A 65 per cent increase in reservations was noted on June 1, compared with the same date last year, President W. A. Brandenburg said.

It is significant that the number of high school graduates in Nebraska is virtually the same as in 1962.

# Parochial School Aid Bill Defeated by 24-15 Vote good many of them were con-froversial, some of them ex-tremely so. Add to this the fact that the huge budget measure is still to be debated and it becomes obvious why many of the sena-tors are pessimistic about the possibility of winding up their work prior to July 4. The legislators have been com-ing to grips with some of the more knotty problems awaiting disposition.

LINCOLN—A proposal to allow tax-financed transportation for parochial school pupils has been soundly defeated in the legislature. The vote against the suggestions was 24-15. Spearheading the attempt for the controversial aid was Sen. Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff. After the legislative turndown, he immediately announced he is having a constitutional amend-

he immediately announced he is having a constitutional amend-ment prepared and hopes to have it submitted to the voters in

The legislature's action came after Governor Morrison and some chirch spokesmen went on record in favoring of spending public money to finance school trabsportation for parochial students. The governor said he also favors a constitutional amendment on the matter.

Carpenter had argued that it
would be fair and equitable to
gove parochal schools some bate
n view of the money the private
chool system saves the taxavers.

school system saves are tax-paxers.

During the debate, it was noted that in 1953 the attorney general issued an opinion stating that the aid to parochial students would be unconstitutional. How-ever, Carpenter said the opinion "does not really say anything and I went to know the letter of the law on this matter."

He said he was not prompted by any church group to introduce his proposal and added that it was submitted "because I be-lieve in the principle."

his proposal and added that it was submitted "because I believe in the principle."

Among those who have a view opposite Carpenter's was Sen. Clifton Foster, Bradshaw. He said the Scottsbluff lawmaker's idea was in direct conflict with both the state and federal constitutions. He also maintained the state "does not owe the parochial system a penny." Several of the parochial spokesmen said bus transportation is in the category of "welfare service" to which private school students are entitled as residents of the community. They said this in no way involves the doctrine of separation of church and state.

Nebraska will celebrate its Centennial in 1967. Thus far, the legislature has not made money available for the event.

The defeat of the state income tax proposal has helped some of the senators make up their minds on pending legislation. This group includes those who are working diligently to keep the levy on property for state governmental purposes as low as possible.

governmental purposes as low as possible.

Among bills getting preliminary approval in recent days was one proposing establishment of a statewide educational television network. Approval came despite the fact the financing will apparently come from the state's general fund, which receives a good deal of its support-from the levy on property.

The bill still has a long way to go, but it survived its first floor test handily.

Also off to a fast start is LB 655 which provides the means by which an osteopath may be licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Nebraska. One signio ficant revision in the measure removed provisions which would have applied the grandfather clause to presently osteopaths.

clause to presently practicing osteopaths.

There are some lawmakers who now believe LB 15 will get a lot of support. The bill could impose a fourmill tax on stock in domestic and domesticated corporations.

Such stock is now exempt under Nebraskars intangible tax formula. The philosophy behind this exemption is that it encourages home corporations.

Nebraskans who own stock in foreign corporations do not get such favored treatment.

Already passed is LB 11, which increases the tax on gross premiums of domestic insurance companies from four-tenths of one per cent to six-tenths of one per cent.

Meat Price Investigation

Governor Morrison says he is opposed to having the state con-duct an investigation into the decline of livestock prices and its relationship to retail meat

its relationship to recent prices.

The governor said such a study would only result in a duplication of similar studies conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the University of Nebraska College of Agricul

Recently, the legislature asked Morrison to report the results of a study into the prices of cattle and hogs authorized by the lawmakers March 22.

Morrison said he has conferred with agriculture department officials in Washington and with college of agriculture-economists about the price problem. As a result of these talks, he added, he is convinced what is most urgently needed is more rapid and frequent marketing information to keep feeders advised about the general livestock situation across the country.

Lawn Tips

Many insects and insect-like pests damage lawns and other turf. They cause the grass to turn brown and die, or they build unsightly mounds that may smother the grass.

Some of the pests infest the soil and attack the plant leaves and stems; others suck juice from the plants.

Other insects and insect-like pents inhabit lawns but do not damage the m. They are annoying, and some of them attack people.

Do not permit children or animals on the lawn until the insecticides have been washed off by sprinkling, and the grass has dried completely.

to reduce temperatures inside

The structure should be oriented so that the principal glass areas receive maximum protection from the direct rays of the sun. Provision also must be made for shading the house, particularly the glass areas—with roof overhangs, awnings, shutters, louvertype screens or vegetation. Light colored roofs, exterior walls and

ated and reflected heat. Large concrete areas adjacent to the house and exposed to the sun should be avoided.

Plantings of deciduous trees shade the house in summer and yet permit the sun to penetrate during the winter for indoor light and heat. However, trees and shrubs should not be planted too close to the house if breezes through doors and windows are depended upon for natural cooling.

Metal or canvas awnings reduce the heat coming through three windows by 70 to 75 per cent. Light-colored awnings are more effective than dark ones.

Louver or bar screens are about 90 per cent effective in reducing heat through south windows not otherwise shaded.

With vacation time approaching perhaps a look at your luggage might be in order.

To remove dust accumulated on the inside of the luggage, use the nozzle attachment of your vacuum cleaner. Actually this should be done frequently to keep luggage tree from dust and lint. Next, wash the outside of luggage with saddle soap, wipe dry with soft cloth. When thoroughly dry apply paste wax to give the surface a semi-permanent protection. Buff the surface—an electric polisher or a good hand rubbing will give an extra hard finish. Interiors of train cases

After your trip this year, wipe all travel stains from the luggage and store in dust proof covers made of plastic film.

### Lining For Distinction

Liming For Distinction

A light-weight, firmly-woven lining is recommended for garments made from losely-woven fabrics or fabrics which have a tendency to stretch. Laces need lining for appearance as well as body. Linings keep fabrics like silk shantungs from pulling out at the seams and 'sitting out' in the skirt. They also prevent some wrinkling in a smoothly fitted sheath dress.

A skirt with a pegtop needs lining for effect. Some dresses with bloused bodies need a lin-

ing to keep the fullness just right and in place.
A lining covers the inside seam work in coats and jackets, An underlining or innerlinning in a fabric used to back a section of a garment for shape and add-

of a garment for shape and addeed strength.

Fabrics such as cotton sheath lining, muslin seri, or china silk are used for underlinings while lining fabrics are usually silk, rayon or acetate and should be soft and pliable but firmly woven and durable. Both underlinings and linings should permit the same type of cleaning—cither dry cleaning or laundering—as used for the outer fabric.
