## Teachers Learn About Latest English Tact

Since practically everybody claims Johnny can't write, 150 teachers and school officials came to Wayne Saturday to learn about new ideas that may overcome Johnny's handicap.

The occasion was a regional conference for English teachers, one of several such meetings arranged by the Nebraska Council of English Teachers. Mrs. Mildred Jones, associate professor of English at Wayne State, expressed pleasure when advance reservations edged over 100. Then she was overjoyed when about 150 appeared, representing 55 schools in NE Nebraska.

Dr. Roy Riggs, head of the WSTC language division, outlined the English teaching problem as he gave a brief welcome talk.

Thomas Fairclough of the University of Nebraska carried on from that point in the main address, explaining how modern linguistic research has produced new insight into the problems of teaching English.

He cited one new text as the leading example of new English instructional methods—a book now being used in some Wayne High classes.

In the afternoon buzz sessions, Miss Ruth Ross explained her use of this text ("English Sentences" by Paul Roberts) at Wayne High since last September.

Fairclough and Miss Ross stepped in at the last hour to lead the session for high school teachers after the scheduled moderator could not come.

Three other buzz sessions, for lower and upper elementary and for junior high grades, gave teachers opportunity to examine some of the new English curriculum materials devised last summer by 44 Nebraska teachers.

These materials will be revised next summer by another study group of English teachers, operating with the financial aid of the Woods Charitable Fund.

Calendar Shows March A Busy Tax Period

The March Tax Calendar shows state personal property taxes are due March 1. Statements of personal property subject to taxation must be filed with the county assessor by that date also.

Then on March 15, Federal income taxes for individuals are due. Other tax points due on March 15 are:

Fourth quarterly installment and last day to file amended declaration of estimated individual income tax for taxpayers on fiscal year ended Feb. 28, 1963.

Individuals (other than farmers) may file final return 1940 by March 31 in lieu of amended estimate.

Third quarterly installment, fiscal year ending June 30, 1963.

Second quarterly installment, fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1963.

First quarterly installment, fiscal year ending Nov. 30, 1963.

Annual return on Form 1040 and adjustment of estimated tax to actual for fiscal year ended Nov. 30, 1962.

Annual declaration of estimated income tax on Form 1040-ES for fiscal year ending Nov. 31, 1963.

Pierce Seeded in Class B Tourney In March at Rice

State Bank Receives Trust Power Authority

The State National Bank of Wayne has been granted authority by the Comptroller of the currency of the United States to operate and offer full trust powers effective February 13.

This means that the bank can now offer a variety of new services including the right to act as trustee, executor, administrator, registrar of stocks and bonds, guardian of estates and investment of common funds.

According to bank president Henry E. Ley, the requirements for such authority include certification with the State of Nebraska, bonding of managing officers under the same contract as that of the bank for \$275,000 each to which the bank has added a million dollar excess bond. An auditing committee is an additional requirement and the bank has engaged an auditing firm of national reputation from Chicago for this purpose.

At a board of directors meeting February 13 the following managing officers were elected: a trust investment committee: Herman Lundberg, Harold E. Hein and Everett E. Rees. Ley was elected trust officer.

Dutch Elm Disease Warnings Start Again

The warnings are out again on Dutch Elm disease, but county agent Harold Ingalls says there is no need for panic about the trees in Wayne.

Ingalls said precautions are always good, but there has not been any of the disease reported in Wayne county that he knows of.

A major precaution against disease, he said, is the removal of dead elm wood. This means dead limbs in the trees as well as dead wood on the ground.

The beetle that carries the disease lives and propagates under the bark of dead elm wood and the removal of the wood cuts greatly the chances of the disease occurring.

# Wildcats Crack Records in 109-82 Win Over Kearney

Every game is a little game now for Wayne State and Peru State as they near the end of conference battle.

Wayne, now leading the NCC at 61, goes to Hastings Friday and Doane Saturday while No. 2 Peru, 6-2, has a single home date with Hastings Saturday. Then Wayne will entertain Peru Thursday, Feb. 28, in what could be the decisive title match.

Wayne's Wildcats, surprising all season, pulled another surprise Saturday. After losing three straight, they whipped Kearney, 109-82, posting several season records in doing it. The 109 Wayne's highest score of the year; the 68 rebounds by the team and the 16 by Al Johnson also high; the free throw attempted and scored, 31 of 43, likewise tops.

Wayne did not easily subdue Kearney, however. The Antelopes rushed close at the half, 43-30, and went ahead briefly after intermission, their last lead, 52-48, coming at 16:40. Half a minute later Wayne went ahead to stay, but needed another 10 minutes or so to put the game in the bag with the knot firmly tied. Second-half field goal accuracy of 62 percent by Wayne and weak free throwing by Kearney proved decisive.

