Buying your Sewing Machine For most families the purchase of a sewing machine for home use is a lifetime investment. There are a number of gim-icks used to bait the homemak-er into buying a sewing ma-chine these days when there is such a wild choice of machines available. So it behooves the homemaker to "Look around first".

No machine is likely to have all the features you might con-sider desirable so a compromise best suited to your prèsent and future needs is in order. 



Q. Both of my children are nearsighted (myopic). Would eye exercise improve this condition? A. In some cases eye exercises seem to improve the ability to *use* the eyes and thus improve vision to a slight degree. However, nearsighted-ness (myopin) is an optical defect . the dis-tance from the lens to the retina is too great. As a result, the image is formed in front of the retina, with resulting "tuzy" vision. It's like a camera being out of focus. No amount of exer-cise will correct the physical defect which causes nearsightedness.

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
