## Room Requests Indicate More Students at WS

"Increased enrollment for the third term of Wayne State's trimester schedule is indicated by advance room reservations," said President W. A. Brandenburg. Dormitory room requests already are 27 per cent over the actual occupancy last year when Wayne offered a third term for the first time under its trimester plan.

Dr. Brandenburg predicted about 500 students for the term beginning April 22 compared to 387 in the third term last year.

Classes begin April 23, the day after registration, and students can earn a full term's credit for the period ending August 3.

The regular summer session, with one period of nine weeks this year, opens June 3 and ends August 3.

## Third Ward Race Highlights Light Voted City Election

### Warns Residents About Loose Dogs And Trash Laws

A warning was issued this week by the Wayne Police Department to all dog owners to keep their dogs penned up or suffer the consequences.

Police Chief Garth Dawson said the force was spending too much time chasing and impounding dogs and contacting their owners. From now on, the owners will be taken to court and fined.

Along the same lines, stricter enforcement of sanitary ordinances will be observed, starting with the ordinance that requires all garbage cans to be tightly covered, according to Dawson.

Police will begin checking on this ordinance and violators will be prosecuted.

### Ley, Echtenkamp Elected To School Board Offices

A far from record vote turned out last Tuesday for the Wayne city and school election, although only two votes separated two candidates when the canvass was completed Monday morning.

Only 585 out of approximately 2,200 eligible voters exercised their rights at the polls.

The closest race came in the Third Ward where Lyle Seymour defeated incumbent Chris Tietgen 95 to 93. Before the canvass Monday, Seymour had a five vote lead with five absentee ballots to be counted. The canvass revealed Tietgen received four of the absentee votes while Seymour got one.

There were nine absentee ballots with the other four in the second ward.

In the First Ward race, incumbent Ed Smith defeated Bill Kuller 107 to 82.

Arnie Reeg defeated Cliff Wait 132 to 95 in the Second Ward.

Mrs. Dorothy Ley proved to be the strongest vote getter of the four candidates for the two posts in the school board election by polling 417 votes.

Don Echtenkamp was elected to the other vacancy as he drew 320 votes.

The other candidates, Dallas Wendt and Benjamin Bernstein, polled 320 and 111 votes respectively.

In write-ins for school board, Ed Seymour received 53, Edith Wightman 6 and H. E. Hein, one.

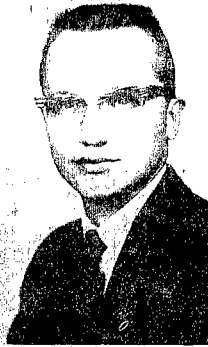

## Eiting Explains New Phone Rate Changes

"Reduced rates became effective Thursday on Stanton-to-station telephone calls made between 9:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. from this state to the points in any other state in the country except Hawaii and Alaska," said B. H. Eiting, local telephone manager.

Maximum rates for such interstate calls from an place in Nebraska will be 90 cents for the first three minutes. Rates for calls of shorter distances will be reduced proportionately.

The tariffs for the rate reduction which were filed with the Federal Communications Commission also provide for an increase of from five to ten cents on person-to-person interstate calls of less than 800 miles.

# Painting Can Solve Room Size and Shape Problems

You can "change a room's dimensions" if you know the magic tricks of paint color in this day, when every room may not be the answer to your dream-house architecturally, these problem-solving hints from the National Paint, Varnish and Lacquer Association come in handy, indeed.

First, some basic color facts.

**Light vs. Dark**

The lightness or darkness of a color radically affects the illusion of size. Try this test yourself to see how it works. Place side by side identical objects, one in black, the other in white, since these are dark and light extremes. See how the white seems larger and farther away, the black smaller and closer.

So it is with walls.

White or pastels (which are only colors tinted generously with white) will open up a small area and "enlarge" it. But if you wish to diminish the wide open spaces of a cavernous room, deep shades

will seem to draw walls closely together.

Now the color itself.

You may have heard them described as "warm" or "cool." The easiest way to tell which is which, is to relate them to familiar things. Like the sun, like flame, warm colors are variations of orange, red or yellow. They seem nearer to you and make rooms smaller.

