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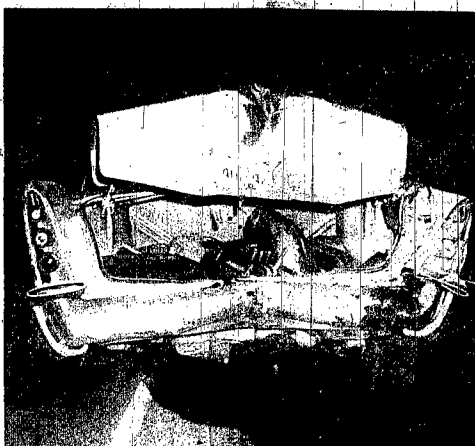
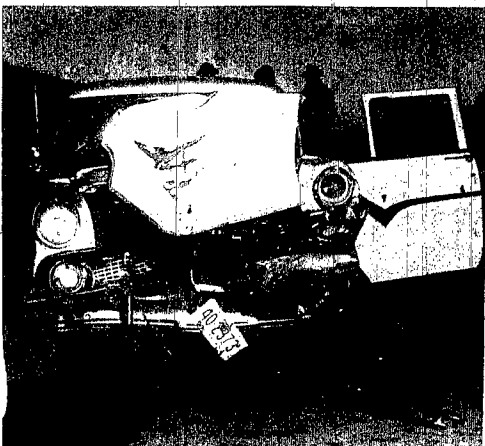

## Anna Welch, 101, Resident Since 1884, Died Wednesday

Mrs. Anna Welch, 101, died last Wednesday at Wayne hospital following a lengthy illness. Mrs. Welch, the former Anna Davies, was born June 20, 1861 at Glamorgan, Wales. She came to this country with her parents when she was three.

The family settled in Plymouth county, Ia. In January 1884, she came to fill a vacancy in the Wayne city schools. Shortly after her arrival in Wayne she became a member of the Presbyterian church.

She was married Nov. 17, 1885 to A. A. Welch, who was then superintendent of the city school. Mr. Welch later became county superintendent and then formed a law partnership with F. M. Northrop. Later he was associated with R. B. Davis and then was appointed district judge. Mrs. Welch was active in the church, women's societies and Sunday school.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the United Presbyterian church. Dr. Oliver B. Proett officiated at the rites. Russell Anderson sang "Nearer, Still Nearer" and "Oh Love That Will Not Let Me Go." Franklin Philleo was organist. Pallbearers were Leslie Ellis, Dr. Walter Benckath, Don Wightman, Dave Hamer, William Mellor and Joe Corbit. Burial was in Greenwood cemetery.

She was preceded in death by her husband in 1928 and a son, Herbert in 1930. Survivors include a son, Judge Leslie Welch, Kansas City; a daughter, Mrs. Harry (Florence) Armstrong, Sioux City; six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

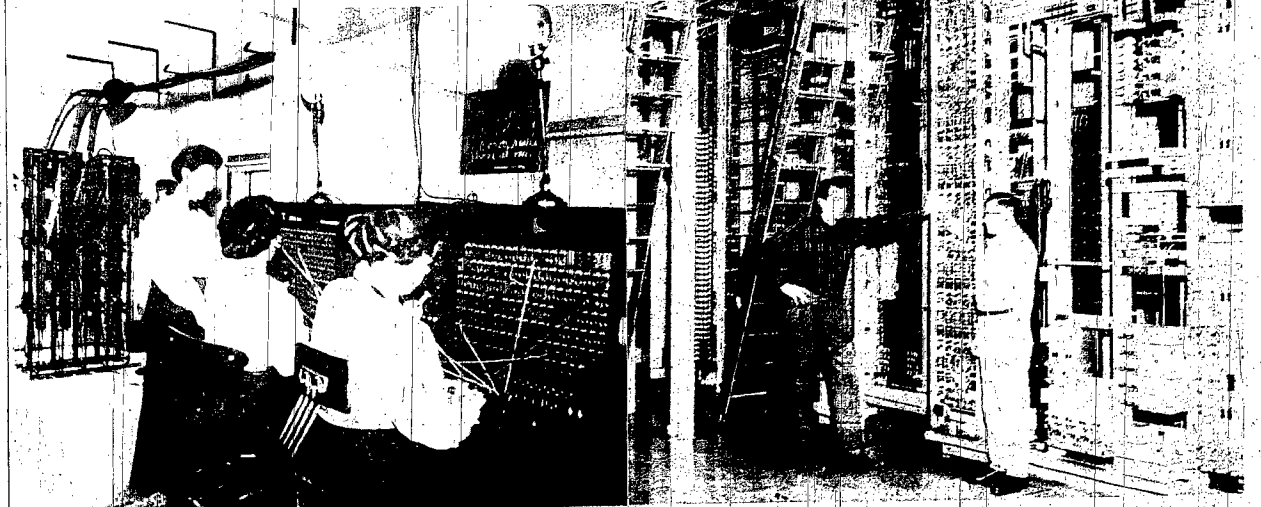
## Traffic Safety Meeting Well Attended Thursday

Sixty-three people from six Northeast Nebraska counties attended the Traffic Safety Conference here Thursday, sponsored by the Nebraska Council of Home Extension Clubs and the Nebraska Agricultural Extension Service.

Mrs. Louis Fear, president of the Nebraska Council of Home Extension Clubs, emphasized the importance of learning right attitudes towards safety at an early age.

George Nothhelfer, manager of the Omaha Safety Council, in his speech, "The Driver's Life Line—Seat Belts," said a survey of statistics shows that persons involved in a car accident where they might be thrown from the car have a 60 percent better chance of survival when wearing seat belts. A film was shown featuring the use of seat belts by a safety council committee making a study of fatalities in car accidents.

