See New Record Enrollment In Wayne State's Fall Term

A new record enrollment next fall at Wayne State appears likely on the basis of advance dormitory reservations.

A 65 per cent increase in reservations was noted on June 1, compared with the same date last year, President W. A. Brandenburg said.

It is significant that the number of high school graduates in Nebraska is virtually the same as in 1962.

College officials offer two explanations for the large increase in room reservations: a higher percentage of graduates plan to attend college this fall, and the trimester calendar attracts students who wish to accelerate their education. Students may complete the bachelor's degree in two and two-thirds years under the trimester schedule, or they may take the traditional four years with recesses from mid-April to September.

Summer session enrollment this week raised the campus population sharply. A flood of registrants Monday brought the combined summer-third term total close to last year's 1,981, and enrollment will continue through next Monday, the last day to enter a summer class.

The summer faculty has four newcomers, here for the June-July session. They are Dr. Helmut Haessler, from California Lutheran College, in history; Dr. Klaus Herrmann, from Lakehead College, Canada, in history and political science; John Hillbert, from Midland College, in speech, and Arthur Robertson, from Norfolk Junior College, in mathematics.

If you are going on vacation, the Wayne Police Department would like to know about it. Police Chief Garth Dawson brought this up in explaining one of the services of the police in protecting property.

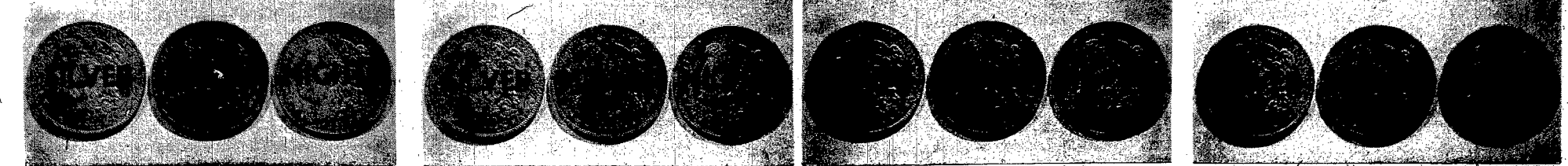
Chief Dawson said that if you are planning to be away for an extended period, notify the Department and they will check your house on their regular patrol of the city.

Capitol News Parochial School Aid Bill Defeated by 24-15 Vote

LINCOLN—A proposal to allow tax-financed transportation for parochial school pupils has been soundly defeated in the legislature. The vote against the suggestions was 24-15.

Speechmaking the attempt for the controversial aid was Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff. After the legislative turn-down, he immediately announced he is having a constitutional amendment prepared and hopes to have it submitted to the voters in 1964.

The legislature's action came after Governor Morrison and some church spokesmen went on record in favoring of spending public money to finance school transportation for parochial students. The governor said he also favors a constitutional amendment on the matter.

Carpenter had argued that it would be fair and equitable to give parochial schools some help in view of the money the private school system saves the taxpayers.

During the debate, it was noted that in 1953 the attorney general issued an opinion stating that the aid to parochial students would be unconstitutional. However, Carpenter said the opinion "does not really say anything and I went to know the letter of the law on this matter."

He said he was not prompted by any church group to introduce his proposal and added that it was submitted "because I believe in the principle."

Among those who have a view opposite Carpenter's was Sen. Clifton Foster, Bradshaw. He said the Scottsbluff lawmaker's idea was in direct conflict with both the state and federal constitutions. He also maintained the state "does not owe the parochial system a penny."

Several of the parochial spokesmen said bus transportation is in the category of "welfare service" to which private school students are entitled as residents of the community. They said this in no way involves the doctrine of separation of church and state.

Home Stretch
Nebraska's lawmakers have taken a four-day vacation and are now heading down the home stretch toward adjournment.

There are some, including presiding officer, Lt. Gov. Dwight Burney, who can't visualize the completion of legislative business before July 15.

Between 50 and 60 bills were still awaiting first consideration at the start of this week and a

Centennial Spending

The commission said in studying centennial celebration budgeting for four other states, only Oregon put out approximately double the sum expended by Kansas, West Virginia and Minnesota.

A. James Ebel, Lincoln, commission chairman, said, "If the Nebraska Centennial is to do good for the people of the state, funds must be in hand to begin concrete planning now."

Nebraska will celebrate its Centennial in 1967. Thus far, the legislature has not made money available for the event.

Peace Corps
University of Nebraska officials has been advised an earlier-announced Peace Corps training program on the campus this summer has been canceled because of insufficient volunteers.

The University had been asked to establish a program to train up to 75 volunteers for specialized work in Ecuador.

Lawn Tips
Many insects and insect-like pests damage lawns and other turf. They cause the grass to turn brown and die, or they build unsightly mounds that may smother the grass.

