The largest crowd of the current legislative session turned up for a bill which would repeal a Nebraska statute forbidding marriages between white persons and those possessed of one eighth or more Negro, Japanese or Chinese blood.

Similar bills have been killed with regularity in committee in recent sessions. This time, however, the measure was advanced to the floor of the Unicalmeral where it is expected to stand a good chance at passage.

The bill was moved out of the Judiciary Committee on a 4-3 vote, after an effort to get it killed failed when it mustered only three votes.

Another large crowd was on hand when the Labor and Public Welfare Committee took testimony on a bill to prevent abuse of farmers and ranghers attempting to market commodities.

That bill also got committee approval. It seeks to include the right to pursue farming and ranching enterprises, in the lawful right to work statute and grant them protection during purchase of supplies or marketing of commodities.

During the public hearing frequet reference was made to the actions of the National Farmers Organization (NFO) during last year's livestock holding action.

Earl Luff, speaking for the Nebraska Chambers of Commerce and Associated Industries, said "when the original law was written, agriculture was overlooked. No one dreamed the problems which have faced the agricultural industry in recept months would ever come about."

He said, "Conditions are created that breed gangster-like violence endangering lives and property. The force of a clear and positive law is needed to discourage those who would indulge in such activity."

Sen. T. C. Reeves of Central City, introducer of the bill, said it "will not eliminate holding practices, as NFO carried out but control them. Anyone who harvests a crop or raises livestock should have access to the market."
