open to all teachers.

Dr. Robert Stepp and Dr. W. C. Meierhenry of the University of Nebraska will demonstrate audio-visual media that can help teachers to teach more effectively.

## Feed Grain Program Signup Starts Friday, Ends March 22

Signup for the 1963 Feed Grain program begins Friday and will run through March 22.

John Mohr, chairman, ASC County committee, is urging growers not to wait until the last few days of the signup period to file applications to participate.

Growers who take part in the 1963 feed grain program will receive a price-support payment in addition to the diversion payment, according to Mohr. Such growers will also qualify for regular price-support loans or purchase agreements on their 1963 corn, grain sorghum, and barley crops.

The price-support payments, the Chairman explains, is a new feature of the feed grain program for 1963. (A similar program is also available under the 1963 wheat stabilization program.) It is a payment which will be made on the "established" normal production of the acreage planted to the three feed grains in 1963. The same rates will apply throughout the country; they will not vary by counties as the regular loan rates do.

Rates for the price-support payments have been established at 19 cents per bushel for corn, 16 cents per bushel (29 cents per hundredweight) for grain sorghum, and 14 cents per bushel for barley. For each farm, the farm bases for all three grains will be combined into one feed grain base. And the rate used in determining the price-support payment—like the diversion payment—will depend on the kind of feed grain taken out of production.

Mohr pointed out that the price-support payment really serves as income insurance; it will be made to growers who divert at least the minimum 20 percent of the farm's feed grain base into a conservation use. Even if the planted crop is destroyed by natural conditions, or even if part of the feed grain is fed to the animals on the farm, the price-support payment will be made just the same.

Unlike last year's feed grain program, the regular loan or purchase agreement will be available to 1963 program participants on the farm's entire 1963 production of corn, grain sorghum, and barley—it will not be restricted to the normal production of the feed grain acreage.

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

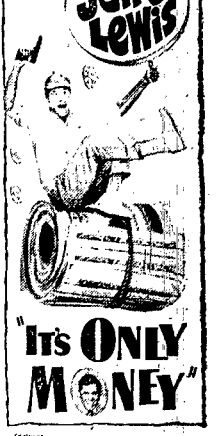

Wayne State and Peru State will clash Saturday night in one of the key conference cage battles of the season.

It shapes up as Wayne's main challenge to a perfect NCC record, which now stands at 5-0. The Peru Bobcats, always tough in basketball, usually give Wayne an extra tough time on the Peru court.

The Wildcats will have considerable sideline support, if appears, as college students and Wayne businessmen plan a migration. A bus load of townsmen last year liked their trip to Peru so well that they are going again.

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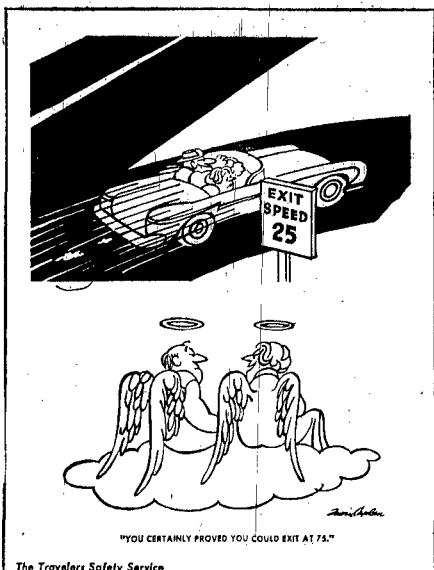
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### Capitol News . . . Morrison Wants Action on Several Recommendations

Governor Morrison has served notice that he is going to do his utmost to get several of his key recommendations enacted into law.

One would be to establish a separate department of economic development. And the other is his proposal for a 10-year improvement program for higher education. He has indicated that his suggested budgets for education are what he considers the minimum that can be appropriated to get an adequate job done.

Morrison said he feels so strongly about setting up the new department and about higher education needs that if the Legislature doesn't agree with him, he will seek another gubernatorial term.