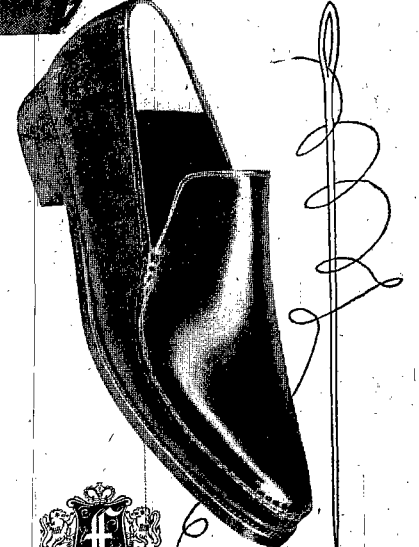

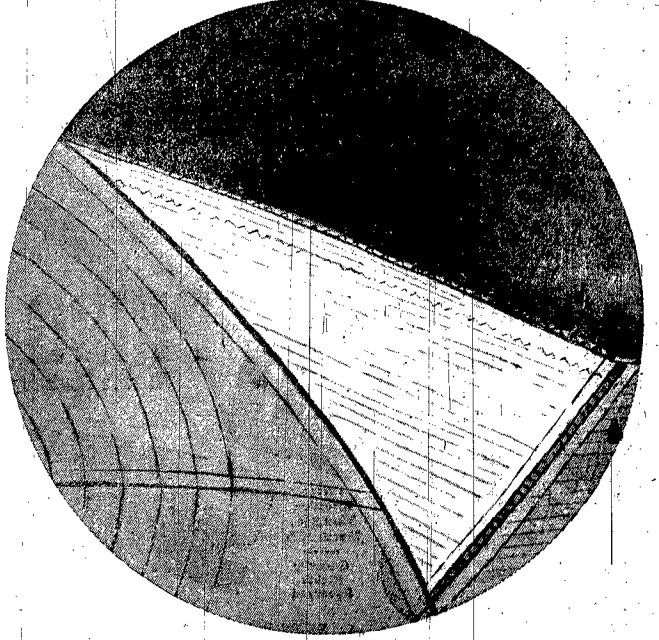

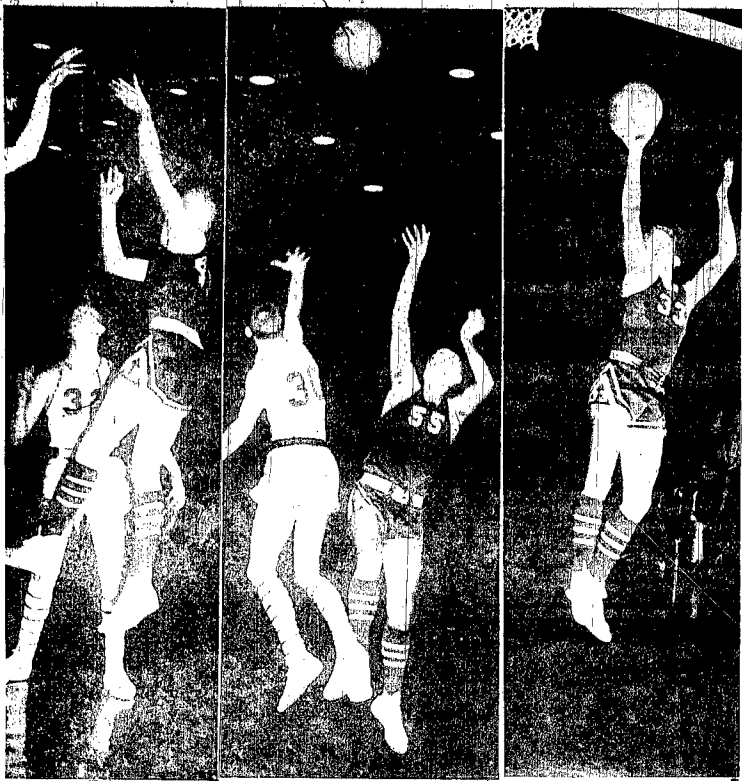

## Blue Devils Fall Short In State Tourney Bid

The Wayne Blue Devils pushed the Pierce Bluejays right up to the last second in the Class B playoff Saturday, but were unable to overcome the lead Pierce built up in the three periods.

Pierce took command of the game after both teams struggled along for nearly three minutes

The Devils dropped farther behind in the second stanza as the scoring evened out on both teams. Wayne bottled up Hoefener for only five points, three of those on free throws.

With 11 seconds to go, and the score 64-62 for Pierce, the leaders had a chance at the free throw line. But the Bluejay rebounded the shot and Wayne muffed, calling time out immediately.

Wayne put the ball into play but a bad pass gave it back to Pierce and Wayne fouled. This used up six seconds and Pierce was again at the free throw line, still two ahead and only five seconds in the game.

Again the lid was on for Pierce, Wayne rebounded and called time out.

With five seconds left, Wayne took the ball out at the far end of the court and hurried into play. Ken Olds got the only shot, but even then the buzzer sounded as he began the shot which missed.

So ended the Devils' bid for a state tourney berth.

In gaining the playoff, the Devils defeated Laurel 65-51 and Hartington Holy Trinity, 76-38.

Wayne State sprinter Darrell Reiffenrath notched an honor as one of only two winners not representing Kearney. Omaha's Jim Foster won the broad jump. Reiffenrath scooted over the 75-yard dash in 7.6 for a blue ribbon. He also claimed third in the 220 dash.

Bill Nelson, Wayne, likewise

placed twice—tying for second in the high jump at 6-0. Teammate Bob Schroeder was included in the four-way tie at that height.

Ron Buelt earned Wayne a fifth in the 440; Bob Fulstone fourth and Carl Owczarzak fifth in the two-mile run; Ed Humpal, a close second in the shot put with a 49-5 second, 5 1/2 inches behind the winner. Wayne's two-mile relay team was fourth.

In the conference finale, Wayne redeemed these losses with the 92-58 bombing of Peru to earn a title tie with Peru.

Statistically, the tie seemed logical as the two teams were almost identical in all respects, and their playoff game could not have been closer.

Seniors Ron Jones and Dennis Johnson topped not only the team but the conference in scoring. Jones totaled 457 points, averaging 16.2 in 28 games, while Johnson hit 387, averaging 15.4. They were No. 1 and 2 in the NCC with 218 and 188 respectively.

Jones' 457 total is the third highest ever scored by a Wayne player in one season, exceeded only by Larry Coney's 512 and 487.