The Wildcats finished with five players shooting in double figures for the first time this season: Ron Jones, 23; Jon Garcia, 21; Al Johnson, 18; Dennis Johnson, 17; and Jim Murphy, 11. The entire Wayne team saw action, all but one scoring.

Gary Mason paced Kearney with 15 before fouling out. Allen Boucher tallied 10.

Wayne goes into the conference climax with an eight-straight win record over Hastings, four straight over Doane, but the Wildcats have lost four in a row to Peru (three last year and one this year).

## Wisner Topples Blue Devils 58-51

The Wisner Bulldogs took advantage of under-par ball handling and shooting on the part of Wayne, and despite a late Devil rally, rolled to a 58-51 victory.

The first two quarters found Wayne unable to keep their game moving. Wisner came up with 8 field goals in the first period and led the Devils 17-10.

Little improvement pleased Wayne in the second quarter while the Bulldogs hit with some consistency and held a ten-point lead 31-21 at intermission.

The Devils found the range in the third quarter and netted 19 points to surge within one point of Wisner, 41-40. Wayne used controlled ball-handling and shortly before the quarter ended led the Bulldogs for the first time since the opening seconds, 39-37.

Wayne then broke for the first four points of the fourth quarter

and led Wisner 45-51. Wisner netted a two pointer and the Devils came right back with two more raising the score to 49-43. Wisner then hit three straight and put the game in a knot, 49-49. Wayne hit another field goal and concluded their scoring, while the Bulldogs added insult to injury by not only winning but raising the margin to seven, 58-51.

Wayne did what they could at the free throw line as Wisner was called for only eight fouls. The Devils received nine charity tosses and made seven for 77%. Wayne committed 13 fouls, giving Wisner 16 free throws. They made good only six of these and had 37%.

Don Meyer led the scoring for Wayne with 20 points. Jim Kern and Jim Mau each contributed 11. Alan Becher had 25 for Wisner and he was followed by Bruce Stigge with 13.

## ACT For College Bound Seniors

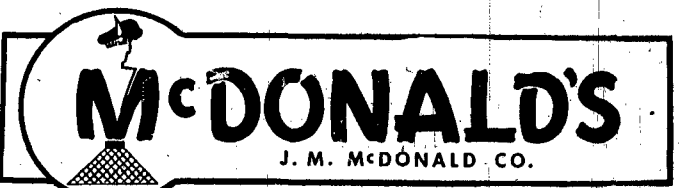
Saturday morning, Feb. 23, the next American College Test will be given at Conn Library on the Wayne State Teacher's College campus.

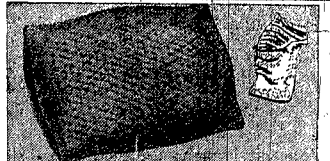

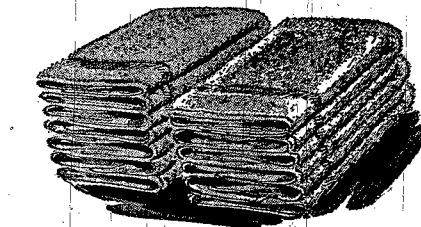

Highway Study Urged

State and local officials have urged the Legislature to adopt a resolution seeking a \$250,000 comprehensive highway needs study.

Sen. Russell, chief introducer of the resolution, said the study would project Nebraska highway needs for the next 20 years.

Verne Harvey, division engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, said the federal government could put up 63 per cent of the funds needed.

Everyone at the hearing agreed the study would serve as a guideline for the Legislature, Governor, and State Highway Department.

Power Disputes

Sen. Clifton Foster, Bradshaw has charged some public power districts with trying to "influence legislation" through their advertisements.

Foster said he has no desire to try to limit "legitimate advertising" by the districts, such as the type which seek to promote the use of electricity in Nebraska.

No Promises

Members of the Nebraska Aeronautics Commission have informed Kimball, Hastings and Omaha they can make no promises for state matching funds for airport projects because the commission budget is still in the hands of the Legislature.

Price Too High

Ervin Stephens, Broken Bow, has offered to sell to the Nebraska Game Commission 2,488 acres, including some 600 acres of lake, in the Sandhills for \$210,000.

Commission Director Mel Steen said he was interested in the land and lake "but disinterested in the asking price."

Steen said preliminary commission studies placed the value of the land at \$150,000. He told Stephens that "maybe we can get together and agree on a price more in line with the commission's thinking."

The Commission, in other action, has promoted Jack Strain, head of the parks division, to administrative head of both the parks and engineering and operations divisions.