In the past Morrison has frequently stated he was not interested in serving beyond his present term. He did emphasize that any rumors about him running for the U.S. Senate two years hence are "totally unfounded and false."

The reaction from some of the legislators to Morrison's statements was generally that the Legislature would not be "pushed."

Sen. Richard Marvel of Hastings, chairman of the powerful budget committee, said during the next few months the committee will be gathering much pertinent evidence and testimony regarding budgetary matters. He indicated also that the committee

will be much more inclined to base its recommendations on that evidence and testimony than on the suggestions of the governor.

Sen. George Syas of Omaha said he is sure "facts and figures will prevail in the Legislature."

The governor said he is certain his budget was among the most modest of any offered by any governor in the 50 states. If it is implemented, he added, "it will keep Nebraska as the lowest of any state on a per capita tax basis."

Among specific recommendations for sizable general fund appropriations in Morrison's budget was \$33 million for the University of Nebraska, up \$5 million from the 1961-62 figure; \$7.5 million for the normal schools; up about \$1.5 million; \$15.7 million for the department of public welfare, up about \$1.3 million and \$13.3 million for the department of institutions, up about \$2 million.

He also proposed raising about \$11 million for the general fund by increased cigaret, liquor, and pari-mutuel taxes, along with higher driver license fees.

**Support Proposal**

Chairmen of the state Democratic and Republican parties have strongly endorsed legislative bills to close the gap between the primary and general elections and to have state party conven-

tions elect the delegates to the national conventions.

GOP Chairman Robert Denney of Fairbury and Democratic Chairman Russell Hanson of Newcastle both gave the proposals their enthusiastic endorsement.

Under bills introduced by Sen. Marvin E. Stromer of Lincoln, the primary would be moved from May to September and the state conventions — rather than the voters — would decide who will serve as national convention delegates.

Both chairmen said the proposals would result in better candidates, better elections and better government. They also believe action should be taken to elect the Unicameral on a partisan basis.

Hanson expressed doubt action would be taken this year because "so many of the legislators are reluctant to act on a proposal until it has been considered several times . . . but I think the bills should be passed this year."

According to Denney, the success of the bills will "depend on how much the Legislature listens to the organized parties."

Both agreed the delay between a May primary and a November general election is too long a period to keep public interest stimulated.

**New Appointment**

Governor Morrison has appointed A. H. (Harlan) Story of Plainview to the State Game Commission.

He succeeds Clem Ballwek of Spalding who was appointed to fill the vacancy when Sen. LeRoy Bahensky of St. Paul resigned to run for the Legislature. Story is a 41-year-old farmer. He is national vice president of the Izaak Walton League.

He would like to see individual senators or a group of them ask for a "full scale legislative investigation of the reformatory situation."

Vogt said he opposes legislative confirmation of Morris' appointment because of conditions he and Governor Morrison have allowed to develop at the reformatory. "He said some employees, some past employees and some inmates are displeased with the way supt. C. V. Keller administers the institution.

The committee took no immediate action. Several members indicated, however, they would like to gather considerably more evidence and testimony before taking any concrete action. In the first several hearings, Morris had not had an opportunity to give his side of the matter.

**How Do You Measure Up?**

These standards have been adopted as minimum for candidates in a Farm Efficiency Awards program—

**Cattle Feeding**—\$175 return per \$100 of feed—Feed costs of 12¢ per lb. for choice grain fed cattle.

**Dairy**—13,000 lbs. milk per cow, 250,000 lbs. per man, \$300 per cow return above feed costs.

**Hogs**—9 pigs weaned per litter, 325 lbs. feed per 100 lbs. gain. 11¢ cost per lb. gain.

**Layers**—250 eggs per hen housed on 45 lbs. feed per dozen eggs, 6,000 hens per man.

**Corn**—110 bu. per acre at cost of 65¢ per bu.

**Soybeans**—45 bu. per acre at cost of \$1.25 per bu.

Records are required as proof of accomplishment.

**Crop Test Reports Available**

The reports of yields in on-state tests comparing corn hybrids and small grains are now available in county Extension offices.