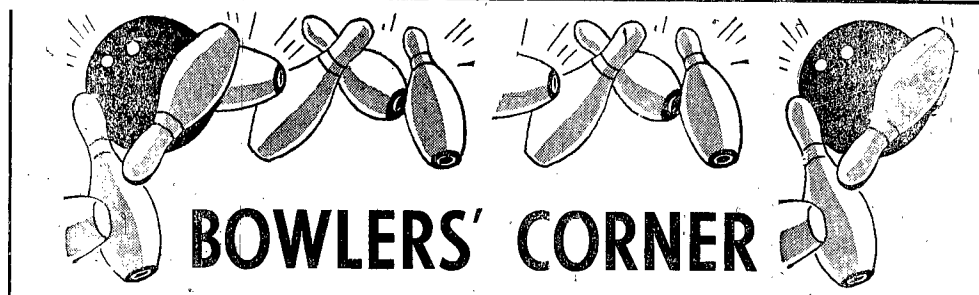

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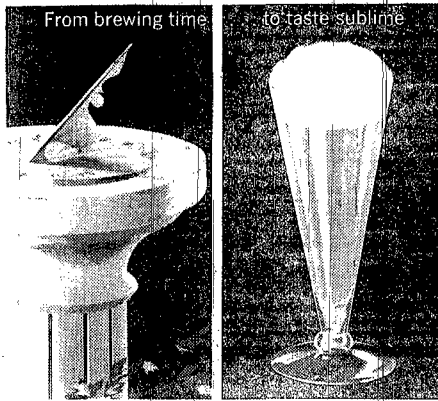

### DRUGS AND DRIVING

Q. Do drugs, especially tranquilizers, affect driving ability?

A. Various drugs which act on the central nervous system can affect the performance of everyday acts such as driving a car or operating a power tool. This would include tranquilizers, sedatives, energizers, etc. Most tranquilizers do not seriously impair performance. However, the amount of drug taken must also be considered, with larger doses producing more pronounced effects. In addition, little is known about the build-up of such drugs in patients who take medication day after day. Although there have been no known instances of such build-up, a point might be reached where marked effects on driving ability would be noticed.

### TOO TALL

Q. I am 14 and have developed about like most girls my age. However, I am somewhat taller than my friends and this has me worried. Is there anything I can do to stop growing?

A. Doctors have ways of retarding growth in some cases but you are probably over-concerned. After the menarche (onset of menstruation) most girls (about 80 per cent) grow less than 4 inches in height. Doctors don't know why the other 20 per cent fail to respond to the braking of growth in a similar fashion. In any case, you have much more than an even chance of not growing much taller.

## 585 People Served Daily At School Cafeteria

### Nine Women Needed To Prepare Food

It is a human trait to take certain situations for granted. Things we do as the days go by gradually become habits and sooner or later we tend to forget their true meaning. This can be applied to the meals which we receive at the cafeteria.

We all take our daily flight down to the elementary school, get our meal tickets punched, go through the line, get our trays of food, sit down to eat it, take the milk bottles to the rack and the trays to the counter, get our coats, and then return to the high school to begin our classes. We don't bother to think about all the preparation that has gone into the meal.

Do you know how many pounds of meat are served a day at the cafeteria? On Valentine's Day the cooks prepared 12 turkeys for our meal and on an average day they prepare 100 pounds of meat. Also, the cooks prepare about 900 servings

each day they place food on 585 trays. On the day they served the Christmas dinner the women served 665 people.

The women working at the cafeteria this year, in addition to Mrs. Summers are Mrs. Rolfe Longe and Mrs. Clair Stoakes, dessert bakers; Mrs. Robert Stanley and Mrs. Russell Beckman, bread bakers; Mrs. Edna Nissen, salads and vegetables; Mrs. Bill Schriber and Mrs. John Dall, meat dishes; Mrs. Martin Willers washes the trays. By the way, how would you like to wash trays from 11:30 until 3:30? Mrs. Willers does!

Yet the students pay only 30c each day for their cafeteria meals. The money collected from the students covers the day-to-day costs of the lunch program. It pays the salaries of the employees and pays for all the purchased food. The school district provides the facilities for cooking and eating the lunches.

# THE PAY-OFF IS IN THE . . .

Systemized farming, which includes the orderly growth of farm automation, is becoming the most important means for achieving success on today's farms. TOP FARMER asked Dick Walburn of Badger Northland, Inc. (one of the Country's leaders in farm automation) to tell us what is causing this big surge in farm automation, what are some of the problems to consider and what can be expected in the future. Here are some of his comments:

"Necessity is the mother of invention" . . . and necessity brought about mechanization on the farm. Two factors were chiefly responsible . . . one was the shortage of hired help that existed after World War II, and the other was the cost-price squeeze that evolved during this period.

Dairy farmers were the first to mechanize, adopting the barn cleaner to do their cleaning. Mechanized feeding was not as readily accepted by the dairy farmer as the beef farmer; however as herds have grown larger, mechanized feeding has become more important. Without mechanization, these two chores took a good portion of the working day (in addition to being a back-breaking job) and limited the number of animals one

man could manage properly. When the price of milk dropped, a farmer had but two choices if he wanted to stay in business: (1) Increase his production or (2) Lower the cost of his present production. Either way, he had to mechanize.

Beef farmers have been faster to adopt mechanized feeding than dairy farmers. They were hard hit by the cost-price squeeze of the 50's, and mechanical feeding was one of the solutions to their problems. Greater silage utilization has developed in an effort to cut the cost of gains, plus supply consumer demand for leaner meat.

The advent of high moisture corn storage, in concrete or steel silos, has done much to advance the cause of stored feeding programs. Feeding beef animals at a medium or high level of silage, plus a proper amount of corn and protein supplement results in a carcass grade that is little below that of animals on a high energy ration. Feeding silage not only allows a farmer to produce meat at a lower cost but allows him to raise more meat per acre.

