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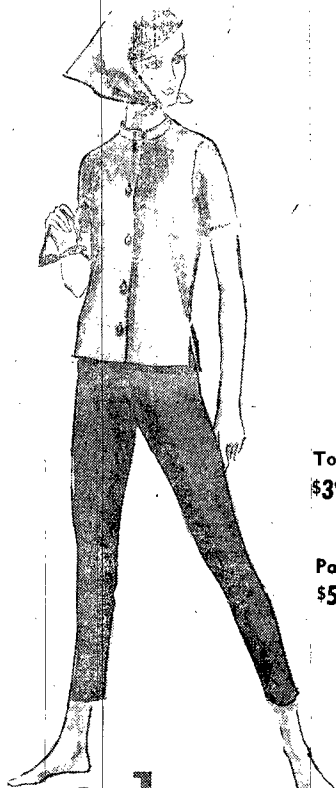

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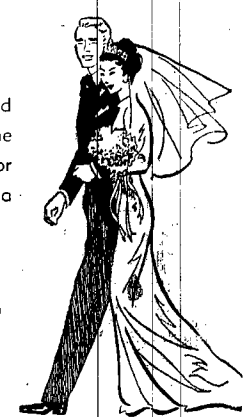

Carl Ellermeier's Wayne State thinclads took top honors Wednesday evening in the first annual Le Mars Invitational. The Wayne tracksters chalked up firsts in every major track event with several double winners emerging.

One school record was broken with a sizzling 9.7 100-yard run by Darrel Reifenrath. Reifenrath also won the 220 with a flat .22 seconds.

Carl Owtzarkzak emerged with two firsts for Wayne with a 4:35.9 mile and a close win with a 2:05 880. Ron Buell and Milt Harrison took first and second places in the 440.

Ed Humpal chalked up another first with the shot for the only win in the fields events. Humpal also

took second in the discus. Denny Mayo placing fifth. Mayo grabbed a second in the javelin throw with Warren Smith placing fifth. Bill Nelson placed fourth in the broad jump and second in the pole vault. Roger Deron placed fourth in the pole vault.

**ENLARGED HEART**

Q. Is an enlarged heart dangerous? Can a person with an enlarged heart continue an active life and drink, smoke and eat whatever he likes?

A. It depends entirely on what is causing the enlarged heart. If it is due to heavy training in athletics or other forms of violent exercise the person involved should be able to get along quite well. If it is of recent origin, a physician should be consulted as to the cause. It should be remembered that alcohol, tobacco and improper eating (especially food high in fat) put an extra load on the heart.

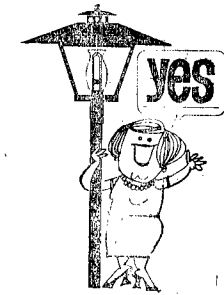

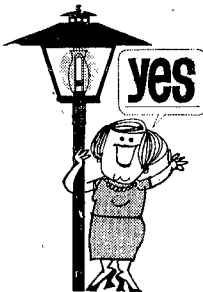

# State Income Tax Measure Is Postponed Temporarily

A decision on the hottest issue of the legislative session—whether Nebraska should adopt a state income tax—has been postponed temporarily. The bill proposing the tax, LB 612, has generated heated comment off and on ever since it was dropped into the hopper early in the session.

It underwent a major overhaul when it came up for floor debate for the first time last week. But an attempt to kill it fell four votes short. Eighteen senators wanted to bury the bill, but 25 others balloted to keep it alive.

Some of the major changes made during opening debate provided for: withholding of the tax by employers; a \$400 per minor child exemption; and taxation of corporate income.

A move to make the tax effective Jan. 1, 1964, instead of a year later, fell just one vote short. Sen. Kenneth L. Bowen of Red Cloud, chief sponsor of the bill, said he was against making the tax effective in 1964 because ample time should be allowed to set up the mechanics for collecting the tax.

Even though the kill attempt failed, Bowen was not claiming an eventual victory. He said "the fight has just begun."

Throughout all of the arguing and maneuvering it has generally been conceded that the final decision on killing or passing the bill will be close.

Bowen has served notice he would attempt to bring the bill back before the legislature this week. The lawmakers voted to delay further discussion until after the budget bill was reported out of committee.

There are several other lawmakers who have said they do not want the income tax measure linked with the budget bill.

**Food and Lodging Tax**  
The legislature has approved introduction of a bill which would impose a special service tax on food and lodging. It is similar to one submitted two years ago which was killed after being advanced out of committee.

Sen. Marvin Stromer, Lincoln, asked the revenue committee to introduce the 1963 bill "because too much transient money is floating through this state."

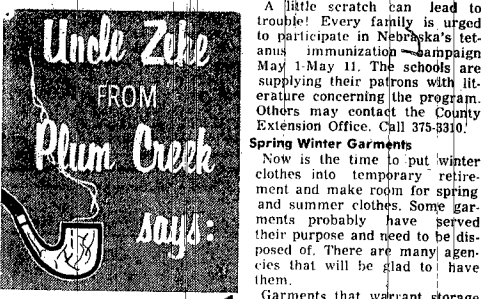
As written, the measure, LB 787, provides for a five per cent tax on hotel and motel rooms costing more than \$2 and a three per cent tax on meals costing more than \$1.50.