Strain will not be the technical head of the engineering and operations division. Applications for the technical head are being processed. The position has been vacant since the death last December of Eugene Baker.

Steen said Strain will not get a large salary, "only an increased work load."

Oat Variety Developed

A new variety of spring oats has been developed by University of Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station researchers, according to Extension Agronomist J. C. Swinbank. The new variety is called Neal.

It has just been officially released and seed for increase is available from the Foundation Seed Division of the University.

"Neal is an early maturing, short-strawed, lodge resistant variety which has produced excellent yields in the southern half of the State, where it is recommended for production."

It is resistant to several races of stem rust, partially resistant to crown rust and appears to have a tolerance of yellow dwarf virus disease.

The grain on Neal is satisfactory for milling as well as for livestock feed, Swinbank said.

Food Technology Scholarship

Nebraska high school seniors, particularly boys, who are interested in the food industry may apply for one of 15 \$300 college scholarships, reports Dr. R. Burt Maxcy, chairman of the food technology committee at the University of Nebraska. Applications are due immediately.

The \$300 college scholarships are being offered for the fourth year by the National Institute of Food Technologists. High school senior boys and girls may obtain additional information by writing: Dr. R. Burt Maxcy, Department of Dairy Husbandry, College of Agriculture, Lincoln, Nebraska.

Most Shrubs Need Pruning

Most older deciduous shrubs need some pruning, says Wayne Whitney, University of Nebraska Extension Horticulturist.

He refers to those shrubs which lose their leaves during the winter—such as lilacs, spiraea, hollyhubs, cranberry and honeysuckle. All shrubs can stand a more severe pruning while they are dormant than during the growing season.

Bridal wreaths and honeysuckle are shrubs that can be trimmed to the ground. The entire plant can be sawed off at ground level and it will regrow the following season—a new shrub on the old root. He says these won't be any bloom the first year—just a nice new vigorous shrub.

Shrub height can be reduced by taking out old wood at the base. Leave the tops of the shrub alone as much as possible. Top pruning—cutting the shrub off at the top—encourages more growth on top.

He explains that new shoots will appear where a pruning cut is made. Therefore he advises making cuts where new growth is wanted.

Food Best Source of Nutrients

Nutrition authorities agree that it's best to buy vitamins and minerals as in the packages provided by nature—healthful foods.

Why then do we spend millions of dollars for vitamin and mineral supplements? These substances can be obtained so much cheaper in our natural foods, states Dr. Josephine Brooks of the division of foods and nutrition at the University of Nebraska.

Food faddists and promoters of vitamin and mineral products have circulated many false ideas about food. For instance, they tell us that all diseases can be cured or prevented by diet. Some diseases are caused by diet irregularities, but these diseases are rarely encountered in the United States.

Or they may say that our soil is so impoverished that foods grown on it are nutritionally inferior. There is no scientific basis for this theory. Peddlers of diet supplements also say our foods today are overprocessed and lose all or most of their valuable nutrients. These promoters overlook the modern food processing methods which preserve or restore nutritional values.

Watch for belittling and extravagant claims—they're an almost sure sign of the faddist or promoter. Remember, the food you can buy in your grocery store can supply you with all the nutrients you need, safely and much less expensively.

Encourage Children to Eat Different Foods Children often resist new foods because of unfamiliar textures, tastes, and consistencies. Offer your child only one new

Capitol News . . . USDA Rapped for Advising On Taxes in Plains States

Some parts of a U. S. Department of Agriculture research report on revenue and expenditure patterns in the Great Plains states have triggered a volley of criticism from a number of Nebraska politicians.

Included in the report was the suggestion that the Plains states in their heavy reliance on state and local, property taxes might be impeding industrial progress.

The USDA report said, "Sales and income taxes are the two productive revenue sources that remain relatively undeveloped in the Plains—though several states are notable exceptions."

Sen. Michael Russell of Omaha, while calling the Legislature's attention to the report, said the USDA should be "broadly condemned" for poking its nose into Nebraska's internal affairs. The action, he continued, amounted to "unwarranted interference" on the part of the federal government into the business of a sovereign state.

Governor Morrison was also quick to criticize the report. "We don't need the federal government or anybody else to advise us on this matter," he said, adding that he would write to Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman and advise him to have the federal government spend more time trying to develop industrial uses for farm products. This would be much more worthwhile, Morrison said, than advising states how local taxes should be levied.

Sen. Carl T. Curtis described the USDA report as "the most outrageous intrusion by the federal bureaucracy in the affairs of a sovereign state that I've ever heard of."

Two economists from the University of Nebraska assisted in preparation of the report. They are Dr. E. B. Schmidt, professor of economics, and Herbert H. Kramer, head of an experiment station.

