Pick School and Council Candidates at Caucus

With the city and school caucuses completed, a full slate of candidates was selected by both parties.

In the city caucuses, the Citizens party nominated incumbent Ed Smith for first ward councilman, Arnie Beeg from the second ward and Dr. Lyle Seymour in the third ward.

The Popular party nominated Bill Kugler in the first ward, Cliff Weil in the second ward and incumbent Chris Tietgen in the third ward.

The Citizens party nominated Mrs. Henry Ley and Dallas Wendt for the two openings on the school board while the Popular party nominated Don Echtenkamp and Benjamin Bensten for the school board. None of the candidates are incumbents.

In the party chairman election, Donald Reed was elected Popular party chairman and Mrs. Ruth Ellis secretary. The Citizens party re-elected K. N. Parke chairman and Al Kern secretary.

To date, city clerk Howard Witt reported no petitions had been filed with him. Deadline for filing of petitions for the April 2 election is 5 p.m. March 12.

Wayne Business Men Attend Governor's Meeting in Lincoln

Six Wayne businessmen attended the Nebraska Governors conference on community betterment and industrial development in Lincoln last Wednesday. They were K. N. Parke, Dallas Wendt, Ted Babe, Alvin Voorhes, Cal Comstock and Alan Cramer.

Morning program included a welcome by the mayor of Lincoln, D. L. Tyrrell, and an address by Governor Morrison. Speakers talked on various phases of industrial development in the small community.

After lunch the group was divided into two sessions, one on industrial development and the other on community planning. Babe and Wendt attended the community planning session while the other Wayne men sat in on the industrial conclave.

Dr. Johnson Gives Up Social Science Chairmanship Post

Dr. J. R. Johnson will give up his duties as chairman of Wayne State's social science division next fall, but he will continue to teach. President W. A. Brandenburg said following a State Normal Board meeting last week.

The senior member of Wayne's faculty, Dr. Johnson will have reached the age when staff members must relinquish administrative duties, as required by the Normal Board policy. Division chairmanships are included in such administrative duties. The policy permits such personnel to continue teaching until mandatory retirement at age 68.

Dr. Johnson joined the Wayne faculty in 1935. A historian of note in Nebraska, he currently serves as chairman of the Nebraska Historical Landmarks Council, and he is vice-president of Wayne County Historical Society.

Named by the Normal Board as chairman of the division succeeding Dr. Johnson is Dr. Warren A. Williams, now teaching at Hope College, Holland, Mich. He earned his bachelor's degree at Wake Forest College, his master's and doctor's degrees at the University of North Carolina, and he has done post-doctoral study at Michigan.

The board also appointed three others to the faculty, all effective in September.

Harold D. Johansen will be an associate professor of business with additional duties in the office of the dean of administration. He is a candidate for the Ph.D. next summer.

Harvard W. McLean, also a candidate for the Ph.D. at Iowa University, will be an assistant professor of education.

Guy J. Hale, candidate for a master's at Missouri this summer, will be an instructor in mathematics.

Legislature Approves Lottery Bill Friday

County Attorney Charles McDermott reported Monday that a lottery law was passed in the Nebraska Unicameral last week. The law is very similar in content to that which the voters of Nebraska passed Nov. 6, 1962. The new law carries the "emergency clause" which puts it into force immediately.

Under the new legislation some give-away promotions have been legalized which heretofore have been forbidden. Interested parties should consult their attorneys if considering an advertising campaign in conjunction with a drawing or giveaway. Next week's Wayne Herald will carry a resume of the new law.

Relate History of County 4-H Clubs and Members

Wayne County 4-H club members are taking part in a statewide 4-H Career Exploration Survey during National 4-H Club Week, March 2-9.

Harold Ingalls, County Extension Agent, says that Nebraska's 35,000 4-H club members are taking part in the career survey as a means of getting firsthand information about the work in which they are interested or curious. Each 4-H member will interview two adults who are working in the club member's major field of interest.

Before making the interview each member will discuss career opportunities with their parents. Then he or she will decide who to contact for an interview.

"The interviewing experience will prove both interesting and beneficial to each 4-H club member," Ingalls said. "In addition tabulation of the survey will provide useful information in selecting and developing Extension 4-H programs designed to help members prepare for their chosen career."

The importance of knowing the requirements for a particular field of work cannot be over emphasized. An increasing number of persons in the U. S. find themselves unemployed because they are not trained for the positions that are open.

Through the 4-H Career Exploration Survey, men and women in Wayne County can make a real contribution to the leaders of tomorrow by taking a few minutes to talk with 4-H club members about the educational needs and opportunities in their particular field of work.

4-H Clubs, Foundation for Careers in Wayne County

One of the first 4-H leaders in Wayne County was Dr. W. M. Hawkins, veterinarian, who came to Wayne in 1921. Dr. Hawkins relates that he organized a livestock club at Wayne in 1922 with the encouragement of H. J. Miner, then president of the Wayne County Fair.