According to Stromer, the bill would raise more than \$3 million. Of the total \$200,000 would be earmarked for tourist promotion, \$250,000 for industrial development, and \$500,000 for development and completion of access roads to recreation areas. Whatever was left would be placed in the state's general funds.

"Since Nebraska seems to be exploring all avenues of raising revenue," Stromer said, "I feel we should also take a look at this." He said enactment of the bill into law would not hurt the hotel, motel, or restaurant owners and operators. The tax would be paid by the consumer or user, he argued.

**Tetanus Immunization**  
The significant number of cases of lockjaw reported in Nebraska has prompted the Nebraska Medical Association to initiate a statewide tetanus immunization program.

involved the jaw muscles. Protection against lockjaw is possible when a toxoid to provide immunization against tetanus is injected in prescribed amounts. It stimulates the body to produce a protective barrier.

Primary active immunity is obtained by giving three doses of the toxoid. Periodic booster doses are recommended at intervals of four years and at the time of any injury or cut. A little scratch can lead to trouble! Every family is urged to participate in Nebraska's tetanus immunization campaign May 1-May 11. The schools are supplying their patrons with literature concerning the program. Others may contact the County Extension Office. Call 375-8310.

**Spring Winter Garments**  
Now is the time to put winter clothes into temporary retirement and make ready for spring and summer clothes. Some garments probably have served their purpose and need to be disposed of. There are many agencies that will be glad to have them.

Garments that warrant storage space during the summer are worthy of good grooming treatment. The best insurance against permanent damage which may occur during storage is to put clothing away clean. Spots and stains which are allowed to remain on fabric may cause color change or fiber deterioration.

Many professional cleaners include mothproofing and storage in their services. Some families set aside one closet for out-of-season storage. Clean garments can be hung in plastic bags or placed in boxes in the storage closet.

There is no substitute for cleanliness of clothes in clean storage space.

## Co. Agent's Column

A new sudan-sorghum cross, NB-280S adapted to all areas of Nebraska was released by the University of Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station Monday.

The new cross—Nebraska 7035 sudan x Martin—produces an excellent for a green crop suitable for pasture or green chop, according to J. C. Swinbank, NU Extension agronomist.

Since NB-280S is not a feed grain, it can be grown on conservation acres under the feed grain program. It is adapted throughout the State for irrigated and dryland production. Seed of the parent lines is available from the NU Foundation Seed Division. The seed will be released to growers who are interested in increasing the seedstocks.

Nebraska-280S is very comparable in yield to Piper or Wheeler Sudan. It has good seedling vigor and recovers rapidly after cutting or grazing. Swinbank said the stem size and leaf width is larger than true sudan, but less than some of the sudan-sorghum crosses now on the market.

During the testing period at Lincoln, Nebraska 280S had the lowest average prussic acid content of any of the sudan-sorghum crosses being tested.

Therefore, the prussic acid content is low enough for safe grazing.

**High Grain Feeding Can Boost Dairy Profits**  
Many potentially high producing dairy cows in Nebraska are still being underfed.

Today's better bred cattle require more energy to reach and maintain high levels of milk production than most dairymen have been accustomed to feeding says Don Kubik, Northeast Nebraska Extension dairyman. Liberal grain feeding during the early lactation period is essential if cows are to reach top production.

Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement Association records show close relationships between production, amount of grain fed and the return over feed costs. The highest producing cows during 1961 also returned the highest profits and had the cheapest feed costs per 100 pounds of milk. There seems to be little reason

for breeding for high production unless dairymen also feed accordingly.

To determine the potential production of a cow, the dairyman should challenge the cow through heavy grain feeding and measure the response in milk produced. Thumb rules for feeding grain according to production are not satisfactory, since the level of feeding lags behind production. Cattle should be fed "for production" rather than "according to production," Kubik believes.

The Nebraska approach has been to feed every cow early in the lactation as if she is a good cow and let the results be the guide for continued feeding. Many dairymen start by feeding six to eight pounds of grain per head about three weeks before freshening. This is increased from one to two pounds daily until grain intake reaches 1 1/2 pounds per 100 pounds of body weight. Pre-calf feeding helps get the rumen, the cow's appetite and eating habits adjusted to liberal amounts before freshening.

Additional concentrates are offered as soon after calving as possible. Grain should be increased until milk production or the cow's appetite reaches a peak. "A challenge feeding period of 30 to 60 days may be necessary to establish the production for the lactation," according to Kubik.

Once this production level has been established, feeding can be adjusted to the milk-feed price ratio. Cows responding to the challenged rate of feeding should be continued until production begins to decline. Cows not responding within 60 days should be fed at the rate of one pound of grain for every three or four pounds of milk.
