

Decorative Lighting Effects Can Prove Highly Functional

Not all fixture lighting is intended specifically to provide illumination for clear, quick, comfortable seeing. Some lighting is used primarily to create an emotionally satisfying environment, according to the American Home Lighting Institute.

Decorative, or non-task lighting can also be highly functional. Used correctly, it helps repair the two most common mistakes in home lighting: Glaring concentrations of light surrounded by darkness or extreme flat, even lighting.

Avoid High Contrast—Undesirable high contrast—or difference in brightness—is often created, for example, by using portable lamps without general light from ceiling or wall fixtures. The picture is one of pools of light surrounded by extensive unlighted areas. This type of harsh lighting is hard on the eyes and contributes to discomfort and irritability.

Contrasts are normally reduced by lighting a vertical surface, such as a wall or drapery, in the normal field of vision. Such lighting adds to the over-all illumination of a room and softens the lighting. Lighting experts employ hanging or surface-mounted fixtures, valances, cornices, wall brackets, coves, soffits or custom architectural lighting for this purpose.

This type of lighting also accentuates the color and texture of wall or window treatments and

contributes to the over-all interior design.

Just as undesirable in the home is flat, even lighting, it does not jangle the nerves like sharp concentrations of light but it produces boredom and monotony.

This is best offset with pinpoints of light in key areas and on decorative accents to stimulate interest, excitement and alertness.

Highlighting of art objects like paintings, murals, sculptures or planters can be done with recessed or surface-mounted directional lights or hanging fixtures. Many have focusing mechanisms for precise light control.

Similar techniques can be used to add emotional impact and visual excitement over a coffee or end table or a room divider, creating the theatrical effect of spot-lighting key areas.

Dual Purpose—Good fixture lighting does more than deliver the right light for seeing. It combines general illumination with sparkling highlights that add variation and interest and keeps the senses alive.

Correctly applied, it dramatically emphasizes the most beautiful and distinctive features of your home by bringing to life the furnishings and accenting those special touches of decor and architectural.

A Clean Garage—For the final scrub-up of a clean and out garage, use full-strength pine oil cleaner to remove grease spots, then scrub with a solution of 1 cup to 3 gallons of water. Removes gas, paint odors.

Paneling Can Define Room's Activity Areas

Solid lumber paneling is not only distinctive in and of itself, but it can also create distinction between activity areas within a room.

The lines of demarcation which can be achieved with wall paneling may be either visual or physical.

To visually separate different activity areas, certain walls or sections of walls may be paneled while the remaining wall space is left unpaneled. In this way, a specific area of the rooms becomes the focal point.

Fireplace Wall—An example of this sort of visual delineation would be the treatment of a fireplace wall on which the mantel itself is kept simple. The center of interest is created through the effective contrast between the brick or stone of the fireplace and the vertical rise of the paneling.

Similarly, an unusual collection of paintings or other wall hangings could be displayed to advantage against a wall paneled with solid lumber—such as clear, vertical grain Larch from the Western Pine region.

To emphasize a study corner in a larger room—a family or living room, for instance—that corner might be paneled in knotty Ponderosa Pine and bookcases built-in, thereby creating a comfortable room within a room. In like manner, a difficult alcove might be transformed into a distinct dining area simply by installing hand-sawn patterned paneling on its three walls.

It is also possible to differentiate between activity areas in a room where all the walls are paneled by using a different installation design or pattern on the featured wall.

Thus, in a room where vertical paneling has been used throughout, the fireplace wall might be done in horizontal or even diagonal paneling. In using the same wood species, but varying the installation, the differentiation can be achieved without disrupting the integrity of the decor.

Room Dividers—The alternative to visual demarcation is physical separation via paneled screens and room di-

viders. These devices are more definitive than is the paneled feature wall, but as they are neither solid nor built to ceiling height, they divide space but do not enclose it.

For instance, many of today's homes are not designed with entrance foyers, nor are the living rooms such that they will stand being chopped off with a solid wall to create an entrance hall. However, an effective entrance can be achieved with a divider built of solid lumber.