Hog farmers have been the last to enter into mechanization. Mechanized feeding and cleaning would have reached them eventually; however,

their entry was hastened by the market conditions of 1959 and '60. Hog producers turned to confined feeding and farrowing programs, and slanted their efforts toward producing leaner meat at lower cost. Self-feeders and overhead grain augers have become very popular. Manure removal has remained the hog farmers' big problem. Although some lagoons have proved successful, many problems remain unsolved. Badger Northland dealers have installed both barn cleaners and augers in hog houses for removing manure, and both have proved successful. Current trend in hog manure removal is through the use of lagoons. This method results in the loss of the manure and also creates a dispersal problem of the effluent. Pollution of neighboring streams, surface as well as underground, seems to be inevitable with this method of removal and it is doubtful if the public will tolerate lagoon operation over a period of time.

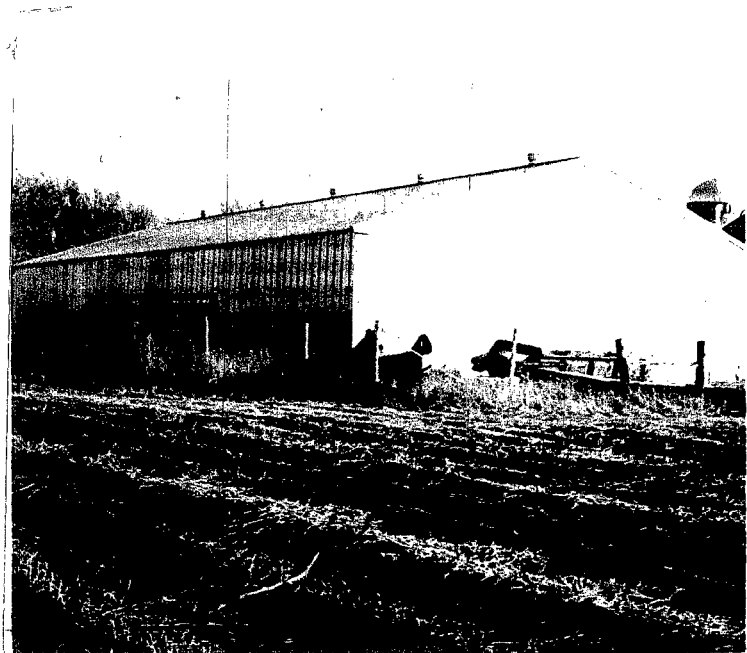
## TOMORROW'S FEEDING METHODS

### Dairy

Very limited pasturing will be used, probably only on land that is suited for little else. Hay-making on a large scale will not be practiced unless means are found to distribute this feed mechanically. Limited hayfeeding will be done in self feeders. Pelleting of feeds is not too apt to become common practice unless more economical means of pelleting can be devised. Low moisture grass silage and corn silage will become the two most important feeds to a dairyman. Oat silage will also become more widely adapted by dairy farmers. Dairymen using high energy, high protein silages will probably cut the amount of grain and concentrates they presently use. Free stall housing, a recent development, will replace loose housing, and many stanchion barns. Indoor feeding with mechanical bunk feeders will become common practice on free stall setups; however the trend to outside feeding should continue strong. A mechanical method of distribution will probably be developed for "in-stall" feeding. All feeding will be done mechanically. A single man operation will produce 1,000,000 lbs. of milk. Fully mechanized, one man will be able to manage 65 to 80 milk cows. Many of these operators will have their heifers raised by contracting.

### Beef

Confined feeding will be used in every phase of beef operations, from brood cows to finished

All rations will be premeasured and premixed as they are fed, providing a perfectly balanced ration. Low moisture grass silage, corn silage and high moisture corn will form the bulk of the feeding requirements in the Corn Belt. Sorghum silage and low moisture grass will be fed in the south. Trench or bunker silos in the south and southwest will be replaced by upright structures on all but the largest farms. Even then, the "silos in the ground" will be mechanized. Barn cleaners will become a common sight in feedlots as operators continue to mechanize every phase of their operation. Indoor feeding will become more prevalent as operators strive not only to control the feeding of their animals, but their environment as well.

## Hogs

Confined feeding and farrowing of hogs will be stepped up greatly in the next couple years. Many operators will completely control the environment of these hogs. Inside feeding with climatic controls will be commonplace in the Corn Belt. Fewer hogs will be run with cattle as beef farmers turn to heavier silage feeding. Units for feeding out 5,000 head a year will not be uncommon. Average operators will turn out a minimum of 1,000 head annually. S P F hogs will probably become prominent as operators strive for greater efficiency. Pasturing or partial confinement on pasture will only be practiced by smaller operators. Silage feeding (corn silage and low moisture grass) to sows will be commonly practiced. "Limited feeding" is fast being adopted by hog farmers in an effort to produce leaner meat with a better feed conversion ratio. Putting hogs on limited feed results in a slightly longer feeding period but this is offset by a better market price and lower cost of gain. Manure problems will be greatly increased with these larger setups; however, we don't believe lagoons are the answer. More and more barn cleaners, and augers, are being installed in these units. Mechanical removal of manure into holding tanks looks promising. The manure is turned into a liquid which can be pumped out into a tank spreader, and from here it is spread on the fields to take advantage of its fertilizing value.

## SYSTEMATIC FARMING

Some farmers, like Mr. Knute D. Knutson, Rt. No. 3, Janesville, Wisconsin, have a sixth sense for planning their own systematic operation that matches the best of them.

Like many successful farm operations, some of the basic improvements on the 375-acre Knutson farm came slowly over the years . . . but they all fit into one master plan that is now beginning to pay off in a handsome way.

"We're not trying to build a show place here," proclaimed the Norwegian-born Knutson. "We're directing our every effort and plan toward a business farming operation that will make money."

It was back in 1944, just after the Knutsons moved on their newly acquired farm that the step-by-step plans started falling into place. "Even though we have had a basic aim in our planning, we have always allowed for flexibility. This is essential in any good farming operation," observed Knutson. "Change is part of our business."

The past, present, and future as illustrated, shows why the Knutsons' operation is the success that it is.

Son Don, at right, has just obtained a degree in animal husbandry from the University of Wisconsin and is assuming a major role in the expanding farm operation. "He'll take over more and more as time goes on," his father exclaimed. "This is one reason we are planning and investing so strongly for the years ahead."