Eight calves fed in this first club were sold at auction in the Sioux City Stockyards by Don Cunningham.

As 4-H membership grew, finding exhibit space at the county fair was a constant problem. One of the early fund raising events was an auction of donated items sold by Don Cunningham. Seven hundred and fifty dollars was realized toward construction of the present 4-H livestock exhibit barn. Don Cunningham was mentioned on many occasions for lending his help and influence toward the success of 4-H club work.

Dr. Hawkins mentions that earlier 4-H clubs were in existence in the Carroll area. These were girls' home economics clubs. Through his influence, livestock clubs were organized at Winslow and Hoskins.

Records going back to 1894, when the first county agent was employed, are available in the county extension office. These show more than two thousand former 4-H members with three hundred twenty-five different leaders.

Dr. Hawkins, living at Heron Lake, Minn., provided us with information on the 1921-1934 period in a letter dated January 8, 1958. He mentions these families participating in the early 4-H program: Claycomb, Herman, Alecker, Meyer, Grimm, Carlson, Auker, Heikes, Grier, Sydow, Harder, Von Seggen, Lessman, Shields, Splittgerber, Anderson and many others whose names were not recalled.

Dr. Hawkins relates this incident: "The Claycomb brothers were faithful 4-H members and at the time the high school band was organized, Frank purchased a horn and practiced for the band. One evening after school I was out at Claycomb's farm, and John, who was a very serious minded sort of a boy, was busy feeding his 4-H pigs. I didn't see Frank and I inquired of John where he was and he said he was at band practice. I asked John if he was going to join the band and he said he wasn't. He threw some more corn into the pig pen and turned to me and said, "You can't make any money blowing a horn."

No doubt other 4-H leaders can relate interesting incidents.

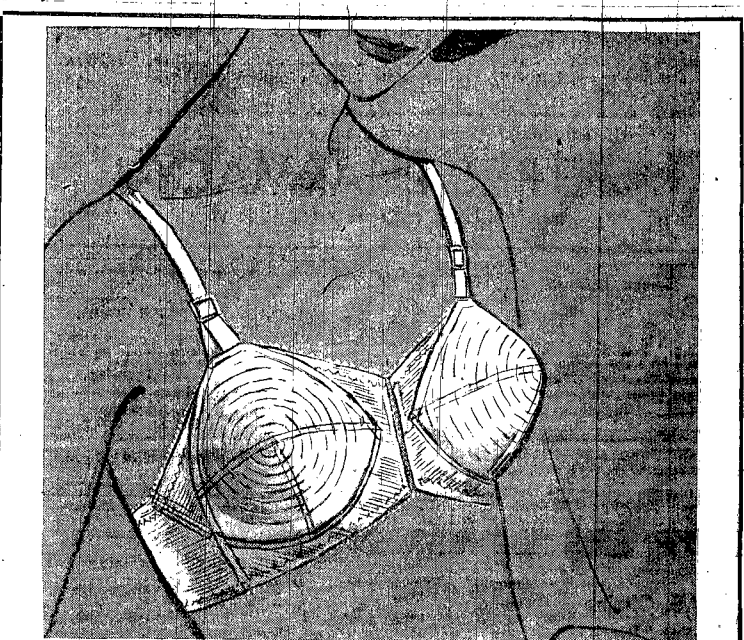

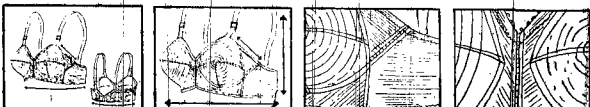

Wildcats Earn NAAI Playoff Battle with Peru Tonight

Wayne State's basketball prospects took a roster hit Monday night as the Wildcats smashed Omaha university and set sights on the final playoff game with Peru State tonight.

The District NAAI clash is scheduled for 7:30 in Fremont's City Auditorium, whose seating capacity likely will be taxed to the limit.

The Wildcats, off and on all season, certainly have been "on" for the last two crucial games. Thursday at home they humbled Peru, 92-58, to earn a conference title to play Peru.

Then Monday night they battled a tough Omaha defensive quint into 73-55 submission. In both games the Wayne defense was a bear trap, constantly snapping shut on opposition thrusts.

Such defense, coupled with a poised offense, finally demoralized both Peru and Omaha, changing what started as on-saw games into complete routs.

The going against Peru is not likely to be easy tonight, however. At stake is a ticket to the national NAAI tournament for the

The big question will be this: Can the Wildcats again turn the thermostat down on the Peru defense? Observers of the game last Thursday figured that if Peru suffered a chilly night, part of the chill could be credited to Wayne's performance.

Towering Chuck Peterson turned in his best defensive games of the year against Peru and Omaha, with 15 and eight rebounds respectively. His snappy board work, plus ball hawking by others, repeatedly forced both opponents into errors or hasty shots.

