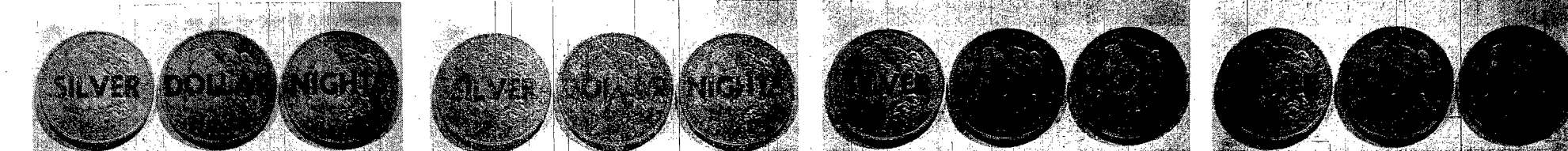

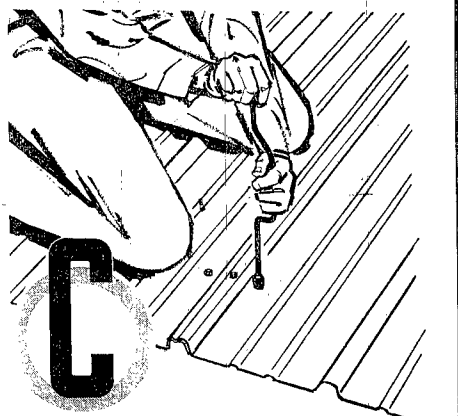

Peru had double winners with Larry Rätthe's hurdles sweep, 16.7 in the highs and 27.8 in the lows, and Bill Witly's 135-6 discus and 166-10 javelin.

The meet was Wayne's last before the Nebraska College Conference meet at Kearney May 16-17.

Wildcats Co-Champions In Three-Way Title Tie

Wayne State Monday won another sport championship this year, but again a co-championship. The Wildcats split a pair with Kearney, thus finished the NCC season in a three-way title tie with Kearney and Peru, all with 5-3 records.

The previous championship was Wayne's basketball tie with Peru.

The future of Wayne baseball rested on an NAIA district meeting Tuesday night when Nebraska entrants in the NAIA playoff were to be chosen. This posed a knotty problem because only two teams will represent Nebraska in a playoff with two Kansas teams this weekend. Nebraska contenders for the two spots include the NCC's tri-champs, the Tri-State's leaders, plus the state's independent teams, chiefly Omaha.

Wayne lost the opener with Kearney, 5-3, but rebounded to smash the visitors, 12-2, in the nightcap.

The Cats gained a 3-0 lead in the first game, but faded on a disastrous fifth inning when Kearney scored three runs on three doubles and an error. Wayne never managed another score—not in that game.

But they smashed Kearney with the five runs in the first inning of the next game, including Ron Sadler's grand slam homer. Still fired up in the second frame, the Cats scored four more times, then added another pair in the third inning—one of them Dean deBuhr's freak homer when the Kearney center fielder apparently caught the ball on the top of the fence, then dropped it over the fence.

DeBuhr pitched the entire second game, striking out 11. Keith Krommenhoek started the first game but yielded to Larry Faust in the fifth.

Capitol News Committee Gives Approval To Television Financing Bill

The legislature's education committee has approved an amendment to the state educational television financing bill which struck a proposed special property tax levy feature.

A now amended, the bill provides that if such a network is approved, the legislature may provide funds for its establishment and maintenance.

The original measure called for financing with a special levy of 10 mills in 1963 and varying rates in succeeding years. Under another amendment the network was divorced from the state's centennial celebration and accompanying activities.

Meanwhile, a spokesman for the Nebraska State Committee on Educational Television joined with Sen. Richard Marvel of Hastings in disagreeing with Dr. Paul Miller of Omaha who proposed a restudy of the proposed network. Miller is Omaha superintendent of schools.

Jack McBride, co-chairman of the state committee, said the network was thoroughly examined during a 15-month survey under the direction of an 18-member committee appointed by the governor. Marvel, sponsor of two bills seeking implementation of educational television, said it should be started in the state during this session of the legislature.

McBride said the survey made was thorough, comprehensive and kept the educational needs of the state in mind at all times, "including the needs of Omaha." Under the bills before the legislature, he added, Omaha would get "every bit as much" service as any other portion of the state. He said Miller in his opposition implied Omaha should get more.