Such a divider might be a simple screen of vertical White Fir 1 x 2's, or something of a lattice-work nature. Or it might be a series of shelves at random intervals which could accommodate plants or a collection of glassware and china.

Dining Areas—Another area in which the solid lumber screen can produce effective results is in the case of the non-existent dining room. Rather than simply establish one end of the living room as a dining area, it is possible to construct a handsome and not-too-space-consuming divider which would serve, on both sides, as a backdrop for furniture. This sort of divider is most effective if it is solid perhaps two-thirds of the way up and open from there to the ceiling.

Open-work screens can also be used to span the wide opening between two definite rooms where the opening is an alternate entrance that is not used, but should not be sealed off with a solid door.

In today's money market, home improvement financing is one of the most common types of lending transactions. In fact, home improvements can be financed through a greater variety of techniques than almost any other kind of purchase.

Choose Your Plan—To choose the one method of financing that is best suited to your particular situation is a basic step in making sure that your remodeling or modernization project will

Industry Leaders Spur Modernizing

The year 1963 has been designated as a nation-wide "Home Improvement Year," by leaders of the building products industry. National trade associations, manufacturers and government agencies are cooperating in a massive program with the objective of persuading home-owners to upgrade their homes. The program is being coordinated by the National Home Improvement Council.

Home Improvement Year activity, according to the Council's executive director, Edgar Hall, will center on "providing the home-owner with all the information he needs to start his own sensible, sound home improvement program."

With the cooperation of local dealers, lenders and contractors, the Council in 1963 will organize "How to Improve Your Home"

meet all the requirements of a sound investment.

To aid you in making this selection, here is a quick wrap-up of methods of home improvement currently available.

FHA Title 1 Short-Term Loan: You can borrow up to \$3,500 with five years to repay under this loan, which is insured by the Federal Housing Administration. It is confined to improvements considered "essential" to the home, such as modernizing kitchens, bathrooms, finishing off extra rooms, etc. Interest usually runs 5 percent discount on the first \$2500 of the loan, drops to 4 percent on the balance of the loan. "Discount" interest means that the full interest charges are deducted from the amount of the loan at the outset.

FHA Long-Term Loan (Section 203K): You can borrow up to \$10,000 for as long as 20 years. The loan (also insured by the Federal Housing Administration) must be used to make major structural changes in your home, such as adding a new wing. Your dwelling must be at least 10 years old. Simple interest runs around 6 percent.

Bank Home Improvement Loan: Like a Title 1 loan, you can borrow up to \$3,500 and take five years to repay. The interest varies from 5 percent to 7 percent discount. While costing slightly more than Title 1 loans, bank loans are more flexible. You can use the money for many improvements which are considered "non-essential," and thus, not eligible for a Title 1 loan.

Open End Mortgage Loan: If the mortgage on your home contains an "open end" provision, you may be able to borrow on it for home improvements, an amount equal to that which you have already paid off. To handle the added debt, (1) your monthly payment may be increased, or (2) the time of repayment may be increased slightly.

New Mortgages—Refinancing Present Mortgage: If your mortgage does not include an "open end" clause, look into the possibility of retiring your present mortgage, by getting a new one large enough to pay off the old loan and also cover the additional cost of your home improvement project.

Personal Bank Loan: If your home improvement project is relatively minor, such as installing storm doors or windows, repainting or the like, you might consider this type of financing.

One of the most functional forms of built-in units is the storage wall. This type of storage may be either straight storage, a combination of storage and furniture, or storage and activity.

Whether your project entails a step-by-step remodeling process toward a total goal or a single project approach, careful planning is necessary.

Even if you plan to do-it-yourself remodeling program, you might wish to have the advice or part of the work done by a building contractor. He will also be able to counsel you on structural considerations and local building codes and restrictions. When it comes to choice of materials, your own lumber dealer is the best authority.

Q. Do dental authorities approve of the new electric toothbrushes?

A. The American Dental Association's Council on Dental Therapeutics, an agency established to evaluate test data submitted by manufacturers, concluded that electric toothbrushes made by General Electric and E.
