Most Shrubs Need Pruning
Most older deciduous shrubs
need some pruning, says Wayne
Whitney University of Nebraska
Extension Horticulturist.

He refers to those shrubs
which lose their leaves during
the winter—such as lilacs, spireal highbush cranberry and
honeysuckle. All shrubs can
stadd a more, severe pruning

which lose their leaves during the winter—such as lilacs, spireal highbush cranberry and honeysuckle. All shrubs can stand a more severe pruning while they are dormant than during the growing season.

Bridal wrest and honeysuckle are shrubs that can be trimmed to the ground. The entire plant can be sawed off at ground level and it will regrow the following season — a new shrub on the old root. He says these won't be any bloom the first year—just a nice new vigorous shrub.

Shrub height can be reduced by taking out old wood at the base. Leave the tops of the shrub alone as much as possible. Top pruning—cutting the shrub off at the top—encourages more growth on top.

He explains that new shoots will appear where a pruning cut is made. Therefore he advises making cuts where new growth is wanted.

Food Best Source of Nutrients
Nutrition authorities agree that it's best to huy vitamins and minerals as in the packages provided by nature—healthful foods.

Why then do we spend millions of dollars for vitamin and mineral supplements? These sulfstances can be obtained so much cheaper in our natural foods, states Dr. Joseph in e Brooks of the division of foods and nutrition at the University of Nebraska.

For instance, they tell us that all diseases can be cured or prevented by diet. Some diseases are caused by diet irregularities, but these diseases are rarely encountered in the United States.

Or they may say that our soil is so impoverished that foods grown on it are nutritionally infenior. There is no scientific basis for this theory. Peddlers of diet supplements also say our foods today are overprocessed and lose all or most of their valuable nutrients. These promoters overlook the modern food processing methods which preserve or restore nutritional values.

Watch for belittling and extravagant claims—they're an almost sure sign of the faddist or promoter. Remember, the food you can buy in your grocery store can supply you with all the nutrients you need safely and much less expensively.