Gives Power Views

Governor Morrison says he would like to see LB 220 passed in its present form and given a two-year trial before other major power legislation is considered.

The bill proposes creation of a state power review board.

The governor made his feelings known after the legislature reversed itself and refused to revive LB 600, the so-called strong merger power reorganization plan.

Morrison said he believes the lawmakers killed the four generation and transmission reorganization bills because they feel that it would be "too radical a departure from the existing program."

He added that the 1963 legislature might be in a better position to assess the needs of more legislation.

The strong merger bill was killed recently by the public works committee, but the legislators voted to override the committee action. The next day, however, they voted to reconsider and in effect upheld the committee's killing of the proposal.

The legislature also refused to raise a second power reorganization bill—LB 483. That measure proposed a merger of the boards of directors of Consumers Public Power District, Loup River Public Power District, and Platt Valley Public Power and Irrigation District.

Filing Cost Raised

It will cost more for candidates to file for office under LB 540 which received a 42-1 final stamp of approval from the legislature.

The bill provides that candidates from the county through the U. S. Senate level will pay one per cent of the annual salary the candidate will receive if elected.

Under present law those filing for the U. S. Senate pay a \$50 fee and others pay \$10.

Reach Agreement

The governors and boundary commissions of Nebraska, and South Dakota have reached an agreement on placing the Gavins Point tailwaters entirely in Nebraska, but permitting reciprocal fishing and hunting in the area.

The agreement supported the Nebraska Game Commission view that the tailwaters are in Nebraska. But it ignored the commission's stand that South Dakota fishermen must have Nebraska licenses before angling in the tailwaters.

The final compact will be drawn up by attorneys general of the two states. Then it will be presented again to the boundary commissions for ratification and sent to the legislatures of both states.

Governor Morrison, who had favored a more conciliatory settlement than the one proposed by the Nebraska Commission, said he was sure the agreement approved was the only one the Nebraska legislature would go along with "as a matter of practical politics."

Extension Notes

Buying your Sewing Machine

For most families the purchase of a sewing machine for home use is a lifetime investment.

There are a number of gimmicks used to bait the homemaker into buying a sewing machine these days when there is such a wide choice of machines available. So it behooves the homemaker to "look around first."

No machine is likely to have all the features you might consider desirable so a compromise best suited to your present and future needs is in order. First consider the kind of sewing for which you are buying the machine. For occasional plain sewing, making of simple garments or patching and mending, a straight sewing machine is satisfactory.

The more versatile swing-needle or zigzag type machines are designed to handle a wider range in stitch styles and specialty sewing. This calls for a decision as to whether the specialty job will be done often enough to warrant the added cost.

Teachers Colleges Budget

The presidents of the four state teachers colleges have urged the legislature's budget committee to approve a budget of \$9.3 million for the next biennium.

The normal schools were appropriated \$6.1 million in state tax funds by the 1961 Unicameral.

Henry I. Freed of Chadron, president of the Normal Board, noted that Governor Morrison had recommended a \$7.5 million appropriation for the teachers' colleges.

When he was asked how the governor arrived at his recommendation, Freed replied: "I don't know, but I wish I did." He also expressed the hope that the governor's recommendation would not influence the committee.

Meals and Lodging Tax

A bill proposing a special tax on meals and lodging has been withdrawn from the legislature.

Sen. Marvin Stromer of Lincoln, who was instrumental in getting the bill introduced, asked that it be withdrawn from consideration.

He said the people who would be affected by the bill have a "double standard." He explained that "on the one hand they want money to promote tourism, but on the other hand they say 'don't come near us because we can't help finance the promotion of Nebraska.'"

Stromer said he remained convinced the special taxes he proposed would not have worked a hardship on hotels, motels or restaurants.

The bill proposed a five per cent tax on rooms renting for \$2 or more, and a three per cent tax on meals costing \$1.50 or more.

Income would have been earmarked for tourism promotion, industrial development and access roads to recreational areas. Any surplus above specified amounts would have gone into the general fund.

Board of Equalization

Railroads operating in Nebraska have asked the State Board of Equalization to reduce by \$3.8 million their 1963 property assessments.

The actual assessment will be arrived at later this month by the five-member board headed by Governor Morrison.

The Union Pacific, largest freight and passenger railroad in the state, asked the board to assess it on valuation of \$644 million, down \$12 million from 1962.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, second largest in the state, asked to be assessed on valuation of \$34.5 million, down some \$665,000 from last year.