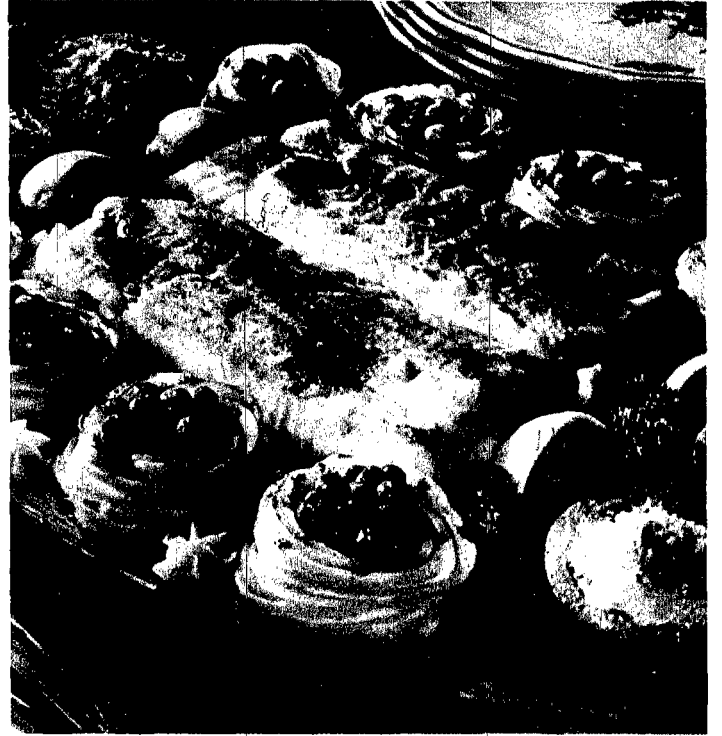

Then there are vegetable dishes upon which we can lavish our imagination in transforming into main dishes. Give your Lenten meals a lift by varying your basic foods.

If you're looking for interesting ideas seafood always provides a ready answer. Creamed tuna needs only a little "face-lifting" by combining with shrimp to become Seafood Supreme or some other tempting main dish, while frozen fish offers marvelous fare.

Versatile cheese combines well with almost any food for an entree — it proves especially delicious when used with shrimp and mushrooms, possibly in a casserole . . . ## SAVORY BAKED PERCH

1 package (12 ounces) frozen perch fillets, partly thawed	1½ tablespoons chopped onion
Melted butter, salt, and pepper	1½ tablespoons diced green pepper
⅛ teaspoon basil	2 tomatoes, cut into wedges
	Salt, pepper, and butter

Thaw fish just enough to separate fillets. Arrange in greased shallow baking dish. Brush with melted butter. Season with salt and pepper. Sprinkle basil, onion, and green pepper over the fish.

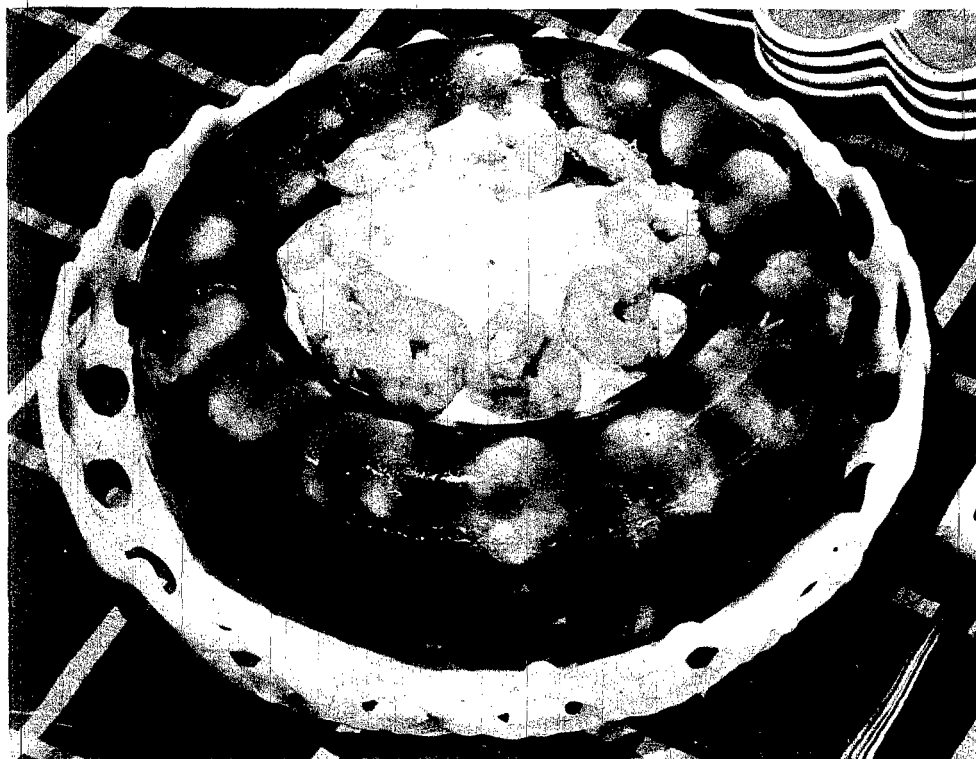
Bake in hot oven (400°F.) 15 minutes. Then remove from oven, arrange tomato wedges around fish, season with salt and pepper, and dot with butter. Return to hot oven and bake about 15 minutes longer, or until fish is easily flaked with a fork. Makes 3 servings.



## JELLIED SHRIMP SALAD

2 envelopes unflavored gelatine	⅛ teaspoon pepper
1 cup cold canned mixed vegetable juices	2 tablespoons lemon juice
2¾ cups hot canned mixed vegetable juices	2 5-ounce cans shrimp, drained
½ teaspoon salt	¾ cup diced celery
	¼ cup diced green pepper

Soften gelatine in cold vegetable juices. Dissolve thoroughly in very hot vegetable juices, stirring well. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Chill until the mixture is the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Fold in shrimp, celery and green pepper. Turn into large ring mold or 8 individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold on salad greens. Serve with mayonnaise or salad dressing. Yield: 8 servings.

