During the thirties, farmers earned from 35 percent to 40 percent as much as non-farmers. World War II in-creased the percentage to about 50 percent. Then it shot to a peak of 63 percent in 1948 and dropped back to a low of 48 percent in 1955. Now it is back to 60 percent.

percent in 1955, Now it is back to 60 percent. ' I disagree that we can help farmers by publicizing low aver-age incomes. Such figures don't give a true picture. The young man who wants to go into farm-ing can earn many times these agverage earnings if he has ambi-dion and ability. Low income sta-fistics too often are used to scare farmers into giving up the free-dom to manage their own busi-pess for income protection. And this very management freedom is now helping top operators earn \$5,000 to \$10,000 per year more than average farmers with the same resources. Seed Certification 'Applications
