Tax Broadening Bill, LB 612

Killed by Legislators 23-19

Capitol News

LINCOLN—The issue of tax broadening has been laid to rest for another two years in Nebras-ka.

The legislature has killed LB 612 which would have imposed 612 which would have imposed a tax against income to defray the costs of financing state gov-crimiental operations. The vote to kill carried 23-19 but was close enough to give op-ponents some second thoughts. One of them, Sen George Syas, Omaha, said the disagreement has so evenly split the senators "that we cannot afford to rest on our oars." Some of those favoring the in-

our oars." Some of those favoring the in-come tax measure believe get-ting such a tax passed in succeed-ing sessions will be more difficult when the Unicameral gets more representation from the metro-reliter the second second second second second representation from the metro-

politan areas. The immediate effect of the in-come 'tax rejection apparently will be an effort to hold down the state property tax levy. Some of those actively supporting a broadened tax base have already said they will vote against any bills which would hike the mill levy for state government sup-port.

Icvy for state government sup-port. Some of those working hardest to get LB 612 killed said an in-coime tax is not necessary at this time. They noted that laws have already been passed to increase the state treasury's income by about \$15 million for the next biennial period. In addition, they argued, there is a three per cent increase annually in the valua-tion of taxable property. Generally, spending bills which will jump the state property tax seem to be in for a rough going in the remaining days of the ses-sion.

sion. A measure which would im-plement the Kert-Mills program of medical assistance for the aged seems to be in good shape. The financing would come from a \$2 increase in the \$3.50 head tax, which is imposed on those between 21 and 60.

A good-sized fight apparently is building up in the legislatur over a proposed statewide Sun day closing law.

day closing law. One of the legislators, Sen. William B. Brandt of Unadilla, said he cannot support any pro-pocal "that will put any small, legitimate enterprise out of bus-iness. This bill, in its present form, would do that."