Against Peru, Dennis Johnson hit 30 points, Ron Jones 23, and against Omaha they hit 16 and 15.

The remarkable feature of Wayne's victory over Peru was the fact that Wayne lost four players by fouls and was called for 21 fouls, but still produced a 92-58 rout. Peru lost two to fouls and had 19 fouls. Peru's shooting to complete routs.

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

Student Council Hashes Over "Outsider" Question

The Student Council of Wayne High held their scheduled meeting last Friday afternoon and chose Mrs. Hinkley as their second sponsor. First sponsor is Mr. Dean.

Meeting dates for the council were changed from after school during the school day. The periods will rotate so as not to interfere with any one class two consecutive times.

A discussion was held on whether Latin should be introduced to the curriculum at

Wayne next year. It was decided to write to other schools who presently offer Latin within their system and get their opinions on its values.

The council also discussed whether outsiders should be allowed at high school dances. Superintendent Westergaard, who was present at the meeting, said this about the proposal.

"The student council discussed at quite some length at Friday's meeting the possibility of inviting

outsiders to school dances. Several of the students have boy friends or girl friends not enrolled at Wayne City Schools. These Wayne High students do not attend the dances because their friends cannot go.

"The school administration takes a different look at this than the students that brought this to the attention of the council. They do not feel that there is a problem at the dances with NOT enough students with "dates" that dance only with each other; rather, the problem lies with getting those that come alone to the dance to get together and dance. By admitting outsiders it would be adding to the problem already present. School sponsors feel that it is not necessary that they sponsor

dances for people other than the student body.

"When the sponsors get the students off the sidelines for "mixers" it is those with "dates" who want to run to the sidelines and "sit out." School dances should not be a place that encourages dating. It should be an activity to which a boy or girl can come as much as he or she wishes. The problem has not been solved; bringing outsiders to the dance doesn't solve it, either."

To which Gary Lorenzen, Student Council president, replied: "We, the student council, feel along with the administration that the problem has not been solved. Perhaps inviting outside guests is not the answer. We know that everyone feels that the participation of students attending school dances can be improved. The members of the student council encourage the student body to voice their opinions to their class representatives on what should be done. We plan to discuss this further at our next meeting. Since this is a problem concerning the entire student body, it is hoped that everyone will help in solving the problem."

The student librarians are Delores Larsen, Linda Thompson, Eileen Cunningham, Larry Larsen, Delmar Raufson, Verna Mae Hansen, Carolyn Koskan, and Jerry Meyer.

The audiovisual equipment is also stored in the library. Students are trained to run the machines and it's up to them to get them to the proper rooms on time. Some of the students who do this are Larry Nelson, Bill Luaders, Tom Mau, Craig Costello, Bob Reeg and Dean Weible.

The number of people in the study hall at a session is between 70 and 94. Approximately 160 books are checked out daily. The library is open before and after school for students who need it.

Some of the new books are "Elizabeth the Great," "Ishj in Two Worlds," "Fighters for Peace," "The Astronauts," "The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich," "John Foster Dulles, Peacemaker," and "The Life Treasury of American Folklore."

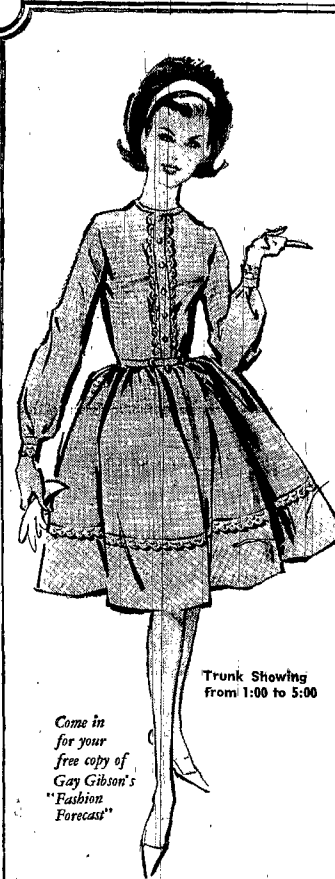

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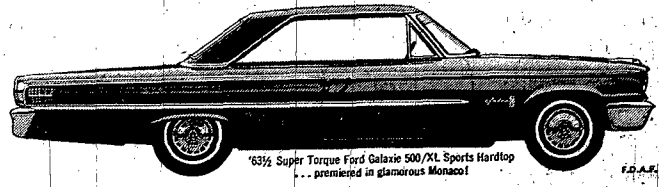

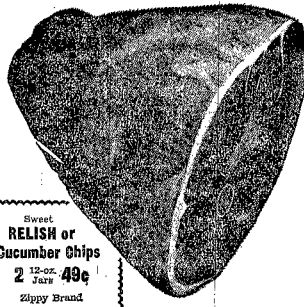