Conversely, like the sky, like water, variations of blue, violet, green and gray are the airier "cools." They make objects appear to recede. Therefore, rooms look larger.

These colors will actually make you feel warmer or cooler mentally. So take this into consideration along with the size of the room before you paint. For instance, a pastel yellow will seem to enclose you more than a pastel blue, even though they are both pale. So if you're painting a long, narrow corridor you might very well prefer choosing your pastel from the cool family.

Speaking of long, narrow rooms, it is best to break them up with color. Favorite decorator tricks are painting the two narrow ends

# Bathroom Gets New Look; Modernizing Transforms

High on the list of modernization projects in older houses is the conversion of old-fashioned bathrooms into highly decorative ones. From the inconspicuous room of the house, the bathroom is emerging as a luxurious showpiece, with every attention given to the plumbing fixtures, floor and wall coverings, towels and other accessories.

A glance by an inexperienced person may not capture the possibilities of enlarging the small bathroom. This is true if one thinks only of replacing old fixtures with new ones in the same position as they already exist. An experienced modernization plumbing contractor would see the situation differently.

**Tub Variety**

For instance, quality bathtubs in color are available in many sizes: 5 and 5-1/2 feet; small square tubs which measure 38 x 39" and fit neatly into a shower stall space; and large, sumptuous squarer tubs which have the tub cavity on a diagonal with handy corner ledges.

With such a variety to choose from, many changes can be effected in the bathroom.

A tub along one wall may be replaced by the square type which would take up the same space as far as the length is concerned yet would provide much more sumptuous bathing facilities.

In more extensive modernization, the new tub may be placed along a different wall, opening up new areas for lavatories and towel racks.

Where space permits, a single old lavatory may be replaced by two (either compact pedestal types or drop-ins, installed in a countertop) to provide double-duty washing facilities.

An important part of plumbing fixtures are the faucets and levers. Since these are usually chrome-plated and shiny items, they should be outstanding in design to complement the fixtures. One of the best developments in

# Built-in Storage Units End Home Clutteration Problem

Is your family always looking for things? If the time spent by families searching for missing articles could be computed, it would undoubtedly run into millions of hours each year.

Which, in many a home, points up the importance of somewhere, somehow developing additional storage facilities, to the end that there shall be "a place for everything, and every thing in its place."

One of the most versatile and adaptable forms of storage unit is the storage wall. This type of storage, which would be equally at home in any room in the house, may be either straight storage or a combination storage and activity center (known as a "living wall").

The key to successful storage walls, be they "living walls" or straight storage, lie in careful planning and assortment of individual needs plus correct choice of construction material.

If solid lumber is used for a storage wall, the wall can be effectively integrated with the rest of the room—particularly if the room is paneled with matching lumber.

As for the where and what of storage walls, straight storage is most commonly incorporated in kitchens, bedrooms (for dressing rooms) and bathrooms; "living walls" are best adapted to family and living rooms.

The beauty of the straight storage wall is the fact that it assures that all of the items to be stored are consolidated, keeps the articles within easy reach out of sight, and it obviates the necessity for a full complement of bulky furniture.

Although the straight storage

in a deep warm shade and keeping walls light. This shortens the length considerably to your mind's eye. If the ceiling is abnormally high, pull it together with the floor by painting them both in the same deep shade.

**Ceiling Rule**

In any room, this ceiling rule holds true: Too high, keep the color deep; Too low, lift it with a light color.

A half-wall jutting out from nowhere splits a room's symmetry. Since you can't disguise this architecture, dramatize it with a bright, warm shade. This might be the focal point of a furniture grouping or prize painting. More interest is added to a too-square room with this technique, too.

You can afford to chop up space with contrasting-color woodwork and doors only if the room is big enough to take it. Otherwise, paint all the same shade as the walls. Everything blends. The same goes for radiators, pipes, lighting fixtures, extraneous molding and other such eyesores foisted upon you. They'll fade away.