One part of the report said: "This study attempts no blueprint for the tax systems of the Great Plains region. Its purpose is to describe the situation respecting revenues and expenditures of local and state governments."

Traffic Safety

Nebraska's lawmakers, no doubt influenced to some extent by the state's bad traffic death record last year, have started taking some steps they believe will help eliminate some accidents and deaths.

In recent days, the legislators gave their preliminary OK to a bill calling for installation of two front seat safety belts in every new car sold in the state, starting in 1964.

There was a bit of opposition to the proposal from some senators who felt that the law would be "unenforceable." But it won approval easily.

Also given first round approval is a bill calling for use of reflective material in the manufacture of vehicle license plates starting next year.

Some of the senators said they were impressed with a demonstration given some time ago of the reflective materials. They said they were sure reflective plates would cut down on the needless highway slaughter and would reduce the number of accidents.

Apparently in an effort to help defray the additional costs of the new-type plates, the legislators voted to start issuing them only once every four years, starting in 1968.

Weekly Bridge Tip — Not Too Difficult

This thoughtful play by South defeated declarer on a hand that was 100 per cent certain to make. West returned a spade and sat back and waited for the club trick which was inevitably his.

As dummy's cards are placed upon the table, South should take inventory of his assets and note the structure of the North-South hands. After East has failed to follow to the first lead of hearts it shouldn't take an experienced player long to realize that the contract is certain to be fulfilled, regardless of the location of the king of clubs, barring freak distribution in opponents' hands. The answer, of course, is to strip the North-South hands of their spades and diamonds before throwing West in with the king of hearts. After winning the first trick with the spade king, and the second trick with the ace of hearts, the king of diamonds is played from South. The ace of spades is then led and declarer's last spade is ruffed in North. North's ace of diamonds wins the next trick. North's last diamond is ruffed by South. The North-South hands have now been stripped of spades and diamonds.

West is now given the lead with his king of hearts. His position is hopeless. If he returns a spade or a diamond, declarer merely discards, a club from North as South trumps. If West returns a club, South wins with his queen and ace of clubs and trumps his last club in the North hand. Thus, by stripping the North-South hands of spades and diamonds before conceding the losing trump trick to West, the making of the contract is assured.

Declarer (South), a rather impetuous player, won the opening lead in North with the king of spades. Observing that there were only two hearts outstanding, the jack of hearts was led from North. When East showed out, South quickly decided that he would have to rely on a club finesse to bring home the contract. Therefore, he overtook the jack of trump with the ace and led a small trump, conceding to West the heart trick which must be lost.

He gave us what we have today.

Not too long after that Freedom was gained another day in February chronicled an event that looms large in American history. The birth of Lincoln. During his early lifetime events transpired which threatened the existence of the free nation Washington had given us. Some one big enough, strong enough and just enough had to accept the leadership for the holding together of this nation and the preservation of the Freedom so dearly bought.

From the prairies of Illinois came that man to suffer and finally die, as only one man before him had suffered and died, that his nation might be preserved, Washington and Lincoln gave and held for us everything we have today. All our privileges. Let's not forget that these

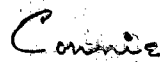

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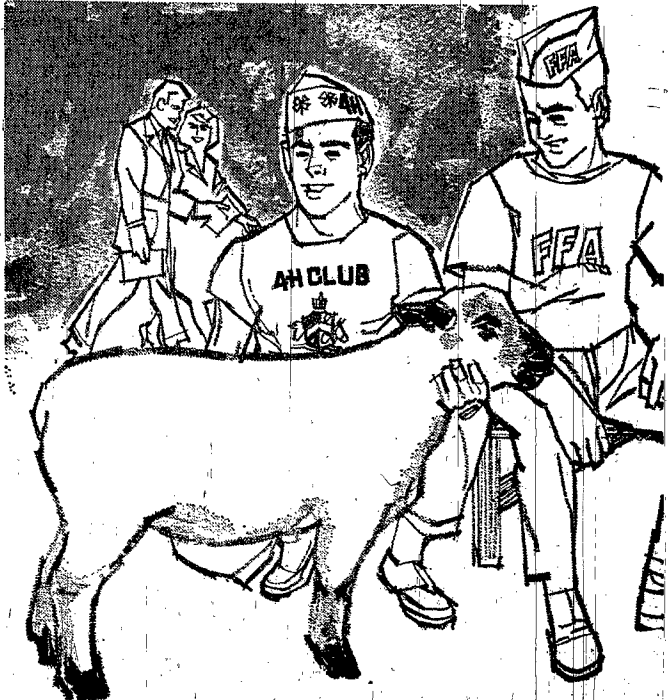