Other items which can be obtained are tree torials, certified seed directories, soil sample boxes and information sheets.

**Protect Young Trees**

Rabbits and mice often cause serious damage to young wind-break trees.

The following measures can be used to protect trees from rodent damage: trapping, poisoning, wrapping the trees or repellants.

Repellants have been most practical. The following materials have proved effective: Arsan 42-S, new improved Z. I. P., select rabbit repellent, and Peter Rabbit repellent. These can be brushed or sprayed on the small trees.

Winter is always a good time to get tractors and machinery in shape for spring field work. Those without a heated farm shop will need to pick the milder days between now and spring. Repair, maintenance and tune up now will save time and

### Way Back When

**Plentiful Sweet Potatoes**

Sweet potatoes have been listed among the "plentifuls" in January and February by USDA Marketing Service. Homemakers who want to serve highly nutritious food on a limited budget will find sweet potatoes a high vitamin content. They rate next to carrots as a source of Vitamin A. They also supply a good amount of Vitamin C, B<sub>6</sub> and B<sub>2</sub>. One medium sweet potato, baked in its jacket, furnishes about 155 calories.

Serving sweet potatoes baked in their jackets can be a welcome surprise for your family. Preparation is fairly simple. After cleaning medium-sized sweet potatoes, wash with fat if a soft skin is desired. Bake at 425 degrees F. (hot oven) until soft—35 to 60 minutes depending upon size.

For the homemaker who likes to try something different, I would suggest "Scalloped Sweet Potatoes and Oranges". Here's the recipe:

2 medium-sized sweet potatoes, cooked, peeled, and sliced  
1 large orange, peeled and sliced  
1 tablespoon grated orange rind  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 teaspoons table fat  
1/3 cup orange juice

Place a layer of sweet potatoes in a greased baking dish, add a layer of orange slices. Sprinkle with orange rind, salt, and sugar, and dot with fat. Repeat until all ingredients are used. Pour orange juice over the top. Cover dish. Bake at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven), 45 minutes to 1 hour. 4 servings.

**Breathing Hazards**

Smog may have a big city problem but today folks living in the less populated areas are no longer free from dangers of polluted air. Helen Becker, our Rural Health Specialist in Extension, warns against breathing fumes from hair sprays and spray paints.

She states that a condition known as "Farmers Lung" is caused by repeated inhalation of dust from moldy hay or other grasses. Severe headaches, fever, uncleanliness and often severe chills are result of contact with this type of dust.

Even though it is common knowledge that carbon monoxide is a killer folks still run the risk by running their cars in closed garages and tolerate faulty mufflers or tail pipes. The National Safety Council estimates 1900-people in the nation die from carbon monoxide produced by passenger cars.

Everyone has been warned of the danger of doing home dry cleaning indoors. Coin-operated dry cleaning has been accepted as a welcome substitute. A word of caution: If the car is loaded with some freshly cleaned clothes out of the coin-op, be sure the windows are opened at least part way. Some folks are allergic to the fumes from the solvent that may not be completely evaporated.

### Weekly Bridge Tip — The Rule of Eleven

- NORTH**

We must make the following assumptions today: (1) North and South have bid three no trump, with South playing the hand. (2) East assumes that West is leading his fourth best card in his longest suit.

Regarding the assumptions, we might say that North would be more likely to be declarer at 3-no trump; but the point we are making today is better illustrated with South playing the hand. We must also assume that West is leading from his fourth best spade if we are going to properly demonstrate the rule which applies to this week's hand.

Most players beyond the novice stage realize that it is accepted practice, when defending against a no trump bid, to lead the fourth best card in the longest suit. There are two exceptions to this practice. The bidding for example, may give a clue as to the best opening lead, or the player on lead may prefer to lead from the top of a sequence.

Let's say you are sitting East in the above hand. West leads what is presumably his fourth best spade, the 6 spot, against the 3-no trump contract. Would you play your 3 of spades, after North (Dummy) plays the 4 with complete confidence that partner's spade 6 will win the first trick? If you wouldn't,

you probably do not know the Rule of Eleven.