## Wildcats Win Three Of First Four Games

Three wins in the first four games, a no-hit pitching effort and some heavy-duty hitting inaugurated Wayne State's baseball season last week. Especially satisfying to the Wildcats was the twin victory over defending NCC champion Peru. Wayne followed up Saturday at home with a convincing 7-3 win over Morningside, but managed only two runs to Morningside's three in the nightcap.

Coach John Jermier happily ate some of his pre-season comments after the weekend — comments such as "pitching doubtful" and "hitting weak." Sioux City southpaw Keith Krommenhoek scotched the pitching doubts with a no-hitter as Wayne bopped Peru, 6-0, in the opener. He came close to a perfect game, allowing only two walks in the seven-inning stint. His mates helped with errorless defense.

Wayne batters contributed to the reversal of the coach's words. The first two Wildcat hits among five were home runs by Stan Schaulis and Ron Jones. In the second game Ron Anderson and Ron Sadler added another pair of homers among a dozen hits which lifted Wayne to an 11-3 win.

Freshman hurler Dean deBuhr went the route for Wayne while Peru used five pitchers (after needing three in the opener).

Against Morningside, Roger Ginapp pitched all of the first game, allowing five hits, and Ken Hutchinson went all the way in the nightcap, giving up six. Wayne bats connected for 10 hits in the opener, six in the follow-up, bringing the four-game total to 33, against 18 by the opposition. The Wildcats have committed six errors, the opponents eight.

Wayne batting statistics look impressive. The team average is .293. Stan Schaulis is hitting .545; Ron Anderson .461; Ron Sadler .454. Schaulis has batted in eight runs. Sadler five. The pitchers' earned run average also looks good—Krommenhoek and Hutchinson having allowed no earned runs, deBuhr one and Ginapp three. Jermier observed Monday that pre-season conditioning drills seem to have paid dividends. One

proof: four pitchers needing no relief. The team will be idle until Wednesday, April 17, when it enters Northwestern college in a 1 p.m. doubleheader. This pair will be played on the new college diamond.

Darrell Reifenrath collected a pair of thirds in the 100 and 220 sprints. Charles Borg and Bob Fulstone came in fourth and fifth in the mile. Don Shilling fifth in the 120 high hurdles, Ron Buelt third in the 440 and Carl Owczarzak fifth in the two-mile. Wayne finished third in the mile relay and fourth in the 880 relay.



### Capitol News . . . Legislators Take Breather Following Days of Debate

Members of the Legislature took time out late this week for the Easter vacation breather and the feeling was fairly general that the legislators needed a bit of rest.

Debate during recent days has been punctuated with some harsh words and this could have been the proof that the lawmakers need a vacation.

The strongest language came during debate of the bill which finally wound up with the senators agreeing to increase the tax on horse race betting from two to three per cent.

As introduced by Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff, the measure called for a six per cent rate. This was cut to four by the revenue committee and the legislature decided three per cent would be even better.

Under the bill, the first million dollars collected would remain exempt from the tax. The law primarily affects the Omaha and Lincoln tracks.

While the debate was in full swing, Sen. Michael Russillo, Omaha, charged that Carpenter's only sport was being a member of the Legislature, and Sen. Sam Klaver of Omaha said the legal profession "lost a real Clarence Darrow" when Carpenter did not become a lawyer.

Sen. Elvin Adamson, Nenzel, who proposed cutting the tax from four to three per cent, said there is a danger that if the rate goes too high, it could discourage attendance and work a hardship on the various tracks around the state.

It was Carpenter's opinion that upping the tax to four per cent would have had no effect on attendance or wagering.

It appears that the bill as amended, will sail to passage. The vote for preliminary approval was 38-1. The lawmakers have been speeding the measure across the legislative board so that it can become effective as quickly as possible.

The bill with the four per cent

The OEP is developing plans under which all of the resources of the country can be catalogued and evaluated.

Last January, Governor Morrison issued an executive order creating an emergency resources planning committee headed by Maj. Gen. Lyle Welch, state civil defense director.

Sullivan said that "in the event of a nuclear war, the successful prosecution of private and government efforts will depend in great measure upon the efficiency with which this nation manages its resources."

He urged those at the seminar to "think seriously" about private and governmental cooperation "so Nebraska will not be caught short should a national crisis ever develop."

