Warm weather conditions have resulted in more rapid development of red spider mites than normal. As they develop on evergreens and ornamental plants, they can be reduced with sprays of several antimitics such as chlorobenzilate, aramite, dimite, oxvel, kelthane, tedion or genite.

The 2,4-DB formulations should be especially effective for use on soybean fields where cocklebur is a serious problem. At rates recommended for controlling cocklebur, certain other broad-leaf weeds such as pigweed and annual morning glory will be suppressed or partially controlled.

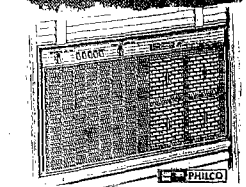

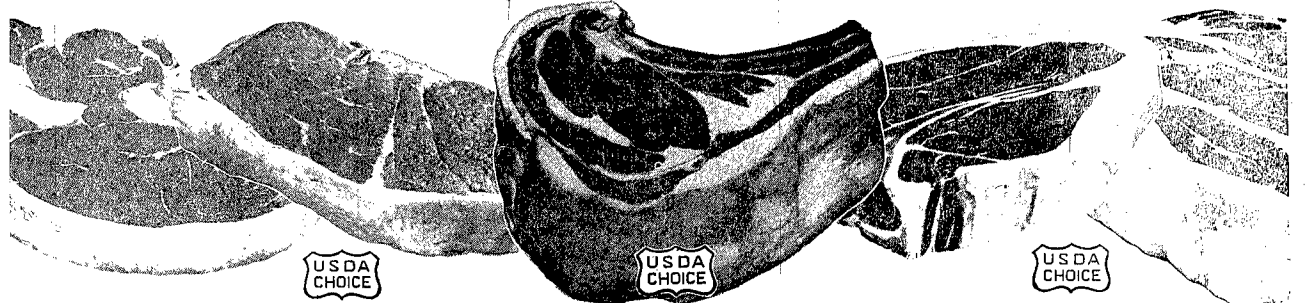

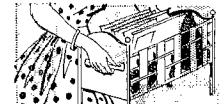

Medical Mirror Better Health Through Knowledge DRY CLEANING FLUID Q. I recently tried one of the new coin-operated dry cleaning machines. Is the cleaning fluid used in such machines poisonous? A. Various solvents are used in such machines and it would be difficult to give a pat answer to your question without knowing the name of the solvent involved. Many dry cleaning establishments use tetrachlorethylene. This chemical, one of several used in coin-operated machines, is moderately toxic. The vapors are easily absorbed through the lungs, and inhalation of the vapor may cause headache, lightheadedness and extreme drowsiness. Coin-operated establishments should be well ventilated to protect customers and workers from over-exposure to cleaning fluids. However, no poisonous effects can be experienced from dry clothing cleaned in this manner. CARBUNCLES Q. What causes me to keep having carbuncles, and what can I do to stop them? A. You should see your physician and find out whether you have too much sugar in your system or some other disorder. Many dry cleaning establishments use tetrachlorethylene. This chemical, one of several used in coin-operated machines, is moderately toxic. The vapors are easily absorbed through the lungs, and inhalation of the vapor may cause headache, lightheadedness and extreme drowsiness. Coin-operated establishments should be well ventilated to protect customers and workers from over-exposure to cleaning fluids. However, no poisonous effects can be experienced from dry clothing cleaned in this manner. CARBUNCLES Q. What causes me to keep having carbuncles, and what can I do to stop them? A. You should see your physician and find out whether you have too much sugar in your system or some other disorder. 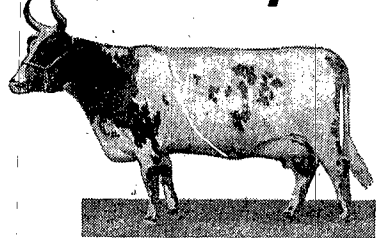

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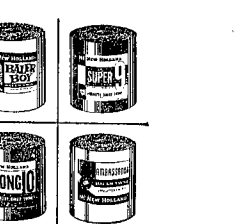