Johnson Reappointed

Governor Morrison has reappointed Forrest Johnson to a six-year term as state tax commissioner.

Johnson, 45, was first appointed to the post by the late Gov. Ralph Brooks.

A Democrat and former mayor of Lincoln, Johnson is an attorney and former president of the League of Nebraska Municipalities.

His reappointment is subject to confirmation by the legislature.



Years ago Congress or even our State Legislature passed a law and at the appointed time it was enacted as a statute and we were governed by it. In those days we were governed by statute meaning that the law which was enacted became the one by which we shaped our course in order to conform.

These laws were enacted and placed upon the books by an elected legislative body. Therefore, we were governed by those whom we elected. Right now though the deal is rapidly changing. We are getting away from Government based upon the statute and have drifted into government by regulation because in a great many instances the laws are passed and a certain Department is charged with their enforcement. Then this Department is given a free hand to set up such regulations as are necessary to administer the law.

Brother, if you think there aren't some "dillies" among these regulations it is only because you have never studied them. Then we go a step further and my friends it is a long step—a step known as "Interpretation of the Regulations." Right there is the pay-off and the trouble is that you have to accept these interpretations and be governed by them. You are not given credit for being able to make a sensible interpretation. Bureaucracy in action. Wouldn't be so bad if some of the bureaucrats gave more thought to a sensible decision rather than substituting their weight of authority for good horse sense.

Trouble too is that you no more than think you understand and maybe can abide by the regulations and their interpretations than along comes a new crew. Now by the wildest stretch of imagination they couldn't possibly let the rulings of the old regime stand. Got to show what they can do—so here we go again.

The original statute has long been lost in a maze of regulations and interpretations enforced and administered by a set of people that by the elective process were never of our choosing and undoubtedly never would be.

You say this doesn't happen in your business. Do a little nosing around your own city or county seat. The boys are there "regulating and interpreting."

Internal Parasites in Livestock

Livestock losses due to internal parasites are one of the largest losses suffered by livestock producers.

Here in Nebraska about 80 per cent of our swine are infected with round worms and 30-40 per cent show evidence of lung worm infection," says Dr. E. Crosby Howe, NU Extension animal hygienist.

Sheep, cattle and horses all suffer from internal parasites. Symptoms may resemble other diseases, or other diseases may complicate the condition, so that it is wise to have your veterinarian make the diagnosis and prescribe the best treatment for the type of parasite found.

"Livestock men who would like to increase the net income from their operation will find that disease and parasite control and prevention will, when properly administered, do just that," Dr. Howe points out.

'63 Weed Control Guides

A guide to "Chemicals That Control Weeds" in the field as well as in lawns and gardens is available at County Extension Offices throughout Nebraska.

The circular, EC 63-130 contains latest information on the effective ways to control various weeds based on University of Nebraska Agricultural Experiment Station tests.

Sections in the circular include recommendations for preplant emergence and postemergence weed control in field crops. Other sections include recommendations for controlling weeds in pastures, non-crop areas, lawns and other areas. In addition, there is a special section on controlling troublesome weeds and woody plants.

ings on slopes once thought to be too steep for cropping more than 50 percent of the time. M. D. Weldon, University of Nebraska Extension agronomist reports. Recent experiments have shown that high yields may provide enough crop residues to keep up soil organic matter. And these residues furnish enough cover to protect soil from serious erosion, if rows are on the contour or parallel to terraces. Continuous cash cropping does involve some risks. Continued use of nitrogen fertilizers caused various residual effects in the soil, depending on the kind of nitrogen materials used. These effects can be corrected by getting soil samples tested and applying fertilizers as needed, according to Weldon.

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

EYE EXERCISES

Q. Both of my children are nearsighted (myopic). Would eye exercise improve this condition?

A. In some cases eye exercises seem to improve the ability to use the eyes and thus improve vision to a slight degree. However, nearsightedness (myopia) is an optical defect . . . the distance from the lens to the retina is too great. As a result, the image is formed in front of the retina, with resulting "fuzzy" vision. It's like a camera being out of focus. No amount of exercise will correct the physical defect which causes nearsightedness.

Q. Is a doctor required by law to treat a stranger who has been injured in a highway accident?

A. There may be a moral and ethical obligation to render first aid in such an emergency, but there is no legal requirement.
