

Capital Leaving Nebraska **Deserves Committee Study**

Lincoln — Goverpor Morrison bas described the out migration of Nebraska capital as "a very serious obstacle to economic growth" and said he will hame a committee to draw up legislation aimed at solving the problem.

According to the governor. Nebraska has one of the highest rates of capital leaving a state for investment elsewhere. He said he has met with officials of the Nebraska State Bankers Association, and agreement was expressed that "something must be done to rectify this serious problem."

done to rectify this serious problem.

Morrison said he will appoint the committee after the bankers association suggests several candidates. Representatives will also be made from other Nebraska industries.

It is the governor's plan to have the committee study the matter of capital export make recommendations and draw up legislation. It is Morrisor's hope that some remedial legislation can still be proposed during this legislative session.

Taxation on intangible property may be part of the problem, Morrison said.

But he said "the negative psychological attitude, that has developed in this state plays a big role. People think the grass is greener on the other side of the fence. This is a complete fallacy."

In his comments, Morrison also said: "Nebraska must deyelop a program to encourage its
young citizens to remain in the
state. A state's growth is dependent on its young people. They are
the ones who build a dynamic
economy."

The governor praised a pro-posal by Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff. Carpenter hopes to amend a bill to exempt from tax-ation intangible property owned by non-residents of Nebraska held in trust by a trustee domi-

Nebraska lawmakers came back to their desks after a six-day Easter vacation break and got right back to work.

With the session at about the halfway point, the legislators know they still have some of the hottest business still on the agenda.

The state income tax bill was set for debate Thursday, April 25. Some of the senators would like to see the proposal held over for awhile but others are anxious to come to grips with it.

Health Report
An official of the State Department of Health said recently Nebraska has a high percentage ratio of suspiceted tuberculosis, cancer, heart and other chestrelated discase cases.

Dr. George E. Pickett told the State Board of Health thal 15,000 chest X-ray films made in Nebraska in 1961 turned up 281 suspiced TB cases, 753 heart cases, 51 of cancer and 787 of other types of chest diseases.

The board authorized Dr. Pickett to conduct a study into the possibility of expanding state's cancer. TB and heart diseases control program.

Dr. Pickett said he will cooperate with heart, cancer and tipesaces control program.

Dr. Pickett said he will cooperate with heart, cancer and tubercular private agencies during his study. He intends to follow up the history of each suspected case and to make recommendations on how to better control the-problems uncovered.

He said he believes U.S. Public health funds can be obtained to help carry out the study and expressed hope that private agencies would also contribute.

Requiring Exams

The University of Nebraska is beginning to require graduates of non-accredited high schools to take entrance examinations.

It has been a longstanding policy of the university to admit anyone holding a diploma from any Nebraska high school if the student insisted on enrolling.

The Nebraska Education Directory shows 100 high schools in 47 counties are approved but not accredited by the Nebraska Education Department.

The university intends to keep a continuing check on progress of non-accredited high school graduates who enroll at the university. Ross said tests should provide helpful starting-point information. Many years ago the university had an entire testing program but it was dropped after World War II.

Extension Myrtle Notes

When You Defrost

A corrugated cardboard carton is all the equipment you need to prevent a darhaging rise in the temperature of frozen food removed from the freezing compartment during defrosting. However, defrosting must take less than half an hour.

Tests show that the temperature of frozen foods placed in covered cardboard cartons rose an average of only 3.5 degrees F, while the cold-storage area was being defrosted. The average temperature rise for packages stacked on a table was 7.3 degrees F. and for those wrapped in hewspapers, 5.2 degrees F.

Research shows that in conventional refrigerator units in which frozen foods are left in place during semi-automatic defrosting, the average temperature rise in frozen foods in the incecube department was 8.5 degrees F.

In refrigerator-freezer combinations with automatic defrosting, there was no significant rise in temperature in the freezing compartment when the unit was in a room with a nor-

Tree plantings may be treated at the time of planting or before weeds reach the two-leaf stage using 4 pounds of active chemical per lacro. The herbicide should be applied in bands 3 to 4 feet wide down the tree