Included in the state emergency planning committee are heads of various state departments and leaders of industry with corresponding areas of responsibility.

### Income Tax Bill

Dr. B.N. Greenberg, York, president of the University of Nebraska Board of Regents, has been criticized by a state senator supporting the state income tax because Greenberg's name was used in a letter opposing the tax.

Sen. Eric Rasmussen, Fairmont, said he was critical "because here is a man heading up a state agency that is asking for a \$9 million increase in taxes and his name is used in a letter like this."

Greenberg said he had not authorized the use of his name in the letters and that he did not even know they had been written.

### Co. Agent's Column

Unusually favorable weather contributed to our excess crop production the past five years.

An Iowa State College report indicates that this is the case. A report of federal crop insurance losses paid in Wayne County would substantiate this contention.

Federal crop insurance was made available to Wayne County farmers in 1956. That year (1956) 364 policies were issued. The government paid on 326 losses.

In 1957, 518 policies were issued and 41 losses paid. Since 1957 not a single loss has been paid and the number insuring has dwindled to 66 in 1961.

The Iowa study reports that in the past 72 years, there were nine unusually good crop years and nine unusually bad years. Six of the good crop years have occurred in the most recent ten year period.

More than one-half of Nebraska's corn is produced under irrigation. This is not the case in a very large part of the cornbelt. Weather is one important factor over which man has little control.

A series of dry years such as were experienced in the 1930's could alter our crop surplus situation drastically.

### World Food Congress

The Congress has authorized the United States to serve as host country for the World Food Congress. An estimated 1200 delegates from more than 100 countries will convene in Washington, D.C. June 4-18.

Between one-third and one-half of the world's 3 billion people suffer from hunger and/or malnutrition. On top of this the population is expected to double in the next 35 years. The rate of population increase in the less developed regions, where hunger is most prevalent, is greater than in the most prosperous areas.

Unfortunately it has not proved feasible or practical to move large quantities of food to distant areas of the world except

distributed by Russell Soucek, a Seward attorney.

Meanwhile, debate on the income tax proposal, LB 612, has been shoved back at least three days. It was scheduled to come up April 22 on the legislature floor, but Sen. H. L. Gerhart of Newman Grove received permission to have it postponed to April 25. When that happened, Sen. Kenneth L. Bowen of Red Cloud, chief sponsor of the bill, let it be known he might seek even more of a delay.

Bowen has said to discuss the bill on April 22. But he warned of Gerhart's request was granted, he then felt he was also justified in seeking a further delay.

### Fishnet Curtain

Frank L. Farrar, South Dakota's attorney general, has criticized M. O. Steen, Nebraska Game Commission director, and at the same time has urged his state not to drop a "fishnet curtain" of its own around South Dakota waters near Gavins Point Dam.

Farrar said the Nebraska commission's decision late last month to cancel a reciprocal fishing permit agreement between the states in the dam's tailwaters was a "publicity stunt."

Such was not the case at all, according to Steen. He countered that South Dakota was pulling a "publicity stunt" by trying to tell Nebraska "what we can and cannot do in an area clearly in Nebraska."

The area in dispute, Steen continued to maintain, is in Nebraska "without a doubt and South Dakota knows it too."

Farrar said he wants the matter settled by negotiation.

**STEROID DRUGS**

Q. What exactly are "steroids" as used for arthritis and what are the damaging side-effects?

A. The word "steroid" refers to a general group of chemical substances. Certain steroids have been found useful in medicine. For example, corticosteroids (cortisone and cortisone-like compounds) are used in management of arthritis. However, it is now known that even with "steroids," there is no cure for arthritis. Like all potent drugs, corticosteroids may produce unwanted effects, especially when taken for long periods. A discussion of such effects is far beyond the scope of this column.

**FARMER'S LUNG**

Q. What is "farmer's lung"?

A. Farmer's lung is an acute inflammation of the lungs due to exposure to moldy farm dusts (hay, grain, tobacco, etc.). Characteristic symptoms are chills, fever, and shortness of breath within a few hours after exposure to moldy dusts. There is no specific treatment. Workers who develop this condition should avoid further exposure to farm dusts.