## PLANKED FLOUNDER FILLETS

- 2 packages (12 ounces each) frozen flounder fillets
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- Salt, pepper, and paprika
- 1 package (3 1/4 ounces) whipped potatoes
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 ripe tomatoes, halved
- Grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 package (9 ounces) frozen Italian green beans
- 4 lemon wedges

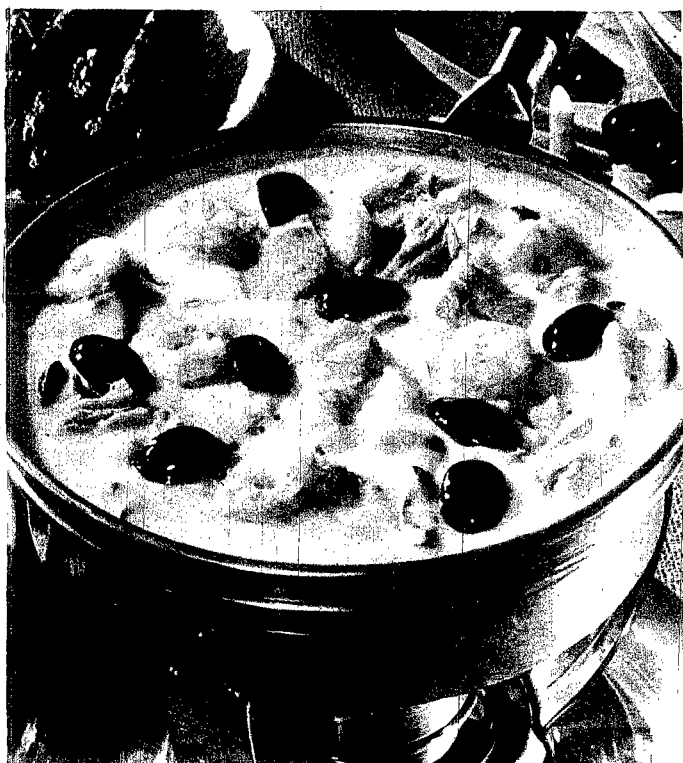
Place fish on foil on broiler rack, brush with melted butter, sprinkle with salt, pepper, and paprika, and broil about 4 inches from heat, turning once and basting with butter. Remove fish from broiler when just slightly underdone, about 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, prepare the potatoes with the water, milk, salt, and butter according to package direc-

tions or prepare your own mashed potatoes.

Place the fillets on a well-oiled plank. Also, place tomato halves on plank and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. With a pastry tube or spoon, make the potatoes into a decorative border on the edge of the plank. Pipe potato nests to border both sides of fish.

Sprinkle the potatoes with paprika. Place plank under broiler, close to heat, until potatoes are browned, and the fish may be flaked easily with a fork, about 5 minutes. Meanwhile, cook the Italian beans, as the package directs. To serve, place the hot buttered Italian green beans attractively on the plank in potato nests. Garnish the plank with the lemon wedges. Makes 4 servings.



## SEAFOOD SUPREME

- 3/4 cup ripe olives
- 1 (6 1/2 or 7-ounce) can tuna
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- Dash Tabasco sauce
- 1 (5-ounce) can deveined shrimp
- Pastry shells or rice

Cut olives into large pieces. Drain oil from tuna into saucepan; add butter. Heat until butter melts, blend in flour. Add milk and cook and stir until thickened. Stir in seasonings, olives, undrained shrimp and tuna. Serve hot in pastry shells, on rice or over toast or waffles. Makes 4 servings.



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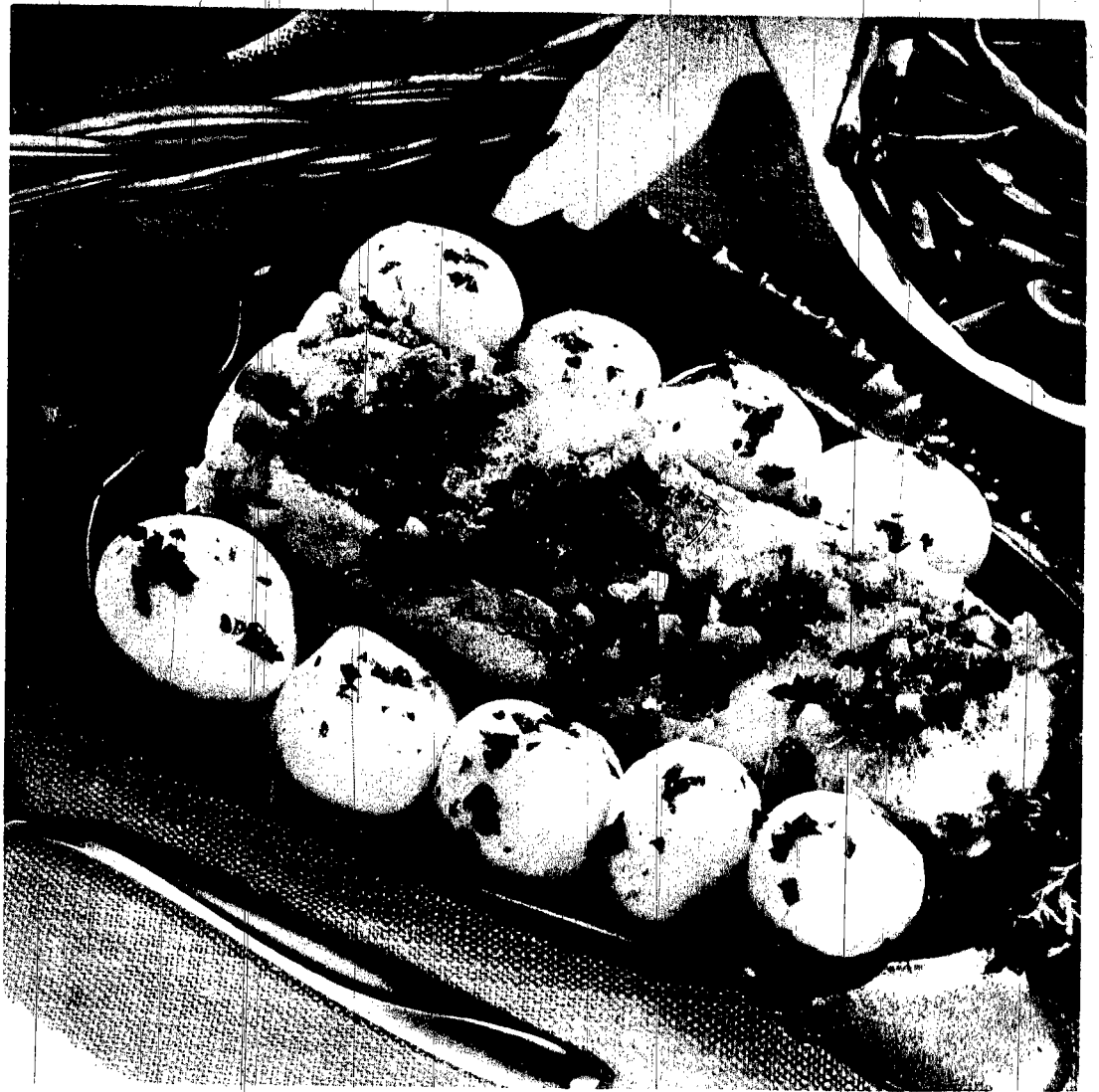
### BAKED COD WITH DILL PICKLE SAUCE

