More Patrolmen Asked

Col. C. J. Sanders, head of the Nebraska Safety Patrol, has plac-ed his request for 80 additional troopers before the Legislature's Budget Committee.

Sanders said the patrol force presently totals 209 men but with vacations, sick leave, and days off there are only 63 men per shift to patrol 10,000 miles of state highways.
He said of the Patrol's request for nearly \$5.6 million, about \$1.2 million would foot the bill for the 80 new troopers and one clerk-typist. This includes salaries, cars, uniforms and other equipment.

When asked if the Patrol would lower its standard to get as many as 80 men. Sanders said, "whoever follows me when I rettre in June, if he is from the organization, would never lower standards for patrolmen. If only 50 qualified, only 50 would be put on duty. But I feel we could get 80 men if the Legislature will allow it."

Lots of Water

Nebraska has about 186 times as much water in ground-water storage as is replaced in an average year. Dr. Eugene C. Reed, director of the Conservation and Survey Division at the University of Nebraska, said.

He told the 32nd annual conference of the Nebraska Well Drillers Association, "this is a tremendous resource. The state has a fine future because of its water supply but we can manage it for the greatest good."

Reed cautioned, however, that no water supply is inexhaustible even though it is replaceable because the total supply from all sources will be progressively diminished.

"Nebraska's tremendous ground water supply is like money in the bank to be used when needed," he said. "The amount of water replaced over a period of time is our average income or return of capital to out bank account. If we can learn to manage our ground water bank account setate to future generations."

Might not hurt us to take a look at the type and kind of men, who were among these fifty-six signers. Three of them were rather extraordinary men; Thoma's

Jefferson; John Adams and Benjamin Franklin. When you take
a look at the other fifty-three
you will find them men, whom
you consider ordinary fellows,
coming from all the various
walks of life. Rich men and poor
men. Some educated, others not
sof fortunate. Some young, some
old. Truly a group that had not
too much in common except the
greatest attribute of all, a passionate love for their country.
This bound them together for all
time, and gave them the accolate
of distinction for courage and patrictism wherever freedom is enjoyed.

o were some of these men Who were some of these men-and how did they fare? Well, you know about the roles played by Themas Jefferson, John Adams and Benjamin Frankin, but did you know that Jefferson so ex-hausted his resources that bank-ruptcy faced him in the last years of his life. John Hancock almost ruined himself by contri-buting \$100,000. Robert Morris, another signer, was one of the wealthiest men in America at that time.

In fact, he practically financed the Revblution. He not only gave up all he had, but he obligated himself by bottom is personal word. You can get some idea of what he gavd up by the fact that he had 150 of his merchant ships either sunk or captured during the war, and he died in a debtor's prison.

Then there was John Hart (called Honest John). A New Jersey man, and an old man for those days, for he was 65. He owned grist mills and farms. He didn't have anything to gain in the way of material things by signing, but he remained true to his concept of being true to him self and the worth of human dignity. In turn, he suffered the burning of his mills and his fields were laid waste. He was forced to hide oist-like a hunted animal. Abraham Clark signed, and when he did he signed the death warrant for himself and two sons who were British prisoners of war. Philip Livingston lived with a price on his head until his death. William Floyd and Lewis Maris were exited from their homes for seven years.

So the list goes on. Old man, young man, rich man, poor man every one of them with an ideal in their hearls to bring that ideal fruition, that you and I might have the most precious boon of fleedom, the greatest gift a man can have, and yet my friends, it seems that we sometimes take it for granted.

World Corn

Corn is always growing somewhere in the world. Right now in Southern Hemisphere countries corn lis in the mid-growth stage, and when haivesting begins below the equator farmers up north will be planting corn kernels in fields from Mexico to Bulgaria.

Prespects are that 7.3 billion bushels of dried corn will be produced in 1982-1983, according to preliminary forecasts of the Foreign Agricultural Service of the U.S. Department of Agricultural in 1982, 1983, and the United States, by far the largest corn-producing country,

The United States, by far the largest corn-producing country, accounts for about half of the world total, or 3:59 billion bushels of corn for grain on 5:5.5 million acres, less than one-quarter of the world corn actreage. The explanation of the high bushel output, of course, is, that yields in the United States were at an all-time high of 62.4 bushels per acre. This compares to an estimated world yield of 30.2 bushels per acre.

Over the years many have credited corn as being the greatest crop of the l'United States, Whether measured in acreage, bushels, income or variety of end uses, corn comes out on top. What strikes us as remarkable about this pre-eminence of corn is that it may very well have been true throughout our history. H is to n i a n s frequently have made the point that maize or Indian corn was the main food crop of all of the American colonies. So widespread was its use that it was considered more precious than silver and was accepted as payment for bush taxes and debts, For a time Massachusetts even used corn kernels as ballots in public voting.

As the nation expanded westward, so went the cornficids. Abundant harrests supported the thoneers and their livestock and eventually made the United States the granary of the world.

Wayne Whitney, University of Nebraska Extension horticulturist, has some early-bird words of advice for gardeners. First, he reminds that seed left from last year may or may not be suitable for planting. Unused seed should be kept in a cool, dry place, protected from fodents. He says seeds of onion, salsify, parsnips, and sweet corn rapidly lose their germinating ability. Unused seeds for other common vegetables should give satisfactory stands up to three years. But sow them somewhat thicker. Whitney feels that good seed is usually not expensive. He says it definitely dozen't pay to get poor quality seed. He also doesn't feel it, pays to save seeds from crops grown in your garden. You may inherit some of last year's disease problems. Also commercial seedsmen can furnish superior seed at a very low cost.

Finally, he recommends selecting varieties won't do well even for the expert gardener.