Some of the pests infest the soil and attack the plant roots; some feed on the plant leaves and stems; others suck juice from the plants.

Other insects and insect-like pests inhabit lawns but do not damage them. They are annoying, and some of them attack people.

These pests can be controlled with insecticides. Control recommendations developed through research are constantly being revised as new chemical substances are discovered, tested, and perfected.

Following is a list of insect pests commonly found in lawns and recommended control materials:

Sod webworms: Aldrin, chlordane, dieldrin, heptachlor and diazinon.

Leaf hoppers: DDT and malathion.

Chiggers: Dieldrin, lindane and toxophene.

Use of these materials also helps control white grubs, ants and moles which feed on underground insects.

Follow directions on the container label and heed all precautions in regard to each insecticide. Do not apply insecticides to a lawn when people or animals are on it, and do not allow insecticides to drift to an area where they might injure people or animals. Do not permit children or animals on the lawn until the insecticides have been washed off by sprinkling, and the grass has dried completely.

Wash thoroughly with soap and water after applying insecticides, and before eating and smoking. Wash dusting or spraying equipment thoroughly after using it.

Extension Notes

Is Your Luggage Ready?
With vacation time approaching perhaps a look at your luggage might be in order.

To remove dust accumulated on the inside of the luggage, use the nozzle attachment of your vacuum cleaner. Actually this should be done frequently to keep luggage free from dust and lint.

Next, wash the outside of luggage with saddle soap, wipe dry with soft cloth. Wipe thoroughly dry apply paste wax to give the surface a semi-permanent protection. Buff the surface—an electric polisher or a good hand rubbing will give an extra hard finish.

Interiors of train cases or makeup kits can be refurbished by recovering, using patterned contact paper obtainable in department stores.

After your trip this year, wipe all travel stains from the luggage and store in dust proof covers made of plastic film.

Lining For Distinction
A light-weight, firmly-woven lining is recommended for garments made from loosely-woven fabrics or fabrics which have a tendency to stretch. Laces need lining for appearance as well as body. Linings keep fabrics like silk shantungs from pulling out at the seams and "sitting out" in the skirt. They also prevent some wrinkling in a smoothly fitted sheath dress.

A skirt with a petgot needs lining for effect. Some dresses with bloused bodies need a lining to keep the fullness just right and in place.

A lining covers the inside seam work in coats and jackets. An underlining or innerlining in a fabric used to back a section of a garment for shape and added strength.

Fabrics such as cotton sheath lining, muslin, silk or china silk are used for underlinings while lining fabrics are usually silk, rayon or acetate and should be soft and pliable but firmly woven and durable. Both underlinings and linings should permit the same type of cleaning—either dry cleaning or laundering—as used for the outer fabric.

Don't Let Comfort Bring Tragedy
Modern electrical appliances have become commonplace in homes everywhere. When used correctly, most appliances are perfectly safe. However, some special safety precautions must be observed. Many accidents would never occur if dangerous conditions and situations were recognized and removed.

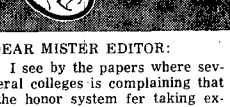
"People often become so accustomed to dangerous conditions they don't recognize the potential hazards. They know that the cord on the living room lamp has some "babe spots", but do not replace it until baby is shocked or the curtains catch fire," quoting Mrs. Clara Leopold, Lincoln.

Some Safety Guidelines:
Disconnect the electric iron when answering the telephone so it won't burn the cover or garment.

Keep youngsters away from the washing machine when it's operating.

Teach every member of the family that a radio has no business in the bathroom. Water plus electric current can be fatal.

Metal pull chains for electric light fixtures should have a cotton string where you grasp them to avoid a short circuit through your body.

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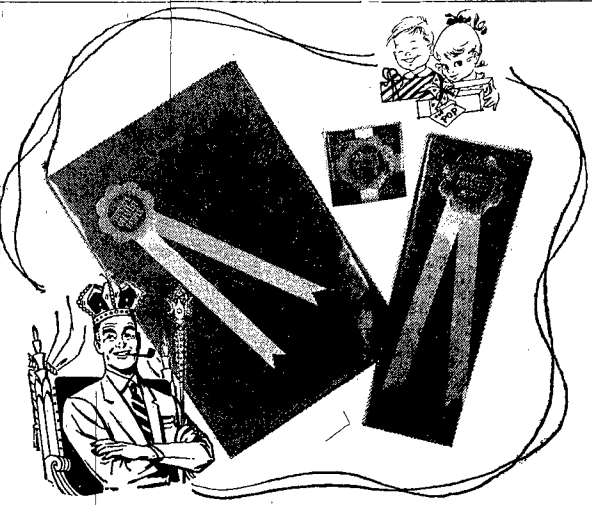
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