1 package (1 pound) frozen skinless cod fillets  
 Melted butter  
 Salt, pepper, and paprika

½ cup butter  
 ½ cup chopped dill pickle  
 ¼ teaspoon sugar

Place frozen block of cod in greased shallow baking dish. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with salt, pepper, and paprika. Bake in hot oven (400°F.) 50 minutes. Remove from oven.

Meanwhile, melt butter in saucepan. Add chopped pickle and sugar and heat gently about 5 minutes. Pour over baked fish and serve at once. Serve with baked potatoes, if desired. Makes 4 servings.



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### CHEESE SOUFFLE WITH MUSHROOM SAUCE

¼ cup butter  
 ¼ cup flour  
 1 cup milk  
 ½ teaspoon salt

Dash of cayenne  
 2 (4-oz.) packages freshly shredded cheddar cheese (2 cups)  
 4 eggs

Make a white sauce with the butter, flour, milk, salt and cayenne. When thickened, add shredded cheese and stir until cheese is melted. Remove from the heat and add beaten yolks of 4 eggs; mix well. Slowly pour this mixture into stiffly beaten whites of 4 eggs. Mix and blend carefully but thoroughly. Pour into a 2-quart casserole and bake 1 hour in a 300°F. oven. Serve at once with Mushroom Sauce. Makes 6 servings.

To make Mushroom Sauce: Drain 1 (2-oz.) can mushrooms and save the liquid. Brown mushrooms in 1 tablespoon butter. Add mushroom liquid to 1 (10-oz.) can cream of mushroom soup and ½ cup milk and cook until mixture is smooth. Add browned mushrooms. Makes 1½ cups sauce.

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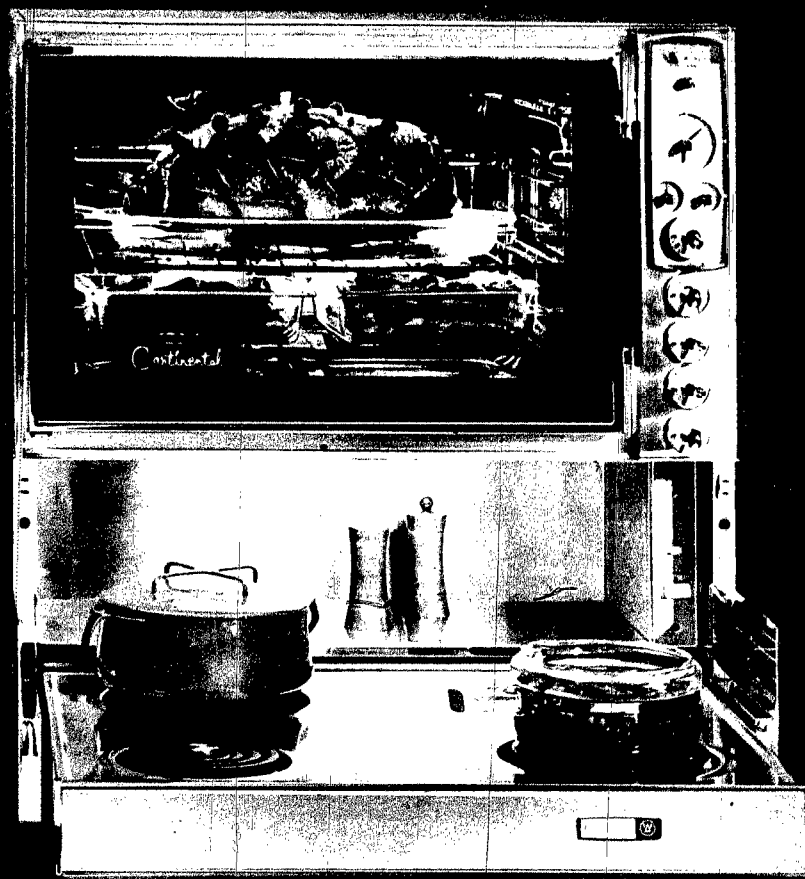
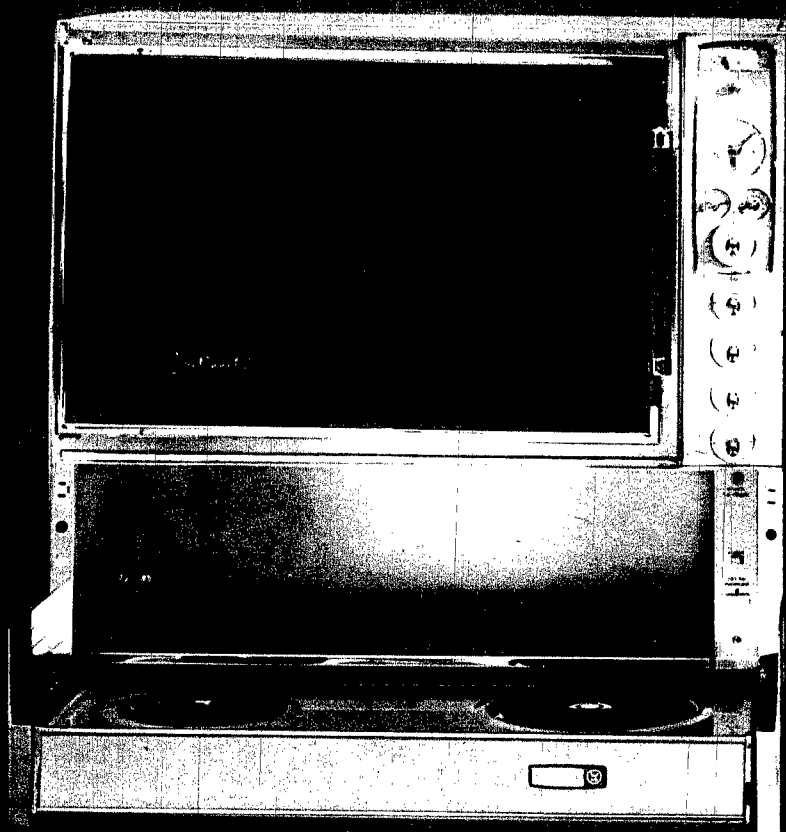