In applying the Rule of Eleven, take the card which has been led (the 6 in this case; add to 6 the number of spades in Dummy which are higher than the 6 (one, the king in the above hand); plus all the cards in your (East) hand higher than the 6 in the spade suit. You have 4 spades higher than the 6. Therefore, you add 6, plus 1, plus 4, to get 11. Always subtract this total from 11 to determine the number of spades South has in his hand which will beat the opening lead, the 6 spot. When you subtract 11 from eleven you get none, which is the exact number of spades South has which will beat the opening lead, the 6. By applying the Rule of Eleven, you play your 3 spot, and your side runs 5 spade tricks to defeat the contract. If you play any card other than the 3, North-South make their contract.

The Rule of Eleven may be applied just as effectively by the bidders as it is by the defenders. If you are sitting South in the above hand, for example, you would start with the spade which is led, the 6; plus spades in Dummy (North) higher than the 6 (one, the king); plus spades in your (South) hand higher than the six, (none). This gives you a total of 7. Again, you always subtract the total from 11. Seven from 11, as South, tells you that East has 4 spades higher than the 6. If South applies the Rule of Eleven in this hand he hopes East has only 4 spades because he knows he will then have the bid made.

Application of the Rule of Eleven will save you many tricks by helping you locate key cards. If you don't use it, you should. You can usually tell when a fourth best card is led in a suit. When the card is obviously the fourth best, apply the Rule of Eleven.



## Medical Mirror

Better Health Through Knowledge

### CONTACT LENSES

Q. I have heard many people say that you can go blind from wearing contact lenses. Is this true? Will carrots help improve eyesight?

A. Some people have difficulty in adjusting to contact lenses but we are not aware of medical evidence that they cause blindness. Many competent ophthalmologists (eye specialists) recommend contact lens under certain conditions and we feel certain that they would not do so if blindness might be the result. However, some people insist on wearing contact lenses in spite of undue irritation and this could be dangerous. Carrots contain vitamin A. Lack of vitamin A causes so-called "night blindness," a condition in which dark adaptation is slowed. If one is deficient in vitamin A, eating carrots would probably help. Otherwise, vitamin A has no special effect on eyesight.

### NOSE DROPS

Q. I have hay fever. Nose drops helped at first but now it seems that drops and sprays just cause more clogging. Should I switch to another brand of drops?

A. No. Stop using drops and sprays and see a physician. With continued use, tolerance to such preparations gradually builds up to a point where the more you use the greater the obstruction. See your family doctor or an allergist. If your trouble is due to allergy, specific treatment will help. There may be associated sinus disease or some type of nasal deformity. Such conditions can only be treated by a physician.

## Wayne City School's Policy in Regard To Extracurricular Activities

Last week's "Harbinger" contained several articles regarding student participation in extracurricular activities. This is not a new problem. It is a problem that has not been overlooked by administrators or Boards of Education. It is a problem that has not gone unnoticed in schools across the state of Nebraska and across the nation. This problem has been discussed many times at administrative meetings and staff meetings. Surveys have been taken and the results are the same in every survey. Schools that have enrollments over the 1000 mark and those that have enrollments below the 100 mark have certain students that are very capable of carrying a full load of academic work and are in all activities. Who is a better judge of one's abilities than a person himself or his parents?

Should schools set up a standard that all students have a certain grade average before they can participate in one, two or three activities? This appears to be a workable plan on paper but what about the special cases to consider? What about the student that is not able to receive more than a grade of 3 (average) in academic work? Should he be limited to one or two activities when he has a great interest and talent in band, orchestra, choir and is an outstanding athlete?

Some schools make it mandatory that all students be in at least one extracurricular activity. Authorities feel that these activities are part of an education. Students should be able to judge for themselves when they are overloaded with work. Wayne City Schools do counsel with students that are dropping below their ability and make recommendations to them regarding their balance or imbalance of work. There are just a few isolated cases that need counseling; the rest of the students know their capacity for work. When is the last time you, as a student, have sat down for a self evaluation?