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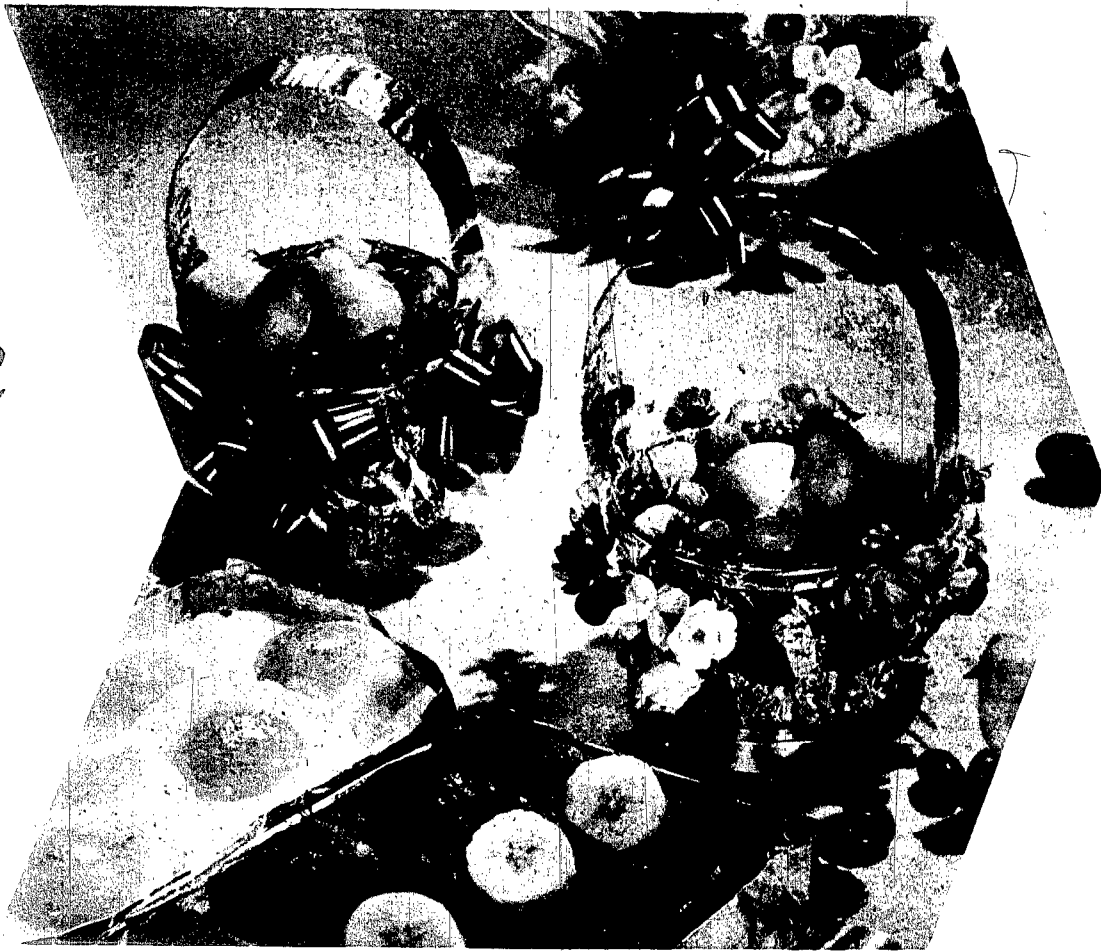

Put straight, vertical lines of white frosting at about 1½-inch intervals on chocolate-frosted sides of cake. Fill in between vertical lines with 2 "X's".

Finish with any desired pattern of edging around top rim of cake. Pile remaining frosting in center top of cake to resemble "nest". Fill "nest" with jelly beans. If desired, a basket handle may be made by wrapping ribbon around a strip of paper board; press ends in sides of cake. Yield: 1 10-inch tube cake.

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2-1 lb. cans pork 'n beans

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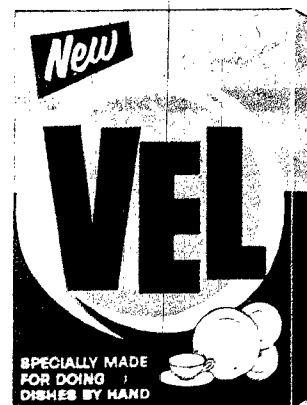

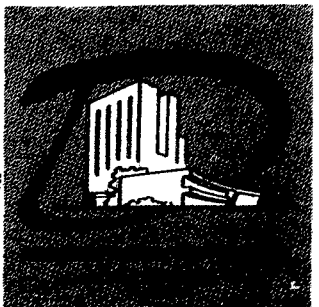
